Protecting Malaysia's icons



For Malaysia Day, the **Malaysian Palm Oil Green Conservation Foundation** (MPOGCF) put the spotlight on "The Other Malaysians" – three iconic species that have become synonymous with the country, namely the orangutan, the Bornean elephant, and the animal that flanks the national coat of arms, the Malayan tiger.

The aim of "The Other Malaysians" is to create awareness of human-wildlife conflicts relating to these three magnificent creatures. "These three icons are the animals that you come into contact with the most at palm oil plantations," says Hairulazim Mahmud, general manager of MPOGCF. "Our aim is harmonious co-existence. We have solutions to achieve that, and we are doing this campaign to raise awareness."

MPOGCF works with and brings together the forestry and wildlife departments of Peninsular Malaysia, Sabah and Sarawak, universities, NGOs, palm oil industry stakeholders and more to support efforts to conserve endangered wildlife that live at the edges of plantations.

For the much-beloved orangutan, MPOGCF was instrumental in rehabilitating thousands of hectares of land in Lower Kawag, part of the Ulu Segama-Malua Forest Reserve in Lahad Datu. Hairulazim points to the recent "Orangutan Diplomacy" campaign as one of the foundation's biggest wins, with Malaysia's palm oil trading partner countries supporting the in-situ conservation of the majestic primates in their natural habitats.

MPOGCF also helped to upgrade the Borneo Elephant Sanctuary (BES), which encourages the use of wildlife corridors and other mitigation techniques to reduce human-elephant conflicts. "BES is very important to us because of the contact that these animals have with plantations," he says. "We share what we know about the behaviours and needs of Bornean elephants as well as techniques to co-exist with plantations and smallholders."

The foundation is also very committed to the conservation of Malayan tigers, which includes collaborating with the Department of Wildlife and National Parks Peninsular Malaysia (Perhilitan) to breed captive Malayan tigers at the National Wildlife Rescue Centre (NWRC) in Sungkai, before a three-year rewilding process for cubs at the National Tiger Conservation Centre (NTCC) in Lanchang.

"The Other Malaysians" calls on all Malaysians to support the conservation and preservation of the three iconic animals. How can members of the public help? "We always encourage the public to get involved in our campaigns and programmes," Hairulazim says. "They can register their interest with us, and if the opportunity presents itself, we can engage them as volunteers, or they can donate to the fund." **mpogcf.org**

Empowering women and artisans

Artisan workshops in Kampung Kauluan offer new opportunities for women while preserving Sabah's rich cultural legacy

Situated in Kundasang, just over two hours away by car from Kota Kinabalu, Kampung Kauluan is the latest tourism destination in Sabah, thanks to the picturesque Sosodikon Hill. At an elevation of 1,900m above sea level, the village enjoys a cooler climate, perfect for tourists seeking respite from the warm Kota Kinabalu weather. With Mount Kinabalu towering over the area, it offers plenty of Insta-worthy moments.

The rising popularity of Sosodikon Hill has provided the women of Kampung Kauluan opportunities for pursuing entrepreneurship, many becoming sundry shop owners, café operators and skilled makers. Traditionally homemakers, more and more women have embraced entrepreneurship in the past decade.

To empower the women in Kampung Kauluan, Koperasi Sosodikon Ranau Berhad (KOPSODIK) organises handicraft artisan workshops to teach the skills needed to make bamboo and woven handicrafts and traditional embroidered textiles. It appoints a master crafter to teach the art of making tikar (mats), sirung (conical woven hats), barait (traditional wooden backpack), storage containers and handbags. During the workshop, the master crafter guides participants through the necessary steps involved in craftmaking, from how to select the right raw material for the handicraft and how to process them, to applying the correct colouring and weaving technique to ensure the best quality craftsmanship.

Sabah's indigenous tribes are known for their creativity and love for vibrant colours. Thanks to the abundance of natural resources such as rattan, bamboo trees and pandan leaves that grow freely in Kundasang, villagers of Kampung Kauluan have plenty of raw materials to transform into functional everyday crafts.



