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

This is a significant achievement, especially given the after-effects of the COVID-19 pandemic on our operations as we continue to restore capacity into the market.

I wish to assure you of our unwavering commitment to providing inimitable Malaysian Hospitality service across all our airlines. I understand that there are areas that we need to improve, particularly in terms of customer experience.

We appreciate your patience and want you to know that we are working hard to address these issues, as our focus remains on you, our valued customers. We will continue to double down on our efforts in ensuring customers remain our centre of gravity to provide you with more products and services that are aligned with your needs and changing market environments.

I am also pleased to share that we have introduced several initiatives to achieve our goals that are outlined in our Long-Term Business Plan 2.0. In the pipeline, we will be introducing the Voluntary Carbon Offset Programme, which will allow passengers to offset emissions associated with their flights by supporting verified carbon offset projects directly when booking through Malaysia Airlines' official website.

I am also pleased to share that we recently transferred four popular Malaysia Airlines' Intra-Borneo services to Firefly following robust demand recoveries across all markets, with the latter now operating one-time daily return flights on the Boeing 737-800 aircraft between its new hub in Kota Kinabalu (BKI) and Sandakan (SDK), Tawau (TWU) and Kuching (KCH), as well as between KCH and Miri (MYY); providing passengers unparalleled travel experience with comfort, convenience and efficiency.

With these developments and other exciting projects in our pipeline, you can look forward to an enhanced experience, greater connectivity and a memorable journey onboard Malaysian Hospitality. Once again, thank you for flying with us and we hope to see you onboard again soon.

Commune with nature

Drawing inspiration from Japanese aesthetics and way of life, Mio Spring features minimalist-style two-storey terrace houses built against a backdrop of lush greenery. 

6 Penang

A young chef helps diversify George Town's food scene

Penang is synonymous with its local food. Domestic and international tourists flock here to sample dishes such as char kway teow, curry mee, asam laksa and dozens of other classics. In this culinary landscape, it would seem to make little business sense to open a French-inspired fine-dining restaurant in George Town.

And yet, that's exactly what Penangborn chef Kim Hock Su did with Au Jardin. Five years later, in 2023, he garnered one Michelin star for the effort.

It's been a long and winding journey back home for Su, who received his culinary training in the UK. "I worked at the White Hart at Lydgate and later at the Freemasons at Wiswell, under Michael Shaw and Steven Smith respectively. I would have happily stayed on, but an







injury brought me home." Su began his first foray as a French-inspired restaurateur in Penang.

He opened pâtisserie Les Macarons de Valérie in 2012, followed by Basil, Le Bistrot in 2014, with investors who eventually took him and half his team to open a Taipei branch of the café. However, the challenge of running and staffing two branches was unsustainable.

One day, Su had a culinary epiphany. "I was at the San Pellegrino Young Chef Academy competition representing Taiwan," he recalls. "And Malaysia was notably absent. Why was I competing for another country when there was no one to represent Malaysia?" This realisation was pushed into action by personal circumstance. When their first child was born, Su and his wife closed both restaurants and returned home to Penang in 2018.

This was the beginning of Au Jardin. Here, Su showcases his culinary knowledge and international experience, married with some familiar flavours and predominantly Malaysian ingredients. "The essence of French cuisine is to take inspiration from the terroir and local fresh produce," he says. "I'm not here reinventing char kway teow or asam laksa, but I'm incorporating what makes those dishes great into our food."

Su and his team change at least 85 percent of the menu every month, offering a fresh experience to regulars and new diners alike. But the *canard* à *l'orange* – a 90-day old duck stuffed with hay, oranges and spices then aged for two weeks and roasted on the bone – has not been allowed to retire. "I dropped it once and diners complained, so we have one evergreen item on the menu."

Even with his success thus far, Su doesn't plan to expand anywhere else. "The art of street food is dying in Penang. The upcoming generation either no longer wants to inherit this craft or leaves Penang for different pastures. By bringing attention to Penang via Au Jardin, perhaps I can elevate interest in the food scene as a whole and keep heritage street food going." **restaurant-aujardin.com**

Kuala Lumpur

A Broadway musical starring local theatre talent



When the curtain rises on *The Producers* at the Kuala Lumpur Performing Arts Centre in July, Peter Ong will look forward to hearing laughter from a live audience again. "This will be the first major musical production in KL since the pandemic," says the performer and co-founder of PAN Productions, "which is why we decided to go with something gloriously camp and over-the-top hilarious."

The Tony Award-winning musical by Mel Brooks – which was made into a movie starring Nathan Lane, Uma Thurman and Matthew Broderick in 2005 – was first staged by Pan Productions in 2013, where it swept the top four prizes at the Boh Cameronian Awards.

As one of Southeast Asia's most versatile stage artists and tenors, Ong is as adept in musical comedy roles. In this year's restaging of *The Producers*, he reprises his role as Max Bialystock, an eccentric fraudster who hatches a wickedly funny

"By staging Broadway or West End musicals with local cast and crew, we're helping Malaysian talent develop experience that will

be recognised by international producers. It helps our performers add to their credentials and maybe even find stardom overseas."

For instance, emerging artist Aaron Teoh, who recently landed a role in the Hollywood adaptation of *Wicked*, started out in PAN Productions musical theatre before touring with *The King and I* in the United Kingdom.

"Aaron's success is proof of how important it is that our artists are seen and heard," says Ong. "Who knows if we are nurturing another Michelle Yeoh right now?"

The Producers runs from 21 July to 6 August at KLPAC (Pentas 2). Tickets are available on cloudtix.co from 1 July.

