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



Breakout has been an amazing success, with the escape room game operating around the country and being franchised overseas. But arguably the standout component of the brand is Hauntu – the immersive blend of live performance, roleplay, storytelling and good oldfashioned horror that debuted in The LINC and has now expanded to The Curve in Petaling Jaya.

Co-founder Johnny Ong wasn't all too surprised that Hauntu would go on to achieve what it did, especially given how embedded horror is in the national psyche. "There wasn't anything like this in Malaysia," he says. "We just tried to do our best, and turns out, people love it."

Hauntu at The Curve opened in late July, with an overarching storyline that is set in the sultanate era of old Malaya and revolves around a traditional Malay arts academy named Seri Panggung Academy. While the school specialises in "training" attendees in the traditional Malay artforms of *wayang kulit* (shadow puppetry), *kuda kepang* (horse dummy dance), and *mak yong* (Kelantanese dance theatre), would-be escape room participants will soon realise that a supernatural presence is afoot and have to embark on a quest to solve the mystery.

The immersion is immediate: players are greeted by the scent of sandalwood as they are ushered into the elaborately detailed Seri Panggung Academy set – expertly lit to maintain the shroud of mystery – and play alongside a cast of

actors to determine who will be bestowed the title of Seri Panggung, the all-powerful master of the academy.

All this requires a generous amount of suspension of disbelief and sleights of hand that former magician Ong just happens to have up his sleeve. "There is a lot of choreography involved, mostly between the actors and the technical side. Every detail is important, as we need to sell the experience to the audience."

This idea also informed the choice to draw from Malaysia's rich folklore. "Malaysians are already familiar with these stories," Ong says, adding that this familiarity allows for immediate transport with as little exposition as possible.

The Seri Panggung Academy storyline will run for over a year, but what happens after? "Hauntu will continue to draw from Malaysian culture and folklore for our storylines," Ong says. It would be remiss not to, because "in Malaysia, we have a whole lot of good stories." *ihauntu.com*



Hyundai Card Art Library Seoul

Fifth in the Hyundai Card Library series – after the Design Library, Travel Library, Music Library and Cooking Library – the Art Library specialises in rare and modern books on - you guessed it - art. Opened in August 2022, the cultural space is located in Itaewon, the hip, multicultural neighbourhood buzzing with trendy restaurants and nightlife. Located on the second floor of the music store Hyundai Card Vinyl & Plastic, this is a relatively small affair and has an exclusive and oldfashioned private club feel to it, with herringbone parquet flooring and large tables on which to flip through covetable coffee table-style books. dive.hyundaicard.com

Punggol Regional Library ^{Singapore}

When is a library truly a shared space everybody can enjoy? When it is not only filled with books, but also with toys, costumes and games, as well as interactive spaces to try new experiences such as craft-making or using a 3D printing machine. The five-storey Punggol Regional Library, which opened in April 2023, is not only Singapore's largest public library, it also caters to people with special needs, with wheelchair-accessible book-borrowing stations, assistive technology and a wide selection of books for people with disabilities and their caregivers. *nlb.gov.sg*

William Warren Library Bangkok

This library was named after the famed biographer and pre-eminent authority on Jim Thompson, the so-called "Thai Silk King" who is credited for revitalising Thailand's silk industry in the 1950s. Located within the Jim Thompson Art Center Building, this library is home to over 3,000 books on textiles and silk production. If there is a particular tome you'll like to cosy up with, head to the library's aptly-named Relaxation Corner. Within the library, there is also a space that hosts a regular rotation of art exhibitions. fb.com/williamwarrenlibrary

Perpustakaan Jakarta Cikini ^{Jakarta}

The Taman Ismail Marzuki – or TIM cultural centre – in the Cikini neighbourhood of central Jakarta is best known for its theatres, stages,

cinema, planetarium and galleries. Since July 2022, it has been home to the revitalised Jakarta Library, designed by architect Andra Matin. It is an intriguing mix of raw concrete reminiscent of Brutalist architecture, with windows that allow a sense of privacy as well as keeping out the sun's glare using design elements that bring to mind Arabian mashrabiya screens. It's also a popular space for remote work, with multimedia rooms available to members. *perpustakaan. jakarta.go.id*

Travelling in Tokyo and looking for a quiet place to work for a few hours? The newest outpost of Tsutaya bookstores, located at the Marunouchi Building across Tokyo Station, has a pay-per-use lounge that can accommodate up to 220 people. Towering beef burgers held

together with a stress-tested toothpick are no longer what piques a Perthian's interest. Lately restaurants have been busy finding new ways to crumb, dust and cook poultry – and give it a breaded home. From kimchi- and gochujanginflected inventions to Nashville-style sandos that promise eye-watering heat, here are the best crunchy chicken burgers to sink your teeth into while visiting Western Australia's capital.

