

Perchance to dream

In Dream of the Day, an art exhibition ongoing until 14 May at Ilham Gallery, art critic and curator Patrick Flores spotlights artworks that explore dreams, myths and fantasies. Spend a leisurely afternoon at this contemporary art space, a 15-minute walk from Petronas Towers, for a rare chance to see the creations of 39 artists from the region. Here are our top picks.

David Medalla

The late David Medalla was a multidisciplinary artist whose works include paintings, sculptures, kinetic art, poetry and performance art. Look for: "MMMMMMM... MANIFESTO (a fragment)", a prose poetry he wrote in 1965 for a London publication, where he answers a selfposed question: "What do you dream of?" Millennials and Gen Zers obsessed with manifesting, watch and learn.

| Sharon Chin

Artist Sharon Chin's thoughtful pieces explore activism and climate justice through deceptively quiet forms. **Look for:** Prints

inspired by the flora and fauna that surround her home and studio in Port Dickson; botanical illustrations of weeds painted over discarded political party flags; linoprint shadow puppets lit by the flares of a nearby oil refinery.

Alfonso Ossorio Alfonso Ossorio

was known for many things: his friendship with Jackson Pollock and Jean Debuffet, his abstract paintings that navigated a complex relationship with religion, and found objects that he called "congregations". Look for: A showcase of Ossorio's daily drawing exercises, through which he constantly examined and envisioned himself in relation to society.


Eiffel Chong

Hailing from Kuala Lumpur, Chong is known for his photographic still lifes and silent landscapes. Look for: Works from his 2015 collection, "For Such Is The Wickedness Of The World That It Shalt Be Destroyed By A Great Flood". It's a series of eerily calm, post-apocalyptic landscapes inspired by the varied interpretations of a great flood that ends the world.

Alex Niño

Alex Ninõ – known for his work with DC and Marvel – was part of the first wave of Filipino artists who transformed the US comic industry in the 1970s.

Look for: His captivating, propulsive comic book interpretation of classic *Moby Dick*, in works that showcase his distinctive elegant but graphic style (honed from specialising in horror and science fiction comics).

The RuMa's Hidangan Tradisi returns for fasting month this year with *Edisi SANTAI*, which features Malay cuisine from the top and bottom ends of the peninsula. **What to eat:** Kick off with a platter of dates, *dodol* (a toffee-like confection), and fried *popiah* (spring rolls) followed by a plethora of claypot-cooked curries such as the fiery Sotong Masak Lemak Cili Api. Be sure to save space for the grille, featuring satay, lobster, salmon and the centrepiece – a whole oven-roasted leg *of lamb*.





Utsav Camp Sariska 200km from Delhi Airport

In the lap of the Aravalli Range in Rajasthan, leopards and hyenas roam wild in the scrub forests of Sariska National Park. The expert naturalists at Utsav Camp – most of them from the local village – show you how to ethically track the animals in their natural habitat by following paw marks and scat, as well as identifying burrows. The lodge's cosy cottages are designed with local stone and bamboo, while the luxurious tents offer sweeping views of wild grasslands. Here, they take a zeromile approach to food, which means locallysourced, seasonal dishes. A rooftop pool overlooks the Aravalli peaks. *utsavcampsariska.com*



Jim's Jungle Retreat Corbett 280km from Delhi Airport

India's first tiger reserve is named after hunter-turnedconservationist Jim Corbett. In this forest in the foothills of the Himalayas, Bengal tigers and wild elephants roam free. On the fringes of this forest, Jim's Jungle Retreat occupies 15 acres of regenerated land, where rustic-chic cottages are artfully concealed within the trees and wild grasses.

