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



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

during World War II. As a building that has borne witness to hundreds of war strategies and state secrets, it's no wonder it was an inspiration for Ian Fleming, the creator of James Bond. The building served as a setting for Bond films Octopussy (1983), A View to a Kill (1985) and Skyfall (2012).

After a six-year renovation, the Grade-II Edwardian Baroque building has been reborn as the first Raffles Hotel and Residences, which opened to much fanfare in late September. It's been called "the opening of the century", among other superlatives; not surprising as the Hinduja Group had spared no

expense in refurbishment – £1.2 billion to be exact - in transforming it into a world-class lifestyle destination.

Made from 26,000 tonnes of choice Portland stone and once home to 1,000 rooms linked by two-and-a-half miles of corridors, the OWO is imposing to say the least. Its characteristic grandeur was beautifully preserved by the late designer Thierry Despont, who managed not only to marry old and new but give it a fresh lustre befitting this legendary building. The passion poured into its (re) creation is palpable in each of the 120 rooms and suites, 85 luxury residences, and the rest of the storied spaces.



Given its scale, there's ample space for everything – from ballrooms the size of supervachts to a subterranean 20m swimming pool and London's first Guerlain Spa. And in a bid to shift the reputation of Whitehall from government to glam, it also unveiled nine new restaurants and three bars, including three concepts by acclaimed chef, Mauro Colagreco. This includes Colagreco's eponymous fine-dining restaurant and an all-day outlet in the building's light-filled former library. When you visit, make your way to the OWO's Grand Courtyard to get a full view of "Poppies", a bespoke installation crafted by glass experts Lasvit. Depicting the poppy flower in motion, the abstract sculpture is a symbol of tribute to those who fought for freedom and honours the building's rich past. theowo.london



The Zetter Clerkenwell 49-50 St John's Square

The 13-bedroom Georgian townhouse prides itself in offering a quintessentially British stay: tea in the parlour, suites with plush sitting areas and views of historic St John's Square, one of London's oldest squares. Collectibles from around the world decorate the many nooks and crannies, along with bespoke wall murals and quirky taxidermy. Location is one of this property's best features – you're within walking distance of The British Museum and the Tate Modern. thezetter.com



The Adria 88 Queen's Gate, South Kensington

The exterior of this Victorian townhouse in leafy South Kensington doesn't scream hotel; instead, it projects all the promise of a fabulous but homey mansion, butler included. Kick back in one of 24 lavishly appointed guest rooms – four-poster beds, marble bathrooms and Nespresso machines – as you mull over what you can do nearby: shopping at Harrods, a spin around the Natural History Museum, or a show at the Royal Albert Hall. Henry's Townhouse 24 Upper Berkeley Street

Named after Jane Austen's brother, Henry, who once resided at the property, this six-room boutique accommodation has only recently been opened to hotel-style room bookings (it functioned as an exclusive buyout previously). Among the charming antiques and interesting artworks that create the hotel's unique ambience are prized first editions of Jane Austen novels. The theme for 2023 is "Surrealism" so expect plenty of whimsical drinks.




Tapestry

Founders Farah Mauludynna, Dimas Putra Pratama and Steven Adidarma launched the dining collective in 2022, and since then Joongla has quickly garnered attention and praise for its accessible approach to "fun" dining. The name Joongla is a riff on the Spanish word *la jungla*, which captures the essence of a forest teeming with life. With a mission to document and introduce Indonesia's lesser-known ingredients and regional cuisines – and shine a light on hidden gems in the large, lush forest of Indonesian cuisine – Joongla's first pop-up dining experiment opened last year at Cihapit Market, a modern wet market known for its vibrant street food stalls, hip eateries and, most recently, a bakery and coffee spots. The meal featured a Sumatra-focused five-course tasting menu, served in a four-by-two-metre stall with

Joongla's first season lasted three months and featured mod takes on dishes from Aceh, Palembang, Riau and West Sumatra. Its second season was all about Javanese cuisine - an exploration of culinary techniques and ingredients from Pandeglang in Banten to Banyuwangi in East Java – while showcasing Indonesia's upand-coming chefs. "We want Joongla to become a platform for nurturing new talents and creating impactful collaborations across professions," says Mauludynna, a brand strategist and whole foods advocate.

After the success of its third Lombok-focused season, Joongla is now open in a new location and accepting reservations for its fourth season, which will run from 3 November until the end of January 2024. With a meticulous 192 hours of research and development in Lombok, the team is proud to welcome you to savour the flavours of Nusa Tenggara Barat. Expect a culinary journey across Lombok and Sumbawa through an ingredient-driven, eightcourse tasting menu that begins with a tangy salad of sliced fruit as palate opener; an appetiser of crispy tapioca-starch chips with two dips - fried cabbage and blue cheese puree as well as a salty chutney; mains of scallop and grilled eggplant, as well as beef cheek skewer, and more.

