Go native with indigenous tourism


Community-based tourism in Malaysia is getting a digital boost. Pioneering ventures like Native, a social enterprise, introduces travellers to authentic cultural experiences with the orang asli in Peninsula Malaysia. As tourism activities return to normalcy, Native's online platform allows local and international travellers to easily explore and book homestay programmes with orang asli communities. Native's cofounder, Daniel Teoh shares how they work to promote indigenous tourism.

Why is indigenous travel important?

Indigenous travel serves as a gateway to reconciliation between cultures. It helps guests to foster an understanding about a culture other than their own. There is a Malay proverb, "tak kenal maka tak cinta", which means that you cannot love what you do not know - and I personally have learned this to be true.








I wish more people knew the depth of history the orang asli have in Malaysia and paid them more credit for their roles in our society. A lot of the products we enjoy in the market such as honey and durians tend to have indigenous origins, and we should value all the unseen work by the orang asli. This year, we're pushing to get more involvement from younger people, by working with schools and universities to make learning about indigenous culture through our programmes, part of a holistic curriculum.

What can visitors gain from these cultural experiences?

Our guests will almost certainly be the only people from outside the community

on any of the hiking trails we offer because only the orang asli community is familiar with [these trails]. There are also plenty of culinary delights to experience – from the foods foraged on trails to the meals prepared by our resident community chefs. For example, have you ever heard of – let alone eaten – roasted rubber tree seeds?

What has been your most impressive memory since starting this social enterprise?

We were crossing a small and quiet stream on one of our trails just earlier this year. Sirat, our hiking guide, paused to show us a little bit of nature's magic. The stream was barely the width of my feet – but when he ripped up a banana peel and dropped it into the water, the stream burst to life. Everything from small shrimp, to catfish, and even a turtle appeared in seconds from every nook and cranny in that little ravine. It's a great illustration of how much of the beauty of indigenous knowledge goes unseen. *discovernative.org*







It might be winter in

Melbourne but that doesn't mean you have to hibernate like a penguin from Phillip Island. Even in the colder months, the cultural capital of Australia offers a wide variety of arts and culture events. Here are the best ones to check out.



Goddess: Power, Glamour, Rebellion

Located in Federation Square in the heart of Melbourne's Central Business District, the Australian Centre for Moving Images (ACMI) is where movie buffs and aspiring filmmakers congregate. On top of the world

A refurbished hiking track on Auckland's west coast rewards those willing to climb a few stairs by rebekah white

When I first hiked

Omanawanui, it was more of a suggestion worn into the land than a track, and I wasn't even sure I was going in the right direction. I remember climbing up a grassy bluff so steep that I was almost crawling, regretting everything that had brought me to this point. But the view at the top took the rest of my breath away.

I was surrounded by ocean on three sides. On my left, cliffs plunged to the sea, and I could see waves crashing on the rocks far below. Ahead was the firm line of the horizon. On my right was a black-sand beach stretching all the way into the distance, where it disappeared in a haze of salt spray. The valley behind me was swallowed by old-growth forest. I couldn't believe I was only an hour from my Auckland home.

I immediately wanted to bring everyone I knew to see it, but knew that I couldn't. At the time, the track was simply too unfriendly.

Then, over the pandemic years, Auckland Council upgraded Ōmanawanui, turning it from a sketchy ridgeline wobble for hard-out trampers into a much-easier track that I could invite my mum to join me on. Now, there are wooden stairs and boardwalks, and handrails made of thick, old-fashioned rope. You don't even have to climb that bluff hand-overfoot, because the Council built a gentler way up.

But what moved me most was seeing people of all ages walking it.

The track starts at the end of the road at Whatipū, which is prounced fa-tee-PU, and named for the local spirit guardian, or taniwha. The track climbs from the beach up on to a ridgeline — that's the hardest part — then follows the ridgeline along the coast, over hilltops, through little glades of

mānuka and kānuka trees, some of them sculpted into fluid shapes by the wind. (You can tell the difference between the two by touching the leaves: mānuka leaves are pointy and sharp, and kānuka leaves are soft. Mānuka is mean, kānuka is kind.)

