

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



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Malaysian cinema has experienced a mini-renaissance of late, with standouts either dominating discourse or winning international awards. Among these is Cho We Jun's sweet *Hungry Ghost Diner*, which bagged the NETPAC Award at the 27th Bucheon International Fantastic Film Festival last year.

Hungry Ghost Diner centres on Bonnie, a food truck operator, who discovers that her family's coffee shop is haunted by the spirits of her dead relatives returning for the Hungry Ghost Festival. "I do feel that in Malaysia, the festival is an intangible cultural heritage," Cho says. "More so than other celebrations, the Hungry Ghost Festival, which occurs in August, has a communal aspect to it, and everyone's invited to take part."

Some of the scale and pageantry of the Hungry Ghost Festival, especially in urban centres, has been lost with modernisation, which informs the themes of return and rediscovery in *Hungry Ghost Diner*. Cho notes, "As society becomes more modern,

we [seem to] prize conformity, convenience and efficiency."

There is a sense of otherworldliness throughout the film, emulating many of his childhood favourites, from Hong Kong comedies like *Mr Vampire* and *Happy Ghost* to the whimsy of *Big Fish* and *Spirited Away*. Despite his debut full-

length film being one of the many local successes last year, Cho is still tempering his optimism about the immediate future of Malaysian cinema. "I would speculate that during the pandemic lockdown, us filmmakers had a lot of time to rewrite screenplays and better develop story ideas," he says. "While

it is nice to see the emergence of all these great titles, it might just be a flash in the pan if we don't continue to follow up with works of quality." kinovisuals.com

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

village at the watery edge of the world, equipped with holiday essentials - six restaurants, a PADI dive centre, a spa by Phytomer, a 24-hour gym, a tennis court, a kids' playground and an on-call buggy service.

Pullman has beach bungalows as well as two sets of overwater villas. One set fans out into the water like a whale's tail and another is arranged in a fish-shaped loop. Apart from roomy bathrooms with showpiece tubs and a choice of indoor or alfresco showers, each villa has its own spacious deck, an infinity plunge pool and ladder access to the shallow reef waters below. Now and then, you might spy a fever of stingrays cruising past from the wooden deck or through the glass window built into the bedroom floor.

For families with kids, a stay at one of two Aqua Villas is bound to build core memories with the little ones. The two-level villa sleeps four, with the lower bedroom built underwater. It's an aquarium with a glass wall that looks out onto a reef regrowth project where scores of fish love to hang out. Solitary black-tip reef sharks appear regularly, weaving through the coral and curiously sidling up to the glass, before casually swimming away.



Among the joys of all-inclusive packages is unlimited food and drink, and each of the resort's outlets offers its own proposition. The main dining hall called Mélange, for instance, is where world cuisines - Arabic, French, Asian, Indian and Maldivian - converge. Phat Chameleon is the resort's signature vegan and vegetarian restaurant with its own well-tended organic produce garden, while Soug Oven serves crowd-favourite Italian specialties. The alfresco restaurant Sol Rising - where menu items feature protein-packed and gluten-free options – would appeal to active early risers and Saffron Affair is a west-facing lounge with front-row seats to some of the most breathtaking sunsets you'll ever see.

For a small village strung out in the middle of nowhere, there's plenty to do here. Fill your hours lying on the beach or working up a sweat - from yoga and Zumba to paddle boarding and kayaking. If you've always fantasised about being a mermaid, PADI Basic Mermaid courses are available for guests six years old and above, and who can float for at least three minutes

and swim 25m with ease. And while it's not everyone's cup of tea, the off-menu back-of-house guided tour is perfect for travellers with a fascination for how things work. The tour includes insight into the resort's sustainability efforts, such as a wastewater treatment facility and a bottle crushing shed where glass is turned into shimmery concrete.

You could also go dolphin-spotting aboard the photogenic traditional fishing boat called the *dhoni*, in spots that attract large pods of spinner dolphins. But if you'd rather dive, Maldivian waters are a deep-blue fever dream of the most magnificent marine megafauna: turtles, manta rays and up to 26 different species of sharks. A whole morning of snorkelling along a reef shelf - teeming with wildlife - is enough to restore whatever sense of wonder and awe you might have been missing. When you no longer care to remember what day it is, but can name at least 10 different species of fish, that's when you know the holiday immersion is complete. 