There is no signage to mark the presence of Joongla in Pasteur, Bandung. Hidden in a hotel, the eight-seater progressive dining destination is open every Friday, Saturday and Sunday with two seatings. Bookings can be made through the website. joongla.id

Here comes the sun

It's not the first place that springs to mind when you think of Australia's beaches, but **Melbourne**, when it sizzles, has plenty of sandy gems to explore by VICTORIA KHROUNDINA



Half Moon Bay, Black Rock ② 32 mins

In the eastern beachside suburb of Black Rock where glass-and-concrete design-forward homes line Beach Road - this pretty bay is a favourite among the locals. Forgo the main stretch in favour of a hidden cove heading towards Red Bluff Lookout. If you get here early enough, you might be treated to total serenity that feels as though you've been transported somewhere far away from the city. End the day with a burger at the charming Cerberus Kiosk.

Rye Front Beach

① 1 hr 10 mins

Mornington Peninsula has many impressive beaches, but the town of Rye - with its gin-clear waters and gentle waves - is especially suited to families. If you're looking to spend a day sunbathing, the expansive stretches of soft sand are perfect. Kick off your shoes, relax and take in the salty sea breeze as it intermingles with the aroma of fresh fish and chips frying in nearby cafés. Take your dinner to the beach for a sunset view as the sun casts an ethereal glow on the water and pier.

Fingal Beach, Cape Schanck 1 hr 20 mins

This beach is a must for adventurous types. Start at the Fingal Picnic Area, which has BBQ and toilet facilities, located on Cape Schanck Road. Then, hike down more than 400 steps to get your heart rate up and be rewarded with views of the rugged coastline, richly vegetated hills and a lighthouse dating from 1859. The beach is not patrolled so swimming is not recommended but a walk along the white sand is the magical main attraction.

Bells Beach

① 1 hr 25 mins

An easy drive from Melbourne, Bells Beach rivals its wilder and more remote counterparts. Sweeping cliffs provide a dramatic backdrop to 300m of pristine sand and its swells attract surfers all year round. Catch professional surfers rip it up at the Rip Curl Pro event around Easter. Meanwhile, remnants of shell midden provide a glimpse into indigenous food preparation, as this was once an important meeting ground of the Wadawurrung people.

Fabric reborn

With the help of a Ho Chi Minh-based brand, an exquisite, allbut-extinct Vietnamese silk fabric enjoys a revival by Joshua zukas

Dubbed "the queen of silk",

lanh my a is sought after for its inky aesthetic, achieved after a weeks-long dyeing process using the fruit of *mac* nua (diospyros mollis) trees. It's said to have dandified Vietnamese elites from the early 20th century.

The fabric caught the attention of the international design community in the 1950s, and it soon became a lucrative export. Unfortunately for the craft and the artisanal community that produced it – synthetic materials crowded it out in the 1970s, forcing ateliers to close shop.

Fast forward to the 1990s, French designer Rose Morant, who used to live part-time in Vietnam and is an advocate of Vietnamese craftmanship, got wind of the outmoded silk. As an artist, Morant works with a variety of materials, from lacquer and gold leaf, to metal, wood, fabric and flower powder. She travelled to Tan

Chau in the Mekong Delta – west of Ho Chi Minh City and the ancestral home of lanh my a - in search of artisans that could still produce it.

There, Morant found that much like lacquer, lanh my a is labour intensive and time-consuming. It involves a meticulous process of layering colour to create a beguiling mirror-like sheen. Still, she was able to convince the local artisanal community to restart the ateliers. Soon, boutique designers across the world were putting in orders for the fabric, which took on the name lacquer silk.

These days, Vietnam's premium silk is produced in Bao Loc in the Central Highlands (north of Ho Chi Minh City) where

intensive dyeing process and become lanh my a. This exquisite material has started to attract and inspire local fashion houses.

One such company is Metiseko (metiseko.com), a sustainable clothing brand established in 2011. Metiseko's flagship shop, a bright boutique with lacquered furniture and tropical foliage, is at 101 Dong Khoi Street, near the Ho Chi Minh City Opera House.

Late last year, Metiseko launched its Verticale Hanoi collection, an homage to Vietnam's capital that incorporates lanh my a into the designs. Notable pieces include the lacquer pelican, a blazer dress with invisible snap buttons, and the lacquer fantail, a loose-fit, widecollared blazer.

"It is a challenge to defend Vietnamese craftsmanship on a high-end level," says Audrey Charles, Metiseko's creative director. Perhaps with the continued elevation of traditional crafts like lanh my a, that is set to change. Metiseko already has plans to release a capsule collection that blends their original print designs with lanh my a.