There is also an increasing demand for traditional embroidered and woven fabrics such as the *lapoi misaayud* fabric, which is worn as the traditional attire of the Tinagas Dusun ethnic group of Ranau. While the making of this woven tapestry is complex and time-consuming, it has become a beautiful souvenir for visitors looking to adorn their walls with traditional art from Sabah.

It is gratifying to see how KOPSODIK's initiative in empowering women is effectively achieving the Desa Lestari Programme's objectives by creating jobs and strengthening human capital, benefitting the entire community. KOPSODIK also plans to offer tourists visiting Kampung Kauluan homestays that offer the unique opportunity to observe live craft-making demonstrations. Mr Sunilin Masinin. the chairman of KOPSODIK, believes that these workshops will not only equip Kampung Kauluan villagers with marketable crafting skills but also help preserve their ancestral heritage.

Happy trails

This month's cool, crisp air brings an invigorating spin to rides around **Hyderabad BY PUNITA MALHOTRA**

Hyderabad's pleasant weather,

bicycle-friendly traffic and passionate cycling community make it a paradise for two-wheeled adventurers. While the city welcomes riders all year round, November is especially magical, thanks to crisp morning temperatures of 12°C to 13°C. Whether you're in it for the peaceful lake views or heart-pumping mountain trails, Hyderabad offers an array of adrenaline-pumping routes.

Urban explorers can rent bikes or e-bikes from the Gachibowli or Necklace Road hubs for a scenic spin around the heart-shaped Hussain Sagar lake, or check out the crown jewel of the city's cycling scene, India's first 23km-long, dedicated solar cycling track. Launched in October last year, this Y-shaped marvel – with a 14km stretch on one side and a 9km path on the other – was inspired by the South Korean

Saddle up

If you're craving adventure, gear up for long-distance rides on high-end bikes to hidden gems like Narsapur Forest in the north or Moinabad in the south, where historic forts and heritage sites lie waiting. Other popular routes, such as Gachibowli-Shamshabad, Shamirpet, Keesara and Shankerpally, cater to cyclists of all skill levels.

But for the ultimate thrill, tackle the 80km ride to Ananthagiri Hills, ascending its winding roads through mist-covered forests. Looking for an even greater challenge? Strap your bike to a car and head to Srisailam, where rugged slopes and steep climbs lead to jaw-dropping views of the Nallamala Forest and Krishna River. It's a sight you'll never forget.

About 200km north of bustling Kuala Lumpur sits the quiet and charming town of Ipoh, capital city of the state of Perak. The town was known as the "City of Millionaires" during its tin mining days in the 19th century. But Ipoh's heydays aren't a mere relic of the past. It's a city of continuing innovation, perhaps best exemplified by its culinary claim to fame: white coffee. This velvety brew, a perfect balance of robustness and smoothness, has become a national treasure.

The city's other strong facet is its topography. Ipoh's landscape is a geological marvel, cradled by ancient limestone hills that have stood sentinel for 250 to 400 million years. An immersive natural experience awaits at the mystical cave temple Kek Look Tong and Banjaran Hotsprings Retreat with its 9ha estate.

To experience the best of Ipoh, consider visiting during the cooler months of November to February. Travel lightly and dress down in casual wear for maximum comfort. Then, blend in with the locals and adopt the city's laidback pace for a quick reset.

① 6am Embark on a hiking adventure

Start the day with an invigorating hike up Bukit Kledang. Situated on the outskirts of Ipoh, 10km from the city, the hill offers a network of trails catering to hikers of all levels. While the summit reaches an impressive 800m, it's the accessible viewpoint at 350m that steals the show. Take the 4-2 trail, a moderate 1.5-hour climb, and be rewarded with a breathtaking panoramic view of Ipoh's cityscape, a perfect juxtaposition of urban life against the lush Perak wilderness. The cave's natural cathedral-like chamber creates a breathtaking backdrop where religious devotion and geological wonder intertwine. Towering statues of deities stand in solidarity with ancient stalactites, their silent vigil illuminated by soft, warm lights dancing across the rocky surfaces. The cave's multiple levels, accessible via ramps and lifts, invite exploration of its depths. Mineral pools dot the landscape. Emerging from the other side of Kek Look Tong, visitors are greeted by a sprawling 5ha Zen garden. • 2pm Pick up finds at an upcycled bookstore