The east wing

With a new Pudong campus, a hub for ancient Chinese culture in Shanghai soars to greater heights by STEPHEN O'CONNELL

As if there isn't enough visual

stimulation in China's largest metropolis, the city's premier repository of cultural artefacts has unveiled a new wing: Shanghai Museum East, located on Century Avenue, in the city's snazzy financial district of Pudong. Shanghai Museum East, which is opening in phases, features six storeys with a combined total floor space of 113,000m² - double the floor area of the Louvre and puts the museum on track for its goal of becoming the world's top museum for ancient Chinese art (the original, smaller museum at People's Square will mainly host themed and special exhibitions in the future).

Here, you can expect a deep dive into the fascinating regional cultures that make up the world's second most populous country. "Our East venue will put on the most comprehensive display of the history of ancient Chinese art," says Chu Xiaobo, the director of Shanghai Museum. "We will also highlight the characteristics of Jiangnan and Shanghai-style cultures with thematic exhibitions. We expect the new venue to become a critical cultural window for the world to learn about China."

The museum's first phase opened in February and features an ancient Chinese bronze gallery, showcasing over 500 pieces of Chinese bronze ware bells, wine vessels, statues, among many others – spanning 3,600 years, from the late Xia Dynasty to the middle of the Qing Dynasty.

The second phase, which opened in May, puts the spotlight on ancient Chinese sculpture. It features 289 pieces, including a panel carved with story scenes of the Three Kingdoms - the warring states competing for dominance after the demise of the Han dynasty in the second century - and the head of a lokapala, or guardian kings that served as tomb sentries. A third of these are on public display for the first time.

The east wing's final phase is expected to be completed in November, but even bigger plans are on the horizon – the Shanghai Museum plans to establish a new North venue, this time focussing on ancient ships and the country's long maritime history.

Admission to the museum is free, but reservations are required and can be made seven days in advance through Shanghai Museum's WeChat mini-programme – a channel within the platform – or at the tourist centre (don't forget your passport). Open from 10am to 6pm daily, except on Tuesdays. shanghaimuseum.net

Another Shanghai surprise

Across the Huangpu River, the new 262-room Hyatt Centric Zhongshan Park officially welcomed guests in the spring. Fans of stylish hotels will find plenty to love here. The property takes many design cues from what's often called Shanghai's first golden age, a period in the 1920s when the city was a booming hub flush with Western businesses and influences. Among those

who frequented this dynamic port hub at the time were travelling businessmen from Europe for whom a bespoke, made-in-Shanghai suit was the height of elegance. The hotel's rooms and suites are a brighter, modern take on the old-style gentlemen's tailoring shops - with touches of nude wovenrattan finishes, brass trim and Art Deco-style bevelled glass lamps - that once dotted the

city. The in-house restaurant. Scenario 1555, is an extension of the East-meets-West concept and serves traditional Shanghainese cuisine in a Western casual dining setting More importantly, the hotel straddles the best of two worlds: it's right next to lush parkland, perfect for breathing space and slow strolls, and is close to downtown attractions. hyatt.com

Head for the hills

Tokyo's latest, must-see hot spot is a cool blend of nature, surreal architecture and high-end labels BY JAR CONCENGCO

Welcome to Azabudai Hills,

a mixed-use complex by award-winning design firms Pelli Clarke & Partners and Heatherwick Studio, and one of the buzziest new developments in the Japanese capital city. Think Satsuma Mandarin trees, blueberry bushes and other fruit-bearing plants on eye-catching sloping lanes. A central green peppered with public art like Yoshitomo Nara's white, towering sculpture "Miss Forest in Tokyo" and other awe-inspiring, undulating structures.

The highly anticipated development - of residential towers and office spaces, art and entertainment galleries, retail strips and pocket parks – opened to great fanfare late last year and has since glammed up the previously quiet, buttoned-up business district of Toranomon.

Many of Tokyo's newest and coolest - from dining to interactive experiences – have set up shop here. The brand new 122-room Janu Tokyo, an Aman hotel, unveiled its flagship property here in February. Michelinstarred restaurants like Florilège and Thai restaurant Saawaan have also moved in. If scoring a table at these popular spots is tricky, gourmands

can also savour the fancy food market at the basement level, from freshly baked pastries and wildcaught fish to expertly


butchered meat. Craving for coffee? The trendy Kyoto-born coffee brand Arabica, with its usual sleek white interiors, has sprouted here as well.