Near the turnaround point, the track enters stands of ancient trees that offer a glimpse of what the forest is like further into the valley. Retracing your steps, you'll have a different view ahead of you: the sweep of black sand at Whatipū and the Tasman Sea.

It's important to bring warm clothes, even on a hot day, plus all the snacks and water you might need; there are no shops at Whatipū, but a lot of good picnic spots along the track. At least two of the hilltops the track crosses were once pā sites, fortified villages where Māori lived, the 360-degree views offering protection as well as beauty.

Ōmanawanui takes about three hours to and back, and can be tackled at any time of year, depending on the weather forecast. (Avoid very windy or rainy days.) And if the going gets tough, think of the word, *manawanui*, embedded within its name: it means perseverance, dedication, resolution.

Take the scenic route

On your way to and from Ōmanawanui, you'll pass through the historic settlements of Huia and Little Huia. Some of the original dwellings in this area have been preserved as baches, or holiday houses, which are bookable through the Auckland Council website. These offer the classic New Zealand bach experience – a modest house in an exceptionally beautiful setting, possibly with its original lurid wallpaper intact. Most of the baches need to be booked well in advance, especially over the summer months, but those with fireplaces would make a cosy stay over winter. aucklandcouncil.govt.nz







A Malaysian in... Singapore

Singapore-based multi-hyphenate Pak Yang, who runs F&B pop-up concept Club Sando, shares his favourite places to dine and enjoy heady beats in the Lion City

My mother is from Sarawak

and my father is from Hong Kong, so I spent my early childhood years between the two cities. I have many nostalgic memories of eating at pasar malam (night markets) in Malaysia. My family and I moved to Singapore when I was eight, as my father wanted me to study there.

After completing National Service in 2009, I carved a career in the music industry and moved to Hong Kong for a job in music distribution. During a chance encounter, I met Chef Nurdin Topham at my favourite jazz bar, sense99. When he learned I was growing disillusioned with the music industry, he invited me to work in his two-star Michelin restaurant Yardbird as a junior chef in 2012. I rose to the rank of sous chef around the twoyear mark.

I also worked in other roles in the Hong Kong F&B industry – my last stint was operations manager with the Meraki Group in 2021. In 2022, I returned to Singapore to work at a private members' club. Initially, I was a development chef for the club's Japanese restaurant.

Over time, I realised I could combine my experiences and create a concept that centres around food and music. This led me to start Club Sando (@club_sando) in February 2023, a pop-up concept that hosts music nights and serves up unique spins on comfort food. We've organised 15 editions since our launch. Our signatures dishes include the katsu chicken sando, accompanied with a side of curry to dip in (similar to how you can dip sandwiches into beef jus) and salad youtiao (deep-fried dough fritters stuffed with prawn paste and topped with salad dressing).

Since returning to Singapore a year ago, I found myself thinking, there's so much to do and eat here! Deciding on my favourite places in Singapore is always difficult, but here they are.





The best place for a night out

The Riverwalk, Boat Quay (20 Upper Circular Road, #B1, #01/06)

There's an izakaya on Boat Quay called **IKIGAI**, which was a nightclub in past iterations. Some may have known it as the club Canvas, or as Home or Mad Monks. The beauty

Malaysia Airlines flies between Kuala Lumpur and Singapore 63x weekly and between Kuching and Singapore 7x weekly. of this place is that, despite numerous revivals, it has never changed hands.

The owners pivoted to an izakaya concept during the pandemic but decided to bring the club back six months after the izakaya took off, in the form of Iki by Ikigai – club nights that run on Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays. The music is always a sure bet.

