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

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MANDARIN ORIENTAL Kuala lumpur ith World Heritage Day celebrated on 18 April, it's only fitting that we visit two Unesco World Heritage sites in our pages this month. While each offers a unique glimpse into the history and culture of two distinct regions of the world, both serve as a vibrant reminder of why we should celebrate and preserve the world's cultural gems.

Our exploration begins in Ahmedabad (p40), the first city in India to be recognised as a Unesco World Heritage Site. 

Have a well-

structured plan

To boost endurance and speed, a good and progressive plan includes slowly increasing weekly distances and tapering off in the weeks before the run. Add in long runs, tempo runs, speed workouts and rest days.

2 Come up with a race strategy

"Pacing goals should be based on the frequency of your training and how fit you are," says the marathoner. And if possible, Edan adds, get to know the racecourse, because it may have sections that require a change of pace.

3 Get the right gear

Of course, running shoes that fit well are essential, but as Edan says, make sure they're worn in and not new. Weatherappropriate clothes are a must, along with anti-chafing cream, sunglasses, a GPS watch and a hat or visor.

4 Visualise your goal

"During your training, use effective visualisation to make your mind stronger," Edan says. "Picture yourself finishing the race, despite some problems, and keeping up a strong, steady pace."





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

HOTELS Calling all style fans

Singapore's hotel boom continues as another luxe property opens on the site of the former Singtel Telephone House by CLAIRE KNOX

Singapore is certainly no stranger to

stylish, sustainable and plush properties, but post-pandemic, luxury hotels seem to have been sprouting by the day in the Lion City. The last year in particular has seen a boom in spectacular and highly anticipated openings, from the Singapore EDITION to the greenswathed Pan Pacific Orchard to the trendy Mondrian Singapore Duxton, with a few of the newcomers boasting celebrated architectural credentials, stellar locations, celebrity chef-designed menus and outstanding facilities.

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Another new property pulling out all the stops is the railway-inspired Pullman Singapore Hill Street – the latest in the Accor Group's portfolio – located right in the heart of Singapore's historic, civic district and built on the heritage site of the former Hill Street Telephone House, once owned by telecom giant Singtel.

The Pullman brand originated as an up-market train service, its first ever coach entering service in 1874 and setting the standard for luxury train travel in America. Fittingly, nods to the brand's rail history are woven throughout Pullman Singapore Hill Street, from the original Pullman sleeping cabin stationed at the entrance (a clever storage facility for luggage), the installation of vintage suitcases decorating the lobby, through to the playful map of Singapore adorning the carpets throughout the property and its 350 rooms and suites - all designed as elegant, 19th-century private train cabins featuring brass and polished, dark wood accents.

It's not only trainspotters who will revel in this property – designed by the award-winning DP Architects – the hotel is a study in smart, sustainable design, with all rooms equipped with in-room sensors, water filter systems (no plastic here!) and Murphy beds that can transform lounge rooms into bedrooms. The property's largest pool is framed by two lush, vertiginous garden walls, and 66

there's a state-of-the-art fitness centre replete with standing punching bags and TRX suspension trainers.

Signature restaurant Madison's serves up a spin on classic, New York-style comfort fare, while next door is the new izakaya and speakeasy MOGA, where top-notch mixologists shake up some of the most sumptuous cocktails in the city – try the herby and fruity, gin-based *inochi no mizu* (water of life). The hotel's fun rooftop swim-up bar El Chido also offers a sweeping, jaw-dropping skyline vista that overlooks Singapore's iconic Marina Bay.