Fitting in with the forest and the community is part of the property's ethos; cottages are built in the architectural style of the Van Gujjar community, with open verandahs and thatched roofs. The locally employed guides are the best storytellers, sharing their knowledge of the forest on nature walks, and on safari drives. Be sure to also pop by the on-site nursery, where native flora are planted to support afforestation efforts. jimsjungleretreat.com

Evolve Back Kuruba Safari Lodge Kabini 265km from Bangalore Airport



The Nagarhole National Park is a stronghold of tigers, leopards, bison and the elusive black panther. River Kabini slices through this wilderness, and on its banks sits this luxe safari lodge. Inspired by the design culture of the indigenous Kadu Kuruba community, the huts here are built with mud walls. thatched roofs and terracotta floors. Here in Karnataka, the seasons bring plenty of sunshine and rain - energy sources that are utilised by the resort's rainwater harvesting initiative and solar power plant. A change of setting might just be what's needed to get the team thinking outside the box



Mixed background

After a four-year hiatus, the Peranakan Museum in Singapore reopens its doors by LESTER V. LEDESMA



Museums are often places

where artefacts are taken away from their natural context and displayed in sterile environments that make them hard to fully appreciate. Fortunately this isn't the case with Singapore's Peranakan Museum, which finally reopened in February after a four-year closure.

Still basking in the glow of its facelift, this heritage building in the Civic District hosts refreshed exhibits showcasing the collective memories of a distinctly Singaporean community. Peranakans are the descendants of immigrants who arrived in Singapore from the 14th to 17th centuries and intermarried with native

Malays. These unions resulted in multi-ethnic families that share a unique hybrid culture.

Though Singapore's Peranakan influences range from Indian to Arabic and even European lineages, the museum mostly focuses on the predominant Chinese Peranakan community. The galleries are spread out over three floors and arranged into sections that revolve around the themes of Origins, Home and Style.

Walking through these dimly-lit hallways, one gets the feeling of being inside a personal photo album.

The first floor brims with nostalgia, with walls adorned with old pictures of weddings, holidays, festivals and other family events. At one side, a pair of screens show video interviews of modern Peranakans pondering their cultural identity.

On the second floor, colourful ceramics bear intricate native designs, alongside ornate furniture and tableware typically found in Peranakan homes.

The third floor is devoted to textiles and fashion, with pieces that include elaborate wedding attire, hand-painted batik fabrics and delicate *kasut manek* (beaded footwear).

These add up to a heartfelt look into the lives of this truly local cultural group. A visit to the Peranakan Museum is an ideal way to spend a leisurely afternoon. Tourist admission fees are S\$12 for adults, and S\$8 for students/seniors/ persons with disabilities *nhb.gov.sg/ peranakanmuseum*

Pretty in pink

A fanciful cinema in Ho Chi Minh City celebrates the city's architectural legacy ву јозниа zuкаs





Playful bird-shaped lights

that illuminate pastel pink walls, chubby baby blue pouffes with rounded corners and a thousand spongy turquoise loungers. This isn't a gigantic soft play for inexhaustible children but a new hangout spot for film enthusiasts.

Built in 2021 in Go Vap District, Ho Chi Minh City's Beta Cinema may feel like a jovial outburst, but local firm Module K carefully designed each corner to

echo the city's architectural heritage, says Jade Nguyen, the firm's founder.

Pink dresses the lobby's walls, ceilings and mezzanine floor to parrot the 19th century rose-hued Tan Dinh Church, one of HCMC's oldest ecclesiastical buildings. The dark turquoise canopy that arcs over the ticket booth mirrors the vaulted ceiling of the Central Post Office, while the tiered blue circular seating area was inspired by the arched entrance of the iconic Opera House. Finally, the airborne light fixtures are a nod to the pigeons that flock to the city's public squares.

