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


















TOMEI will

release its Diamond Collection just in time for Valentine's Day this year, with 14k white gold pieces featuring trendy heart motifs in pendants, stud earrings and rings. TOMEI's marketing manager Kelvin Chen offers tips on how to pair jewellery for every festive season.

Chinese New Year

"Bold gold jewellery is a must to complement the vibrant hues of traditional red and gold," says Chen. He suggests choosing pieces that add a modern twist to the traditional, like intricate engravings and gemstone accents, or minimalistic designs with high polish to match the rich tones of the cheongsam.

Valentine's Day

For Valentine's Day, Chen advises considering your partner's style – minimalist, bold or sentimental. Thoughtfully choose timeless, versatile jewellery, such as delicate pendants, elegant bracelets or diamond studs, which suit daily wear and diverse outfits. "These pieces," Chen says, "never go out of style and hold lasting sentimental value, showing care and attention to their preferences."

Eid

Chen points out that of late, *baju kurung* and *baju kebaya* are often paired with gold jewellery that marry classic elegance with modern design. For added depth, stack rings with different finishes, such as a mix of high-polish gold and diamond-cut designs, or choose layered necklaces with subtle pendants and bold statement earrings.

Christmas

"The season of joy is the perfect time to experiment with mixed metals," says Chen. Christmas calls for cheer, and the whimsy and individual touches of stacked earrings or even pieces featuring character designs can be balanced out by simpler, more understated pieces, like gold bracelets. **etomei.com**

History lessons

Check in for guilt-free luxury and top-notch dining at **Kochi's** historical properties **BY MEENAKSHI J**

Kerala, India's spice-laden treasure,

has enticed traders and travellers for over a millennium. Amid its serene backwater towns and lush isles lies Kochi – an eclectic blend of cultures spread across five interconnected islands linked by bridges, sand bars and a shared love for the iconic banana fritters known as *pazham pori*. The city and its outskirts now champion eco-tourism, blending its storied heritage with sustainable practices and community-driven initiatives.

Leading the way in this transformation is CGH Earth, a sevendecade-old, family-owned legacy rooted in Kochi's man-made Willingdon Island, formerly known as the Casino Group of Hotels. The waterfront **Brunton Boatyard**, a 22-room boutique retreat in





the historic Fort Kochi neighbourhood, spearheads sustainability by using solar power and eliminating single-use plastics from the property. Built on the 1895 boatyard of George Brunton and Sons overlooking the Arabian Sea, dotted with fishing boats and sluggish cargo ships, the property's architecture seamlessly weaves together Portuguese, Dutch and British elements with the charms of the Malabar Coast – lofty ceilings, coved corridors, red-oxide floors, limeplastered walls and warm wooden accents.

Start your day here with a sumptuous à la carte breakfast put together with locally sourced ingredients at the Armoury restaurant, where vintage arms adorn the walls. Feast on freshly baked millet croissants, cupcakes and local delights like fermented *appam* or steamed rice *puttu* with green gram or chicken curry, paired with piping hot filter coffee.

Later, immerse in Kochi's storied history on a guided heritage tour of Fort Kochi. Visit heritage sites and marvel at murals and royal relics in Mattancherry Palace; admire the historic Cochin Thirumala Devaswom temple with its lotus-filled tank; and shop for antiques, perfumes and spices in Jew Town.

For lunch, indulge in Malabar-Dutch fusion at East Indies, the chic restaurant at CGH Earth's **Eighth Bastion**, which is near the historic Dutch Cemetery in Fort Kochi. Built on land that once held a fort with seven bastions under the Dutch East India Company, the site changed hands before CGH reimagined it into an elegant boutique property, with 19 thoughtfully designed rooms.

Vegetarians can relish a cashew cheese tart, coconut milk-based honey-roasted pumpkin soup, flavourful *paneer ghotala* and end with a baked coconut cheesecake or the bamboo rice and palm jaggerybased *mulayari payasam*.

For a truly regal experience in Kerala, stay at **Chittoor Kottaram** – a restored one-key palace hotel of CGH, with three exclusive bedrooms, just 45 minutes from Kochi airport. This heritage retreat is steeped in folklore and art reflecting the Cochin Royal Family's legacy that promises an intimate haven perfect for slow, responsible living and spiritual rejuvenation. *cghearth.com*



The world on a plate

Indulge in a global gastronomic adventure in **Osaka** BY KHURSHEED DINSHAW

If you need a quick break from

your Japanese foodie adventure in Japan's kitchen, the international offerings in Osaka are just as enticing. Here's an amuse-bouche.