Chimek

The lowdown Having ruled the Korean fried chicken game in Perth since 2015, Chimek tackles its décor – tiled tables and barstools surrounded by cartoon-style murals of a Hongdae neighbourhood – with the same passion as its array of flavours.

What to order The menu of half a dozen chicken burgers include Nashville hot and Korean sweet sticky chilli, but nothing tastes sweeter than the **Sweet Chick**. Crispy chicken paired with vanilla ice cream and maple syrup? This combination of salty and sweet, hot and cold is absolutely delicious.

Big Rigz Burger Co

The lowdown Ex-cricketer Brett Dorey and fine-dining chef David Thompson formed this home for burger enthusiasts. Check out the graffiti-splashed walls of blues and purples, as well as the menu serving up beef, chicken and vegan options.

What to order The Korean Flying Rigz burger mixes kimchi, pickled daikon, cabbage and Korean gochujang (spicy paste) mayo. This free-range chicken burger stands tall, with a seeded, grill-crisped bun that is both somehow soft and sturdy. bigrigzburgerco.com


Drasko's Hot Chicken

The lowdown Heat is this restaurant's specialty – as you can probably deduce from the enormous fire-tipped chicken mural on the wall.

What to order Giving spice-hunters a choice, the Nashville-style **Signature Sando** comes with a question: How hot? Let the outdoor breeze cool you down as you devour juicy tenders and crispy wings. *draskoshotchicken.com.au*

Hoodburger

The lowdown This burger joint is so popular that it has five locations spread across Perth. The no-frills US diner aesthetic puts the focus on the foods. What to order The Golden Curry Tender Sandwich is really a "Don't knock it until you've tried it" experience. The Japanese staple of Golden Curry shares bun space with chicken tenders, American cheddar and pickles. One small recommendation: add mashed potato to it. hoodburger.com.au

A new luxury hotel in the Golden City wants to be your guide to **Punjab**'s vast cultural riches **By BINDU GOPAL RAO**

A region that was once along the Silk

Route is bound to be paved with treasures, both ancient and new. Amritsar, near India's border with Pakistan, is one of Punjab's largest cities as well as its cultural heart, home to one of Sikhism's holiest sites, the Golden Temple.

Before the city was founded in 1574, the area was blanketed in thick forest, and horses were the main mode of transport. No surprise then that a colourful horse art installation proudly graces a spacious, light-filled lobby at the new Le Meridien Amritsar, connecting the city's history to its present. The hotel's arts and heritage theme continues in its design – a fusion of European chic with a distinctive local inflection –plus elegant art pieces scattered all over the property.

The luxury hotel, which opened in July, is located about 1.5km from the Sri Guru Ram Das Ji International Airport. With digital kiosks in the lobby offering travel ideas, it aims to be a guide for cultural explorations in the city through its Unlock Art Programme.

Once you're ready to explore Amritsar, all you will need is your Unlock Art room key – a keepsake, artist-designed key card – to gain access to a culture centre partner. Here are a few you shouldn't miss.



Indian Academy of Fine Arts (IAFA)

Established in 1928, this prestigious art institution has a collection of paintings and sculptures dating back decades before the Partition of 1947. The institution also runs a restoration lab to preserve the region's fine arts heritage. *indianacademyoffine arts.com*

Partition Museum

Across 14 galleries, the Partition Museum documents the impact the Partition of 1947 - which created the separate nations of India and Pakistan - had on the lives of ordinary people. It houses artefacts such as utensils, clothes and trunks that were carried by Partition survivors as they found themselves suddenly displaced in one of history's largest mass migrations. partitionmuseum.org

Central Sikh Museum

Started in 1958, the Central Sikh Museum features a rare collection of paintings of Sikh gurus, saints and warriors as well as a collection of coins, arms and ancient manuscripts. Look out for the *kangha* (wooden comb) of Guru Gobind Singh and rare pencil sketches here. https://bit.ly/46t8cP3

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Tastes like home

Led by a Cordon Bleu-trained chef, a Malaysian restaurant in **London** is set to open a new outpost in trendy Clapton this month **by VICTORIA KHROUNDINA**

"Malaysian food

hasn't come as far as Southeast Asian cuisines like Thai or Vietnamese in London," says Abby Lee, the Cordon Bleu-trained chef at the helm of Mambow, one of London's first restaurants to spotlight regional Malaysian cuisines. Born in Singapore to Malaysian parents, and of Peranakan and Sarawakian heritage, Lee grew up savouring the pungent flavours of her family's cooking. During a trip back to Malaysia after completing her culinary degree and stints at

Michelin-starred restaurants across Europe, Lee scoured her grandma's old recipes, stirring up a desire to acquaint the public with the flavours of her childhood.