Art lovers will be thrilled to find that the vibrant museum teamLab Borderless has come to Azabudai Hills with four new installations, including "Microcosmoses: Wobbling Light", a massive room full of hanging orbs that create an expansive, eye-boggling illusion. Another museum called Shueisha Manga-Art Heritage, located at Garden Plaza A, is dedicated to manga and includes art from the hugely popular series One Piece. When the Azabudai Hills Gallery opened in November, its inaugural exhibition also featured the abstract and thought-provoking sphere

Mussel memories

In Port Phillip Bay, Greater Melbourne, a luxury tour lets guests enjoy clean air, freshly cooked molluscs and a perfect day on the water BY SHERMIAN LIM



It's a crisp autumn morning in

March, and I am on a leisurely cruise along Port Phillip Bay, a spot of paradise located between Greater Melbourne to the east and Greater Geelong to the west. The gorgeous bay is home to a variety of habitats - sandy beaches, rocky reefs, seagrass meadows and mangroves that support a rich diversity of aquatic life. The array of endemic marine plants and animals is impressive, ranging from hundreds of fish species, molluscs, crustaceans and seabirds to dolphins and little penguins.

But today's adventure aboard the Valerie, a sleek, former fishing vessel turned luxury tour boat, is all about one of the bay's marine natives: mussels. Organised by Portarlington Mussel Tours, trips aboard the Valerie accommodate up to 12 passengers, although private charters may be arranged for a more intimate experience.

Boat captain Lance Wiffen, also a mussel farmer of 30 years, steers the boat around the bay before anchoring where 250ha of his mussel farms are located. As he winds a thick line of rope up from the depths of the greygreen bay waters, my attention gradually turns to what's clinging to the rope – dozens upon dozens of dark, slightly muddy bivalves covered in what must be millions of salmon-hued phytoplankton. The rope rises, and water slides off, exposing black shells that glisten in the sun like rough jewels.

Wiffen gathers a handful of mussels, meticulously cleaning each one before carefully prying them open with a knife. "The vibrant orange ones are female," he explains, contrasting them with the paler males. Once washed, these mussels are ready to be enjoyed fresh

from the water. Mussels also have enough nutrients to be considered a superfood, packed with protein, omega-3, iodine and selenium.

We remain anchored and guests are strolling along the deck, enjoying the fresh breeze while sipping on raspberry lemonade or bubbly from Bellarine vineyards. Inside the cabin, a gastronomic showcase of local produce salmon pate, olives, breads, spreads, crackers, several types of local cheeses, fresh fruit and a handcrafted, locally smoked butter - awaits. I watch Connie Trathen, the tour's marketing manager, expertly whipping up a pot of mussels while narrating her steps like a seasoned cooking show host. This hearty dish is made with grated cheese, tomatoes, minced meat and a sauce from a cherished Wiffen family recipe.

My first bite of a half-shell, Kilpatrick-style mussel is joyful. Juicy, tender and bursting with cheesy saltiness cut by a tangy secret sauce. How can something so decadent also be so nutritious?

Maybe its flexibility as a protein is why mussels have fast become such a modern food staple, making its way onto Australian plates at home and in all levels of dining, served as a main dish rather than a mere accompaniment, Renowned chefs like Ben Shewry of Attica restaurant in Melbourne have praised their culinary value, with Shewry considering them "one of the best to cook". Recognising this potential, the government of Victoria has invested in expanding farming sites in Port Phillip and the Western Port, allowing operators like Wiffen to not only grow their operations as the demand for Victorian shellfish, - especially mussels - grows across Asia and America.

As a veteran and advocate for the local mussel farming industry in Victoria, Wiffen has always envisioned Portarlington Mussel Tours as an opportunity for visitors to enjoy a premium boating experience around the bay while witnessing the sustainability of mussel farming firsthand. "It's environmentally friendly," he explains. "We don't use fresh water or chemicals, so it's a purely organic product." portarlingtonmusseltours. com.au

also offers slow-roasted chicken as well as other pasta and salad dishes. **Shop 6, 25 New Praya**

Sheung Hei Claypot Rice

Another neighbourhood classic, this lively spot specialising in dim sum and claypot dishes – cooked to a smokey crisp over charcoal stoves – has a well-earned Bib Gourmand nod. Apart from the extensive claypot menu of over 30 different offerings, the restaurant also serves Chinese home-style dishes such as Peking Ribs. It's often busy, so time your visit well. **25 North Street**