Where I'd take someone visiting Singapore

Park Place Residences at PLQ (2 Paya Lebar Rd, #01-01/02/03)

Rempapa in Paya Lebar serves dishes that represent the four main ethnic groups in Singapore as well as Peranakan flavours. I personally like the Nyonya fish dishes, ayam buah keluak (traditional Peranakan dish consisting of chicken, tamarind gravy and buah keluak nuts), and platters of assorted kuih.

Simplicity is best

Dunman Food Centre (271 Onan Rd)

One of my favourite hawker stalls is **Fu Xing Steamed Fish** at Dunman Food Centre. While there are three steamed fish stalls here, Fu Xing – located on the second floor next to a store selling *kway chap* (noodles served with offal and gravy) – is my personal favourite. Here, the cooking reminds me of those I grew up eating in Hong Kong. You can get it prepared with black bean sauce, Hokkien-style,

but my favourite is either the grouper or pomfret, steamed simply with soy sauce, scallion and ginger.

The trendiest 'hood

Dempsey Hill (canchita.sg, comodempsey. sg, doverstreetmarket.com, claudinerestaurant.com)

For great food and unique shopping experiences, I always recommend visitors to pop by Dempsey Hill. A must-visit is Peruvian restaurant Canchita, which serves delicious patacones (plantain crackers with guacamole), octopus a la brasa (grilled octopus with beans and avocado), as well as classic ceviche dishes. I also highly recommend Candlenut. This one-star Michelin restaurant serves authentic Peranakan cuisine with a modern touch.

For really cool fashion streetwear, there's **Dover Street Market**. And if you're looking for a nightcap, head to the French restaurant, **Claudine**.

For comfort food

Little India (5 -7 Upper Dickson Rd)

There's a plethora of food at **Little India** — especially vegetarian and tandoor dishes. For comfort fare, I head to the Indian vegetarian restaurant **Komala's**, where the food is simple but executed well. Here, the flavours are clean, and the food is made with love.

I especially love the rice with dhal curry, though other must-tries are the *masala poori* (a type of Indian snack), *dosai* (thin pancake made with a fermented batter), and the vegetarian briyani. They even serve *teh tarik* (pulled milk tea) out of the classic tin cups here.

What to try

Run by cyclists Ashish and Nidhi Thadani, come for a post-ride coffee and a delicious bite of naanza – Tandoor-baked Indian pizza.

Meat and greet

Manila's most innovative restaurants are playing with new (and old) ingredients BY MIKE AQUINO

Alegria Manila: Wagyu Carpaccio

Try Alegria Manila's tasting menu and you'll find yourself taking an exhilarating carretela (horse-drawn carriage) ride between Latino and Asian influences with chef Charles Montañez expertly setting the course.

The result is not a derivative Asian-this or Latin-that. "We're not even going to try doing traditional Latin food because you can't get the same ingredients," he explains. "We're taking the soul of the dishes and presenting them using our cooking, to fit the Filipino palate."

Consider chef Montañez's wagyu carpaccio in a risotto made from Chinese pearl barley: a fanciful creation inspired by the Filipino arrozcaldo con goto (rice porridge with tripe). *G/F Uptown* Parade, BGC, Taguig City; grupoalegria.online/ alegria-manila







"For the plating and presentation, it's as simple as can be: starch, sauce and chicken," Chef Rap explains. For starch, this dish uses adlai, a wild rice alternative with a slightly nutty flavour that pairs well with the pamapa-infused sauce. Adlai has long been a staple for the Philippines' native communities.

Rabbit Room: Chicken Pendatun

On Makati's Sampaloc Street, spot the abstract rabbit pointing to a driveway and the door that opens up into the restaurant.

Rabbit Room's industrialmeets-Art Deco space is like a convivial venue to try the menu by chefs Rap Cristobal and John David Ty. "I advocate using local ingredients and produce as much as I can," chef Rap explains. "We stay true to our roots and try to keep everything simple."