Nostalgia permeates Lee's cooking, but she likes to flirt with a concept of a traditional dish and create something that feels new. One of Mambow's inception dishes, a hot and sour fish curry, inspired by her grandma's *asam pedas* (a sour and spicy Malaysian stew), encapsulates this. Served with grilled mackerel, a lascivious amount of tamarind and featuring Lee's favourite herb, *bunga kantan* (torched ginger), it's moreish, comforting and bombastic in flavour.

Mambow had an ill-fated start in Shoreditch due to Covid-related lockdowns. It reopened as a food-stall concept in the coworking space Market in London's southeast area of Peckham in June 2022. But this November, Mambow is set to move to a bigger, bolder and more permanent space in the trendy east London area of Clapton. The winter menu leans strongly on seafood, with a riff on prawn toast inspired by *otak-otak*

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Covent Garden now hosts the first permanent site for social enterprise Soda Club. Opened in December, the Tasting Room and Shop offers a curated selection of over 150 low-alcohol or alcohol-free drink brands to sample and take home. joinclubsoda.com/ tasting-room (a spiced fish cake wrapped in leaves), *rempah fish* (deepfried seasonal fish stuffed with sambal), and *kam heong* mussels infused with pickled chilli and topped with prawn floss.

Mambow's strong sustainability focus is another drawcard. Most of the produce is locally sourced: line-caught fish from Cornwall, organic fruits and vegetables from UK farms, as well as hand-selected meat. "We're always turning offcuts and any by-products into specials or using them to enhance other dishes. Nothing goes to waste," explains Lee. It's another nod to her childhood spent eating her grandma's cooking and tasty regional morsels at Malaysian markets: the produce, environment and local culture enshrined in daily life, something Lee has successfully transported to her slice of home in London. mambow.co.uk

I was born in a township called


Happy Garden in Kuala Lumpur. Mum is from Malacca, and Dad is from Penang. I personally think those are the two best states in Malaysia for food, so I guess you can say that my love for food is preordained. I moved to Melbourne, Australia, in 1994 to do a Bachelor of Science, and have been based in the country ever since.

In 2008, I got a job promotion that required me to move to Sydney. Shortly after that, I applied to take part in MasterChef Australia. I placed sixth, and after that managed to balance my work and cooking lives. Twelve years later, I decided to take part again – this time in MasterChef Australia: Fans & Favourites – and I haven't looked back. I love living in Sydney and am thrilled to be sharing some of my top picks... naturally, mostly food related.

Sydney is big on café culture


There are many cafés all a stone's throw away from my home in Surry Hills that I often visit. There is a coffee place called **Artificer** that procures their own coffee beans and makes their own brew. Their coffees, depending on the blend you choose, have a variety of tasting notes. For instance, the Nicaragua Los Grandillos has a hint of nutmeg, while the seasonal blend combines a mix of beans that gives a more wellrounded espresso flavour. If I'm after hot chocolate, I go to Veneziano Coffee Roasters, and to French-style Lavie & Belle **Bakery** for the best almond croissant I've ever tasted! It has the perfect combination of fresh almonds and marzipan. If I'm craving savoury, the Aleppo pepper and Asiago cheese scroll from A.P. Bakery is my go-to. artificercoffee. com, venezianocoffee.com. au, laviebellebakery.com.au, apbakery.com.au

Dinner plans?

Sydney does Thai food well because we have Thai chefs and influencer powerhouses who have revolutionised the way we view Thai food. The likes of Palisa Anderson, David Thompson and Martin Boetz have all paved the way and helped make it accessible. For consistently good dishes, chain **Chat Thai** is my recommendation. I love their *vum naehm khao todt*, which is a rice pancake - rice cooked on the base of the pan over low heat until it's crispy, then loaded with fermented meat and aromatic herbs. When I miss Malaysian food, I head to Chinta **Ria Buddha Love** located on the fringe of Chinatown. Their crispy noodles topped with an egg-like gravy, remind me of the hawker-style noodles Dad would take home for supper when we were kids. *chatthai.com*, *chintariabuddhalove.com*

Taking friends out to eat?