5 Lo Pan Temple

If you're so inclined, make a quick side trip to this Chinese temple dedicated to Lo Pan, a Chinese engineer, carpenter and military strategist who is considered the patron saint of contractors and builders. 15 Ching Lin Terrace



Winstons

Venture into the backstreets of Kennedy Town, enjoy the detours and perhaps end up on Forbes Street, packed with cute cafes and eateries. You'll find a mix of local and international flavours (there's even a Marks and Spencer). Winstons is a cosy cafe by day and a lively cocktail bar at night, unmissable with its retro cinema signage. Shop 8, The Hudson, 11 Davis Street

Sai Wan Swimming Shed

A short distance away lies the Sai Wan Swimming Shed, offering a glimpse into Hong Kong's history and an iconic spot to catch the sunset. This is the last remaining swimming shed on Hong Kong's

waterfront. The sheds, built by the Hong Kong government in the 20th-century, once provided changing rooms and wooden piers for swimmers. *Victoria Road. Mount Davis*

7am Early hike

Start your day on a high note with a hike up the **Pelindung Hill Loop** to admire the sweeping panoramic views of the city. You may also be able to spot the dusky leaf monkey which is native to the area. At approximately 5km long, the hike takes up to two hours to complete depending on your pace. The entrance to the trail is accessible from the city centre, near the Tengku Ampuan Afzan Secondary School. The trail is not particularly technical, but requires a reasonable level of fitness and proper footwear to navigate a combination of uphill and downhill sections and some uneven terrain. 9am

A quintessential Malaysian breakfast

Like most Malaysians, the people of Kuantan take their breakfasts seriously, especially at Muar-E Kopitiam which sells out on busy weekends. Order the mee tepung goreng (stir-fried noodles), nasi kunyit (turmeric rice) or roti stim (steamed bread). Wash it down with a refreshing *muar teh* (iced tea) or kopi ais (iced coffee) for a strong caffeine kick to start your day.

Alternatively, you could tuck into some hearty Malay fare such as nasi kukus (steamed rice) along with dishes such as freshly fried chicken or *ikan* bawal goreng berempah (fried pomfret), kari kambing (mutton curry) and gulai kawah daging (beef curry) at Warung Mazenah Nasi Kukus. a643, 2, Jalan Beserah; Lot 78 Off, Jalan Beserah

There's been a street art renaissance around Malaysian cities – city backlanes once marred by unsightly graffiti are now converted into walkable streets with beautiful wall art. Check out the **Kuantan Art Street** and you'll find a variety of colourful murals depicting wildlife such as the Malayan tiger or *buaya* (crocodile) and 3D art with playful effects encouraging you to interact with it.

Not far from the street art is **Menara Kuantan 188**. Ride up the tallest tower on the East Coast (and second tallest in Malaysia) to take in sweeping views of the city and Kuantan River. For adrenaline junkies (and those who aren't afraid of heights), there's a skywalk where you can take a harnessed walk along the perimeter of the tower. *Jalan Teruntum; Jalan Besar*

① **12pm**

Lunch with a side of nostalgia

Well-known in the Kuantan café scene is **Kuantan Pickers & Kedai Kopi** – a spot that serves local fare against the backdrop of old-school knick-knacks and vintage posters. On some days, a busker serenades diners with classic feelgood tunes as they enjoy dishes like *roti goyang* (toast topped with a runny half-boiled egg) or the Ah Li mee rebus satay (a sweet noodle dish served with thick peanut sauce and three satay sticks). 22, Jalan Besar

②2pm Nature and culture

Situated about 35 minutes by car from the Kuantan city centre, **Sungai Pandan Waterfall** is nestled amidst a lush rainforest and is an ideal spot for

picnics, swimming or simply immersing in the sights and sounds of nature. While you have the option to hike to the top of the waterfall, the picnic area is easily accessible from the parking lot.

If you would prefer to stay in the city centre, opt for the Kuantan River Cruise where you can learn more about the flora and fauna of a 500-year-old mangrove forest. This two-hour boat ride is led by a licensed nature guide who will share about the city's fishing history and industry as well as the river animals and seabirds found here.