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
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A brighter picture

Sa Sa Art Projects For cutting-edge art

Since then, Sa Sa has been instrumental in nurturing a new generation of risk-taking contemporary Cambodian artists. Hem Chan Sopheak, Pteah Chas' 30-year-old founder, organises multimedia group exhibitions that showcase young local talents in media like photography, painting and digital printing. Meta House Best art for the activist

Founded as a German-Cambodian cultural center in 2007, the team at Meta House has spent the last 16 years working to support "the reemergence of Cambodia's art and film scene after almost 30 years of unrest," savs founder Nicolaus Mesterharm, Poetry festivals, documentary showings, workshops and cross-cultural discussions are all part of Meta House's mission. Says Mesterham, "Contemporary artists are starting to focus on optimism and change – while always remembering the past and all those who were lost." 

A Malaysian in... Bali

Ewe Jin Low, renowned architect behind the award-winning Green School and advocate for sustainable bamboo-based designs, shares his tips for seeing Bali beyond the usual BY CRAIG SAUERS



I was a conventional architect

until I accepted a job in Bali. It changed the trajectory of my life and pushed me to simplify the way I live. My wife and I stayed in a little place just outside Ubud and we went around the island on our motorbike. It was like being in our teens again. Then I started working with bamboo. I had worked in England, Australia and Kuala Lumpur, and I was in the twilight of my career when I saw this job with Ibuku, a sustainable architecture firm in Bali. I ended up working with the firm as lead architect for five years and was involved in 50 bamboo buildings, including the Green School and Green Village. The whole experience changed me. I love working with bamboo – it's a sustainable resource we should be using


more of. It has a positive impact on the environment and the possibilities of bamboo architecture are endless. Now we have an amazing opportunity to bring bamboo into the mainstream. I'm trying to do that across Asia, from Malaysia to the Philippines, with my firm, Tenten Design, and Better Bamboo Buildings. Although my home base is Melbourne these days, I always make time for Bali. Here are some of my top picks.

Ride for inspiration

I love driving around or riding my bicycle. Rather than going to places designed for Instagram, seek out the less trodden areas. Hop on a motorbike and ride from Keramas beach towards the interior and to places like Ubud. Or you can ride along the eastern coast all the way to the city of Singaraja in the north, maybe get lost along the way. That's how you find the real Bali. Keramas beach, Gianyar

Indulge in the good stuff


Dapur Usada in Ubud is my current favourite. They serve













Ayurvedic-inspired vegetarian food and every dish is a perfect harmony of flavours. Then there's **Alchemy**, one of Ubud's leading vegetarian restaurants. I love the unique veggie options, from pizzas and pastas to protein bowls. *alchemybali.com*

Recharge and refuel

Monsieur Spoon is a wonderful French-style café for coffee, croissants, tarts and light meals. They have several outlets across the island but there's one near the Monkey Forest in Ubud that I used to frequent. It gets quite crowded with café-goers but if you go in early, you might be able to enjoy a quiet cuppa. monsieurspoon.com

Reconnect with nature

I love going to the village of **Kusamba**, where I rent a *jukung* (a traditional Balinese outrigger) and set off toward **Nusa Penida**, off Bali's southeast coast. Once I'm in the middle of the sea, I'll drop a line 300m down and wait for the fish to bite. It's not just about fishing, though – it's about just being out in the open sea and watching the sun rise over **Mount Agung**.

See sustainability in action

To see what humans can do with bamboo, visit **Green Village** and the **Green School**. With Green Village, Ibuku made these spectacular, milliondollar homes out of the humble bamboo. The Green School, on the other hand, offers a different perspective on education. Students don't wear uniforms, there's no fixed syllabus and kids learn how to plant rice, play

native sports – they have mud wrestling as a subject – and practise yoga.

Make sure to visit **Begawan** too. They're a private estate retreat that also offers training programmes in the areas of education, health and the environment. Some initiatives include reviving ancient rice variants by buying up rice fields and training farmers, so these varieties don't disappear. *greenvillagebali.com*; *greenschool.org*; *begawan.life*

Witness the community spirit

Every month, there's at least one ceremony that the whole community participates in. There's one called *tumpek* landep, which happens every six months, where spiritual leaders bless your iron objects. It used to be your knives, for example, but nowadays they can bless your car, your laptop, your motorbike. The Balinese are very friendly and if you're walking past, they'll often invite you in. It's an amazing example of what community means on the island.

Go further

Hideout is a lovely chain of boutique properties set in the rice fields. These jungle huts are made of bamboo so they're sustainable. This is an adult-only property, making it perfect for a romantic weekend. They're so popular that you must book up to six months in advance.