If I have friends that I want to impress, I'll take them to eat Mediterranean or French food. Some of my favourites include Parlar in Potts Point (I suggest trying the anchovy churro and pan tomate) and Armorica in Surry Hills. I highly recommend ordering their steak frite, and definitely with the bone marrow butter for an extra kick. Italian fine diner Pellegrino 2000 is another great choice. Last time we were there my partner, who is half-Italian, cried over a plate of fritto misto because it was so delicious...and I'm the emotional one! parlar.com.au, armorica. com.au, pellegrino2000.com

Tell me about fashion

A few years ago, I realised that if I'm going to wear glasses, I might as well make it a statement. I used to travel a lot for work and began buying a pair of glasses from most destinations I visited, and then had my optometrist, **George Skoufis Optometrist**, fit the lens. George Skoufis is based in Paddington and has a good range of eclectic eyewear featuring both local and international labels.

I've also just started a collaboration called **Alvin x Niloca** with my friends at Niloca Eyewear. They are based in Melbourne but the collection is available online and we'll be selling limited edition titanium frames in three different colours (rempah-red brick, custard yellow and not-so-ordinary blue) and eight models, each of which is named after a favourite Southeast Asian ingredient. *gso. net.au, niloca.com*

Retail therapy

Glasses may be my fashion item, but for clothing I go to Incu as they stock a wide variety of clothes, from international names to emerging Australian labels. There are stores in Paddington and Chatswood, as well as an outlet in Rosebury. Lab Nation is a skin care range that I use and they are produced in Byron Bay. The great outdoors

My partner and I walk everywhere, and we're lucky the **Botanic Gardens of Sydney** is so close to home. It's one of those places where you never get tired of the views of the Sydney Harbour Bridge and the Sydney Opera House across the water... and that is always spectacular! I like spending time meandering through the themed gardens – such as the herb garden and succulent garden – or just taking in the lush greenness of it all. **botanicgardens.org.au**

Kota Bharu

Kota Bharu, the capital of Kelantan, is one of the key transit points en route to Perhentian Island if you're travelling by bus from west coast Peninsular Malaysia to cities such as Kuala Lumpur or Penang. It's the perfect place to spend a day and get more bang out of your travel experience.

Located along the borders of Thailand and overlooking the South China Sea, Kota Bharu is a cosy getaway that offers a unique blend of modern businesses while retaining its small-town charm. Widely considered a rich, cultural centre among the Malay community with its strong Islamic influences, it offers many opportunities for immersing in the Kelantanese way of life.

Saturday

① 7am Breakfast fit for royalty

Start the day at **Kopitiam Kita** for a breakfast of Kelantanese delicacies. This frills-free restaurant's claim to fame is its *roti titab*, a thick buttered toast topped with dollops of sweet kaya and a runny half-boiled egg. If you're hungry for more, grab a variety of ready-made packed rice meals available such as *nasi dagang* (rice with fish curry) and *nasi kerabu* (blue-coloured rice with dried fish or fried chicken).

Don't be fooled by its humble environment, as Kopitiam Kita's long list of famous clientele includes acclaimed Malaysian singer Datuk Siti Nurhaliza, travel writer Paul Theroux and even Kelantan's royal family. Jalan Sri Cemerlang, Taman Desa Jasa, 15400

9am The early bird catches great bargains

Walk off breakfast at **Pasar Siti Khadijah**, a bustling marketplace dominated by female entrepreneurs, an emblem of a distinctive Kelantanese lifestyle where local women are encouraged to pursue entrepreneurial activities. This retail therapy haven is iconic in Kelantan and named after Khadijah bint Khuwaylid, a successful Arabian businesswoman from the sixth century. She was also the first wife and first follower of the Islamic prophet Muhammad.

Here, you can shop for everything from herbs and spices to fresh produce and dry goods like *keropok ikan* (fish crackers), and if you ask, sellers will provide samples of delectable local snacks such as *kuih akok* (pandanflavoured pancakes). The upper floors of this four-storey building are where you'll find batik clothing, kitchen supplies and traditional handicrafts. *Jalan Buluh Kubu*, *15000* INSIDER TIP Visit Kopitiam Kita between 6:30am to 9am to avoid crowds.