After the cruise, take a gander at Muzium Pahang, also known as Muzium Sultan Abu Bakar, which is housed in a restored colonial building from the 1910s. Get an up-close look at Pahang's arts and culture, such as traditional Malay woodcarving, driftwood animal sculptures and Tenun Pahang woven fabrics. ⊕5pm Chasing sunsets

With comfy couches, trendy viral swings and fun party tunes, Puteh Beach Bar is an ideal spot to kick back, feel the salty sea breeze and watch the sun go down. Snack on pizza or fajitas and sip on a

Malaysian dessert, cendol is best described as rice flour jelly strips cooked with pandan leaves (the ingredient that gives its bright dessert comprises shaved ice over the cendol, drizzled with gula Melaka (palm sugar syrup) and santan (coconut milk). Toppings such as red bean or sweet corn are also added to Kuantan's version, giving it extra texture. Try a bowl at Cendol Air Putih order the cendol biasa for the original or cendol campur for the additional toppings. There's even an option to add durian as a topping!


From ocean to plate

As a seaside city, fresh seafood is a musthave in Kuantan. Visit Ana Ikan Bakar Petai for their signature Kuantan-style ikan bakar – grilled fish and petai (bitter bean) with a fragrant sauce. Other dishes to try would be the sotong goreng tepung (fried battered squid) or kailan ikan masin (Chinese broccoli with salted fish). For Chinese-style cooked seafood and dishes, HLS Restaurant is a crowd favourite. Helmed by an award-winning chef known for his innovative dishes like the crab seafood porridge and abalone fried rice with tobiko, this restaurant can often be packed, so plan ahead. 9pm

An after-dinner stroll

After a nourishing feast, wind down with a pleasant stroll on the beach at **Teluk Cempedak**. The latter is a popular nighttime spot for families, couples and groups of friends. Here, vendors rent out air couches for lounging on the beach, while street vendors sell snacks, bubble guns and other toys. Adding to the entertainment are buskers singing top 40 covers and fire-twirling performers. **The Esplanade** by the Kuantan River is another option if you're pressed for time. *Teluk Cempedak; Jalan Tanah Putih*

Close out your 24-hour jaunt in Kuantan at **Bazar Serambi Teruntum**, where you'll find an array of hand-woven products and other handcrafted goods from across the state of Pahang. Preserving the pearl

Penang's commitment to sustainability is ramping up. From ecotourism initiatives to grassroots efforts promoting local organic farming and zero-waste living, see what's transforming the island into a greener hub

We are strolling through a 130 million-year-old virgin rainforest.

"Look at this boulder," Allen Tan, managing director of The Habitat, exclaims mid-conversation. He crouches on the ground to point out a camouflaged rock gecko, a species that's hyperendemic to the nature reserve in Penang Hill.

He does this a lot throughout our forest tour – breaking the conversation to point out stalks of wild ginger, a colony of migrating termites or a black giant squirrel frantically leaping up a tree.

Penang, also known by the moniker "Pearl of the Orient", is a northern state in Malaysia consisting of an island off the Straits of Malacca, and home to George Town, a Unesco World Heritage Site. Due to the impact of economic development and urban density, the island has inevitably copped the effects of climate change such as rising temperatures and an increase in natural disasters. The state government is mid-way through its 12-year plan to transform Penang into a green, family-focused, net-zero hub.

Attractions like The Habitat certainly contribute to the preservation of the island's natural biodiversity while also drawing attention to an alternative facet of Penang's tourism. The park was launched in 2016 by father-and-son duo Reza and Harry Cockrell who have a home in one of the 52 heritage bungalows on Penang Hill. With the Hill being very dear to their hearts, Reza and Harry wanted to do something meaningful for the community as a way to give back. Subsequently, they won an international tender called by the state government in 2009, and after years of planning and work, the passionate pair opened the doors to The Habitat.

The park is a part of the Unesco Penang Hill Biosphere Reserve which comprises 12,481ha of protected marine and terrestrial ecosystems. Unbeknownst to many, the Biosphere Reserve represents some 25% of the island – significant for an island that's only 295m² in size. Today, The Habitat houses thousands of species of flora and fauna, some of which are native to Penang Hill, such as the vampire hill crab which is merely the size of a 50-cent coin.