Best of all, it's a mere hop, skip and jump from major attractions such as the National Gallery, Raffles City, Fort Canning Park and Chinatown, an area of town teeming with some of the best eats. *pullmansingaporehillstreet.com*

Post-Songkran, indulge guilt-free in Mediterranean goodness in Phuket

When seaside luxury resort Trisara was mulling over a concept for their new all-day dining restaurant, the answer came easily: Mediterranean cuisine, widely credited as the reason behind the region's Blue Zone status, and trending as the world's healthiest. The result is Cielo, which opened late last year, where you can savour light and heart-healthy dishes fresh seafood (think grilled sardines with Provençal olive oil, lemon and parsley), fruits and vegetables, nuts and plant oils - with a postcard-perfect view of the Andaman Sea. Dining here is good for both the heart and the earth - the hotel group is committed to sourcing ingredients locally, so vegetables served at Cielo are mostly from homegrown, smallholder farms and from Trisara's very own working farm, Pru Jampa. trisara.com

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


In **Kyoto** and throughout Japan, a stay in a storied, luxury ryokan is a precious travel experience not to be missed **BY KISSA CASTAÑEDA**


A ryokan is not just a traditional

Japanese inn, it's the oldest form of hotel in the world. And among hotel lovers in the know, the 200-year-old Hiiragiya in Kyoto, is revered for the extremely welcoming *okami* (the landlady or proprietress), is a bucket-list classic: a shining example of a ryokan that writers, artists and dignitaries wax lyrical about. Hiiragaya is one of about 50,000 ryokans operating in Japan, a country widely acknowledged for setting standards in hospitality (there's a reason the new Michelin Keys, a guide to hotels, is launching here).

In the West, a ryokan is commonly thought of as an upscale bed and breakfast but it's much more than that. It's a portal to *omotenashi* – the Japanese word for hospitality that goes beyond usual service to offer intuitive warmth. Unlike a B&B, a ryokan is honour-bound to serve dinner, which is traditionally a *kaiseki* (a multi-course meal). "The food is a really important element because historically Japanese people used to travel by foot and they would stay in

ryokan as they travelled through, so most Japanese people didn't tend to stay for more than one night. Ryokan are places where you eat and then relax right after," says Naomi Mano, founder of Luxurique, a high-end travel agency and event management company.

Ryokans come in all stripes. There's Nishiyama Onsen Keiunkan, widely considered the first example of a hotel, which was founded in 705 CE and remains open to this day. And there are others from cosy, family-owned properties in small onsen towns to legendary inns etched in history like the almost 400-year-old Ichinoyu Honkan in Hakone, (which was depicted by famous artist Hiroshige) to modern renditions such as the Zaborin luxury ryokan in Niseko. What unites them is their passion for service and ability to be flexible based on their guests' needs. "It's different from the hospitality experience in a hotel in which you would go and ask for service by calling reception. In a ryokan, they anticipate what you want.

A good ryokan should be as accommodating and flexible as the clients want," stresses Mano.

While the price point is an obvious consideration, a luxury ryokan is characterised by an outstanding location and an impeccable approach to service, food and amenities; an onsen is also more often than not expected at these venues. According to Mano, top-notch ryokans usually have historical significance like Asaba in Shuzenji, on the Izu Peninsula, famous not only for its picturesque lake with a noh (classical Japanese dancedrama) theatre but for an ambience and environment you can't find anywhere else. Another beautiful luxury ryokan worth staying at is Gora Kadan in Hakone National Park, situated on the grounds of Kanin-no-miya, the former summer villa of the Imperial Family. Housed under the Relais & Châteaux brand, Gora Kadan is renowned for serving kaiseki cuisine by chef Makoto Kobayashi. And among the newer properties, The Shinmonzen, designed by Tadao Ando, stands out for its location in Gion, the elegant and atmospheric heart of Kyoto.

Manila's indie publishers are sharing stories differently and fuelling a reading boom BY PIERRA CALASANZ-LABRADOR

Print's not dead, and books

in particular are enjoying a boom in the Philippine capital. Thanks to large crowds at recent book fairs, enthusiastic #bookhaul posts – social media helping to break down literary gatekeeping - plus a distribution system greatly aided by online shopping platforms, there's a growing demand for locally published books among readers in the region. Here are three independent publishers feeding a growing public appetite for quality storytelling and local stories.

Good Intentions Publishing

Its artful covers opening up to award-winning writing, relative newcomer Good Intentions is upping the game with coveted titles and end-to-end publishing solutions. Launched in 2018 by writers Angelo "Sarge" Lacuesta and Ana Maria "Mookie" Katigbak-Lacuesta – a husbandand-wife team – Good Intentions aims to publish fresh narratives, as well as explore alternative techniques, channels and platforms in publishing.