What was once Ipoh's busiest banks now safeguards a different kind of wealth. BookXcess Kong Heng greets visitors with a facade of normalcy. But descend the staircase into the basement, and you'll find yourself in a literary vault. Safety deposit boxes line the walls, silent sentinels of the building's past, while sturdy metal beams stand testament to its enduring strength. Traces of history linger in the faded watermarks on the walls, remnants of the 1980s flood that once submerged this underground sanctuary. Venture deeper, and you'll discover a room dedicated to Yasmin Ahmad, Malaysia's legendary filmmaker. This intimate archive showcases her cinematic legacy, captivating photography and poignant musings. For those seeking a tangible piece of this cultural treasure trove. limited edition merchandise awaits. 91 Jalan Sultan Yussof

^(b) 3pm Recharge with artisanal coffee

The star attraction at **Aud's Café** is their visually attractive ice cube coffee. Containers of milk and sugar accompany a glass of frozen espresso cubes, allowing you to customise your brew to taste. As the ice slowly melts, your cuppa transforms, growing bolder with each sip. For those feeling peckish, there are plenty of mouthwatering choices from their extensive menu, ranging from breakfast platters, sandwiches and pasta dishes to rice bowls, snacks for sharing and dessert to go with your ice cube espressos. 97 Jalan Sultan Yussof







() 4pm Relive the glory days of tin mines

A stone's throw from Concubine Lane lies **Han Chin Pet Soo**, the Hakka Tin Mining Museum. This historic edifice once housed an exclusive social club – founded in 1893 by the esteemed Towkay Leong Fee – open only to members and distinguished guests. Today, the two-story building safeguards over 1,500 antiques and artifacts that paint a vivid picture of Ipoh's tin mining heyday.

Be transported to a bygone era as you wander its halls, surrounded by tangible remnants of the city's blue-collar heritage. Each carefully curated piece tells a story, offering glimpses into the lives of the hardworking folk who shaped Ipoh's future during the tin mining boom. Advanced tickets are recommended as daily visitor numbers are limited. *3 Jalan Bijeh Timah*

① 6pm Dine like a local

Ipoh Tuck Kee will tantalise your taste buds with its array of dishes infused with intense *wok hei* – that aromatic smoky essence from wok-cooked food. The Moonlight Kuey Teow is a must-try, a dish where silky noodles bask beneath a glistening raw egg yolk. Don't miss the restaurant's signature steamed baby octopus – each morsel a delicate balance of succulence and tenderness.

A word to the wise: Ipoh's finest eateries often prioritise substance over style. The atmosphere at Tuck Kee, like many local gems, can be warm and lively. Come prepared with a portable fan to get comfortable. *61 Jalan Yau Tet Shin, Taman Jubilee*

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Crafting Hearts with Precision

Through the eyes of a Paediatric Cardiothoracic Surgeon

As they say, a child's heart needs to be handled with utmost care. This is also true in a literal sense, as Dr Siti Laura Mazalan, a leading Paediatric Cardiothoracic Surgeon at Pantai Hospital Kuala Lumpur (PHKL) will tell you.

Each day for Dr. Laura is a balance of responsibility, skill, and compassion. Her work involves performing intricate surgeries to treat complex congenital heart defects, requiring a multidisciplinary approach and a highly specialised touch developed through years of practice.

With over 20 years of experience, including a fellowship at Birmingham Children's Hospital under Dr. William Brawn and Dr. David Barron, Dr. Laura is one of the few paediatric cardiothoracic surgeons in Malaysia.

She leads innovative procedures at PHKL, specialising in neonatal and paediatric congenital cardiac surgeries, single ventricle surgeries, cardiac homograft, and airway reconstructions in children. A recent surgery involved a one-year-old child who had been on respiratory support since birth. Just three weeks after surgery he was breathing normally again.