A highlight of the park is the 230m-span forest canopy walk, in itself an engineering marvel. Across nearly two years, the team went to great pains to build pylons for the bridge entirely by hand instead of heavy machinery to minimise damage to the forest floor.

The Curtis Crest Treetop Walk, meanwhile, is the park's highest accessible platform where visitors can scan a bird's eye view of the treetops and its surroundings—including the governor's mansion, the oldest property on the Hill. From this viewpoint, the difference between the highly urbanised George Town and the Hill is stark; patches of brown against vast swathes of green.

Our forest walk concludes at Kommune, a retail store and café where we sip tea made with wild ginger from the forest. Allen expresses his hope for Penang's tourism future, one that goes hand-in-hand with the island's lesser-known biodiversity. He

also expresses that high value needs to be associated with attractions such as Penang Hill to support the people and resources needed to maintain its natural ecosystems.

"Penang is more than just cheap drinks on Chulia Street. Our nature experiences are equal to [some of the best] in the region," he says. "For example, people might pay RM500 for a nature experience in Chiang Mai, but RM30 for a ticket admission to a Penang rainforest is deemed expensive. Penang is still regarded as being a relatively affordable destination, and I think we have to move away from that mindset. Hopefully, visitors will realise that Penang is also a place for deep experiences which are worth paying more for."

AT A GRASSROOTS LEVEL, HOYYEE CHEE

is doing her part as the founder of Grow Community Market – a regular farmer's market at Hin Bus Depot – to sell organic produce from her farm as well as to educate visitors and tourists about the island's diverse edible plants.

When Hoyyee started selling her produce eight years ago, she would lament poor sales and a lack of interest from visitors. But through years of awareness and education, the market has gained steady traffic and other local farmers have even joined her quest in pushing Penang produce to the masses.

Her farm is in Gelugor – just 5km south of the city centre – where she also runs Grow Lifestyle Space, a vegetarian café serving up favourites like *nasi ulam* made entirely from seasonal farm produce.

Penang may be a haven for Malaysian street food, but Hoyyee estimates that a majority of hawkers still use imported produce – usually from China – in their daily fare. Understandably, they might be hesitant to pay more for local organic produce if the cost of a plate of noodles is valued at under RM10.

Nevertheless, Hoyyee emphasises that buying from local farms comes with a bonus of being able to interact with the people who grow the food, as well as revenues being channelled directly to the farmers without pricey middlemen. On top of that, local farmers are often silently battling other issues such as climate change, high costs of land rent and a lack of fertility in Penang's soil due to urbanisation.

growing in popularity among conscious consumers. Penang's most well-known establishment is OWL Zero Waste Grocer, a neighbourhood bulk grocer selling household items, pre-loved clothing and unprocessed foodstuff.

While browsing the store on a weekend. I notice a customer walk in armed with old laundry detergent bottles. After a few minutes, she leaves the store with her bottles filled to the brim with chemical-free detergent and shampoo, a bunch of Batu Ferringhi-grown leafy greens wrapped in newspaper, and some dried beans stored in glass jars.

"When you go to a supermarket, it's a sea of plastic. I just couldn't do it anymore," says owner Cathie Sanchez on what prompted her to helm OWL. These days, she has a roster of loyal customers as well as a steady stream of eco-tourists who stock up on their holiday needs such as chemical-free toothpaste, reusable containers and local snacks.

Cathie has several tips for tourists visiting Penang looking to reduce their carbon footprint: take reusable containers on trips to wet markets to reduce plastic use, and to hawker centres to avoid polystyrene takeaway boxes.



Cheong Fatt Tze Blue Mansion

An eclectic fusion of ancient Chinese feng shui and Euro-Gothic design elements, this 19th-century mansion in Penang underwent a six-year restoration project in the 1990s. The project retained the application of traditional methods and adopted a "reuse and recycle" philosophy to ensure little was discarded, particularly its old timber and tiles. The mansion is now fitted as a luxury boutique hotel. cheongfatttzemansion.com



Suffolk House

This colonial 18th-century Anglo-Indian house aimed to preserve the bulk of its majestic structure during a decades-long restoration project that was completed in 2000. Experts consulted old paintings to replicate its original 18th-century form. The stunning building is now used as an events and wedding venue. Their upscale, casual-dining restaurant is open to public, reservations required. suffolkhouse.com.my



Fort Cornwallis

The 18th-century fort was restored using traditional materials and techniques with modern interventions. Instead of concrete, locally sourced, "breathable" materials were used, keeping moisture low and reducing decay over time. Here, visitors can browse art stalls or grab a bite at Kota Dine and Coffee while immersing in history. instagram.com/fort_ cornwallis

just a responsibility that lies solely on the individual. It should be built into a city's make-up and policies and ultimately ingrained in how a city is designed. Meet Think City, a Malaysian social-purpose organisation with a stronghold in Penang that has been involved in many of George Town's restoration, urban greening and sustainable development projects.