Connecting the postmodern design decisions with Ho Chi Minh's heritage requires a little imagination, but what is a cinema if not a place to indulge in whimsical flights of fancy. *betacinemas.vn*



A Malaysian in... London

Syabira Yusoff, cardiovascular researcher, home baker and the first Malaysian winner of *The Great British Bake Off* lists her favourite places to eat in London







Since winning the top prize in series 13 of The Great British Bake Off in November 2022, I have been featured in magazines and interviews on national television, written my cookbook proposal and grown my Instagram (@ svabira bakes) followers to over 80,000. The Great British Bake Off has taught me to never hesitate and always go for what I want in life. I am currently expanding my baking repertoire and culinary knowledge and will share what I've learned through a food blog. In the future, I would like to run my own bakery. Ever since moving to London in 2013, I've had the chance to try some truly amazing food. Here are some of my top picks.

1 Karamay Uyghur Cuisine 14 New London St.

14 New London St, London EC3R 7NA

Specialising in halal Western Chinese or Uyghur cuisine, this is not your typical Chinese takeout food. This restaurant offers a wide variety of dishes, ranging from mild to very spicy. My favourite items are the green bean *leghman*, which is handpulled noodles topped with green beans and beef, kungpo chicken with peanuts, and the flavourful hot and sour soup.

2 Gopal's Corner

Market Halls, 191 Victoria St, London SW1E 5NE

Being abroad, I often visit Malaysian restaurants for a taste of home. Whenever I crave Malaysian Indian food like banana leaf rice, *roti canai* (flatbread) and *mee goreng mamak* (fried noodles), I head to Gopal's Corner, which is nestled within the bustling food court of Market Halls Victoria. Set under a scenic roof terrace, Market Halls is a great spot to try street food from all over the world.

3 **Café de Nata** 25 Old Compton St (near Chinatown), London W1D 5JN

I grew up in Melaka, where we have a rich history that's deeply rooted in Portuguese culture. Egg custard tarts, or *nata*, are a delicious reminder of this cultural influence and a must-try when visiting Melaka. Whenever I need a dose of nata, I head to



this bakery, which offers many varieties of the delicious custard creation, including strawberry, raspberry and passionfruit.

4 Medsalleh Kopitiam

At this lively café, they serve a wide variety of popular

Although this is not in London, Tamatanga in Leiceister is worth a visit. A colourful interior and long communal tables give this Indian restaurant a modern vibe. Try the *thali* – it's a huge platter crammed with freshly cooked sides and curries served with naan bread. I especially adore their garlic naan bread, which reminds me of the chilli cheese naan at the famous Pak Putra Restaurant in Melaka.

1 Shires Ln, Leicester LE1 4AN

Malaysian street food such as nasi lemak and roti canai, and they all taste as authentic as the versions back home. Whenever I'm here, I have to order a serving of cendol, which is refreshing and oh-so-delicious. They also serve Musang King cendol if you're hankering for the taste of durian.

5 Arome Bakery

9 Mercer St, London WC2H 9QJ

This trendy bakery offers baked goods crafted with French techniques and Asian ingredients. Look forward to tantalising creations such as sesame miso caramel cakes, pear and shiso pastries and croissants with Japanese BBQ sauce. It is always crowded, so be sure to get here early to nab the good stuff.

6 Borough Market Borough Market, Cathedral

Street, London SE1 9DE

The historic Borough Market is one of my favourite places in London as it simultaneously reminds me of a Malaysian pasar pagi (morning market), with its smorgasbord of stalls packed with fresh produce, and a pasar malam (night market) with its delicious selection of street food. Whenever I'm in Borough Market, I make it a point to drop by Bread Ahead Bakery, which sells the best artisan doughnuts in the city.

7 Cedric Grolet Wilton PL London SW1X 7R

Wilton Pl. London SW1X 7RL You cannot miss this patisserie by culinary rock star Cedric Grolet. Best known as being the executive pastry chef at the two-Michelin starred Le Meurice, Cedric Grolet recently opened his first patisserie in the heart of London. Enjoy an indulgent afternoon of sweet treats at the sleek steel-and-marble space - the tasting menu features five mini-versions of Grolet's most famous creations: hazelnut, lemon, Paris-Brest flower, a vanilla

flower and his version of the

classic British scone.