The most fulfilling part of her job is seeing children, once weak and oxygen-deprived, thrive after surgery. "Watching their lips turn pink, seeing them grow and become active, and knowing they can lead normal lives is incredibly rewarding," she shares. She believes her practice thrives at PHKL, thanks to its state-of-the-art technology and a dedicated multidisciplinary team. This allows the hospital to perform complex, life-saving surgeries and provide transcatheter interventions for cardiac and respiratory conditions with exceptional care.

PHKL's commitment to patient-centred, holistic care is evident in its support for families throughout treatment. The collaboration between perfusionists, nurses, and allied health professionals ensures optimal outcomes for young patients.

Dr. Laura also plays a key role in PHKL's public-private partnership with the Ministry of Health and the Malaysian Congenital Heart Foundation, where the hospital treats complex paediatric cardiothoracic patients from across Malaysia, regardless of socio-economic background, as part of its corporate social responsibility efforts.

"Congenital heart diseases in children are on the rise, but the number of experienced surgeons remains limited. 'We do what we can to help, to the best of our ability,' says the dedicated surgeon, Dr. Laura.

For Dr. Laura, success isn't just about saving lives—it's about helping children grow into healthy adults. 'Seeing them all grown up, big and tall, is satisfying. It's a great feeling,' she adds with a smile."

Artist and photographer Acacia Diana soaks up the wonders of Da Nang, and shares some tips for capturing the spirit of this lively central Vietnamese city

Central Vietnam's coastal city of Da Nang, says Acacia Diana, is a multi-sensory experience that can be a lot to take in.

Emerging from the airport, she heard the sound of relentless traffic even before she could see it. Vendors wearing the country's iconic conical hats pushed carts of colourful and fragrant street food, their various aromas mingling in the air. She could almost feel the crackling of the city's high energy. "If you really want to dive into a dynamic part of Asia," she says, "Da Nang would be a great option."

The London-based Malaysian photographer – who has worked with numerous global brands and humanitarian missions, and has been an ambassador for Canon – was on the ground for an assignment with Malaysia Airlines, photographing cabin crew across one of the cities in the airline's latest roster of exciting new destinations.

This year the airline launched three new destinations from Kuala Lumpur: Chiang Mai in northern Thailand, the Maldives and Da Nang, the buzzy metropolis that has in recent years made waves as a holiday destination. Often considered the capital of Vietnam's central coast, Da Nang's sandy beaches, modern infrastructure and long dry season have made it a destination with one of the highest rates of returning tourists in the country.

The city is especially popular among creatives like Acacia, who find plenty of inspiration in vibrant pockets such as Con Market, a dynamic hub of 2,000 kiosks of local food, dried seafood, textiles and souvenirs. A walk down the storied Bach Dang Street, running west of the Han River, evokes a sense of the city's former life as an important trading port, and provides a glimpse into Da Nang's promising future as one of Vietnam's great cultural and commercial centres. Da Nang is also the gateway to some of Vietnam's most beautiful gems, including the picturesque ancient town of Hoi An and the citadel city of Hue, the country's former imperial capital.

DA NANG IS A PHOTOGRAPHER'S DREAM, AND THIS

photographic assignment to capture its sensorial delights came at the perfect time for Acacia. The past few years have been especially challenging for her. Dealing with a stalker while she happened to be in



Play with layers. 'Create more visual complexity by introducing elements in the foreground or background. At Man Thai beach, I used a fruit net at the end of my lens to capture a woman carrying her goods on the beach. This creates both a framing device and depth to the photo, together with a splash of colour for added interest. Depending on the frontal object, adjust your aperture to determine the level of blur for the photo. For this image, I used a narrow aperture, so the pattern of the netting was still distinct. A more blurred foreground can increase the sense of depth in an image."

Consider alternative

perspectives. "Instead of shooting the view head-on at eye level, take time to walk around, and experiment with different heights and angles. At the Silk Village, I opted for a very low angle (lying down on the floor!) to capture the curve of the silk fabrics against the blue sky. This created a photo free of distractions. The empty sky also gives visual space to appreciate the subject at the centre."





Experiment with shutter speed.