One of these projects is the recently opened Linear Garden, part of the Penang Green Connector project to build a series of parks, community facilities and connected hubs along the island's coast. The garden is a strip of shaded respite facing the Esplanade Seawall. Hamdan Abdul Majeed, managing director of Think City, explains that the intention is for the trees in the garden to mature and provide thermal comfort to visitors.

In the next two years, Hamdan and his team have major plans of refurbishing the North Seafront area and turning it into a more holistic recreational space with a cultural museum and large green spaces. More urban greening solutions should be implemented to reduce heat stress and flooding that have become major issues in the state, he adds.

instead become our assets," says Hamdan. "When we have public, open spaces, people start to converge and great, spontaneous things can happen, which can transform a destination."

Hamdan echoes Allen's sentiment on the importance of Penang's shift to a highvalue destination for tourists as a vital way to sustain the island and its ecosystems. Locals should be able to reap the benefits of tourism, rather than to solely rely on their public purse to clean up the effects of consumerism. Essentially, it should be a win-win formula for both locals and tourists.

For Hamdan, the focus needs to be on attracting conscious tourists, and to ensure that prices in Penang reflect the true cost of maintaining the environment and supporting local livelihoods. He adds, "Only then can we be truly sustainable."

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
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With the recent launches of family-friendly adventures, weekend spa getaways and fun group activities, Singapore's Sentosa Island is primed for rediscovery

Getting to Sentosa Island – along a route that takes us through Singapore's spotless urban environment – is an easy half-hour drive.

Yet, despite the short distance from home, there's that palpable change of mood once we cross the causeway bridge and enter Sentosa. From the harbourfront area's industrial district, the atmosphere suddenly becomes that of a quiet park accented with neatly manicured greenery. There's an unhurried atmosphere leading to landmarks that range from stately heritage villas to artsy installations and even a whimsical theme park castle.


Sentosa is a $4.71 \mathrm{km^2}$ landmass off the southern coast of Singapore, a former British army base that has since been transformed into a multi-million-dollar tourism zone. It's a welcome change, indeed, and we can't wait to live in it – at least for the weekend. My wife and I are bringing the kids along for this quick escape from everyday life.

I remember first coming here two decades ago as a gawking visitor. Back then the island was already known for its wide array of attractions. Among them were a huge oceanarium, a tropical spice garden, lots of thrill rides and even a dazzling light-and-sound show that featured a huge statue of the Merlion. The diversions came and went as their novelty declined, but this island has a knack for changing with the times. These days, it's the massive Resorts World casino-hotel, the good-for-groups attractions at Palawan Beach and the world-famous Universal Studios theme park that is raking in the crowds. There's also the brand-new Sensoryscape, an immersive evening trail that fuses traditional park design with digital lighting, sound projection and augmented reality into a moving multisensory experience. It's no surprise that this tourist wonderland is one of the places that we bring our friends from overseas - and of course, they're all happy to tick it off their must-see list.

FOR SINGAPORE LOCALS, THOUGH,

Sentosa is an ideal getaway for those longing for a fun and convenient vacation. This is especially true when one has two young children in tow. As a parent, I'm always thinking of the number of layovers and whether a travel destination is suitable for children, along with a slew of other concerns.

Fortunately, we don't have to deal with that during our weekend in Sentosa. Our taxi drops us off at Oasia Resort, where we are greeted by the smiling concierge amidst chic, lemongrass-scented interiors. A converted heritage building, this used to serve as a British military barracks and is now one of four premier resorts run by Far East Hospitality on the island.

Our kids get into the holiday spirit as soon as we finish checking in. The Junior Suite with its huge, plush beds gives them enough room to run and jump around. It would be totally fine to leave them in this gleeful state, but my wife and I have signed them up for a more substantial activity - a bath bomb making class at the in-house Oasia Spa, to be conducted while the two of us steal away for a soothing Oasia Signature Massage session. We take in the blissful kneading, natural massage oils and custom fragrances as the therapist eases off the work week with a mix of Shiatsu and Indian techniques. Just like that, our staycation is off to a relaxing and luxurious start.