I also love **Bandido** in Uluwatu, which is built with bamboo, recycled wood and local stone. I worked on these with my friend, Javier Díaz, who's also an architect. Surrounded by lush tropical gardens, this nature-inspired property puts you at the doorstep of Bali's best waves. *hideoutbali.com*; bandidobali.com

The **Sibu Central Market** is easily the city's socioeconomic heart. It's a lively hub that locals and tourists frequent for fresh produce, seafood, traditional handicrafts and local snacks that highlight the flavours of Sarawak. *Jalan Channel*

Dig into a hearty brunch

Sibu is most famous for its delicious fusion of Foochow Chinese, Malay and Iban cuisines. Must-eats include the *kampua mee* (a type of local dish known for its flavourful broth and al dente noodles), red wine chicken and *kompia* (a bread snack made of flour, minced meat, onions and salt).

Foochow Chinese dishes are mainly of the non-halal variety. Locals love **Soon Hock Café and Restaurant** especially for their kampua mee, while those looking for pork-free or halal alternatives like to visit YS Cafe. Visit a famous landmark

Head to Eng Ann Teng Tua Pek Kong Temple, a Sibu landmark that was built around the 1800s with materials glazed tiles, stone dragon and phoenix statues – shipped from China. The term *tua pek kong* translates to "grand uncle" and represents prosperity. Many Chinese communities, especially in Southeast Asia, have temples such as this one in Sibu dedicated to tua pek kong, where devotees offer prayers and seek blessings for health and good fortune. Within the temple grounds is the Goddess of Mercy Pagoda, a sevenstorey tower that was constructed in the 1980s as part of a revitalisation project for the temple. Overlooking the tranquil sea, it's become a symbol of peace for locals. Jalan Temple



It was a beautiful crisp autumn evening in the South Korean capital, and as I walked towards Wonhyo Bridge, one of 27 bridges that traverse the river, I noticed a small crowd. It was a serendipitous moment straight out of a K-drama: I had come to the South Korean capital on a group tour designed around K-drama locations and there I was, on the fringe of a film set, soaking up an unplanned item on the itinerary and watching an actress drive into a parking spot over and over again. Finally, after what seemed like a dozen takes, the director yelled "Cut!", and the actress changed out of her heels and into a pair of decidedly less glamorous slippers, and everyone dispersed into the night. Everyone, including my group - 17 of us, mostly Americans plus a woman from Malaysia and another from Canada - that had travelled from far away, all for the love

Tours of K-drama shooting locations aren't new; such excursions feel more like part of the myriad of things you can do in Korea. But this eight-day tour, organised by Noona's Noonchi, an internet community that promotes the use of K-drama to explore issues of mental health, felt more like what we'd say in Korean, a mo-im, a meeting of kindred spirits.


What exactly brought us here? While the group initially seemed disparate with some travelling solo and others as a group - we soon learned many of us were at a transition point in our lives. Tracey Lewis was a typical participant, a newly retired school principal who'd stumbled on K-dramas during the pandemic and found that many of the themes of conflict, uncertainty and then growth resonated with her new situation. She would watch K-dramas late into the night, baffling her family, who often found her on the couch in tears or laughing uproariously. But no one shared her new obsession. On this tour, she hoped to connect with others who shared her passion.

Jo-Lene Mahon from Malaysia certainly did. She had recently lost her husband to cancer. "It's been a tough few years to say the least, and K-dramas helped me through the darkest of moments," she told us. "When I felt like I couldn't cope, I'd watch shows like Hometown Cha-Cha-Cha to give myself hope, My Liberation Notes to remind me that just five minutes of happiness a day is achievable, or just lose myself in beautiful dramas like Hospital Playlist."

For many of us, K-dramas provided a relaxing break from hectic, demanding lives; for others, the themes of family, conflict, communication, and repressed trauma gave them a framework to inspect their own lives. There is a Korean saying, people don't die from crying but from an inability to cry. Many participants said they found themselves in cathartic heaps of tears watching K-dramas.

Then there were the enthusiasts who came with actual spreadsheets of titles they'd watched and those they anticipated. They came with encyclopedic knowledge of which actors starred in which shows and when. It was a level of fandom - of K-dramas, and by extension, Korean culture - I'd never seen before.