"Add life to your images by opting to use slow shutter speeds for long exposures. This technique can capture motion blur, and can express dynamism in a still image. At Con Market and Dragon Bridge, I used this device to show the fast pace of the city and to evoke its sound. It's best to use a tripod for this kind of shot. Alternatively, you can hold your camera in your hands and create patterns."



Above: Acacia Diana in her element at the Lantern Market Malaysia turned into a high-profile case that led to both a landmark ruling and a new anti-stalking law in the country, but the experience had diminished her confidence. Her mental health had suffered and she felt depleted of energy. "I didn't touch my camera for a long time," she recalls.

Planning the shoot in Da Nang helped coax her out of a deeply isolating experience. "You can live life at a low base, but you want to live life at a high frequency where you really enjoy life and relish it," she says. "I wanted to find magic and inspiration again."

The quest to capture Da Nang's magic brought Acacia and the crew to some of the most stunning attractions in the area. The Chua Linh Ung Pagoda, for instance, a stunning temple complex on the Son Tra Peninsula, known for its natural forests and hidden beaches, features the tallest Quan Am (Lady Buddha) statue in Vietnam.

Eight kilometres south of Da Nang's city centre, the picturesque Marble Mountains comprises five limestone peaks, karst formations named after the five elements – metal, wood, water, fire and earth. Carved into the mountains is a network of 10 terrestrial and subterranean pagodas, thick with the scent of slowburning incense, that date back to the 17th century.

Further south, the Unesco World Heritage Site of Hoi An is exceptionally photogenic, the soft glow of multi-coloured lanterns at dusk echoing its rich history of a once-prosperous trading settlement. The combination of Chinese and Japanese aesthetics with

local craftsmanship has resulted in a flamboyant and colourful visual style. At a nearby 300-year-old village, Acacia witnessed ethnic Cham people continuing a long-cherished tradition of weaving high quality silk – light, smooth, luxurious to the touch.

FOR ACACIA, THERE WAS NO SHORTAGE OF INSPIRATION

in Da Nang. At Man Thai Beach, she soaked up local life, catching the lively morning scene of fishermen bobbing back to shore in coracles (teacup-shaped boats) and fishmongers selling the freshest catch of the day, their baskets laid everywhere on the cream-coloured sand.

While shooting Da Nang's iconic Dragon Bridge as it breathed out fire in a spectacular night-time show, she was reminded that chaos can be a gift. "We learned that after fire, the dragon shoots water," Acacia recalls, laughing. "So I scrambled to wrap my gear in protective plastic. My battery was running low. An uncle [older gentleman] knocked out my tripod. Everything was happening. When the dragon finally roared with fire, we were all startled. Luckily, I was shooting at a superhigh-speed shutter and captured a moment when my subject, April, was looking up at the dragon in awe and surprise. And she wasn't even acting."

And although the Golden Bridge in Ba Na Hills – the mountaintop re-creation of French Indochina – is one of the most photographed places in all of Vietnam, arriving in the early morning to find it shrouded in mist made for an almost mystical experience. "I imagine how it would really ignite your sense of wanderlust and sense of adventure," Acacia says.

But it was in the ethnic-community village of Co Tu at the foot of Ba Na Hills where she felt something powerful and transformative. "That was mind-blowing for me because it was so different from what I expected," she says. "And the people were so warm and welcoming, it really touched me to my core."

The Co Tu people, also formally called the Katuic people, are an ethnic minority known for intricate weaving, basketry and stunning minimalist wooden sculptures. The artworks accentuate the beauty of raw wood and elements, and are inspired by the religious beliefs, geography and fauna of the region.

Life in their charming village – people cooking, children playing – had an otherworldly serenity and purity to it. As the sun set, the hosts started a bonfire. A woman began to sing, and soon a man joined her, their song accompanied by wooden flutes and a guitar. "The combination of the sounds had such an enchanting quality to it that I completely forgot I was photographing," Acacia says. "It was nothing short of magical."

Time for a dip

Melbourne is undeniably perfect starting mid-March, as Australia's autumn months begin to unfold.