Australian brunch in a century-old shophouse

Penang's long-beloved allday breakfast spot Urban Daybreak has a new home on George Town's Bishop Street – and it's beautiful. Located inside a century-old shophouse, where natural light streams through old-fashioned louvered windows, the former art gallery underwent a renovation to make room for its new resident eatery. "We wanted to reveal the soul of the building rather than change it," says founder Jeremy Teoh of the lovely interior arches, wooden floors and terracotta tiling. The walls were kept white as the idea of an art gallery evolved to celebrate not only the coffee culture but also the local art scene in Penang.

Urban Daybreak's legendary menu still features all the classics: fried chicken waffles, the bestselling Avocado Smash and Urban's Really Big Breakfast, a sharing platter for a hearty start.

A tribute to the biodiversity of Perlis

Perlis, the northernmost region of Malaysia, is home to rare wildlife such as the slow loris, stump-tailed macaque and Lar gibbon. A new photobook, featuring images by Peter Ong and illustrations by Jennifer Linggi, pays tribute to this rich biodiversity, with an urgent message about conservation.

A collaboration between the Perlis Nature and Wildlife organisation and youth-led environmental group Roots and Shoots Malaysia, Wang Kelian, Perlis – The Forgotten Valley is not just a keepsake, but a bittersweet reminder of what we stand to lose if we don't act quickly.

"Malaysia is a megabiodiverse country, and we need to take better care of it," Ong says. "We must get out of the mentality that it's someone else's job."

Kuala Lumpur

A social entrepreneur driving epic change

When John-Son Oei started building homes for orang asli (indigenous communities in Malaysia) villages in 2010, he expected it would be a six-month break before starting a career. Thirteen years later, community service has become his purpose. Through his social enterprise EPIC Homes, Oei has helped build nearly 190 homes, empowered villagers to start their own businesses and grown EPIC Homes into an organisation that supports everything from digital learning to circular economy initiatives.

How did EPIC Homes take off?

In the first project we did as EPIC Homes, we built a community toilet over a weekend in 2010. Everyone had an amazing experience. I realised that many people are hungry to make a difference, but don't know what to do except donate money. I wanted to provide a platform for people to meet the communities they're working with and learn their culture. I believe that looking beyond your own survival is key to unlocking your purpose in life.

How do you build homes so quickly?

We were inspired by Ikea. The main structure can be assembled in half a day. Our suppliers provide timber for the subframe in standard cuts that fit the steel frames. There's a manual you can follow to put the house up from scratch. We also split into teams – one for structure, others for the roof, floors and walls.

How many people join the builds, and where do they come from?

People from more than 50 countries have joined us for builds. Some fly in to volunteer and then travel around Malaysia. The ideal number for a holistic experience, where there's time to have fun and take pictures, is 30 people. You can do it with 15 – you just wouldn't have time for ice cream breaks!

When did your mission grow to include social entrepreneurship?

For our second project, we were pointed towards a man who was living in a shack. We thought: Let's raise some funds. But some questions bothered us. What happens after the house has been built? How did he even end up in this state? If you bypass the person and go straight to solving the problem, you strip them of their dignity.


Have any volunteers remained in touch with the communities?

EPIC stands for Extraordinary People Impacting Communities. We encourage volunteers start their own initiatives with us. There's one social enterprise involved in ecotourism called Native Discovery and another called The Asli Co. They help women in the community make and market their products, and the funds go to keeping their kids in school. **epic.my**



The hidden powers of bamboo

Tease your taste buds with a variety of bistro-style dishes at The Café. For those who enjoy live music, look out for the music weekends that feature live jazz performances.

Other seasonal activities also include school holiday fun for kids (and parents!).

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A Malaysian in... Hong Kong

I was born in Johor Bahru

into a very musical family. When I was a teenager, we used to perform together in a band. With the support of my father, I pursued a musical career, and in 2010, moved to Hong Kong. I am who I am because of my Malaysian roots, while Hong Kong has inspired me so much, given me so many opportunities and been a driving force for my career.

I recently signed under Emperor Group and have been working on a new album to be released later this year. In the meantime, I've released a couple of singles, including "Dum Dum", which has topped the charts of all five major Hong Kong TV and radio channels. I feel really at home in Hong Kong now – I love the city's unique landscape, and how the mountains and the seaside are so accessible. Here are some of my favourite things to do around the city.

Getting a legal high

Old Peak Road Trail (Old Peak Rd, Central)

What I like about Hong Kong is that you can reach the mountains just as easily as the seaside. Along Old Peak Road there's a 3.5km trail that takes you up to The Peak, the highest point on Hong Kong Island, in about an hour. Upon reaching the top, you get to see the worldfamous views of Hong Kong's skyline with mountains and the sea in the distance. You'll also find the Victoria Peak Circle Walk - an easy loop that I recommend to everyone since it's paved and relatively flat.

Let's get physical 111 Studio

(Russell St, Causeway Bay)

Whenever I am preparing for a concert or music-video shoot, I





attend dance rehearsals for four to five hours every day and hit the gym with my trainer or do home workouts whenever I can. I work out at 111 Studio, a newly opened private gym owned by my friend and fellow Emperor Group artist Sammy Sum. It's super-clean, private and well-equipped.







Down to a fine art PMQ (Abardoon St. Control)

(Aberdeen St, Central)



Malaysia Airlines flies between Kuala Lumpur and Hong Kong 7x weekly. When it comes to discovering local fashion, design, arts and crafts, I enjoy exploring PMQ (the former Central Police Married Quarters), where you can find tons of designers and artists as well as their studios. I like to spend an afternoon here visiting the silversmiths who make jewellery by hand – I've bought a few adorable catthemed bangles. I also enjoy browsing handmade glassware in the home-decor shops and shopping for clothes.

Creating a scene

Central Harbourfront Event Space (Lung Wo Rd, Central)

The Central Harbourfront Event Space is the go-to venue for large festivals in Hong Kong – it has a great vibe with fabulous views of the skyline. I love just strolling around, grabbing food and drinks, relaxing on the grass and listening to music.