Plot twist

There are many K-drama-themed tours, but Noona's Noonchi (nunchi is a Korean term for, loosely, being able to use nonverbal cues to size up a room), has a unique twist: operated by Jeanie Chang, a Korean-American family therapist, the eight-day tours visit filming sites in Seoul and elsewhere, but the schedule includes time for the participants to discuss various K-drama scenes portraying depression, trauma, generational conflict and many similar topics. *noonasnoonchi.com*

AS A KOREAN-AMERICAN, THE TOUR HAD AN EXTRA PERSONAL

pull. My parents were both born in what would eventually become North Korea but were separated from their families after World War II. Eventually they left South Korea for America, and I grew up in a household that did everything it could to assimilate into mainstream American culture. That meant scrubbing the past clean. As a child I was forbidden from learning Korean – they were worried I would acquire an accent or be confused.

Many years later, around the late 1990s, K-dramas began gaining international attention. They were known then as *yeong sok guk*, or serial dramas. I was living in Korea in 1998 as a US Fulbright fellow and had started watching to brush up on my Korean, but soon became addicted to the characters and storylines that often had unexpected, moving twists. K-dramas, intentionally or not, became a backdoor way for me to learn about the culture my parents left behind.

Because K-drama shows are highly specific, including the jokes and tropes—such as the tenderness with which adult children tuck in their ageing parents—it never occurred to me that any of my non-Korean friends would want to watch these with me, even with subtitles.

As such, it's been astonishing to see my homeland take the world stage as a cultural giant. K-beauty products are all over TikTok, and Hollywood stars like Emma Stone say they are obsessed with K-pop boyband sensation, BTS. Even the Oxford English Dictionary, arguably the most authoritative arbiter of the English language, added 26 transliterated Korean words in its most recent (2021) update.

But perhaps nothing has exported Korean culture to the world more than K-dramas (this transliterated word is one of the OED additions), multipart TV series of any genre – horror, thriller, comedy, romance – whose format allows unhurried plot lines: rags to riches, lovers never quite meeting, time travel plots, police procedurals. The launch of the 2021 TV series $Squid\ Game$ on Netflix was watched by an astonishing 111 million people in its first 28 days – pushing the period drama Bridgerton off the number one most-watched spot – quickly followed by $Extraordinary\ Attorney\ Woo$, which also broke viewing records and is currently a nominee for a Global Emmy.

AS AN ORGANISING PRINCIPLE FOR TRAVEL, K-DRAMA IS

all encompassing. Everything that's appeared onscreen is fair game. Our first meal together, for example, was delicious *samgyetang*, which appeared in *Descendants of the Sun*, among the most popular shows in the past decade. Samgyetang is a delicacy that Koreans believe balances the body. Ours was served traditionally in a bubbling earthenware crock, a tiny, whole chicken stuffed with glutinous rice, garlic and a red jujube. Most importantly, it had a whole ginseng root, which, even after being boiled for hours, retained its

earthy bitterness that contrasted perfectly with the delicate herby broth, slightly sweet from the jujube. The meal came with some bracing radish kimchi and was finished with *sujung-gwa*, a delightful punch made of dried persimmon, jujubes and cinnamon—sweet, soothing and reportedly good for digestion.

It happened to be Hangul Day, marking when Joseon-era King Sejong invented a phonetic alphabet in 1443 to extend literacy beyond the province of the elites who could read Chinese characters. So before the meal we trooped to the imposing King Sejong statue right in Gwanghwamun Square, a public square with a wide promenade.

We also explored Cheonggyecheon stream, the nearby famous natural waterway that was covered in concrete during the post-Korean War development. It was then uncovered in 2005 as part of a green urban renewal project and has become a favourite place for strolling among locals and tourists. It's also a popular site of K-drama shoots.







Throughout the tour, we followed our affable Korean tour guide as she led us around landmarks such as the futuristic needle-shaped N Seoul Tower on Namsan (South Mountain). It's one of the most recognisable edifices in the city and its second highest point. At its observation deck, we enjoyed a stunning 360-degree view of Seoul. We could see everything from the presidential palace (the Blue House) and the numerous mountains within the city limits. Not surprisingly, this unique location appears in dozens of K-dramas as a meeting spot. Even the restrooms are outfitted with clear glass so you wouldn't miss a minute of the view.

Our tour of the capital also took us to Yonsei University in the busy college neighbourhood of Sinchon, another favourite spot on the tour. Established by American Presbyterian missionaries, the ivy-covered stone buildings in the distinctive main campus stand in as various universities in K-dramas, so of course there were people angling to pose for photos. Later, we traipsed through ancient shrines cosplaying in Joseon-era *hanbok*, the traditional Korean dress, and explored traditional markets. I marvelled at the sheer number of tourists from around the world, many of them gobbling up street food that once made non-Korean friends gag. Jeanie, a.k.a. Noona's Nunchi, mentioned she used to stealthily throw out Korean goodies like kimbap and bulgogi that sometimes appeared in her lunch box. Even at the airport lounge on my way back home, I'd filled up on as much Korean food as I could but then also stood back in awe watching all the non-Koreans similarly dig into spicy tuna kimchi. When did Korea become super cool?