2 Dorsu

28A Abdul Carime St (Street 21)

From their Kampot production studio which operates largely on collected rainwater, this clothing brand uses fabric castoffs known as dead stock in making normcore classics that can be best described as Jil Sander in the tropics: chic, comfortable, easy-to-wear. *dorsu.org*







3 Wat Chocolate

#64, St 360

This bean-to-bar company – which has a workshop in Siem Reap, a boutique and café in Phnom Penh, and is stocked in local delis and supermarkets – purchases cacao direct from farmers in Mondulkiri Province to make a line of dark chocolate bars and other cacao items such as nibs (roasted and cracked cacao shells) and powder for drinks. 4 Dai Khmer Refill Store

Dai Khmer's vegan soaps, creams and oils are handmade by women in a village called Ta Khmao, most of whom are mothers and single mothers with very little education and therefore few employment opportunities. Hornbills – the brightly coloured bird even appears in its coat of arms – and Kuching, its capital city, is the main gateway for some of Malaysia's most popular ecotourism destinations and diving spots.

Planning a trip this June? Don't miss the Rainforest World Music Festival, taking place from the 23rd to the 25th. The three-day annual festival takes place in the lush rainforest at the base of Mount Santubong, at the Sarawak Cultural Village. In 2015, while filming Parts Unknown, the late Anthony Bourdain dropped by Choon Hui Café and declared Sarawak laksa "the best breakfast ever". He added that the noodle and prawn soup was a "breakfast of the gods" because of its complex, spicy and flavourful broth. Its fame ensures a queue so try and arrive soon after 7am when they open, and order other hawker treats like *kolo mee* (dry egg noodles with spicy minced meat and shallots), *popiah* (spring rolls) and *kaya* (coconut jam) toast with rich local coffee while you wait.



Continue walking along the Main Bazaar and take in its two-storey shop lots, the Square Tower (built in 1879) and the landscaped esplanade beside the Sarawak River. 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




Life in the saddle

From lush rice fields and gorgeous mountainscapes to private hot springs and a cat village, a cycling adventure in Taiwan's East Rift Valley offers a scenic escape from city life



TAIWAN

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he East Rift Valley, a long, narrow corridor of misty green mountains between Taiwan's Central and Coastal Mountain Ranges, is arguably one of

the most picturesque cycling destinations in Asia. Natural beauty aside, there's also the sheer infrastructure that makes it so attractive. Taiwan produces 70 percent of the world's mid- to high-tier bicycles annually, and has put in place all the ingredients for a cycling revolution of sorts, with more than 5,000km of cycling lanes across the country. There's also a range of cyclist-friendly facilities at police stations, supermarkets and convenience stores – even toilets that can accommodate bicycles.

Naturally, as digital editor of a cycling magazine in Malaysia, it's always been my dream to bike around Asia's so-called Bicycle Kingdom. During a work trip to Taipei, I convince my colleague, Treas Lo, a novice cyclist, to join me on a tour of East Rift Valley. My husband and my best friend – both seasoned cyclists like myself – also tag along for the four-day south-tonorth adventure.

DAY 1: TAITUNG TO RUISUI, 110KM, 6.5 HOURS

Our journey into Taiwan's eastern region starts with a scenic, four-hour train ride from Taipei, setting the tone for a tour that will go through one of the country's best-known cycling routes. Our starting point is Taitung, a gateway to Taiwan's eastern coast and the Huadong Valley (the local name for the East Rift Valley).

The expedition begins with an early morning send-off for our four bike cases. Our bicycles had travelled with us from Malaysia to Taiwan, and now they would follow us on Taiwan Railways' cargo freight service, which has a branch at Taitung station and other major stops along the train line. This being the cycling capital of Asia, it's not uncommon for cyclists to use cargo services to transport their bikes, making bike commuting and longer-distance cycling more convenient. Communicating our requests is smoother with help from Treas, who speaks Mandarin, and we are

To enjoy great views you must climb, and this is especially true in volcanic territory like Taiwan. Our route will cover the smooth roads of the Provincial Highways, County Highways and local roads. Not all have wide shoulders but these are mostly safe for cyclists and flanked on either side by the stunning scenery of mountains, forests and farmland.