Hang in a hip 'hood

West Kowloon Cultural District (Austin Rd West, Tsim Sha Tsui)

An artsy and trendy neighbourhood I like to visit often is the West Kowloon Cultural District. It's a relaxing open space with several artthemed landmarks, as well as plenty of cafés and restaurants. The Xiqu Centre is very special, since it shows contemporary musicals and traditional Cantonese operas, plus the architecture is gorgeous. Then there's Freespace, a live-music venue, and the Art Park along the waterfront, where people like to picnic or hang out with their families and dogs. Head over to the waterside for sunset, then grab a bite before seeing a show.

A furry delightful place to stay

Rosewood Hong Kong (Salisbury Rd, Tsim Sha Tsui)

During the pandemic, I booked a staycation with my pet cat, Almond Paste, for the first time. It was amazing! I stayed at the Rosewood Hong Kong, and they thought of everything, from providing a litter box to a pet bed and food bowls. The hotel is next to the pet-friendly K11 Musea mall, so I could explore, shop, dine and do everything with my cat during my stay. After some initial curiosity, she finally decided to sleep with me in the big, comfy hotel bed she's very smart!

On the waterfront

Sai Kung Public Pier (Sai Kung)

I often work during weekends and take a day off during the week. It works out well, because I get to enjoy the quiet weekday atmosphere of places further out in the countryside, like Sai Kung Town, a small village in the northeastern New Territories that retains Hong Kong's original fishing village charm. At Sai Kung Pier, I can also join a day trip on a speedboat or sampan (a small local boat) for a fun day out. I like to go in the late afternoon to catch the sunset, which is spectacular.

Dinner with the stars

The highest restaurant in the world is a must-visit in Shanghai now that China has reopened its borders by MARK ANDREWS

Just over 556m above the ground, Heavenly Jin in Shanghai Tower's J Hotel truly lives up to its name. Late last year, it set a new Guinness World Record as the planet's most towering restaurant, surpassing Dubai's At.mosphere by some 115m.

The interiors are no less impressive. A 30m-long Silk Road mural greets guests as they enter, while ribbon-like crystal lights twinkle as the open kitchen prepares modern European, Japanese and fine Chinese cuisines.

But let's face it: You're visiting for the view and Heavenly Jin's panoramic view of the Huangpu River is especially stunning after sunset. Reservations are essential.

Open season

With mild weather, easy access and stunning new trails, summer in Seoul is a hiker's dream **by MATTHEW C. CRAWFORD**



Early summer is a sweet spot among Korea's

seasons. The rice paddies are filled with neat rows of seedlings, the hills draped in foliage and the mornings still pleasantly cool. To reap the natural bounty, millions of locals head into nature at this time – the older generation armed with sturdy protective gear; the youth adorned in Instagrammable attire. Among the options in the Seoul region, several new trails and walking paths have special appeal.



Y-Shaped Cloud Bridge, Dodeok Mountain, Gwangmyeong City

In August 2022 a creative piece of engineering called the Y-Shaped Cloud Bridge, the second such structure in Korea, opened in Dodeok Mountain. By stepping onto the suspension bridge and venturing to the centre of the Y, hikers can admire jagged cliffs, an artificial waterfall and a small lake below. Dodeok Mountain sits just beyond Seoul's southwestern city limits.

Trail tip From the parking lot, the loop is about 5km, so budget at least two hours. A more direct route to the observatory takes 40 minutes.

Bugak Mountain, Seoul

Right by Bugak Mountain, a cashew-shaped chunk of granite right smack in central Seoul, an atmospheric trail along the old city wall opened in 2007, followed by a northern section in 2020. In April 2022, the two southern trails – one slightly northwest of the presidential Blue House, the other just east – had their grand reopening.

Trail tip A short walk from Gwanghwamun Station, these two southern trails take about an hour to ascend, if followed to the highest point of the mountain (342m). Look out for the January 21 Incident Pine Tree, between Chungundae Peak and Baegakmaru Peak, which was riddled with bullets while the commandos engaged in a shootout.

Gubong Island Loop, Ansan City

South Korea's vast tidal flats were named a UNESCO World Heritage site in 2021. These can be seen along Section 51 of the sprawling Gyeonggi Dulegil trail, where you can find a picturesque spike of land named Gubong Island. Head to the rocky outcrop holding Gubong Sunset Observatory, where a round sculpture is popular with photographers as it lines up with the setting sun.

Trail tip The bridge is about a 40-minute walk and hike from Cheolsan Station, on Line No. 7 of the Seoul Metro. Continue another 10 minutes to the peak of the mountain (just 201m high) for views encompassing the capital, its satellite cities and nearby Surisan Provincial Park.

Columnar Joint Path, Cheorwon-gun

A volcanic eruption thousands of years ago in the northeast of Seoul created a lava plateau and, in some spots along the Hantang River, columnar joints (clusters of hexagonal pillars). In 2021, a series of trails along the river opened, including a suspension walkway skirting a cliff above the river.

Trail tip At a length of 3.6km, the walkway takes about 1.5 hours end-toend, budgeting. For many, the highlight is a glassbottomed section that curves away from the cliff.

CAFES

Indie cafés in Phuket that offer leafy reprieves, along with great food and even better photo ops by CRAIG SAUERS

Ma Doo Bua

Meaning "come see the lotus", Ma Doo Bua is located east of the Laguna Phuket complex. The caféslash-hotel offers an oasis from the action on Bang Tao beach.

The star attraction here is the picturesque lotus pond and its giant lily pads. From morning until dusk, the café fills with Instagrammers queuing up for irresistible shots among the lilies.

They even offer drone services, taking overhead shots while travellers perch in a wooden boat (from THB 500). Order specialties like *rad na* (stirred noodles in thick gravy) or tangy tom yum soda while you wait. *madoobua.com*

Maybelle's Coffee Garden

When Richie and Maybelle Colligan decided to open a café, they launched a YouTube channel to document the process.