1 A taste of Thailand

Located in the Centara Grand Hotel Osaka, Suan Bua mirrors the lively atmosphere of Bangkok's night markets, with vibrant neon signs and the rich aroma of spices filling the air. Guests are welcomed by a charming tuk-tuk display at the entrance, setting the scene for a delightful journey through Thai cuisine's greatest hits, from tom yum goong with river prawns, lemongrass, chilli and mushrooms; a delicious pad Thai of stir-fried rice noodles with vegetables and deep-fried tofu; or Thai green curry with chicken or beef. Desserts range from homemade coconut ice cream to water chestnuts in coconut milk. centarahotelsresorts.com

2 French fare

Feeling a little French? **The-Moment Grill** & **Dining** at The Osaka Station Hotel serves the classics – think sole à la Dugléré featuring sole paired with seafood mousse, simmered in fish, white wine, and mushroom and shellfish stock, and served with aromatic vegetables. But beef is the main draw at this all-day restaurant, and among the more popular dishes are the Rossini-style wagyu





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beef and foie gras with truffle sauce and a house speciality called The Moment Burger – a rich, quarter pound burger made with a rare 100% Kobe beef patty and homemade buns. Located on the 29th floor, it offers breathtaking city views from approximately 140m above ground. **osakastation-hotel.jp**

Cantonese classics

Helmed by Chef Raymond Wong, previously of the Michelin-starred Shang Palace in Hong Kong, the award-winning **Jiang Nan Chun** specialises in Cantonese cuisine. Feast on dim sum – shrimp dumplings with bamboo shoots and scallop dumplings with black truffle to fried spring rolls with shredded chicken – or heavier mains such as deep fried crab shell, stuffed with fresh crab meat that's been blended with light coconut milk, deep-fried with the shell and served alongside crab-shaped vinegar and ginger jelly. For dessert, enjoy bean curd meticulously sliced into a thousand cuts and shaped to resemble a blooming flower floating in syrup.

The restaurant, located on the 37th floor offers panoramic views of Osaka, is perfect for dates and other special occasions such as Chinese New Year. Jiang Nan Chun, which means "the spring of south China", is inspired by the colour of spring, from the light green wallpaper and service staff uniform to a blossom-shaped centrepiece and chandelier. For even more of a visual feast, sneak a peek at two masterpieces of Japanese craftsmanship in the private dining room – flower motifs in lacquer, eggshell and aluminium. **fourseasons.com** ARTS & CULTURE

Show time

This year's premier arts festival in **Adelaide** promises world-class performances celebrating love, art and the power of human connection **BY SMRITI DANIEL**

Among the offerings that make the

picturesque city of Adelaide a global arts hub, few garner more attention than the Adelaide Festival. Long celebrated for its bold programming and immersive cultural offerings, 2025 marks its 40th year of existence. And we've been promised a celebration of love in all its forms, set against the backdrop of the city's most iconic venues.

You'll be spoiled for choice across the festival running from 28 February to 16 March, so plan for a long trip. There are 11 world premieres, nine Australian firsts and 15 exclusive performances – across various venues – each offering a unique exploration of love, from the universal to the deeply personal.

One of the highlights is Trent Dalton's *Love Stories*, where the bestselling Australian author brings to life a series of real love stories collected from his time spent on a Brisbane street corner asking strangers, "Can you tell me a love story?" Dalton captures the warmth, humour and deep emotion of the many ways love manifests in our lives. The stories on stage remind us of the power of human connection and the shared moments of joy, sorrow and everything in between.

If you're looking for even more immersive experiences, Innocence offers a gripping operatic journey. Finnish composer Kaija Saariaho's score sets the stage for this contemporary thriller, unfolding the complexities of guilt, redemption and memory. Set on a revolving two-storey stage, *Innocence* dives deep into a tragic event at an international school. Dance enthusiasts will be captivated by *Club Amour*, performed by the legendary Tanztheater Wuppertal dance company. Rooted in choreographer Pina Bausch's visionary work, this performance is a raw, poetic meditation on human relationships and



desire. Under new artistic director Boris Charmatz, the company brings a revitalised energy to Bausch's legacy, offering a visceral exploration of the human condition.

Beyond the performances, the 2025 Adelaide Festival is about the spaces it creates for audiences to come together. A striking addition this year is The Courtyard at the Festival Plaza, a vibrant meeting point offering nightly programming, food and drinks.