How exactly? It begins with their HQ-slash-free library at Comuna Building, a new creative hub along Pasong Tamo Extension in Makati, Good Intentions Publishing's Assembling Alice by Mookie Katigbak-Lacuesta

where visitors can hang out and pick up tomes such as Luna: A Journal of New Filipino Writing, which features young and contemporary Filipino writers, and A Death Foretold: The Ninoy Aquino Assassination, a collection of essays about the assassinated hero that also recalls a pivotal moment in Philippine history. Aiming to empower authors, make publishing dreams come true and bring quality reads to a wider audience, Milflores keeps a rigorously curated and diverse catalogue of books that range from literary fiction and non-fiction to young adult and reference titles.

Current bestsellers include the National Book Award winner *Even Ducks Get Liver Cancer* by oncologist Wilfredo Liangco, a hilarious and sometimes heartbreaking account of life as an intern at the state-owned Philippine General Hospital.

stop whatever ails them from getting worse. I also build health programmes for the underprivileged through the Hong Kong Jockey Club's Neighbourhood Kitchen and host a podcast, also called *ActiveWay Health*. Being a mum of two kids, a six-yearold and two-year-old, also keeps me busy. But I'm quite adventurous, and I still find time to explore Hong Kong. Here are some of my top picks.

Let the kids run wild

It's an easy hike for kids and families, and you can reach the pier from Central Ferry Pier in about an hour by boat. *sunferry. com.hk*


Blow off some steam

I was born and raised in Kuching. There aren't any restaurants serving Kuchingstyle food in Hong Kong, but when I miss Malaysian food, I go to **Kedai Kopi Semua Semua**. They serve a very good *assam laksa*, thick rice noodles in an aromatic, tamarind-based broth topped with mackerel fish, sliced cucumber, pineapple and onions. They have a few branches now, but I only go to the one in Mong Kok. The interiors are quintessentially Malaysian and I really enjoy it. *618 Shanghai St, Mong Kok*

Have a pick-me-up

I'm not a coffee expert, but I do love **Chart**. It's in the Central Market, which was refurbished a few years ago, so now it's very hip and trendy. Some of their recent specials were inspired by the "Before" movies [Before Sunrise; Before Sunset; Before Midnight]. Gear up for my workouts

I usually stick with the crowd favourites for my intense workouts: Lululemon, Alo Yoga and Sweaty Betty, which is a brand we work with for our Qintensity events. Dining with the family


We eat very healthy at home; when we go out, it's to treat ourselves. The Rosewood is a great spot. It's big and airy, and the outdoor area by K11 Musea nearby is wonderful. 



① 7am Fort-ify your Dutch adventure

To kick off the day, work up an appetite by exploring the **A'Famosa**. This Portuguese fort was built between 1511 and 1512, which comes as no surprise that it's the oldest European fort in Southeast Asia. Most of the original structure was destroyed when the Dutch and British tried to seize power of the city. However, the remaining Porta de Santiago gateway and the Middelburg Bastion are historical landmarks that offer visitors a glimpse into Melaka's past.

From the top of St. Paul's Hill, make your way to the **Dutch Square**, a remnant of the Dutch colonial past between the 17th and 18th centuries. The red-painted buildings are known as stadthuys, which served as the former Dutch administrative building. In the centre of the square is Queen Victoria's Fountain which was built in 1901 to commemorate Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee. *Jln Parameswara; Banda Hilir*

∂ 9am Ballin' breakfast

Head over to **Hoe Kee Chicken Rice**, a three-minute walk away from the Dutch Square. This restaurant is a popular spot for a very iconic Melaka dish – chicken rice balls, a unique variation of the popular Hainanese chicken rice dish. The fragrant rice is moulded into mini golf balls as a convenient way to eat alongside the sliced chicken. Be sure to add the chilli sauce for an extra punch. *468, Jalan Hang Jebat*