① 12pm Tasty greens

Boost your energy with a healthy lunch of traditional Malay salad called *ulam* at **Restoran Nasi Ulam Cikgu**. Served raw or lightly blanched, ulam consists of assorted local herbs, shoots and vegetables. Ulam is best complemented with a plate of white rice and other hearty Kelantanese side dishes such as crispy fried catfish, served sizzling off the wok. The restaurant's prime location in the city makes it a convenient stop for visitors looking for a quick and filling meal. *Kampung Kraftangan, Jalan Hilir Kota, 15300*

(*) 2pm Blast from the past

Step back in time when you enter Istana Jahar, a 19th-century royal palace built during the reign of Sultan Muhammad II. Completed in 1887, it was transformed into a museum in 1992. For a small entry fee of RM4 (for international visitors), you can wander through the expansive halls of Istana Jahar to admire historical royal artefacts and learn more about the Kelantan Sultanate. For more history and culture, other museums like Muzium Diraja Istana Batu and Handicraft Village and Craft Museum are just within walking distance. Jalan Sultan, 15000







4pm Bee one with nature

Wind down for the evening at the Min House Camp, a peaceful accommodation that focuses on agritourism. Located less than 20 minutes' drive from Kota Bharu, this nature-filled space is where you can learn more about organic farming, especially about harvesting honey from their *lebah kelulut* (stingless bees). Situated by the Lubuk Durian River, this centre also offers several outdoor activities, such as kayaking and clam digging. ② 8pm Catch of the night

For dinner, indulge in a family-style feast at the **Four Seasons Restaurant**, the first halal Chinese restaurant in Kelantan. Seafood lovers will be spoiled for choice with the wide variety of fresh seafood available – from their signature fish head curry to the baked crab with salted eggs and the super-crispy oyster pancakes. Spend the morning at the picturesque **Pantai Cahaya Bulan** with its long stretch of white sandy beach. While swimming is discouraged due to strong wave currents, this beach provides a gorgeous view and ample space for family picnics and kite-flying. If you're planning to eat by the beach, there is a long line of hawker stalls and *warung* (roadside stall) selling all types of seafood dishes, from *maggi ketam*, a Kelantanese spin on instant noodles served with crab, to deep-fried fish balls. *Pantai Cahaya Bulan*, 15350



① 12pm Say so long with shoyu ramen

Before you go, be sure to stop by **BrewbyATAS**, a new player in Kota Bharu's emerging café scene. With a stylish storefront that sports a creative use of exposed lightbulbs, this café opened in April 2023 with a fusion menu that includes handmade Japanese ramen and French pastries. Try the shoyu ramen and cap it off with a buttery croissant or a slice of Okinawa cheesecake paired with an espresso or matcha latte.

Yeo Teong Cheng, owner of BrewbyATAS and a proud Kelantan native, speaks of their bold approach: "We chose to open in Kota Bharu because we want to bring something fresh and exciting to the community, which has a growing interest in culinary experiences. 

A truly extraordinary hotel can turn a regular holiday in Tokyo into an unforgettable immersion in Japanese culture. Here, we've mapped three standout examples of unique accommodations that take you straight to the heart of Japan's endlessly intriguing capital

After all, navigating the world's largest city – an exhilarating mix of futuristic design and technology, pop culture, age-old traditions and over 200 Michelin-starred restaurants – can be overwhelming, to say the least, and even more so if you've touched down for the first time.

Luckily, a growing number of hotels are styling themselves as more than just a place to rest your head, but as an integral, tone-setting part of the experience. Whether you're interested in history, design and architecture, food or sumo-wrestling, these unique properties offer stays that are in themselves a satisfying deep-dive into Japanese culture.

EVERY MAJOR DESTINATION HAS AT LEAST

one beloved landmark that captures the vibe of a whole era and presents a defining element to its personality. If you want to understand a city's aspirations, make a beeline for its grandest, most luxurious digs.

Tokyo has dozens of these, but mention The Okura and the Japanese will immediately visualise the grand hotel in the heart of Tokyo lauded for its design and architecture.

The Okura first opened in 1962, two years ahead of the 1964 Tokyo Olympics. The Summer Games were a celebration of Japan's post-war renaissance, and the global spotlight was on all the incredible strides the country had made, particularly in technology. It was the first time the Games were broadcast internationally live via satellite. Ten days before the official opening, Japan launched the Shinkansen, its legendary bullet train.

The Okura fit right into this new scene. The hotel was modern, fresh and distinctly Japanese. Its iconic lobby, designed by Yoshiro Taniguchi, grand but understated, featured a soaring ceiling and traditional design elements such as lacquered tables and chairs arranged to resemble plum blossoms. It was a giant leap into the future, and it was considered as *the* example of Japanese modernist architecture.

Since then, the hotel has been the capital's meeting place du jour, hosting countless historic state banquets and gatherings. Its guest book reads like a who's who of the last half century, listing the Japanese Imperial Family, visiting foreign dignitaries and global celebrities – real or imagined (James Bond stayed here in 1967's You Only Live Twice).

When the hotel embarked on a full rebuild to modernise the structure in 2015, patrons, designers and architects alike were on edge. Many lamented the end of an era, the loss of an architectural icon, in particular the revered hotel lobby.