If you are like me and like to book travel plans six months ahead, now is the time to start organising your adventures in Melbourne. Ushering in a welcome reprieve from the scorching summer heat, events and festivals light up the season, from the renowned Melbourne Food and Wine Festival to the colourful celebrations of Holi. You might also indulge in Melbourne's top dining hot spots – Gimlet, Freyja and St. Ali's, to name a few – discover fantastic artisan finds at the South Melbourne Market and definitely clock in more than 10,000 steps checking out the city's trendiest neighbourhoods.

Lately, I've been seeking more than just days of city exploration in my travel itineraries. Like many other travellers now, I set aside time to unwind and indulge in a bit of self-care before flying home. So I shift gears and head out to geothermal bathing spots on the Mornington Peninsula, considered some of the best in the region. Known for its vineyards, beaches and scenic coastal landscapes, this popular destination is just a 90-minute drive from Melbourne – perfect for a few days of relaxation and reset.

As global wellness trends continue to flourish, hot springs in Australia's Victoria region have become an integral part of the wellness travel movement. The Great Victorian Bathing Trail – a renowned 900km tourism route that links hot springs, mineral springs and sea baths along Victoria's southern coastline – is a testament to the region's commitment to wellness tourism. Economically, it's a wise bet: by 2027, global wellness tourism is projected to be a trillion-dollar industry.

Spanning across Victoria, the trail connects various hot spring destinations, each offering unique experiences that cater to different aspects of well-being. The region's geothermal waters are famed for their mineral-rich content, which is believed to have various health benefits, including improving circulation, reducing stress and aiding in detoxification. This natural allure, combined with picturesque settings, has positioned Victoria as a hotspot for everyone – especially worn-out, 9-to-5 career professionals – seeking a holistic wellness experience.

AT THE PENINSULA HOT SPRINGS, A SPRAWLING, 17HA

geothermal mineral springs and day spa in Fingal on the Mornington Peninsula, offers bathers a splendid collection of over 70 globally inspired bathing experiences. Outdoor cave pools, barrel baths and other hydrotherapy pools with geothermal waters set at varying temperatures are especially inviting in the cool early autumn weather – ideal for relaxation and quiet reflection. Glamping and newly launched, luxury eco-lodges allow guests to extend their hot springs experience with stargazing and moonlight bathing.

Charles Davidson, Peninsula founder and Victoria native had first heard of reports of hot springs being found on the Mornington Peninsula in 1979, but it wasn't until he had his first onsen experience in Japan that he began to seriously investigate bringing bathing culture into mainstream Australia.

"I was living in Japan in 1992 when I visited a mountain town called

Kusatsu, which is known for its hot springs resorts and just over two hours by train from Tokyo," Charles recalls. It was the first time he had ever hopped into a hot spring, and with a view of a valley full of snow-capped forests and hilltops, Charles describes the experience as deeply cathartic, relaxing and enabling him to be one with nature. "I wanted to bring back the culture of bathing to Australia where people could enjoy natural hot water, which is like a gift from nature." By 1997, Charles and his late brother Richard had opened Peninsula Hot Springs, the first in bathing culture on the Mornington Peninsula.

A sense of community at Peninsula Hot Springs is apparent, fostered through wellness programmes like hot springs yoga sessions and overnight retreats. Meanwhile, the pinnacle of serenity is found at the hilltop pool, where bathers are surrounded by stunning, 360-degree views of the Mornington Peninsula. As I wade in, the stillness and silence of fellow bathers create a moment of solidarity – strangers in peaceful meditation and deep relaxation together, enhanced by the sun's warmth and a delicious breeze.

Other experiences include a reflexology water trail, Hammam steam bath, massaging mineral showers and cold plunge pools, the latter now gaining recognition for their health benefits. "Many athletes use cold bathing for recovery, circulation and overall well-being. It leaves you feeling invigorated and happy," says Charles. "Wellness is about mindfulness, one of Peninsula's seven pillars for a balanced lifestyle. The cold plunge is about staying in control – just jump right in and don't hesitate."