Their 26,000 fans have watched them create a lush space with six coconut trees and vibrant flowers. They've seen the couple develop dishes, including a "proper English breakfast" drawing on Richie's British roots, smoothie bowls and full-flavoured Thai dishes.

Above all, they've followed along as Maybelle's Coffee Garden grew from a humble space into a local favourite on the hill between Kata and Chalong. *instagram. com/maybellescoffeegarden*

Modernist revival

An architectural style enjoys a resurgence in Ho Chi Minh City from an unlikely source ву јозниа zukas

Vietnam has no shortage of epochal

architecture, but one major era is often forgotten: the modernist period. That is starting to change with last year's opening of The Cocoa Project in Ho Chi Minh City's District 3. How can a chocolatier and café revive an architectural style, you might ask? Well, by thoughtfully restoring the 70-yearold building that houses it.

Vietnamese modernism, which flourished in the mid-twentieth century, is related to the broader post-World War II modernist movement. But it was also distinct, as local architects adapted the style's functional, economical and minimalist design philosophy for a tropical climate. These "bioclimatic" design decisions include wall gaps to boost ventilation, louvres to shield windows from the sun and exterior buffer zones to repel heat.

ELEVATE

The house that now hosts The Cocoa Project was originally fashioned with a shady front garden to separate it from the road in front, as well as huge lightwells that both cool the building and shower the interiors in natural light. But the previous tenant – a furniture shop – killed off the garden, obscured the design features and blocked lightwells to maximise floor space.

T3 Architects, a Ho Chi Minh Citybased firm specialising in sustainability, rescued these modernist features and, as a result, made the building more energy-efficient. "In terms of producing a green building," says T3 co-founder Charles Gallavardin, "renovation is almost always better than building something new."

"T3 has illuminated existing Vietnamese heritage and shown there is value in what people already have here," says Khanh Linh Le, The Cocoa Project's co-founder and general manager. "This reflects our approach to chocolate: a good-quality product doesn't need to be imported or luxury."

Tickle your tastebuds at The Cocoa Project

Along with crisp design and artisanal coffees, The Cocoa Project serves up chocolate treats with local flavours to devour on the spot or take away as perishable souvenirs. Celebrating Vietnam's most iconic nut, the cashew nuts covered in dark chocolate are wildly popular and make for excellent snacking. For something with zest, try the chilli-spiced peanuts coated in white chocolate – an ideal beer snack – or the milk chocolate tablets infused with mac khen, a spice mixture from Vietnam's northern mountains traditionally paired with grilled meat.

SUSTAINABILITY A ripple effect in Bengaluru

Thanks to one passionate conservationist, India's Silicon Valley is reclaiming its charming old moniker: the City of Lakes **BY GEETANJALI KRISHNA**

Barely 12km from Bengaluru's

commercial heart on MG Road, Maragondanahalli Lake glistens quicksilver in the sun, surrounded by greenery and high rises beyond. It's hard to believe that until 2021, this large water body was strangled with industrial effluents, sewage and water hyacinth.

Maragondanahalli Lake's transformation is thanks to Anand Malligavad, a mechanical engineer by training. His advocacy began in 2017, when he realised that the 14-hectare Kyalasanahalli Lake near his office had dried up. "Boys were playing cricket on the lakebed, and its banks were waste dumping grounds," he recalls.



ELEVATE

Malligavad approached the engineering company he worked for, as well as influential local residents. With volunteers, three earth movers and six trucks, he desilted the lakebed, created five artificial islands for birds to nest and planted 18,000 saplings of indigenous trees, fruit trees and medicinal plants – all in 45 days.

"Then we waited for the rains..." he recalls. Year on year, the lake filled up and in October 2022, it overflowed for the first time in 23 years. Over 1,000 villagers celebrated by taking the local deity for a ritual boat ride.

Malligavad is equipped only with a sense of urgency to conserve and revive lakes: "If we don't repair the damage," he says, "it's going to end badly for all of us."

Over the last six years, the 43-year-old has restored 30 lakes in and around India's parched Silicon Valley. Today they attract migratory birds and morning walkers alike, and have helped raise local groundwater levels.

But for Bengaluru's "Lake Man", this is just one of the many benefits of reviving his city's lakes. "Lakes not only help ecosystems," he says. "They refresh human psyches."

From wasteland to lakeland



Maragondanahalli Lake A 40-minute drive from MG Road, and next to the Electronic City tech hub, this 8.5-hectare lake was restored in 2022. Its walking track attracts over 700 walkers daily and the area is popular for film shoots.



Nanjapura Lake This 7.6-hectare lake had dried up almost 50 years ago and was restored in 2019. Located 10km from Bannerghatta National Park, this is a lovely spot for birdwatching as it holds water year-round.



Sampigehalli Lake This 2.5-hectare lake adjoins Bannerghatta National Park and makes for a nice excursion. Don't be surprised if you come across some wildlife here – it's a popular watering hole for wild elephants.

① 6am A walk with the wind

One of the best ways to kickstart your 24 hours in Kota Kinabalu is to catch dawn breaking over the city. It gets bright early here, with sunrise starting as early as 6.14am. Take a morning walk at the Tanjung Lipat beachside track. With swaying coconut trees, gentle sea breezes and a picture-perfect view of Mount Kinabalu, this 4km-long jogging track is one of KK's latest recreational playgrounds. It starts from the old harbour bridge and leads all the way to the iconic, rocket-shaped Tun Mustapha building. There is also a spacious area along the track where you can have a picnic or do yoga overlooking the ocean. *Tanjung Lipat Road*



() 8am Breakfast of Sabahan champions

No morning in KK is complete without a hearty kopitiam breakfast, and a piping hot bowl of *ngiu chap* (beef noodle soup), preferably at Yii Siang Hainan Ngiu Chap. KK's ngiu chap is similar to its Hainanese-style counterpart with meatballs, tender beef tripe, beef tendon, sliced beef and sirloin. It's all mixed in one hearty bowl of thick broth featuring *suan chai* (Chinese sauerkraut) and parsley, teasing the taste buds with a sweet and sour tang.