① 10am Peranakan past

Pay a visit to the Baba & Nyonya Heritage Museum for a unique look into the lives of a Peranakan family. Peranakans emerged from the first waves of Southern Chinese settlers in Melaka through the mingling of Chinese heritage with Malay, Indian and other indigenous influences. Baba refers to a Peranakan male, whereas Nyonya refers to a Peranakan female. Once home to four generations of the Chan family, this three-terrace house opened its doors to the public in 1985. As you step into the museum, you are instantly transported into the late 19th-century and early 20th-century Malaya. The home of Baba Chan Cheng Siew is rich in Peranakan culture, blending European and Asian influences with furniture and architectural designs that reflect the essence of many pre-World War II Peranakan homes. 48-50, Jalan Tun Tan Cheng Lock

① 12pm Soup-erb eats

One of the main reasons people visit Melaka is to eat. **Jonker88** is a beloved spot best known for its Peranakan assam laksa. If you prefer a spicier and tangier laksa, opt for the Nyonya Assam Laksa. If you're a fan of creamier soups, the Baba Laksa is for you. Both come with prawns, a dollop of tuna and half of a hard-boiled egg paired perfectly with deep-fried bean curd skin, cucumbers and red onions. For dessert, the Baba cendol, an ice dessert with gula melaka, rice flour jelly and *santan* (creamy coconut milk) is the best way to end the meal.

Perhaps you're an advocate of breakfast for lunch, in which case you need to try the pancakes at **The Daily Fix Cafe**. You can't go wrong with their signature pandan pancakes served with a side of gula melaka. 88, Jalan Hang Jebat; 55, Jalan Hang Jebat

() 2–4pm Temples, tails or ATV trails?

The next stop is the oldest functioning temple in Malaysia, **Cheng Hoon Teng Temple**. The temple was built with the principles of feng shui in mind, ensuring the complex has a view of the river and high ground on either side.

Adventure seekers should go on a mid-day safari tour at the **A'Famosa Safari Wonderland**. Take a ride in a caged truck to get up close and personal with some wild animals, like orangutans and tigers.

Pet lovers can visit **The Huskitory**. This award-winning showroom of Siberian Huskies is RM45/pax per hour. Each ticket comes with a complimentary lemonade or blackcurrant drink.

Thrill seekers can go ATV riding at **Pantai Klebang**, a new attraction now available to the public. Klebang is known for its white dunes, so go early for the best photo opportunities. 25, Jalan Tokong; Jalan Kemus; 27, Jalan Taman Asean; Pantai Klebang

① 5pm Oasis in the city

Take a refreshing break with a coconut shake, Melaka's signature dessert drink. **Klebang Original Coconut Shake**, a roadside stall highly rated on Google reviews, is a good bet. Each drink comes with fresh coconut slices and juice blended with lots of ice. The coconut shake special includes a scoop of vanilla ice cream.


As the day winds down, check out **Sin Hiap Hin**, possibly the oldest social gathering establishment in Melaka that closes at 5.30pm. This family-owned place is currently tended by its fourth generation. Ask the friendly owner for recommendations on different types of local drinks. *Lot 130, Solok Kampung Bahagia; 5, Kampung Jawa*

⑦ 7pm Flavours galore

When in Melaka, it is an unspoken rule to have at least one Peranakan meal. **Nancy's Kitchen** is a popular spot, so do make reservations ahead of time. The fan favourites are the pie tee, *ayam buah keluak*, and *otak-otak*. If you're looking for something different, try **McQuek's Satay Celup**. Dip your choice of meat and vegetable skewers into a pot of satay sauce for a delicious time. For a Chinese Muslim option, visit **Satay Celup Abdullah Lim**. No 13, Jalan KL 3/8; 288, Jln Parameswara; Jalan Kenanga 3/8

Catch the sunset from the viewing gallery at the new **1-Altitude Melaka**, where at 195m above sea level, a panoramic view of Melaka city and the Strait of Malacca is bound to be impressive. The new multi-lifestyle destination, which opened last year, also has an array of new restaurants, including a rooftop fusion gastro eatery with a mouthwatering menu of small bites. *Level 43–45*, *ElementX Mall, Jalan Melaka Raya*