In the end, there was no need to fret. The Okura Tokyo reopened in 2019 to rave reviews. With painstaking precision, a team of designers and architects headed by Yoshio Taniguchi (son of the original architect), had rebuilt the lobby in its entirety, now housed inside the soaring Prestige Tower. It's such a faithful reproduction that some patrons think they are standing inside the original.

The new hotel – with 508 guest rooms across two main buildings – is both at the apex of modernity and a nostalgic homage to its former self. "The design of the building has always been integral to the experience of staying at The Okura," explains Kaori Wakui from The Okura Tokyo's Marketing department. "People come from all around to gaze at our interior designs."

AT THE OTHER END OF THE SPECTRUM,

there's the intimate, impossibly understated affair born of personal passion. Among Tokyo's new hotels, none have created more buzz than Auberge Tokito when it opened its doors in Tachikawa, one of Tokyo's leafy western suburbs, this year. Located 36km west of The Okura, it's built on the former site of a century-old

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The Okura symbolises the essence of Japanese culture. Guests are offered the opportunity for an exclusive "The **Okura Prestige Tower Lobby Symbolic** Design Tour" with detailed explanations of each motif and design element in the lobby. Included are the famous Okura Lanterns, the stunning ikebana flower arrangement in its hexagonal vase, the intricate kumiko latticework and the lacquered tables and chairs arranged to resemble a plum blossom. "The motifs in the lobby appear in so much Japanese artwork," says Kaori. "By joining this lobby tour, guests come away with a deeper appreciation of Japanese craft and design."

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The Okura Prestige Tower Lobby Symbolic Design Tour, exclusive to hotel guests, runs 45 minutes and costs ¥1,500 per person. Reservations needed.

ryotei, a type of traditional restaurant so exclusive that in the olden days some would only accept customers by referral.

Tokito embraces the original French concept of an *auberge* – a small restaurant with some lodging – more ardently than other similar establishments in the city. But where the French version usually prioritises the food, with accommodations as an afterthought, Tokito has crafted rooms (all four of them) that are on par with the dining experience. Celebrated architect Shinichiro Ogata created its exquisite grounds and interiors, blending traditional ryokan elements with a modern, minimalist design. Each room comes complete with a private hot spring onsen bath, a spa treatment area and NASA-certified Tempur beds – all to help you decompress and unwind in the hours before dinner.

What sets Tokito apart is its stellar cast of in-house chefs boasting a constellation of Michelin stars. The team is led by the world-renowned chef Yoshinori Ishii, known for his work in Geneva, New York and in London's UMU *kaiseki* (a traditional multi-course Japanese dinner) restaurant – the first Japanese restaurant in Europe to receive two Michelin stars in 2015. He works alongside another Michelin-starred chef, Kenji Okawara, a friend and colleague he trained with during his formative years in Kyoto.

"We are all creators working at the top of our game, pushing each other and collaborating to heighten the experience for our guests," explains Ishii. "This is what makes Auberge Tokito so special. Everyone who works here, whether in the kitchen or outside, is a consummate professional."

Dinner begins at 7pm sharp in the Shokubo restaurant. Although the restaurant is also open for other customers, Tokito's guests are seated separately at an exclusive counter – the Japanese equivalent of the chef's table. When everyone is seated, the courses start to appear: 12 to 14 exquisitely prepared dishes in total. Whether it's a tuna with *fond de veau*, or a delicately arranged dish of scallops with ujio seasoning, all the dishes use the finest seasonal ingredients sourced from the top producers across Japan. All are handpicked by Ishii himself.

> A stay at the Auberge is to witness where Japanese cuisine in Tokyo is heading. Although Ishii, Okawara and the sous-chef all trained in Kyoto, they believe the key to upholding a tradition is found in evolution rather than preservation.

> "For example, Japanese fishing boats need to head farther out to sea to source the bonito we use in dashi stock," explains Ishii, who enjoys travelling around the country to meet producers and fishermen. "When I went to Hokkaido, I came across a fish called the oku-kajika that was being landed but mostly left unsold. It was a perfectly good fish, so we worked with the local fishery to develop a stock from oku-kajika that we can use like bonito. We always try to discover the best way to cook in the world we live in today."

IF YOU'RE IN TOWN FOR SOMETHING

uniquely Japanese – say, sumo wrestling – you'll be glad to know there's a themed hotel for that. Converted from the former Kokonoe Sumo Stable where for decades sumo wrestlers lived and trained every day, Asakusa Yokozuna Hotel opened its doors in December 2019 to much fanfare.