TO MAKE THE MOST OF THIS FAMILY

trip, we rise early the next day for breakfast at Bedrock Origin (Oasia Resort's restaurant), where a sumptuous spread of dim sum, smoked salmon on avocado toast and bacon and eggs over rye bread provides a massive powerup to get us through this full day of play. Our hotel is conveniently located midway between Sentosa's north

and south coasts, making for an easy stroll towards Palawan Beach after having our fill of breakfast.

This is where we ramp up the family fun; first with a minigolf session at UltraGolf, where my competitive nature is quickly piqued by the 1,900m² layout of sand traps and putting greens. My wife and I take this as an opportunity to show the kids some good-natured competition. However, our intentions are quickly gunned down by child's play, resulting in a no-rules, clubs-optional putting exercise. So much for model behaviour.

We finish all 18 holes right as the morning sun is beginning to bake – perfect timing to head to the airconditioned HyperDrive circuit. In contrast to golf's leisurely pace, this cavernous indoor go-karting circuit is all about the need for speed. A preliminary briefing gets us oriented on the state-of-the-art SODI electric karts and the racetrack regulations. These are geared for maximum safety, yet easy enough for us parents and our 10-year-old daughter to abide by. My daughter gets her own set of wheels; my 4-year-old son, on the other hand, has to ride with me on a tandem kart.

Soon afterwards, we find ourselves behind the wheel at the starting line. We zoom off the moment the light turns green, our gang of three cars going neck and neck. At one point I hang back and watch my wife (a veteran driver) slow down at the curve to let our daughter overtake. And while I'd like nothing better than to floor the pedal on this race, I drive on cruise control so my little boy won't get tossed around by all the swerving. He yells that we are falling behind, so I quickly tear through the track. We roar



past Mum and Big Sister to reach the checkered flag first, and my junior racer squeals with delight over our big win.

The morning's adrenaline rush leaves us with a massive appetite and an equally huge desire to cool down. Thankfully we are able to do both at Splash Tribe Waterpark, where we feast poolside on a kid-friendly spread of fried munchies and fresh seafood. Between dips in the sandcastle-themed play zone – it comes with fun slides and water cannons - the kids eat and splash around as the midday hours float by. The fun extends well into the afternoon at nearby HydroDash, a floating agua park just off Palawan Beach where the slides are bigger, the obstacles taller and the joyful screams – those of my excited daughter – are much, much louder. By day's end, the children are sound asleep in our hotel bed. As we prepare for bed, my wife and I toast to a great day out with a glass of Rubicone Rosso.

protest as they pack their bags on our last morning in Sentosa. We will be checking out soon, though we still have a final activity to do. The Singapore Cable Car is one of Sentosa's iconic attractions, its line stretching from the heart of the island to Mount Faber on the mainland, some 1.65km away. This high-flying experience



has delighted both locals and visitors since 1974 - it's a uniquely Singaporean ride that our kids will be trying for the very first time.

The gondolas move in a slow procession at the cable car station while we patiently await our turn to come aboard. Our ride is the stylish new SkyOrb Cabin that features huge windows and a glass bottom. The kids step in carefully at first - "There's no floor!" my son exclaims - but any fear of heights is eventually replaced by wonder and amazement. The ground falls away; fresh air fills our cabin. Suddenly we are surrounded by blue sky, turquoise sea and stunning views of this country we call home.

The roundtrip journey on the cable car only lasts for 30 minutes, yet here we are an hour later still talking about it. Over a sumptuous lunch of watermelon salad, Hainanese chicken rice and Hokkien fried noodles at Native Kitchen - a bastion of homegrown eats inside the neighbouring Village Hotel – our family looks back at that breathtaking ride and everything else we've experienced these past few days. Singapore is so small that it often feels just a tad too familiar, but it's refreshing to know that nearby Sentosa is always there to offer a change of scenery - and a smashing good time - whenever we need it.

"I feel like we flew to another country," exclaims our daughter. "If travelling is this easy then can we do this every weekend?" I put on a face of mock horror; maybe not every weekend, dear, but rest assured, we will be doing this again very soon. ■