The sense of play is apparent in the chefs' surprising sources of inspiration – Mindanao's Tausug and Maranao cuisines are rare finds in Manila restaurants. The chicken Pendatun dish is a case in point. 8858 Sampaloc St, San Antonio Village, Makati; fb.com/rabbitroomph

The chicken Pendatun is chef Rap's own take on a Tausug dish from Mindanao. "I named the dish after Datu Shariff Pendatun III, the person who taught me the dish," he explains. Following the Tausug way, the chicken is stewed in a flavourful sauce, then grilled before plating.

Like with any good piyanggang, chef Rap's chicken uses pamapa itum, a dark spice paste coloured by a charred coconut meat powder called siyunug lahing. Chef Rap's chicken Pendatun incorporates turmeric, a tradition borrowed from the Maranao community of Mindanao.



Kangar, the state capital of Perlis, sits just

33km south of Thailand (entry via Padang Besar Check Point) and 50km from Alor Setar, the capital city of Kedah. Depending on who you talk to, the origin of the town's name changes. "It was named after a tree, where 16th century sea traders took a respite from deal-making under its massive boughs." "Not true! It was named after a unique type of hawk, found only in this part of the country." And so on.

But the one consistent theme in all the stories are their ties to nature. Located on the northernmost point of Malaysia, Perlis is a frequently overlooked outdoor holiday refuge, which is a shame as this is where you'll be able to spot rare wildlife like the Robinson's banded langur and the endangered Sunda slow loris, which live in the humid jungles of Perlis State Park. Within the 5,000-hectare park, you'll find majestic limestone caves and rock formations forged in the late Triassic era, approximately 200-250 million years ago.

The irony of planning a 24-hour itinerary in Kangar – where much of its traditional Malay village charm and pace is retained amidst modernisation – is that it's too easy to forget time. The best mode of transport is by motorbike, for an easy hop on, hop off experience when checking out places in Kangar.

Breakfast, and make it like the sixties

Kickstart your adventure with a step back in time at **Ngulang Kopitiam**, where '60s-era antiques – home and kitchen tools – line the wall shelves.

Unlike most kopitiams, which have a Chinese influence, Ngulang serves classic Malay cuisine. Go ahead and sample dishes specific to the region, like *roti gulai ikan kembong* (toast with mackerel curry) and pulut hitam ikan masin atau sardin goreng (black sticky rice with salted fish or fried sardine). 410, Jalan Jejawi

Alternatively, visit **Ida Pulut Ayam Titi Chai** to experience a unique northern Malay breakfast – *pulut ayam* – fried chicken marinated in local spices and fragrant sticky rice topped with crispy shallots and Thai chilli sauce. *Titi Chai*

Get the lay of the land

Wang Kelian is a small village that rests at the border of Thailand, 45 minutes from Kangar. It's right outside Perlis State Park, making it the perfect entry point to discover the area's rich biodiversity. To start, visit the Wang Kelian View Point that sits 304 metres above sea level. A tarred road leads up to a rainbow-coloured platform, where you'll be treated to a majestic bird's eye view of Bukit Chabang and Timah Tasoh dam. Wang Kelian View Point, Kaki Bukit



Embrace the fresh air and the song of cicadas at **Taman Negeri Perlis**, located less than 10 minutes away from the Wang Kelian View Point. The park caters to outdoor enthusiasts of different levels.

Join the challenging six-hour trek to Gunung Perlis where, according to state park manager Muhammad Fandi, "You'll find unique plants and animals such as the endangered *pokok Bogak* (cycas clivicola) or *beruk kentoi* (stumped-tail macaque)."

For budding spelunkers, he recommends the four-hour caving adventure at Wang Burma, a limestone cave within the park that's filled with exotic fungi and endurance-challenging passageways. "Visitors love caving in Wang Burma to see the stalactites and stalagmites that were formed 500 years ago," Muhammad Fandi adds.