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The experience of Tokito is the perfectly choreographed interplay between food, ambience and design - curated by the chefs themselves - from the moment you pass through the traditional Japanese front gate. The walk along the winding path, through the forested garden and into the softly-lit reception area dissipates any lingering thoughts of the world beyond. There's an amusebouche waiting for you in the room, and that sets the tone for the rest of the evening.

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Auberge Tokito is a stone's throw from Nishi Kunitachi Station on the JR Nambu Line and a short taxi ride from Tachikawa's main station.

For sumo fans, the best time to be in Tokyo is during the months of January, May and September when "sumo season" heats up. You might find yourself rubbing shoulders with apprentice sumo wrestlers on the subway as they travel to the tournament in Ryogoku Kokugikan Sumo Hall.

The country's national sport can seem inaccessible, especially to tourists. Tickets (especially the better seats close to the ring) can be almost impossible to source and the etiquette for viewing morning training sessions hard to fathom. However, Asakusa Yokozuna Hotel's Head of Marketing, Masaki Murata, says that change is on the way and soon hotel guests will be able to purchase a range of authentic sumo packages.

"As well as increasing the number of official goods on offer in the rooms, we are working with the Sumo Association to create optional tours and packages," says Murata. "One idea in the pipeline is to include a *masu-seki* ticket plan (one of the best tickets in a sumo arena) for guests. The other is to collaborate with a local sumo stable to offer guests exclusive morning practice viewings followed by lunch with the wrestlers." Presumably your plate will be a smaller portion. ■

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As you can expect, everything in the Asakusa Yokozuna Hotel resonates with sumo. The floors are named after legendary sumo wrestlers of the past and classic sumo paintings and banzuke ranking lists, written in ornate Japanese calligraphy, hang on the walls. In the rooms, elevated tatami platforms resemble raised sumo rings and guests can enjoy amenities like "sumo tea" – a novelty teabag held in the cup by the burly arms of a sumo wrestler.

legacy

For centuries, the Batak community in Medan has revered the ulos, a traditional woven textile. Now, modern fashion is catching on

ilidius Siburian, an ulos expert and collector in his 30s, regularly scours markets and antique shops as far away as Bali to procure

this traditional handwoven textile, but he says the ulos closest to his heart was his first. As he was preparing to leave home for university, his opung boru (maternal grandmother) bequeathed him a priceless family heirloom as a token of her love: a vintage ulos surisuri ("comb" in local dialect). With it, she also passed along its history, which she never told anyone, including her own children. When still in her teens, opung boru was visiting another village when a stranger-instantly smitten by her-proposed on the spot. She accepted. However, after five years of marriage and still no signs of a baby, her parents presented her with a piece of dark navy ulos with thin, vertical stripes that symbolised bringing forth good fortune in a long and neat manner. Not long after, Vilidius' mother was born.


Vilidius' collection has since grown to more than a thousand vintage and newer ulos, and he regularly loans his rarest pieces to museums. From a dedicated storage room for all his ulos in Jakarta, he proudly unfurled some of his collection to show me the different types of ulos. Once a practical cloth to ward off the chilly mountain air, ulos has long since evolved into an important ceremonial attribute. It is worn, displayed, or presented during rituals that mark rites of passage – pregnancy, birth of baby, marriage, death – and shows a person's standing in society.

The Batak community, descendants of people who migrated from mainland Asia some 4,000 years ago and settled in the lush highlands of North Sumatra, is considered to be one of the oldest in Indonesia and it shows in their woven textile - it has unfussy geometric patterns and only four colours: black, blue, white and red. Ulos means "blanket" in the local Batak dialect. A partonun (weaver), traditionally a woman, is a combination of tailor and shaman she would create a design based on her customer's aura and gets her inspiration from nature. Despite looking deceptively simple, the process is slow (up to six months) and long (11 steps). Before the arrival of modern factories, all ulos were bespoke because each had particular hopes and prayers woven into it.

counting skills to translate the design into thread placement before they go into the loom," explains Vilidius. "There are lots of unfinished and assymetrical ulos that go to waste because the partonun miscounted or she forgot where she left off after taking a short break." This is why when a partonun starts an ulos, she works long hours (12 to 14 hours a day is quite common) with minimal breaks.

Despite the significance of ulos in Batak culture, being a partonun is no longer considered a sustainable profession. It's just too time-consuming. Demand for bespoke ulos has also plummeted as cheaper, machinemade versions and flashier alternatives from other regions flood the market. It's one of the contributing factors to the extinction of some ulos patterns. Preservation becomes crucial, and this is where high-end fashion comes in.