My parents, who had been displaced by wars and fled for survival, would have found the country unrecognisable. I, too, worried that, having lived elsewhere most of my life, I would come off as a fumbling overseas Korean with rusty language skills. But, being tucked into this tour group that had been brought together by a common love for K-dramas took the pressure off. I could just be myself: a K-drama fan and a tourist in a country that has transformed itself.





Young, gifted and in vogue

One reinvents traditional wear by marrying centuries-old skills with cross-cultural designs, the other specialises in a modern aesthetic that is gaining an international fanbase. Meet homegrown fashion labels that are putting Malaysian talents on the map

A

t the heart of Kuala Lumpur's shopping district in Bukit Bintang early this year, models paraded in

billowing rainbow-coloured baju Melayu (traditional male outfit) to mark the launch of fashion label Behati's 2023 Raya collection. The striking looks – with shades of marigold and magenta, emerald green and indigo—was completed with dark sunglasses and vinyl terompah slides, a modern take on traditional wooden Peranakan slippers.

Behati reinvents traditional wear – Chinese, Malay, Indian and indigenous – for new audiences. Founded in 2018 by designer Kel Wen, its signature piece is an oversized baju Melayu, a dramatic and excessive scaling up of the traditional Malay shirt, which dates to the 15th century. Wen had originally designed it to wear to a friend's Raya open house, where it turned heads all evening. His clothing line grew from there.

"In traditional wear, often the only options are in colour or pattern, but I wanted something more modern, something to make a statement," recalls the 27-year-old creative director, who is originally from Muar, a historical town in the state of Johor. "It was controversial – the first oversized collection went viral on social media. People said I was destroying tradition and I was accused of cultural appropriation. But it's still one of our bestsellers every year."

Since then, Wen has continued to divide opinion with corseted and ripped denim cheongsam, the traditional Chinese samfu updated as a bomber jacket and track pants, a cropped kebaya, a shirt sari and even a military print batik.

While his creations may appear to be a dramatic departure from the original inspiration, Wen argues that tradition remains at the core of every piece. "Often people don't know what makes traditional wear traditional. They just know that it doesn't look the same, so they decide they don't like it. But the tradition is always there in my designs," he says. "For example, in Malay traditional wear there is a certain way of constructing pieces like baju Melayu called *kekek* and *pesak*. We use these methods, regardless of whether it is oversized or not, because that is the traditional way."

Kekek and *pesak* refer to the two pieces of fabric sewn under the sleeves to join the

front and back panels of certain traditional garments and increase comfort under the arms.

"Another example would be our batik, which is traditionally made using wax, dye and metal plates," Wen continues. "Batik is the method, not the pattern. You can choose flowers, or you can choose a military design. Just because it doesn't look a certain way, doesn't mean it isn't honouring tradition."

Wen, who is of Malay-Chinese heritage, believes his openness to creating in a cross-cultural way resonates with many younger Malaysians. "Growing up in a modern multi-racial country, you have a lot of cultural influences, and it has always been important that Behati reflects that.

ANOTHER HOMEGROWN LABEL

that is a rising star on Malaysia's fashion scene is KL-based motoguo. Wildly experimental and totally unique, the brand was founded in 2015 by visionary trio Moto Guo, Kinder Eng and Perry Jay Ang. The label is known for its androgynous styling and surreal aesthetic. Recently, motoguo's heart-covered, high waisted Paula Tsui skirt was worn by Lily Collins on Netflix's *Emily in Paris*. Their Mirage Knit top also appeared in HBO's *Euphoria*. It's exposure like this, says Guo, that is garnering the label valuable international attention.

"We don't seek out to disrupt but rather invite everyone to view clothing in a less restrictive manner," Guo says. "Right from the start, the idea behind the brand has been to spark emotion and create a space for like-minded people to connect," he adds, sharing how many found it initially hard to believe that such avant-garde designs were coming from Malaysians. "It certainly felt like we were living in our own niche. As the mainstream gradually caught on to maximalism and fashion designed to fit both men and women, people are now more receptive towards our designs," Guo adds.

Before the pandemic, motoguo's sales was gradually growing, with many fashion travellers and tourists from Asia and the States dropping by its pop-up in Isetan Lot 10. "[Since then], we have moved most of our retail operations online and we are seeing significant brand awareness, thanks to social media and celebrity TV-show appearances," Guo says.

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
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alking down Charoen Krung Road means walking past the sights, sounds and smells that encapsulate the essence of Bangkok: time-

worn shophouses, the ceaseless putter of tuk-tuks, the aroma of piping-hot noodle soups. Built in 1862 - on the request of Western consuls who needed somewhere to ride their horses - the thoroughfare was the capital's first modern paved road, passing through Chinatown and running parallel to the Chao Phraya River.