However, if you're conserving your energy for the rest of the day, take a leisurely stroll along the **Denai Putera Denmark** trail, which takes only an hour to complete. Unlike the other adventures at Perlis State Park, no guide or permit is required for this short trek. Jabatan Perhutanan Negeri Perlis, Km 2 Jalan Kaki Bukit

② 2pm Catfish galore

A restaurant loved by all walks of life – from locals to Malaysian royalty and TikTok influencers – **Anjung Keli** serves daily fresh-cooked, Malay *kampung*-style mixed rice. Here, you'll find a wide variety of over 50 dishes, including fresh *ulam* (traditional Malay salad), a variety of coconut-based curries, free-range fried chicken, soups and sambals. Anjung Keli's signature dish is the fried or grilled catfish and is an absolute must-try. *Medan Sri Pulai, Jalan Behor Pulai*



4pm Sip your coffee slow


From oat milk lattes and frappes to slow drips and pour overs, Ahli Kopi Kangar will supply all the caffeine needs of a big city coffee-holic. The café is set within an unassuming shoplot with minimal outdoor seating along Jalan Penjara, so if you're lucky, grab a seat, your choice of brew and enjoy a relaxing afternoon reprieve. Café culture is growing in Kangar - down the street from Ahli. D'Yunk Coffee and Café serves a mix of Western and local meals, in addition to a strong cuppa; meanwhile, Sorok Kafe went viral on TikTok as the first in Perlis to introduce charcoal latte to locals. ⊕6pm Get lost in the rainbow village

About a 20-minute drive from Kangar is Kuala Perlis, a rustic seaside town, parts of which underwent a village transformation programme. Explore Kampung Seberang Ramai, one of the weather-worn villages that received a sprucing up. Here, you'll be greeted by a community of traditional homes painted in rainbow colours. The streets, too, are decorated with wind-chimes and suspended umbrellas, and visitors can enjoy spotting street art murals painted on certain houses around the village - but do be mindful of the residents' privacy as these are family homes. For a nice photo op, keep an eye out for the sign that leads to the Tuanku Syed Putra Bridge to enjoy a lovely view of the Perlis River. Kampung Seberang Ramai

7-10pmDinner and a strollby the estuary

After you're done exploring the colourful villages of Kuala Perlis, it's time to grab a bite for dinner. Sandwiched between the Bukit Kubu Forest and an estuary of the Perlis River is the famed Api Api Ikan Bakar Restaurant. Its menu is unique to Perlis -Ikan bakar bawal or pomfret fish, is grilled and laced with a moreish gravy made with turmeric, condensed milk and coconut milk, among other spices, giving you that rich, slightly sweet flavour. What else to order? Sotong goreng tepung (fried squid) and the ulam set (mixed greens accompanied by sambal belacan and a small bowl of curry) are perennial crowd pleasers. Jalan Dato Ali, Bukit Tok Po

Full from dinner? Walk it off by joining the locals at the **Kuala Perlis Pier** and enjoy the salty breeze as you people-watch. Just two minutes away, you'll find the resplendent floating mosque, **Masjid Al-Hussain**.




① 7am-2pm Shopping in a rubber plantation

Before you leave Kangar, be sure to stop by the loud and lively Nat Pokok Getah. It's regarded by locals as being the most iconic open-air market in Perlis due to its location within a rubber plantation in Kampung Kubang, 20 minutes from Kangar. (Nat is an old Malay word that loosely translates to day market). From local homemade snacks like *tapai* (sweet, fermented rice) and traditional herbs like serai gunung (mountain lemongrass) and mengkudu (noni), all the way to used electronics and preloved clothing, one can spend hours sifting through the goods at Nat Pokok Getah. Before leaving town, tuck into your snacks at the dining area located right in front of the market - you'll be elbow-toelbow with friendly locals, but that's just part of the charm of experiencing life in Perlis. ...take your tastebuds on a journey to Barangaroo







Located on the north-western edge of the the city's central business district, Barangaroo is known for its green spaces and stunning views of the harbour. It's also where you'll find a food scene that encapsulates the essence of Sydney – diverse, colourful, multicultural, evolving and oh so fine.