A steady uphill grind out of Taitung city preludes a fair bit of rolling terrain, descending towards the Luye River and the Luye Highlands, before a spell of battling headwinds to Guanshan. The urban township is quiet by the time we arrive just after lunchtime. Most local restaurants are taking a break before dinner service, and we make do with a quick Family Mart convenience store lunch. I'm mindful of the newbie in our group, but Treas doesn't complain. She knows we need energy to last us for the long journey.

It being springtime, we are prepared for sudden changes in weather, with rain gear in our saddlebags. Soon enough, the blue skies turn overcast and we enjoy a refreshing drizzle. We are used to riding in the rain for hours on end, and thankfully Treas continues to be a good sport, seemingly unfazed by the wet ride.

We pedal further north into Chishang, Taiwan's unofficial rice capital and home to the iconic Brown Boulevard, the setting for the popular Mr. Brown Coffee commercial with Taiwanese-Japanese actor Takeshi Kaneshiro. Though not as internationally famed as boba milk tea, Mr. Brown Coffee is a local Taiwanese institution, with a chain of full-service cafés, numerous canned beverages and instant "cappuccino" powders.

As we ride through the lush paddy fields, I am dazzled by the emerald green expanse that spread out before me. The nutrient-rich volcanic soil and high **Clockwise from this page:** Rice paddies near Brown Boulevard; A Taiwan Railway



elevation of Chishang's plains is said to produce the best rice in all of Taiwan.

As the sun dips below the horizon, we follow our noses to a fantastic dinner of fried chicken and chips. The restaurant is attached to a home along the road, and we find out later it is the best spot for food along our route.

About an hour later, we reach the hot spring town of Ruisui and our accommodation for the night: Sunshine Hotspring B&B, where we have booked rooms with private onsens. One of the many cultural remnants of the Japanese occupation from 1895 to 1945, onsen culture is truly a boon for travelling cyclists in Taiwan. After a big first day, a post-dinner soak in the iron-rich, sulphuric bath is exactly what we need to soothe our fatigued muscles.





DAY 2: RUISUI TO HUALIEN, 78 KM, 4.5 HOURS

An early morning dip in our private onsens is followed by a breakfast of freshly baked bread, eggs, vegetables and fruit awaiting us in the dining hall. We are soon packed up and ready to roll out, facing another fairly long journey. More climbing and rolling hills await en route to our first stopping point of the day: the pretty agricultural township of Guangfu, set against the sweeping vistas of Taiwan's Central Mountain range, the tallest peak of which is the Xiuguluan Mountain, at 3,860m. Guangfu is home to a significant indigenous Amis population and has a rich natural landscape with many nature parks and remnants of the Japanese occupation. These include the Guangfu Sugar Plant, built in 1921 and famous for producing over 30 types of naturally flavoured ice creams.

We decide to skip the sweets and make a beeline towards the rural Guangfu Township for a lunch of beef noodles, a quintessential Taiwanese dish. We declare a strict "no sharing" rule to ensure everyone has enough energy to make it to today's end point. Guangfu, an agricultural township is sandwiched between the Central Mountain Range 66

and the Hualien Coastal Range. Today's climbs are steep too, making the journey almost as arduous as day one. Thankfully, everyone's spirits seem pretty high – even Treas seems to have recovered fully from the first day's gruelling route.

Two and a half hours later we stop for tea at the old timber town once called Morisaka, or Little Shanghai, now known as Lintienshan Forestry Culture Park. Formerly the fourth largest forest station in Taiwan, the fully equipped logging community set up by the Japanese once housed 500 households but is now fairly quiet, save for a few dozen households that remain and a handful of tourists who come to see the glory days of the area's timber industry.