There is also a hybrid variation called the laksa ngiu chap, featuring the requisite tender beef slices along with springy noodles, served in a rich and spicy bowl of – you guessed it – laksa soup. Yii Siang Hainan Ngiu Chap, 21 Block C, Lorong Perindustrian

• 10am Island-hopping at the marine park

If you want more beach time after your morning jog, KK is also renowned for its islands and shorelines, particularly the Tunku Abdul Rahman (TAR) marine park, a picturesque cluster of five islands.

To get to the TAR park, make your way to Jesselton Point Ferry Terminal where boats to the park depart at regular intervals between 8am to 4pm. Tickets to the island of your choice (Manukan and Sapi are two of the more popular ones) are available from the boat transfer kiosks. If you can't decide which island to go to, you can also island-hop between them.

The journey to any TAR park island takes around 20 minutes, and a myriad of water activities from snorkelling to scuba diving and sea-walking await once you get there. *Jesselton Point Ferry Terminal, Haji Saman Road*

^(b) 2pm Café-hopping for the 'gram

The hipster café scene has flourished in Kota Kinabalu over the years. A jaunt down Australia Lane at Lorong Dewan offers endless options. Enjoy a cup of coffee, a late lunch or tea, and don't forget to snap a picture or two for the 'gram, as each of the popular cafes boasts distinctive interior decor. October Coffee House Gaya – a pioneer of the scene along Australia Lane – features high ceilings and a rustic barn interior, bedecked in warm floor-to-ceiling wood fittings and furniture.

"We are super proud of the KK coffee scene," says owner Denise Lau. "While we're nowhere close to having a scene like Melbourne yet, we hope we'll live to see the day," she added. Other cafés worth visiting for the coffee, delicious local and Western fusion cuisines and distinctive decor include Woo, Biru Biru Cafe and El Centro. *Australia Lane, Lorong Dewan*

① 7pm Enjoy a sumptuous seafood dinner

Facing the South China Sea, KK offers year-round access to some of the freshest and most affordable seafood feasts in Malaysia.

One of the most popular options is Welcome Seafood Restaurant, beloved for its fast service, cleanliness, as well as reasonable and transparent pricing. Another perk: Welcome lets patrons select live seafood fresh from the tank. Sabahan seafood must-eats include deep-fried soft shell crab, fresh prawns, grouper and an edible type of sea snails known locally as *siput tarik*.

Don't forget to also order the indigenous sayur manis (sauropus androgynus), a type of wild vegetable best enjoyed stir-fried with eggs or belacan (prawn paste). Sayur manis has a mild and sweet flavour similar to asparagus and offers a slight spinach-like acidic bite. It's also rich in vitamin K, so eat up. Lot G18, Asia City Complex Phase 2A, Asia City

() 6am-2pm A trip to the local market

Drop by the Gaya Street Sunday Market, which starts as early as 6am and runs till about 2pm. There are plenty of things to shop for here, from traditional handicrafts and saltwater pearl accessories to local motif batik sarongs and traditional food. If you're looking for great souvenirs, this is the place. Just be prepared to bargain!

① **12pm** One final lunch of your choice

For lunch, round up your 24-hour adventure by checking out KK's emerging upscale dining scene. JOJO Restaurant at the rainforest-inspired LUMA Hotel is a refined Asian gastro bar that's been popular since it opened over a year ago. Try and get a table at the outdoor deck, though the lowlight atmosphere inside is just as nice. Signature dishes include the Wagyu beef steak and tiger prawn fried rice. Top off your meal with a classic tiramisu.

Alternatively, for a final traditional meal, make your way to Little Sulap, a quaint little eatery designed to resemble a wooden sulap (a Kadazandusun cottage). This café serves delicious indigenous Sabahan dishes such as pinasakan basung (pickled fish soup dish), bambangan (pickled wild mango), tuhau (pickled wild ginger), ambuyat (dish made of sago starch) and butod (sago grub). 

Now that tourism bodies are promoting the greener glories of Langkawi post-pandemic, tour operators are embracing the remarkable biodiversity of the archipelago

ike dark snakes, mangrove roots close tighter around me until I have no more room to swing my paddle. A log blocks the tip of my kayak. A roof of emeraldgreen thicket has taken the place of

the sky. Infinite rows of *kayu bakau* (Malay for mangrove trees) observe my clumsiness with grave, silent faces.

"Don't panic. Push yourself out from the side," says Haris. The enthusiastic Malay nature guide has worked for Dev's Adventure Tours for the past year and a half. And for the past hour, he has been explaining the various types of rocks, trees and mangroves to my group of four kayakers.

Following Haris' lead, I put my paddle against the roots and push. Soon, I am back to gliding through Kilim Karst Geoforest Park. Covering the northeastern part of Langkawi's main island, the area has been a part of UNESCO's first geopark in Southeast Asia since 2007. The inscription also includes the Machinchang Cambrian Geoforest Park to the northwest and the Dayang Bunting Marble Geoforest Park, which straddles sea rock formations and an islet to the south of the main town, Kuah.


This month celebrates the 16th anniversary of the inscription of Langkawi's 220-million-yearold treasure trove of diverse habitats. Its coastal mangrove forests, tidal flats, beaches, estuaries, coral reefs, caves and limestone pinnacles that soar like dragon teeth from the aquamarine sea are breeding grounds for flying lemurs, giant squirrels, slow lorises, monkeys and hundreds of bird species. Surprisingly, biodiversity isn't the first thing that comes to visitors' minds when they think of Langkawi.