For fine dining with a view, head to Oncore by Clare Smyth. Perched on the 26th level of Crown Sydney, it's the only international restaurant by the celebrated Northern Irish chef, with menu items that pay homage both to her childhood in Ireland and to present-day Sydney. Another shining star at Crown Sydney is Nobu. Here, it's about exquisite Japanese food with a Peruvian twist. Be sure to try the black cod miso.

For more delectable seafood, pop over to family-friendly waterfront restaurant love.fish for its great selection of mostly Australian-sourced seafood cooked using modern Australian techniques. For something a bit more luxe, try Cirrus, which offers dishes like a whole lobster in scallop XO sauce and Murray cod served with confit tomato, kelp and dashi.







Moonrise Lookout Trail

If you've surfed, swam and SUP-ed along the expanse of Bondi Beach, played beach volleyball and hiked parts of the Bondi to Coogee Coastal walk...

...head to the Western Sydney Parklands

Spread across a whopping 5,280 hectares, Western Sydney Parklands is the largest urban parklands in the world – 15 times larger than New York's Central Park! Although the parklands are located some distance from the Sydney centre, it's well worth the one-hour drive. 



very day, chef Beh Gaik Lean meticulously chops the 78 herbs that bring to life her famous *nasi ulam*, a traditional Peranakan rice salad. She spends

hours grinding the chilli and spices for her notoriously fiery brinjal sambal and preparing coconut milk from scratch for her chicken rendang. Auntie Gaik Lean, as she is affectionately called, knows that the most important ingredient in Peranakan food is hard work. "The harder I work, the better my food becomes," she says with her trademark grit and personality. "It's that simple."

At 69, Beh's hard work and commitment to her food is paying off. After decades spent working as a cook in a factory kitchen, she opened her namesake restaurant in the Penang capital of George Town with her son, Adrian, in 2013. Last year they won a coveted Michelin Star, one of only four awarded to restaurants in Malaysia, propelling her, and Peranakan cooking, to culinary stardom.

Peranakans refer to a community of native borns who are of mixed local and foreign ancestry. They are descended from the first waves of settlers to maritime Southeast Asia from as early as the 15th century.

Beh is fourth generation Peranakan. She is also known as Nyonya, a term used to describe married females of Chinese descent whose cooking spans both their ancestral home and their inherited one. Her signature dishes include her homestyle Nyonya fried rice, her perfectly balanced ayam kapitan (a creamy Peranakan chicken curry) and, her personal favourite, brinjal sambal, eggplant smothered in a layer of smoky hot sambal.

"My mum taught me how to cook when I was 12 years old, and I have spent my whole life perfecting those childhood dishes," she shares, her demeanour softening at memories of her youth. "You must be passionate about your heritage to cook this food because it is so laborious. But, if you have that passion, you will never grow tired of it."

Hoping to pass the torch, Beh is teaching her culinary secrets to her daughter-in-law, Jayna, while her son Adrian manages the front-of-house. Though, she is adamant that she has no plans to retire.

"Retire? No. I don't see myself retiring. I am still learning. I am still improving. A chef never retires," she says. "But I hope that the new generation will have the heart and the soul and the passion that I have, because that's what it will take to keep these traditions, this food, alive."



KEEPING THE FOOD ALIVE IS

exactly what Jawi-Peranakan Chef Nurilkarim Razha is doing. Like Beh, Nurilkarim learned to cook in the family home. He studied culinary arts at restaurants in Bangkok and Kuala Lumpur before returning to George Town in 2013 to run Jawi House, a restaurant and cultural centre, with his mum.

He recalls with fondness the busyness of his childhood home in Penang where, during parties and celebrations, plates heaped with fragrant Jawi bamieh, a Middle Eastern lamb and okra stew, were served to a steady stream of friends, family and visitors.

"In many ways, it was just like this," he says, gesturing to a handful of diners lingering over laksas and biryanis.