IN A QUIET RESIDENTIAL AREA

in Pematangsiantar, two hours away from Medan en route to the province's primary tourist attraction of Lake Toba, sits a three-storey house that looks like others in the neighbourhood, except that one can see multiple women weavers coming and going every day. As I enter the reception area, the click-clacking sound of wooden looms mixed with chatter and laughter fills the air. It's workshop day and the place is packed with women weaving, learning how to create a pattern.

The house is a community space built by Tobatenun, a social enterprise founded in 2018 by a Batak mother-and-daughter team, Kerri Na Basaria and Devi Pandjaitan, to

preserve the art of ulos. The scale of this new kid on the block is impressive – it produces its own dyes using organic waste from the area and plants grown in their garden, and it delivers annual couture and ready-to-wear collections, along with fashion accessories (hats, bags, obi) and home décor.

Tobatenun regularly does collaborations with other designers, most recently in April with Cahayalampu, a lighting designer for ulos lampshades. The Tobatenun team consists of three designers (including a textile designer) who work closely with more than 200 artisans, including weavers from Medan, Pematangsiantar and five villages. Their in-house textile designer develops contemporary motifs based on nature (recent collections drew their inspiration from raindrops and jewel stones), while their weavers are given creative freedom to give their own twist to traditional motifs.

Tobatenun also has a unique place in the world of business. While most artisans are women, the business is usually run by men. As a female-led business with mainly female employees, Tobatenun acts a platform for the artisans to strengthen their place in society. "The aim of Tobatenun is to put a spotlight on women in textile art. Historically and culturally, this is a female space," explains Mariana Christine, Tobatenun's brand communications officer. "Adat (customary law) in Batak society is a man's domain, but it won't run without the most important adat tool - an ulos, that is woven by a woman." This is why, on top of workshops on rare motifs, Tobatenun offers counselling and regular health screenings for their artisans.

Where to buy ulos in Medan

These traditional markets have dozens of ulos sellers, with their own curation of ulos bought from weavers from villages in North Sumatra. Bargaining is welcome.

fashion designer who has incorporated ulos into his own designs, also believes that ulos should empower the community. His main interest is sustainability – both in design and livelihood for artisans. Merdi points out that, "More demand from within and outside the Batak community helps build an ecosystem of artisans from indigenous comminities, and this would revitalise the ulos industry". Thus, innovation and flexibility are crucial. Instead of having a partonun work on an ulos exclusively, a piece of Merdi ulos is produced by up to eight artisans. As a result, production time is dramatically reduced and he gets to provide work for as many people as possible.

For his Spring/Summer 24 collection at New York Fashion Week in September he showcased modern, polished designs utilising ulos that were woven from soft, breathable threads. In 2008, Merdi was the first Batak designer to produce the traditionally heavy ulos in a lightweight version using micro tencel threads, making it more attractive for everyday use. He also gets creative with existing motifs, saying, "Urbanites and the international market prefer a simpler, more elegant aesthetic." Noticing that Batak socialites gravitate towards songket (a fancier woven textile from South Sumatra with gold and silver threads) for parties, Merdi started producing silk songket with ulos motifs. He also worked with Swarovski for a remake of a limited edition, jewel-encrusted ulos that has gone extinct since the 19th century.

To sustain the traditional, one has to adapt and modernise. Ulos advocates like Merdi, Vilidius and Tobatenun feel hopeful that ulos is here to stay – and will continue to grow outside of its use in traditional rituals as its increasing prominence outside of the Batak community. Ultimately, ulos is an expression of love, respect and solidarity. And that's universal. ■

SLDB has an unwavering commitment to becoming the leading catalyst and executor of rural land development in Sabah, with a focus on the food industry. Apart from its successful ventures in palm oil, dairy farming and food production, SLDB has also diversified its businesses into other agricultural food-based products such as chillies, Bentong ginger, stingless bee honey, MD2 pineapple, pandan, coconut and peppers. This diversification enriches the community with new income opportunities and fosters a resilient agricultural landscape for sustainable growth.

barbecue dinner, spectacular fire show, and karaoke showdown.



Golden presence

Since its unveiling in 2006, the

towering Batu Caves Murugan Statue has become one of the most recognisable symbols of multicultural Malaysia. At 42.7m tall, the golden statue presides over visitors and devotees who flock to Batu Caves annually for various Hindu festivals, including Thaipusam earlier in the year and Deepavali, happening on the 12th of this month. "Deepavali at Batu Caves is a time of joy, spirituality and cultural celebration, with special *puja* (offerings) to seek blessings from Lord Murugan," says Sivaraj Nithiananthan, the award-winning drone photographer behind Raj Photography Langkawi. It's also a busy time for the holy site.