After a spectacular descent through the valley's rolling hills and suspension bridges, we eventually reached the pretty coastal city of Hualien, checking into one

Being a popular location for cyclists touring the East Valley route or the Formosa 900 round island route, I'm surprised not to see more cyclists in the area. Hualien is a hotbed of traditional island culture, but perhaps having the Taroko Gorge, paddy fields and the spectacular coast on its doorstep means all the visitors are spread out everywhere, free in the outdoors rather than crowding together in the city.

We skip the night markets with all the indigenous food on offer, instead celebrating two challenging days of riding with a traditional dinner of bubbling hotpot and Taiwanese bubble milk tea. We've completed the two hardest days of the route, with only minor mechanical issues and no rider related problems save for Treas' one tiny muscle pull. This is definitely cause for a grand feast.




DAY 3: HUALIEN TO TOUCHENG, 35KM, 2 HOURS

After two days of hard cycling, we treat ourselves to a slower and easier morning ride. We take a shorter route and will get to Su'ao by train to avoid a narrow, truck-filled stretch even the most advanced cyclists steer clear of.

In Hualien, we are the first among many cyclists to board an eventually packed carriage. Only the evening train comes with dedicated bicycle carriages, so this morning we're sheepishly sandwiched between our bikes and other passengers – but no one seems surprised. Bicycles on the train are par for the course here.

Upon arrival in Su-ao, famous for its seafood auctions and cold springs, we ride to another classic Taiwanese meal of fried chicken at Dongshan Old Street. After tucking in, we enjoy a change of pace with a tranquil riverside bike lane through Dongshan Forest Park to Yilan County's residential and agricultural areas, dotted with quaint Fujian-style temples, with their distinctive swallowtail roofs and traditional cut porcelain carvings. By sunset, we reach rural Toucheng, and are greeted by a dramatic backdrop of yet more towering peaks.



DAY 4: TOUCHENG TO TAIPEI, 85KM, 5 HOURS

We set off after a simple breakfast at our homestay in Toucheng, where the breezy seaside bike lane soon gives way to a Provincial Highway route, flanked by views of the jagged northeastern coast and the misty Xueshan Mountain Range in the distance.

Three hours later, past Shicheng Fishing Harbor, we ride through Old Caoling Tunnel, the first railway tunnel in Taiwan, built in the 1920s to connect northern Taiwan with the eastern coast. Repurposed into a crowded cycling attraction, it is now filled with tourists on e-bikes. Most of these are day trippers out on a sightseeing holiday rather than touring cyclists, as the tourist hotspot has many e-bikes for rent.

The fishing port of Fulong lies on the other end of the tunnel. We choose a coastal restaurant for a lunch spread, fueling up for a bit more climbing on our final day. After that, following the Shuang River, the route turns into a series of punchy inclines to Shuangxi, where we have a much-needed convenience store stop. Cyclists in Taiwan rely on the widespread *konbini* (convenience store) culture, another remnant of Japanese influence and a great way to find clean toilets on tour. Like most convenience stores in the country, this 7-Eleven has packed meals and snacks, a sitting area upstairs and pristine toilets similar to those high-tech bidet options in Japan.

We then head to the famous Houtong Cat Village, a former coal mining town turned cat sanctuary. After the closure of the local coal mine in 1990,

a photographer chanced upon the local stray rescue effort, and as the pictures went viral, the cats quickly replaced the town's mining heritage as a tourist attraction. Houtong's feline population numbers in the hundreds, and being cat lovers, we indulge in a visit and a quick snack at one of the many quaint cafés.

From Houtong, we resist taking the train to Taipei, opting to ride the remaining 40km to Keelung as the greenery eventually gives way to an urban setting.

A final leg along Taipei's famed bike lanes takes us all the way to the Taipei 101 Tower. The riverside routes are brightly lit with neon lights, and being the weekend, there are many families out on a stroll or cycling around the public parks. After dinner at Mos Burger, we check into Le Home hotel for a hot tub soak and a good night's sleep, and in the morning we will pick up our bike suitcases at Taiwan Railways' luggage holding centre.