Nurilkarim, 33, is fifth generation Jawi Peranakan. His great-great grandparents, on his mother's side, were from Lahore, Pakistan. Typically, Peranakan refers to those descended from Chinese settlers, while Jawi Peranakan identifies those descended from the Muslim diaspora of India and Pakistan.

Inside Jawi House, one sunshineyellow wall is decorated with old black and white photographs. Once a gallery of family pictures, the wall now includes members of the wider Jawi Peranakan community in Penang.



"There is a strong collective ownership of Jawi Peranakan history and culture in Penang, and that encompasses the food too. When we started out, we had lots of makcikmakcik (an affectionate term for Aunties) come in and say, 'My grandmother did it that way' and we took those things on board because we want to make the food as authentic as possible."

Nurilkarim, who considers himself a custodian of Jawi Peranakan cooking, says the character of the food comes from the unique marriage of ingredients.

"The foundation is Arabian and Northern Indian, so we use things like rose water and almond paste, but it is heavily influenced by Southeast Asia so incorporates local ingredients like coconut milk, lemongrass and candlenut, or buah keras in Malay."

Nurilkarim admits it can be tough to change the menu his customers love, which is why, next door, he is opening a sister venue called Kemboja this summer, named for the frangipani trees outside. The concept for his new venture is modern Peranakan.

"The idea is to serve flavours of Malaysia, including Jawi Peranakan, but in a more modern way. For example, we might serve snapper smoked with coconut shells, sliced in a Japanese style or maybe a pesto made with *ulam* local herbs," he says. "We're excited to have a space to try new things."

Side dishes

While Peranakan, specifically Nyonya food, often steals the limelight in Malaysia, other fusion foods have their own charm

Kristang

The Kristangs descended from early Portuguese settlers in Melaka, which was colonised by the Portuguese for 130 years. Specialties include Devil's Curry, which is packed full of mustard and chilli paste.

Macanese

The Macanese originated in Macau and are descended from Portuguese settlers but their culture spans Canton, Melaka and Africa. Specialties include Portuguese chicken and Macanese chilli shrimp.

Chetti

Descended from the Hindu diaspora who settled in Malaysia from India, Chetti Peranakan specialties include fragrant tamarind fish curries and sambal telur belimbing, a dish of pickled sour fruit.





ALSO STRIVING FOR

innovation is 35-year-old Zachary Choong, executive chef at Kebaya Dining Room. Born and raised in Penang, Choong studied culinary arts in Switzerland, the Caribbean and the United States before returning to the Penang capital in 2012, where he met heritage conservationist and hotelier Christopher Ong, who was looking for someone to helm Kebaya Dining Room at Seven Terraces Hotel.

"With Unesco and now Michelin, the world is starting to notice Penang, but the food has always been amazing here. As a chef, it's a great place to be,' Choong says of his decision to resettle in his hometown.

Under the direction of Ong, Choong's journey to master Peranakan cooking has been guided by an elderly mentor nicknamed Auntie Baby. Ong, who went to school with Aunty Baby's daughter, grew up with her cooking. With her incredible knowledge of Peranakan cooking, having her mentor Kebaya's chefs was a no-brainer. "Aunty Baby is in her nineties, but she is still very energetic and loves to cook. She's like a walking encyclopedia," Choong adds with fondness.

Using his mentor's ancient recipes and techniques as a foundation, Choong's menu is progressive, experimental and every bit as opulent as Kebaya Dining Room itself, which boasts stunning chandeliers and thick red velvet curtains.

"Peranakan food is a lot of stew, which is delicious, but I feel it could be cooked a little less to preserve the quality of the ingredients," explains the ambitious young chef. "By incorporating some French techniques, we're refining it, making it lighter and not so heavy"

Choong's buah keluak beef reinvents traditional Peranakan flavours, namely the poisonous seed of the Pangium edule tree, which is typically served with chicken in a tamarind gravy. His version features a jam served with a confit of beef, celery ribbons and fresh herbs.