Monumental

Ahmedabac

In India's first World Heritage City, a weekend walking tour of venerable monuments and architectural gems offers a peek into its long and fascinating history

Words **Meenakshi J** Photography **Atik Bheda** You can tell a lot about a city by the way it keeps its old buildings, and here's what I found on a recent visit to Ahmedabad –



while the modern metropolis is moving at full throttle towards the future, it knows where its true charm lies: in all things old and storied. India's western state of Gujarat is home to a staggering 42 Unesco heritage sites, and the 600-year-old Ahmedabad – with its centuries-old mosques, Jain and Hindu temples with magnificent spires, ancient stepwells and palatial mansions – has the distinct honour of being the country's first Unesco heritage city, a title it was bestowed in 2017.

Old is what keeps visitors like me riveted. Eager to know more, I sign for up for a walking tour with Urvashi Panchal, a freelance guide specialising in heritage and textile tours. Urvashi's passion for Ahmedabad's cultural treasures and for preserving the city's built heritage runs deep. She and her husband Nirav, share over four decades of combined tour guiding experience and had worked closely with the Unesco committee on Ahmedabad's inscription as a heritage site.

Urvashi's walking tour begins in the morning, at the centuries-old Dabgarwad market. The row of shops, many of them selling musical instruments and kitchenware, leads to the 19th-century Swaminarayan Temple in Kalupur, the first-ever temple of the Swaminarayan Hindu sect.

We leave our footwear outside and step in to gawk at the intricately carved arches and pillars featuring striking sculptures of dancing women, religious icons and deities, all chiselled in Burmese teak. Although it's faintly abuzz with families paying respect, the atmosphere is hushed and filled with the sweet aroma of incense sticks and striking garlands of fresh marigolds. The sheer splendour of it all leaves me speechless, a sure sign the tour is off to a great start.

WITH A FAINT SCENT OF INCENSE ON MY CLOTHES,

we make our way to the old town. Ahmedabad as it's known today was founded by Ahmed Shah I in 1411, centuries before the current geographical concept of India was formed. Ahmed Shah built a wall – punctuated by 12 gates known as darwazas – around the city. Call it the founding era of Ahmedabad: as the Sultanate of Gujarat's capital, it was where the most influential power players of the time held court.

Today, the old-walled town is alive with the sounds of street markets and the aromas of everyday fare like fafda, a crispy snack made with chickpea flour, and *dhokla*, a spongy savoury fermented cake made of split yellow lentils.

Urvashi and I beeline for the beautifully maintained Jama Masjid, or Friday Mosque. Built in 1423, during Ahmed Shah's reign, the mosque is made of yellow sandstone and was the largest in the Indian subcontinent at the time. Six centuries later it has kept its sense of grandness and serenity. Its central courtyard houses an ablution tank for rituals and is flanked by a prayer hall of 260 columns and 15 domes, some of them featuring lotus-inspired carvings, subtle traces of Hindu and Jain architectural influences.


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Sarkhej Roza, the Sabarmati River in Makarba, is another 15th-century structure worth the walk. Dedicated to Ahmed Shah's spiritual mentor Shaikh Ganj Baksh Khattu, the complex has an expansive reservoir, mausoleums and pavilions. Both the Sarkhej Roza and the Sidi Saiyyed Mosque are fine examples of Indo-Saracenic architecture encouraged by the Sultanate.

Later, in the 18th century, traditional residential clusters called *pols* – from the Sanskrit word *pratoli*, meaning gate – were built during a period of heightened communal tensions and societal upheaval. There are 600 of these pols, designed as mini-fortresses, across six neighbourhoods within the walled city. They feature secret passages, narrow lanes and a shared, enclosed courtyard, ensuring security and privacy to its residents, typically people of similar caste, religion and occupation. The pols also feature havelis or palatial mansions, markets, temples, intricately-carved bird feeders known as chabutras, and community wells – hallmarks of self-sustaining gated communities.