A century later, the centre of commerce and culture moved eastward into the more spacious Sukhumvit and Sathorn. What remained in the Old Town were modest family businesses and their sturdy shophouses dating back to King Rama V's reign, alongside the multi-cultural landmarks ranging from the first bank (Siam Commercial Bank) to first embassy (Embassy of Portugal). From the city's buzzy main street, Charoen Krung became a sleepy stretch of faded buildings.

But since 2017, Charoen Krung has been expanding beyond historical enticements. When the Thailand Creative and Design

Center (TCDC), a design library and co-working space, relocated into the Grand Postal Building on Charoen Krung six years ago, young entrepreneurs and artists followed - a creative exodus driven by cheaper rent and a more peaceful locale, akin to what you'd see anywhere in the world, from Brooklyn in New York to Fitzroy in Melbourne.

Soon the Charoen Krung area - Bang Rak, Khlong San and the neighbourhoods around the Chao Phraya -came to be known as the Creative District, home of annual events like Bangkok Design Week and Awakening Bangkok, a light installation and digital art festival.

Today, travellers seek out Charoen Krung for its third-generation street food eateries, its riverside grand dames such as the storied Mandarin Oriental and the Shangri-La, as well as shinier chic hotels like the Capella. More daring dining concepts and polished eateries are also setting up shop here - modern glitz gently creeping into these old-time quarters - making Charoen Krung the perfect place to taste Bangkok's fascinating duality: a glossy capital made more intriguing by all the grunge. Here's how to make the most of your visit.

TEA AND ANTIQUES

Start with an afternoon stroll past the brutalist Grand Postal Building, antique shophouses and gemstone shophouses, and into Araksa Tea Room, an elegant oasis with earth-toned furniture and sharp bamboo weave accents. Araksa opened in July and brings Chiang Mai's finest brews to the capital. Skip the usual orange Thai tea for their award-winning version, which infuses English breakfast tea with aromatic vanilla and caramel. The tea-based desserts are also a must-try; go for the Thai tea panna cotta with fresh mango for that East-meets-West flavour.

If you prefer a riverside view, head towards Chinatown and into the Talad Noi neighbourhood, to the antique café **Hong Sieng Kong**. After snaking past narrow alleys, rows of junkyards and auto-part shops, spot the Chinese temple Chow Sue Kong Shrine and a bright indigo blue entrance to confirm that you've arrived at what might be the most majestic restoration spectacle in the area.

In 2021, a compound of six dilapidated buildings – former rice mills and houses over 150 years old and deserted for at least 40 – were revived into a bare-bricked coffee shop with trees sprouting from its walls. Not only is this the best riverside spot to view a pink-hued sunset, it's also home to an eclectic array of large-scaled antiques such as Teochew carved wooden doors and colonial-era spiral staircases from Myanmar. After taking in the resplendent surroundings, quench your thirst with their zesty Talad Noi Orange Coffee, a refreshing Americano topped with kumquat juice and soda.

DINNER IS THE NEW THEATRE

This street is peppered with Michelin stars, but it's the refined and fearlessly inventive menus served in an elegant shophouse setting that'll feed your senses. For dinner, commit to some of the shiniest showcases of creativity and top-notch ingredients cooked with exceptional finesse.

From Talad Noi, walk into the backstreets of Soi Charoen Krung 28 to **Jua**, where a slick, fusion izakaya decked with humongous photographs of kabuki has risen from the remnants of a gambling den. "I let ingredients shine rather than pile 120 seasonings on top," explains chef and co-owner Chet Adkins. "We do good food, good drinks, good art and good music...you can stop by casually in your shorts." The food includes tasteful skewers and inventive small plates that are

a mishmash of French techniques, a love of Japanese food and Adkins' previous years in Hawaii. Their popular grilled jumbo prawn with durian butter features the chef's happy discovery of Malaysia's tempoyak (a Malay condiment made with fermented durian), while raw picks like Creamy Poke dress juicy bursts of tobiko and diced tuna in a delicious Sriracha sauce.

Among the more recent additions to the neighbourhood is Small Dinner Club, which opened last year, across the street and a dozen doors down from Jua. The fine-dining experience deconstructs and reinterprets Thai ingredients over a 10- to 12-course tasting menu. In this upscale black box, the reservations-only, 11-seater counter is a stage where food isn't limited to the usual savoury or sweet palate. Here, pink guava is grilled like steak ("medium rare, burntnot burnt"). "We create new perspectives on food and have a different way of doing things to simple, local ingredients that people may overlook," says chef and owner Sareen Rojanametin. "It's fun and fascinating to turn ingredients I've seen since I was a kid into something amazing that surprises even the locals."