You can also participate in the world premiere of *MASS MOVEMENT* by the Stephanie Lake Company. With over 1,000 dancers of all ages coming together in Elder Park, this one-off performance is intended to bring the city together in a spectacular moment of collective artistry.

Under Artistic Director Brett Sheehy AO, the festival serves as a reminder that the richest moments in life come from art, not material things. As Sheehy says, "We reach our greatest enjoyment and satisfaction through experiences over things." In 2025, Adelaide promises an abundance of experiences that will stay with you long after the final curtain falls. *adelaidefestival.com.au*

Jegi-dong

Discover Seoul's herbal medicine sub steeped in centuries-old practices of Korean healing and beauty by MAE YOUNG The first thing you notice at Jegidoad, in the city's Dongd error district, is the scent of herby, an aroma waiting from shops selling dried bark, peels, roots and fruits. The neighbourhood is home to over 1,000 speciality stores related to traditional Korean wellness, including the Yangnycongsi Herbal Medicine Market. The city has officially designated the market as a cultural heritage site thanks to the Bojewon, a place where

travellers and the homeless were given lodging and treatment during the Joseon Dynasty Today, the group of establishments sits on almost 300,000sqm and distributes 70% of the country's medicinal herbs. Here you'll find clinics offering traditional beauty treatments, oriental medicine immunity rooms and the multiawarded Seoul Yangnyeongsi Herb Medicine Museum. When in Seoul, pop by these spots.

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Gam Cho Dang Oriental Pharmacy

One of the area's biggest stores stocks an impressive selection of ginseng, an herb known for its ability to increase immunity, lower blood sugar and even improve male physical performance. This store sells it in syrup, powder, capsules and even jelly form.

This clinic specialises in thermal therapy, which is believed to be an immunity booster. Their Herbal Detox Lab is made from mica minerals that are supposedly good for expelling toxins, and their Golden Immunity Room is made of Yanggu white clay and gold dye, said to improve blood circulation and raise one's immunity. **9 Yangnyeongjungang-ro**

3 Won Sam Dang Oriental Pharmacy

While the other stores in this neighbourhood sell the herbs packed neatly in boxes, ready for gifting, Won Sam Dang sells them in bulk (attention wholesale shoppers). They also sell machines that extract the active ingredients from medicinal herbs and can even prepare a customised mix. **20 Yangnyeongjungang-ro**

4 Sam Hong Dry Goods Bureau

When it comes to medicinal herbs, there are two critical things to note: where they are sourced and the credibility of the seller. This company has taken pride in not having any disputes from both its online and offline buyers since it started 15 years ago. **892-45** Jegi-dong

Seoul Yangnyeongsi Herb Medicine Museum

The museum displays 350 types of traditional herbal medicine and a diorama of a Bojewon, the royal hospital during the Joseon Dynasty, where travellers and the sick were given a place to stay. You can also don a costume of what the doctors used to wear during ancient times. **26 Yangnyeongjungang-ro**

6 Chamdajeong

This oriental medicine café is a *hanok*, a traditional Korean home. They offer *hanbang* teas or traditional teas as well



as healthy traditional bites like *yakseon* lotus leaf rice, a traditional packed meal for travelling monks. **26 Yangnyeongjungang-ro**

A weekend journey in Malaysia's southernmost city begins at point zero, is filled with history and delightful attractions, and ends with sunset at the beach Sunlight glints off the water's surface, throwing a spotlight onto a row of buildings overlooking the Johor Straits.









Not far to my left is the Johor Bahru CIQ Checkpoint, managing traffic between Malaysia and Singapore, but my attention is drawn to a mid-sized, arrowlike structure in front of the General Post Office, crowned with a red inverted teardrop resembling a Google Maps pin. Its legs encase a triangular column bearing blue plaques printed with distances to various Malaysian cities. At its centre lies "0 KM" and the inscription "Titik Permulaan Ke Benua Asia" (The starting point to the Asian continent).

The landmark, known as the Kilometre Zero marker, serves as the traditional starting point for measuring distances in many countries. Often, it's located in the capital city but uniquely, Malaysia's Kilometre Zero is in Johor Bahru, Peninsula Malaysia's southernmost city. This is because distances for three major highways – Federal Routes 1, 3 and 5 – are calculated from this central meeting point.