"The Unesco heritage city tag has helped in attracting tourists to these residential communities like never before," Urvashi says. True enough, we walk through labyrinthine alleys connecting various pols, past sandstone Jain temples with exquisite carvings, past swarms of tourists gazing up at the havelis, taking photos and looking transfixed by the details: stone masonry structures adorned with intricate wooden facades, windows and doors. It's a sensory overload in the best way. Amidst all of these, Art Deco mansions evoke the city's more recent colonial heritage.

MORE RECENT BUILDINGS CHAMPIONED BY LOCAL

philanthropists and global visionaries add texture to the city's overall look and feel. There's the home of Mahatma Gandhi, the iconic leader of India's independence movement, at Sabarmati Ashram. Built in 1915 on the banks of its eponymous river, it was expanded over time with an interactive museum and library by Indian architect and urban planner Charles Correa.

Mr Correa is widely credited with defining the modern architectural style of post-independence India, and the museum features vernacular elements like wooden doors, stone floors, an open

courtyard, a library, spacious functional rooms and a rather enthusiastic use of brick.

In the hut-like structure that was Gandhi's actual ashram, I try my hand at the *charkha*, the spinning wheel that became a symbol of India's defiance of British rule. Spinning the charkha feels unexpectedly meditative, and I feel a profound sense of reverence for the thousands of freedom fighters who sacrificed their lives to liberate the country.

IF I HAD TO NAME A FAVOURITE ERA, IT WOULD be the one immediately following India's independence from British colonial rule in 1947. According to architectural historian Ishita Shah, a wave of enthusiasm for nation-building swept through the ranks of the city's prominent business clans, many of whom wholeheartedly invested in shaping Ahmedabad's architectural and cultural landscape.

One fine example is the Calico Museum of Textile, founded in 1949 by Gira Sarabhai and her brother Gautam (another sibling, Vikram, is the founder of India's space programme). Gira, an architect and designer as well as the museum's curator, fused functionality with aesthetics in its design, symbolising the city's dominance as the textile hub of India.

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Post-independence, the influential Sarabhai family, whose patriarch was a major industrialist, branched out into several fields, from real estate and pharmaceuticals, to textile manufacturing and the arts. Philanthropy was a family affair, and the museum stands out as Ahmedabad's first modernist architectural space.


Other prominent business clans also began engaging renowned architects to shape modern landscapes. The works of Swiss-French visionary Le Corbusier epitomised functionalism by using a modular grid system and climate-responsive architecture in layouts, as well as bold sculptural expressionism in projects like the Mill Owners' Association and Sanskar Kendra City Museum.

Meanwhile, the Estonian-born Louis Kahn, among the greatest American architects of the 20th century, collaborated on the sprawling Indian Institute of Management (IIM) campus at the invitation of architect Balakrishna Doshi. According to Ishita, Kahn – hired by Vikram Sarabhai and Kasturbhai Lalbhai, another industrialist and philanthropist – designed the campus buildings with expansive arches and circular openings, and other such architectural juxtapositions, intertwining aspects of decolonisation and Indian culture.

Today, the latest addition to the city's evolving architectural landscape is the 300m Atal pedestrian bridge that connects the eastern and western banks of the Sabarmati. The design is inspired by the city's love for kites.

I spend the evening on the beautiful Sabarmati riverfront, where an urban regeneration and environmental improvement project has been unfolding since 2012. Before the makeover, the river had been hampered by encroachments and silt that had accumulated over the years. The river had dried up, and the land was being used by circus companies and as a playground. Now its been rejuvenated, and its manicured riverbank lawns and entertainment facilities are already a popular hangout among locals.

ON THE LAST DAY OF MY TRIP, I drive three hours out of Ahmedabad and into Patan, to visit the 11th-century Rani-ki-Vav, a Unesco World Heritage Site. Commissioned by Queen Udayamati to honour her husband Bhimdev, the seven-storey Queen's Stepwell resembles an

[Post-independence], a wave of enthusiasm for nation-building swept through the ranks of Ahmedabad's prominent business clans, many of whom wholeheartedly invested in shaping the city's architectural and cultural landscape" inverted temple, beautifully embodying the Māru-Gurjara architectural elements of lavish sculptures and functional spaces built in sandstone.