Best quick bites

Pressed for time? Here are some of the best street food in Charoen Krung

Jok Prince

Bowls of congee served with meatballs, offal, egg yolk and century egg. Add crunch with fried noodles or patongko (fried dough sticks) toppings. Across the street from Robinson Mall, before the corner Café Amazon

Prachak

Whether topped on rice or thin, delicate egg noodles, their roasted duck, Chinese sausages and shrimp wanton consistently impress. A family-run operation since 1909. Across the street from Robinson Mall, 55m from Jok Prince

Khun Pu Curry Puff


Their golden puffs are fried fresh with new oil every day. The chicken curry filling is a must, but coconut and pineapple bring a sugary kick to your munchies. Soi Charoen Krung 22, a narrow alley best reached by foot

Tumrub Thai

Their kanom krok tiny, half-sphere rice flour and coconut milk pancakes stands out for the crunchy bottom, side crust and a puddinglike centre. **Dragon** Roundabout in Talad Noi, next to Siam Commercial Bank








Since Small Dinner Club opened in 2022, its block of two-storey shophouses has turned into one of the best nooks for a casual-yet-cool night out. Pop by next door if you'd like to hear live jazz in shoulder-to-shoulder intimacy at <code>Bangkok Mojo</code>; shop for some vinyl and groove to the DJ's spins at <code>Have You Heard? Records</code>; or swill organic wine at <code>Madi</code>. Exiting from SDC's back door will bring you to the courtyard connecting all these establishments, where creative types hang out amid leafy potted plants and warm fairy lights.

While it might be tempting to linger in the courtyard, one last nighttime marvel worth visiting is **Siwilai Sound Club**. It draws audiophiles with live performances and a vinyl listening room, but the building itself is something to see. The converted shophouse was originally the site of the first Central department store from the 1950s. Now it emits an inviting glow from within, hinting at satisfying musical entertainment.

Outside, the 'uncles' and 'aunties' hawk fruit in pushcarts and fry roti at roadside stalls as they've done for decades. And it's this charmingly stark contrast—of new and old, of grunge and gloss, of age-old local culture and new creativity—that gives this side of Bangkok its irresistible edge.

Apart from its successful ventures in palm oil, dairy farming and food production, SLDB has also diversified its businesses into other agricultural food-based products such as chillies, Bentong ginger, stingless bee honey, MD2 pineapple, pandan, coconut and peppers. This diversification enriches the community with new income opportunities and fosters a resilient agricultural landscape for sustainable growth.

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

ON-TIME PERFORMANCE Our check-in counters close 60 minutes before departure. Please allow at least 45 minutes for immigration and security clearance. Boarding gates will close 30 minutes prior to departure.

CABIN LUGGAGE HANDLING Passenger and crew safety on board our flights are our highest priority. In compliance with the airline's policy and in observing Occupational Safety and Health Regulations requirements, cabin crew are no longer required to stow passengers' hand luggage in the overhead stowage compartments. This is to minimise occupational hazards and ergonomic risks faced by cabin crew in the aircraft. Cabin crew on duty will, however, assist passengers travelling with infants, young passengers travelling alone, the elderly and passengers with reduced mobility. Passengers who are fit and in good health must carry, stow and secure their hand luggage on board. Hand luggage exceeding the 7kg weight limit must be checked in before boarding.

PORTABLE ELECTRONIC DEVICES (PEDs)

For safety reasons, in line with Civil Aviation Authority of Malaysia guidelines, mobile phones and small PEDs can be used throughout your journey in "Flight Mode". Large devices with screen size above 12 inches are not allowed to be used during takeoff and landing. Whilst cruising, all devices can be used in "Flight Mode". Devices transmitting cellular and signals to satellites must remain switched off throughout the flight, until disembarkation. The Captain may prohibit the use of devices if there is any interference with the aircraft's system.

LITHIUM BATTERIES

Lithium metal or lithium ion cells or batteries for portable electronic devices (PEDs), including medical devices, must not exceed 2g for lithium metal batteries and 100Wh for lithium ion batteries. All spare batteries, including lithium metal or lithium ion cells or batteries, for PEDs must be carried in passengers' carry-on baggage only. These batteries must be individually protected to prevent short circuits. PEDs containing non-spillable batteries, they must be 12V or less or 100Wh or less. Passengers are allowed to carry a maximum of two spare batteries onboard. These batteries must be individually protected to prevent short circuits.



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Smoking, including the use of electronic cigarettes, is prohibited on all flights. Electronic cigarettes must be carried in carry-on baggage only. Recharging of the device inflight is not permitted.






The Hits