To show tourists how much more the island has to offer, tour operators such as Dev's Adventure Tours have been building on the efforts of ecotourism pioneers such as Irshad Mobarak. A tall, stocky Malay man with an infectious smile, Irshad came to the island in 1988. He was among the first to understand that the island's natural bounty deserved more focus and founded Junglewalla in 1994 as side-hustle. He made it a fully licensed tour operator in 2005.

"Langkawi has so much packed within a small area. There are over 265 species of birds, 535 species of butterflies and much more," says Irshad. "The entire geological history of Malaysia happened here: rock substrate, or soil, determined flora, and flora determined fauna," he explains.

But rather than explore the million-year-old natural marvels found inland and on the northern fringes, the 3.9 million tourists that visited Langkawi in 2019 flocked primarily to the island's beautiful beaches and their famous resorts.

The pandemic brought Langkawi's mass-tourismreliant industry to its knees, but also helped in one major way. "Many of the places that were once busy with tourist boats crisscrossing the enclosed waterways became quiet and devoid of visitors,"










Low-emissions jet-skiing An adventurous way to visit Langkawi's lesser-visited southern islets is by a private jet-ski tour. Cenang-based Megawatersports offers small, self-drive and guided tours that, besides the popular Dayang Bunting island, venture as far as Pulau Beras Basah and the turquoise-ringed Pulau Kentut Kecil. Thinking with sustainability in mind, these jet-skis are categorised as super low-emission vehicles under the California Environmental Body's rating system.

says Irshad. "This was truly a needed respite for flora to recover and for fauna to reoccupy certain areas."

When Langkawi reopened on 17 February 2022 as Malaysia's first post-pandemic international travel bubble, the Langkawi Development Authority (LADA) and other local tourism agencies vowed to promote a greener reset for the island. Leading the charge on these new priorities, some of Langkawi's most forward-looking tour operators are now focusing more than ever on nature-based activities that could help carve a new path towards increased ecological awareness.

"We were among the first few tour operators to stop offering wildlife feedings on all our excursions," says Dev's Adventure Tours manager and longtime island resident Claudia Mueller. She acquired the company in November 2006 and focused their offerings on more eco-friendly activities such as cycling, kayaking and mangrove boat cruises. "We are also the only ones giving guests drinking water in reusable glass bottles."

Venturing out on a kayak not only makes travellers appreciate the scale of Kilim Geoforest Park's limestone bays and pinnacles, it's also a green way to explore the sea, especially when compared to diesel-powered boat tours and other vessels that are too large to ply the mangrove-draped tunnels that protect the heart of Kilim.

DEV'S ADVENTURE TOURS ALSO OFFERS

another self-powered way to go beyond Pantai Cenang's touristy seafront: bicycle tours along the blissful countryside. The next morning, my wife Kit Yeng and I drive a scooter along the less-trawled coast north of Cenang to meet our guide in Kampung Raja. Here, we switch our scooters for pushbikes and start cycling along empty coastal paths, taking in the views of viridian hillslopes tumbling into the ocean.

After reaching the end of a cape, we double back through lush paddy fields speckled with grey dots that upon approach turn out to be water buffaloes ducking their horns to drink. I stop my bicycle in the middle of the gravel path. The sun's rays play against their backs while the backdrop of lush mountains hide all this beauty from visitors.

Gunung Machinchang, the highest peak in this western range, towers watchfully above us. Folklore says that the mountains were formed in part because of two giants, Mat Cincang and Mat Raya, who fought bitterly at a gathering of their families. As penitence, they agreed to be turned into stone, benign for eternity and a geological wonder for visitors like us to marvel at.

Our next stop is the traditional house of the Beras Terbakar (fields of burnt rice) area. The traditional Malay house of King Ku Halim Bin Ku Hassan is a reminder of Langkawi's inauspicious past. It was here in 1821, during the battle between Langkawi and Siam, that locals burned all their rice supplies to starve the marauding invaders. Langkawians still lost the war, due to the infamous curse of Mahsuri. Legend says that the maiden was falsely accused of adultery, and her unjust killing damned the island for the following seven generations.

MAHSURI'S CURSE SEEMED TO END

with Langkawi's 1987 declaration as a duty-free port which kickstarted several tourism makeovers. Discounted shopping and duty-free alcohol led to a focus on mass tourism and attractions such as the popular cable car and sky bridge on Gunung Machinchang. The arrival of world-class luxury resorts on most of the island's relaxed beaches – among which Pantai Cenang and Pantai Tengah have the most noteworthy bar and restaurant scenes – attracted many international visitors.

But with the UNESCO Geopark inscription, years before the pandemic, many tour operators and government organisations began considering more sustainable practices. One such tour operator is Dato Alexander Isaac of Tropical Charters, the leading cruise operator on the island and a former president of the Malaysian Nature Society. Since 2014, Tropical Charters has sponsored a free geopark educational tour to more than 4,000 local students and 1,200 teachers.

The aim is "bringing awareness to the geopark and the importance of keeping our waterways clean and using less plastics," says Isaac, who also takes part in regular beach cleanups. In 2018, Tropical Charters even launched its first electric-operated and solar-powered catamaran to run their popular day and sunset cruises.

LADA and government agencies such as the Wildlife and Forestry Departments are working on creating "Langkawi's Trans-Island Wildlife Conservation Corridor, which will ensure the genetic health of our precious wildlife," says Irshad. Langkawi's natural spaces are fragmented into six smaller, scattered zones. The corridor will help endemic wildlife such as primates, civets, pangolins, mouse deer, porcupine and even butterflies migrate freely among them to feed and mate.