It's one of Gujarat's oldest-built structures, and yet it remains one of its most visually arresting and photogenic. The cascading flight of stairs through multiple levels reveal intricately carved pillars and over 800 sculptures depicting natural elements, geometric patterns and deities of the Hindu pantheon. The fourth level, the deepest, leads to a majestic rectangular reservoir plunging to 23m.

Urvashi tells me that these stepwells in and around Ahmedabad show how these ancient cultures placed importance on water management – a community effort – and that they had the foresight to prepare for hot and dry seasons. They're a timely reminder, in this age of climate emergencies, of the architectural wisdom of the past, and how it might still serve us well to this day.

When it's finally time to leave the wonders of Ahmedabad, I learn something new about Urvashi: her daughter was born on 18 April, World Heritage Day. It feels oddly reassuring, and I imagine that she too might be a champion of such a rich culture in the future. ■



INTRODUCTION:

In the heart of Borneo's magnificient landscape, where Sabah's longest river (the Kinabatangan River) flows its snake-like path through the tranquility of rich biodiversity with stretches of palm oil tress, never-ending riverine forest, densely tangled green mangrove swamps and majestic limestone caves, lies a hidden gem. Kampung Batu Puteh helmed by KOPEL (Koperasi Pelancongan Mukim Batu Puteh Bhd). Kinabatangan is the epitome of sustainable ecotourism, cultural richness and a unique community.



Best Tourism Villages by UNWTO:

KOPEL being recognised by the United Nations World Tourism Organization (UNWTO) and granted one of the Best Tourism Villages in 2021. Kampung Batu Puteh fulfilled UNWTO's rigorous evaluation where the main objectives focus on rural development of the 3Ps - people, prosperity and planet.

Mr. Mohd Hasim Abdul Hamid one of the early pioneers of MESCOT emphasised that both local and international visitors who come to Kampung Batu Puteh will enjoy an Authentic KOPEL community-based ecotourism experience.

In the last decades, KOPEL and its small community have a combined a strong passion for their ecosystem, cultural heritage and collective interdependence to promote Kampung Batu Puteh. This co-operative movement has helped generate income and open job opportunities for the community, as well as provide exposure to sustainable forest management based on citizen science. KOPEL Bhd. Kinabatangan has been a catalyst for change - an example to other community-based ecotourism co-operatives specifically in the advancement of remote rural villages in Malaysia and around the world. KOPEL and its MESCOT Initiative have prosperously empowered the local Orang Sungai people of Lower Kinabatangan from a community that used to only rely on natural resources for survival to one that is more environmentally conscious while forging a more sustainable future for generations to come.



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

Killers of the Flower Moon

Mollie Burkhart, a native of the Osage Nation, struggles to save her community from greedfuelled murders by battling unspeakable betrayal.

Killers of the Flower Moon is a 2023 American epic western crime drama film co-written, produced, and directed by Martin Scorsese. The film stars Leonardo DiCaprio, Robert De Niro and Lily Gladstone.

Eric Roth and Scorsese based their screenplay on the 2017 non-fiction book by David Grann.

Set in 1920s Oklahoma, it focuses on a series of murders of Osage members and relations in the Osage Nation after oil was discovered on tribal land. The tribal members had retained mineral rights on their reservation, but a corrupt local political boss sought to steal the tribal members' wealth. Killers of the Flower Moon premiered at the 76th Cannes Film Festival on 20 May 2023. It was theatrically released in the United States on 20 October 2023 by Paramount Pictures and Apple Original Films.

It won Best Film at the National Board of Review and was named one of the top 10 films of 2023 by the American Film Institute. It was also nominated for 10 Academy Awards (including Best Picture), seven Golden Globe Awards (including Best Motion Picture – Drama, and with Gladstone winning Best Actress in a Motion Picture - Drama), and nine British Academy Film Awards (including Best Film).






Whimsical escape


Just outside Kulai, a half-hour drive from Johor Bahru,

lies Putuo Village, a scenic 17.4ha cultural village set within a bamboo forest.