In total, our distance covered was 300km, which is more mileage than some regular cyclists clock in a month. During our four-day journey, we took in sumptuous views, indulged in hot spring therapy and sampled plenty of local delicacies along the way. Taiwan's nationwide acceptance of cycling culture is truly unparalleled, with their wide network of cycling routes, cyclist friendly public transport, bicycle service stops to even free water refills at police stations. Treas and I both agree that while this may be our first cycling trip together, it certainly won't be our last.

Prime time time with primates

Having gone through multiple setbacks – from a devastating fire to a global pandemic and a drought – an orangutan sanctuary in West Malaysia continues to stand strong in its fight to save the great apes

s our boat pierces the placid surface of Tasik Bukit Merah, the first man-made lake in Malaysia that is just

an hour's drive from the bustling city centres of Ipoh and Penang, the sun makes its presence known in the cloudless sky. It is 9:30am on a February weekend and I am on my way to Bukit Merah Orang Utan Island in Semanggol, Perak. From afar, I spot my destination: a cluster of red-brick wooden buildings at the edge of a tiny forested island across the lake. At first glance, the island seems like an idyllic retreat, and for the primate residents of the island, it is indeed a haven on Earth.

Many Malaysians are surprised to learn that they can see orangutans up close in Peninsular Malaysia, as the primates live in the wilderness of Borneo and Sumatra. But Bukit Merah Orang Utan Island – a short ferry ride from Bukit Merah Laketown Resort, which itself is more known for theme parks – has been around since 2000. Spread over 14 hectares, the sanctuary is dedicated to the rehabilitation and conservation of the Bornean orangutan, specifically those from Sarawak.

"Our main objective is to promote awareness and conservation of this critically endangered species through education and research programs for the public," says Nurhafizie binti Mohamad Hapiszudin, head of the Bukit Merah Orang Utan Island Foundation. "Here, we perform ex-situ conservation – which is conservation efforts that are done outside of their natural habitat. We provide natural facilities for orangutans to make them feel at home."

The orangutan sanctuary cares for injured, orphaned and rescued orangutans. It collaborates with educational institutions and zoos within and outside of Malaysia. It also has a successful breeding program with 17 orangutans born on the island to date. Today, visitors can catch a glimpse of only 15 orangutans – 12 of which were born on the island – as the rest have been returned to the wild.

It is not just the orangutans that piqued my interest and made me want to visit the sanctuary. The Bukit Merah Orang Utan Island has had an eventful past few years, weathering through a series of setbacks.

Earlier in 2018, a fire broke out in the sanctuary and destroyed half of their jetty, the gift shop and several offices, with damages costing almost RM1 million. A year after they gradually rebuilt the sanctuary, the world was hit by the Covid-19 pandemic. Due to lockdown restrictions, only selected rangers could go to the island to care for the orangutans. And in 2022, just when it had reopened to the public, an extended drought dried up the lake, which forced the sanctuary to close its doors again.

With these tragedies in mind, I wonder how the sanctuary has been faring, especially in the welfare of the orangutans. Entering the sanctuary, however, one would not have an inkling that these issues even existed, thanks to the passionate and knowledgeable staff of the sanctuary.

After alighting the boat, my group is greeted by our tour guide, Noor Haslina binti Abdul Hamid. Led by the chatty

and petite woman, we traverse through the sanctuary, unravelling the wonders of the orangutans.

The guided tour is the highlight of the Bukit Merah Orang Utan Island. There are five tour slots, with the first at 9.45am and the last at 3.30pm. Unlike in zoos, where animals are kept within enclosures, the orangutans are free to roam freely across six hectares of the island while visitors are limited to a stroll through a 200m-long open-air caged tunnel. The tunnel is flanked by plants and shaded by tree canopies that mimic the joyful experience of being out and about in nature.