ALBA THERMAL SPRINGS & SPA IS just a three-minute drive north of Peninsula Hot Springs. The use of soft underlighting, curved concrete, earth-toned hues, ceramic tiles and wood panels highlight the facilities' sophisticated and serene design. It's complemented by native Moonah woodland grasses and shrubbery – like a medieval outdoor bathhouse with a distinct touch of Australian bushland. Alba's sales and marketing director, Kadi Morrison, shares that the goal was to create a space for visitors to truly disconnect. "We encourage a no-phone policy, so people take time out from their busy lives – away from their emails."

As guests wander leisurely in luxurious white robes, they explore the 31 mineral-rich geothermal and forest pools – three more will soon be open – scattered across Alba's 15ha property, partially nestled within a hilltop once used as farmland. The semi-enclosed pool is a favourite among visitors, while the Eve pool, with its shallow waters, provides a serene spot to soak up the mellow rays of sunset. With naturally heated waters reaching up to 43°C, the pools offer a healing and restorative experience. And to extend the relaxation activities, a visit to the effortlessly chic and futuristic Alba Spa is a must. The spa lobby, featuring curved pod lounges and spacious sun beds, sets a calming tone for any of the 35 available treatments, which include full body massages, hydrating facials and Vichy showers.

For those with extra time at Alba, the experience doesn't have to end after the spa treatment. Pre-book one of the nine private pools on the Terrace that offers ultimate privacy while providing expansive views of Alba's other pools. Guests can also indulge in local wines and cheeses, part of Alba's popular food and beverage offerings. Reflecting on changing attitudes toward wellness, Kadi explains, "For many, the meaning of well-being shifted after Covid-19. It might mean disconnecting from your screen and your busy life, but it doesn't always mean eating kale and drinking green smoothies."

This ethos is reflected in Thyme, Alba's on-site restaurant. Curated by Melbourne chef and TV personality Karen Martini, the menu caters to all preferences, featuring indulgent options like spanner crab with whipped cod roe on a polenta crumpet, alongside healthier dishes such as the Buddha salad – a mix of greens, jelly noodles, shiitake mushrooms and toasted red peanuts – or the Alba bowl, comprising seasoned tuna, spring onions, avocado and cucumber kimchi over rice.

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the award-winning architectural firm Woods Bagot, the space features neutral colours that create a warm and welcoming environment. Located behind the Continental Hotel Sorrento on Victoria's Mornington Peninsula, Aurora's state-of-the-art, 500sqm bathhouse fits up to 60 guests at a time and is inspired by European-style bathhouses.

Aurora's bathhouse offers an immersive 11-step ritual, featuring aromatherapy steam, thermal beds, sensory showers, massaging pools, a glacial mist room, halotherapy, cold plunge and Nordic sauna. Guests can enjoy massages, body wraps and facials in eight treatment rooms, plus a private magnesium float room for ultimate relaxation.

Lyndall Mitchell, owner of Aurora Spa & Bathhouse and a 32-year veteran in the wellness industry, believes it's essential to show that places like Aurora offer more than pampering – they provide real therapeutic benefits. Techniques like hot-to-cold contrast therapy improve circulation and detoxify the body. "When people understand these benefits, they're more likely to make it a regular practice," she says. While wellness is often marketed as indulgence, its true value is in promoting overall well-being.

According to Lyndall, educating people about these benefits can shift their perception. In Europe, for example, bathing is integrated into healthcare, with rebates provided due to its recognised impact on well-being. Bathhouses and spas there are part of daily life, not reserved for special occasions. Instead of spending evenings at home, people connect with friends and family in these communal spaces, embracing a balance between work and enjoyment. In countries like Japan, the culture of bathing is similarly ingrained, with over 1,300 years of bathing history and traditions. It's a routine practice, akin to meditation in India, which is introduced to children from a young age.

Although bathing culture is still developing in Australia, Lyndall sees a gradual shift in how people approach wellness. "When I first entered the industry, we didn't talk about wellness the way we do today," she reflects. "But in the past decade, I've been invited to speak at places like Macquarie Bank and other large corporations, where there's a growing interest in wellness for employees. It's taking time for people to adopt these practices, but once they do, they absolutely love it."