But there are also challenges ahead, with several new mass tourism projects in the works that include reclaiming land to create new artificial islands. The Malaysia Nature Society has warned that reclamation projects will destroy marine life and the ecosystem, disturb water and tidal movements and trigger more ecological problems.

"More can be done for conservation, education and community participation," says Eric Sinnaya, former president of Malaysia Nature Society and a Langkawi eco-tourism pioneer with Morahols Travels, which he founded in 1982.

AS RESPONSIBLE TRAVELLERS, WE CAN

make the final difference for Langkawi's future. Nature remains the island's real bounty: besides elusive colugos, Langkawi hosts other wildlife that can be spotted by taking jungle walking tours in the company of eagle-eyed guides.

"Find our fabulous flying fives, namely the flying lemur, flying fox, flying dragon, red giant flying squirrel and the beautiful flying paradise tree snake, which is not dangerous," says Irshad. Junglewalla runs half-day and multi-day birdwatching tours.

"The latter is quite a unique experience on Langkawi because it's not yet a top-rated tour, but has its avid followers from around the world," says freelance nature guide Elis Ishak, a birdwatching specialist.



She's accompanying me on a half-day tour with Junglewalla to hike in the forest and search for rare birds. We are squatting on our haunches near a tree trunk, pointing our binoculars to the curved mangrove roots that disappear like dark hooks into the water, hoping to see a rare endemic bird, the brown-winged kingfisher.

"It's a very shy creature," Elis whispers. In this gruelling waiting game, hunched on the forest floor, we feel the island's ancient natural powers permeate everything. At last, when my calves start hurting, a fluttering ball descends from the canopy, and the half-fist-sized bird finally shows its golden head and carrot-coloured beak. For a moment, he seems to know where we are, and looks right at us.

Gazing into his eyes, I realise that no new artificial development could ever top the perfection of a million-year-old ecosystem.



Things to do in Langkawi Geopark

Langkawi Geopark includes all 99 islands of the archipelago, so wherever you go, you are in the park. In addition to exploring by **boat or kayak**, visitors can also take the vertigo-inducing **cable car up to the peak of Gunung Machinchang and walk across the Sky Bridge** for beautiful 360-degree views spanning as far as Koh Tarutao in Thailand. Langkawi's northern coast is also home to its less trawled and more beautiful beaches, such as **Pantai Pasir Tengkorak, Pantai Pasir Hitam, and Tanjung Rhu**, where you can see the island's purplest sunsets. The easiest way to get to **Dayang Bunting Marble Geoforest Park** is to join a shared island-hopping tour stops at the popular Pregnant Maiden lake and a few beaches. But when your boatman tries to feed the local population of sea eagles, the best thing you and your boat can do is to say "No, thanks."

Doha's glitzy art and design world has a fascinating counterpoint in the profusion of women photographers currently making waves in the Gulf state

atar has over the years become the art hub of the Middle East. There is a constant offering of exhibitions – ranging from fashion design to contemporary and mural art – that highlight Qatari, regional and international talents.

Qatar Creates, a year-round platform for arts and design that actively supports all forms of creativity, also fosters worldwide recognition for many artists.

Compared to other art forms, photography is still in its infancy in Qatar, with just one major festival, Tasweer, promoting the medium in the region and featuring a broad array of diverse talent. And yet, it is exactly this quieter creative stream which sheds light on life in the Middle Eastern country, its people and the country's history, particularly through the lens of Doha's cosmopolitan female photographers, who are in a great position to tackle subjects such as culture and identity, migration and heritage, and what it means being a female artist in the Gulf.

APARNA JAYAKUMAR Capturing the sartorial flair of Doha's migrant workers

From lying in the mud in the pouring rain to photograph an advertising feature for shoes to shooting on Bollywood film sets such as 7 *Khoon Maaf*, to being a set photographer on the 2020 Netflix series *A Suitable Boy*, Indian photographer Aparna Jayakumar has done it all.

She studied in Europe and has travelled the world for editorial and luxury commercials, and her personal projects are all about studying people and social issues, with photos capturing the everyday people on the street. It







was upon moving to Qatar as a spouse that she had a chance encounter with political cartoonist, artist and writer Khalid Albaih, her next-door neighbour, which allowed her to become involved in a project that truly stoked her passion. Albaih – who, through his cartoons and writing, prompts conversations about immigration, race, conflict and identity - conceived Doha Fashion Fridays, initially an Instagram and blog project with Jayakumar behind the lens. It morphed into a full-blown exhibition at the design hub M7 in the traditional neighbourhood-turnedhypermodern creative district Mshereib, and showcases Qatar's multinational migrant workers in their sartorial finery on Fridays, their day off.

"I simply went up to the people I found interesting to shoot and spoke to them," Jayakumar says. "I asked them about their background, their impressions of the city, their fashion inspiration and dreams for the future; and most of the

time, people were happy to share!" The resulting portraits show not only the sheer variety of nationalities coming together in Qatar, and their very individual fashion styles, but also allow an insight into an important segment of the community, which is often discussed but rarely looked at individually.

Even as a well-travelled international photographer, the sheer dynamism of the Gulf state has inspired Jayakumar: "Qatar had a huge influence on me," she says. "Not only the landscape, which is so very different from India's, but also Sheikha Al-Mayassa's [the Emir's sister and chairperson of Qatar Museums] creative vision and Qatar Creates drive, and the community. Being in Qatar has exposed me to a world of art, architecture, design, fashion and cinema that I have not seen before. Access to the best of the best, from Jeff Koons to Ai Weiwei, has been unparalleled! I have learnt so much just from being around all these greats."





SHAIMA AL-TAMIMI Finding identity as an immigrant

Visual storyteller Shaima Al-Tamimi uses both film and photography to draw on her cultural heritage.