"We always prioritise the orangutans since that is our main goal. Orangutans need a large area to move freely, so this tunnel allows both people and orangutans to wander about safely," says Nurhafizie. During the tour, Haslina easily switches from elaborating on the science of orangutan anatomy to dropping quirky anecdotes of individual orangutans. Claiming to be "married to the orangutans", she spends six days a week on the island, like most of the employees, and has a close bond with the great apes.

My worries about the chances of seeing the orangutans in person immediately disappear within minutes of the tour as

Sungai Dusun Wildlife Conservation Centre, Selangor

Selangor's Sungai Dusun Wildlife Conservation Centre protects Malaysia's most endangered animals, including the Malayan tapir. To visit, you'll need a permit from the Department of Wildlife and National Parks. *wildlife.gov.my* we spot a family of orangutans frolicking in the sunlight, their dark auburn fur contrasting brilliantly against the lush greenery. Having the orangutans bask in the sun a few steps away is simply a sight to behold.

BJ, a 37-year-old dominant male who fathered most of the younger orangutans, sits nonchalantly despite the excited chatter of visitors. His impressive cheek pads, a symbol of his alpha male status, emphasise his intimidating figure. His children, Manu and ChaCha, linger nearby while their mother, an orangutan named Baboon, remains in the shade.

"BJ came out because his favourite ranger is here," says Haslina with a glint in her eyes, glancing at a colleague who is standing beside her. "Baboon prefers *mat salleh* (Caucasian) tourists. She was very friendly to the German visitors yesterday." In due time – thanks to three Canadian tourists in our group – we catch Baboon's attention. "I wanted to see orangutans in the wild but didn't want to fly all the way to Borneo," says one of the tourists, Karen Lane, fresh from a weeks-long trip to Penang and









Langkawi. "It's so interesting to see them play among themselves. There are only two orangutans in the Toronto Zoo so being able to see so many of them up close is a real treat."

Most of the island's visitors are non-Malaysian tourists. According to the sanctuary's staff, locals prefer to visit the nearby theme parks instead. With the recent pandemic affecting popular tourist spots, that lukewarm interest in the sanctuary may dampen the sanctuary's conservation efforts.

"Ecotourism plays an important role to educate the community about, and make them aware of, wildlife conservation. The more visitors come to ecotourism destinations, the more people will be educated about wildlife conservation," says Nurhafizie. "We need support from others. If you have money, let's donate to conservation."

Despite the hurdles it faces, the Bukit Merah Orang Utan Island Foundation remains an optimistic and earnest endeavour to conserve orangutans for future generations. As I prepare to leave, the island unveils one last surprise: we stumble upon a 12-year-old orangutan, aptly named Puteri Hang Li Po (after the Ming Dynasty princess who wed a Malaccan sultan), who is snoozing the morning heat away on the bough of a tree. I carry this image of a happily undisturbed orangutan as I return home, determined to fight the good fight. As the princess sleeps, the work of humans to keep orangutans thriving marches on.



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
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
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

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
The Perfect Pull

CABIN LUGGAGE HANDLING

Passenger and crew safety on board our flights are our highest priority. In compliance with the airline's policy and in observing Occupational Safety and Health Regulations requirements, cabin crew are no longer required to stow passengers' hand luggage in the overhead stowage compartments. This is to minimise occupational hazards and ergonomic risks faced by cabin crew in the aircraft. Lithium metal or lithium ion cells or batteries for portable electronic devices (PEDs), including medical devices, must not exceed 2g for lithium metal batteries and 100Wh for lithium ion batteries. All spare batteries, including lithium metal or lithium ion cells or batteries, for PEDs must be carried in passengers' carryon baggage only. These batteries must be individually protected to prevent short circuits. PEDs containing nonspillable batteries, they must be 12V or less or 100Wh or less. Passengers are allowed to carry a maximum of two spare batteries onboard. These batteries must be individually protected to prevent short circuits.

NO-SMOKING POLICY Smoking, including the use