His croque monsieur appetiser uses beef rendang, a powerhouse of slow-cooked Peranakan flavour, paired with French blue cheese. He uses belacan, a fermented shrimp paste, essential to Peranakan cooking and manufactured in Malaysia for more than 200 years, to enliven his fried chicken batter.

Choong says updating Peranakan traditions is all part of the journey. "If you ask the older generation, they believe Peranakan cuisine is a fixed entity made up of specific ingredients. But, for me, Peranakan cooking is an intangible heritage. It is based geographically but the elements of it have always been fluid and it should continue to evolve in the same way that other cuisines, like those found in Europe, have evolved," he says.

"Even though I'm not Peranakan, I am Malaysian and Peranakan food is part of our culture. By modernising it and keeping it relevant and interesting, we are preserving it in a sense," he adds. "And that's something I'm proud of."

ON-TIME PERFORMANCE Our check-in counters close 60 minutes before departure. Please allow at least 45 minutes for immigration and security clearance. Boarding gates will close 30 minutes prior to departure.

CABIN LUGGAGE HANDLING Passenger and crew safety on board our flights are our highest priority. In compliance with the airline's policy and in observing Occupational Safety and Health Regulations requirements, cabin crew are no longer required to stow passengers' hand luggage in the overhead stowage compartments. This is to minimise occupational hazards and ergonomic risks faced by cabin crew in the aircraft. Cabin crew on duty will, however, assist passengers travelling with infants, young passengers travelling alone, the elderly and passengers with reduced mobility. Passengers who are fit and in good health must carry, stow and secure their hand luggage on board. Hand luggage exceeding the 7kg weight limit must be checked in before boarding.

PORTABLE ELECTRONIC **DEVICES (PEDs)**

For safety reasons, in line with Civil Aviation Authority of Malaysia guidelines, mobile phones and small PEDs can be used throughout your journey in "Flight Mode". Large devices with screen size above 12 inches are not allowed to be used during takeoff and landing. Whilst cruising. all devices can be used in "Flight Mode". Devices transmitting cellular and signals to satellites must remain switched off throughout the flight, until disembarkation. The Captain may prohibit the use of devices if there is any interference with the aircraft's system.

LITHIUM BATTERIES X Lithium metal or lithium ion cells or batteries for portable electronic devices (PEDs), including medical devices, must not exceed 2g for lithium metal batteries and 100Wh for lithium ion batteries. All spare batteries, including lithium metal or lithium ion cells or batteries, for PEDs must be carried in passengers' carry-on baggage only. These batteries must be individually protected to prevent short circuits. PEDs containing non-spillable batteries, they must be 12V or less or 100Wh or less. Passengers are allowed to carry a maximum of two spare batteries onboard. These batteries must be individually protected to prevent short circuits.



NO-SMOKING & VAPING POLICY

Smoking, including the use of electronic cigarettes, is prohibited on all flights. Electronic cigarettes must be carried in carry-on baggage only. Recharging of the device inflight is not permitted.

Every July 30th, we celebrate World Day Against Trafficking in Persons to raise awareness of the plight of human trafficking victims as well as promote and protect their rights.

Human trafficking is a global issue. It refers to all actions of recruiting, conveying, transferring, acquiring, maintaining, harbouring, providing or receiving a person for the purpose of exploitation.

Traffickers often use violence or fraudulent employment agencies that offer fake promises of education and job opportunities. Their victims can be anybody – including our friends and families, or any immigrant seeking better opportunities in their lives.

Malaysians are not exempted from human trafficking activities. Last year, it was reported that one of the latest target groups of job scammers in neighbouring countries include Malaysians.

This is why the Government of Malaysia has reiterated its commitment to eradicate this heinous crime. In 2022, it amended the ATIPSOM – Anti-Trafficking in Persons and Anti-Smuggling of Migrants – Act with the aim of strengthening its legal framework and enforcement, and adopting a more victim-centred approach for trafficked victims.