Having grown up in the Gulf, she was first inspired to pick up a camera by her father, also a photographer. "It started as a hobby – sharing stories of my travels and explorations on Instagram – but eventually grew into a career that took me to places I would've only dreamed of," she says.

Living and working in Qatar for the last 12 years, she says that being a visual storyteller in Qatar right now is exciting. "There's a growing platform and attention being given to photography, especially with Tasweer, a photo biennale, and Qatar Creates, a large arts and culture platform. These initiatives' aim is to promote local creativity and thus provide a platform for artists to showcase their work alongside global artists, says Al-Tamimi.

Her still-ongoing exhibition at Mathaf Arab Museum of Modern Art, titled *As if We Never Came* (until 5 August 2023), is taken straight from her family's history, and her own quest to find a place in a world where migration and a variety of homelands can make it difficult to know oneself. Part of the exhibition is her awardwinning film *Don't Get Too Comfortable*, dealing with her grandfather's and father's journeys from Yemen as migrants, which was nominated for the Orizzonti Award for Best Short Film at La Biennale – the Venice Film Festival – and won the Bronze Tanit Award at the Tunisian Carthage Film Festival in 2021.

Talking about her father's choices when fleeing Zanzibar during the revolution in the 1960s – at the time the country was a British protectorate – she wonders how different her family's life would have been if he had fled to Britain instead of Yemen. "Your citizenship determines the opportunities you get in life," she says.

This interest in migration and identity, and the options both give you in life, led her to cooperate with Aparna Jayakumar on the Doha Fashion Fridays project, which Al-Tamimi took over after Jayakumar left Qatar during the pandemic.


Al-Tamimi is currently working on a new film. She is also busy with a project showcasing the Qatar Flour Mills, the site of which is in the process of being reinvented into the Art Mill Museum.



MASHAEL AL HEJAZI Paying tribute to Doha's oldest neighbourhoods

Mashael Al Hejazi is a Qatari-born and -raised photographer whose pride in her heritage takes centre stage in her work. "Photography is my way of explaining my culture, my country, myself and what it is like to be a Qatari woman, an Arab woman [and] an artist, as well as an international photographer," she says.


Continually progressing in her quest to develop her art, she moved on from her first Polaroid camera as a child to experimenting not only with different cameras, but also with more unusual printing techniques, such as cyanotype and Gum print.

A former artist-in-residence at the contemporary art space The Fire Station Gallery in Doha, where she participated in numerous exhibitions, it was her most recent show that brought all the different elements of her art together. At the Tawtheeq (meaning "documentary") exhibition *My Mother Lulwa's House* in the old bazaar district Souq Waqif, Al Hejazi showcased photographs of the old neighbourhood of Mshereib, a neighbourhood which a few years back was nearly completely rebuilt and reinvented, and turned into the new design and creative quarter in the city.

Her pictures depict old buildings, abandoned cars and remnants of a life once lived in the neighbourhood before it was razed to the ground. It is Al Hejazi's grandfather's neighbourhood, where she grew up, and she named the exhibition after the tradition of naming a house after a mother-figure who makes a house a home.

Using the cyanotype printing method, the photographs are all blue, and a little washed-out looking, even ghostly.

She explains why this was exactly the right process for her vision:




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Photography is my way of explaining my culture, my country, myself and what it is like to be a Qatari woman, an Arab woman [and] an artist, as well as an international photographer" "The photographs in normal print would have only shown the old buildings, but with the blue, historic printing method dating back to the mid-1800s, I can show that the houses are also part of history. They are cold, long gone, and the original people and occupants are not there anymore."

But even though she showcased the ghost of the former neighbourhood, the owners of the houses she photographed – even the owner of the car – were so invested in her project that they came to the exhibition and shared memories.

Al Hejazi is currently organising workshops for other photographers and children interested in art when she is not travelling to learn more about her craft.





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

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CABIN LUGGAGE HANDLING

Passenger and crew safety on board our flights are our highest priority. In compliance with the airline's policy and in observing Occupational Safety and Health Regulations requirements, cabin crew are no longer required to stow passengers' hand luggage in the overhead stowage compartments. This is to minimise occupational hazards and ergonomic risks faced by cabin crew in the aircraft. Cabin crew on duty will, however, assist passengers travelling with infants, young passengers travelling alone, the elderly and passengers with reduced mobility. Passengers who are fit and in good health must carry, stow and secure their hand luggage on board. Hand luggage exceeding the 7kg weight limit must be checked in before boarding.

PORTABLE ELECTRONIC **DEVICES (PEDs)**

For safety reasons, and in line with Civil Aviation Authority of Malaysia guidelines, mobile phones and all PEDs must be switched off for take-off and landing. Whilst cruising, devices placed in flight mode may be used. Devices transmitting strong signals must remain switched off throughout the flight, until disembarkation. The Captain may prohibit the use of devices that can interfere with the aircraft's system.

LITHIUM BATTERIES

X Lithium metal or lithium ion cells or batteries for portable electronic devices (PEDs), including medical devices, must not exceed 2g for lithium metal batteries and 100Wh for lithium ion batteries. All spare batteries, including lithium metal or lithium ion cells or batteries, for PEDs must be carried in passengers' carryon baggage only. These batteries must be individually protected to prevent short circuits. PEDs containing nonspillable batteries, they must be 12V or less or 100Wh or less. Passengers are allowed to carry a maximum of two spare batteries onboard. These batteries must be individually protected to prevent short circuits.

NO-SMOKING POLICY

Smoking, including the use of electronic cigarettes, is prohibited on all flights. Electronic cigarettes must be carried in carry-on baggage only. Recharging of the device inflight is not permitted.



Personal care, baby paraphernalia and first-aid treatment are available upon request.



Transit passengers in KLIA are encouraged to reconfirm their final baggage destination at the Transfer Desk to ensure that their checked luggage is identified and loaded accordingly. Just present your baggage identification tag at the desk.