I aim my phone at the monument and snap a quick photo, marking the start of my weekend in one of Malaysia's fastest-growing cities. Johor Bahru is strategically located just across the Causeway from Singapore. It thrives as a hub for investments and cross-border trade, driving rapid urban and industrial development. The city is central to Iskandar Malaysia, an economic corridor that has sparked nationwide interest with its notable successes and occasional setbacks. Affectionately known as JB, the city's affordable lifestyle also attracts many Singaporeans seeking residential and commercial opportunities. Tourism flourishes, with premium attractions like Desaru Coast, Legoland Malaysia and Johor Premium Outlets drawing visitors from far and wide.

AS A JOHOREAN WHO GREW UP

in Batu Pahat, a nearby town just a two-and-a-half-hour drive from JB, I'm continually impressed by the recent additions to JB's growing roster of things to do and places to eat while revisiting old favourites. This weekend is no different, as I've already plotted out an itinerary of places to visit while in town. Despite the city's average of 10 or more rainy days per month, the 30-degree heat prompts me to seek shade in the old city centre, just a five-minute walk from the Kilometre Zero marker. A carved arch on Jalan Tan Hiok Nee Welcomes visitors to the Tan Hiok Nee Heritage Street, its covered sidewalks offering muchneeded shade. The street's cobbled paving was recently refurbished to complement the preserved pre-war shophouses, including the eye-catching, red-and-white Marrybrown Peranakan Heritage Restaurant. Together with Jalan Dhoby and Jalan Trus, this area forms the "old" city centre, now bustling with cafés, bakeries and restaurants where tantalising aromas entice you to linger longer than planned.

Hiap Joo Bakery, nestled at the end of the street, has been a beloved institution since 1919. This wood-

fired bakery is known for its traditional baked goods, including coconut buns and buttery cakes, which are neatly arranged on timeworn wooden shelves. The banana cake is its standout attraction, drawing a constant stream of customers eager to queue for a taste. Continuing through the old town centre, steeped in multiracial heritage, you'll find places of worship like Masjid An-Nur Kotaraya and the unique Arulmigu Sri Rajakaliamman Glass Temple, located just metres apart. Nearby, the Johor Bahru Chinese Heritage Museum offers an insightful look into the community's history and contributions to the city.

A short distance away, perched on Bukit Timbalan, is the Sultan Ibrahim Building - a solemn reminder of the value of peace. Completed in 1940, it was once Johor Bahru's tallest structure and served as a Japanese fortress during World War II, from which attacks on the British forces in Singapore were launched. Designed by the renowned British architecture firm Palmer and Turner, the building features both colonial and Malay architectural elements, with a Saracenic-style tower. Traces of damage from the Japanese invasion are said to be still visible, though public access is limited as the building is government-owned. I move on in search of a meal.

After a satisfying lunch of Johor laksa, I head to the Johor Zoo located just under 4km from the Sultan Ibrahim Building on Jalan Gertak Merah. Initially known as Kebun Binatang (animal garden), this 13ha zoo is one of Southeast Asia's oldest, established in 1928 by the late Sultan Ibrahim Ibni Almarhum Sultan Abu Bakar. Originally serving as the Sultan's personal animal collection, it was handed over to the state in 1962. Following a major renovation during the pandemic, the zoo reopened on 31 August last year, and is now home to over 275 animals from 53 species, including mammals, birds, reptiles and fish. The elephants were particularly delightful, gently accepting sweets with their trunks. I continue my stroll through shaded enclosures until closing time at 6pm, reflecting on a memorable day.

This two-storey shopping haven offers 150 premium brands, including Jimmy Choo, Nike, Tumi and Balenciaga. Conveniently located near the Johor Bahru Senai International Airport and around 27km from the city centre, it's a hotspot for bargain hunters. I find a pair of street trainers at the Adidas store and am tempted to buy a blouse from British India. The food options are excellent; I enjoy nasi lemak at Madam Kwan's, finishing with a decadent Godiva ice cream perfect for the humid weather.

At around 3.30pm, my phone beeps, reminding me of a sunset date with a friend. Desaru Beach, stretching 25km along the South China Sea, is a popular destination for sun and surf lovers. The strong winds here make it ideal for watersports and kite flying under a bright blue sky. The ocean's scent and the soothing sound of waves crashing on the shore provides the perfect backdrop for my social media reel about the weekend. We settle under the shade of a coconut tree, playing our favourite jazz tunes and sipping cold sodas from a nearby stall. We watch as families, couples and groups of friends picnic, fly kites and swim. Soon, the golden rays of sunset peak through the horizon, bidding a lovely goodbye to the weekend.

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

Longer trips were made to discover the national parks, culture and wildlife of Sabah and Sarawak and to dive into the incredible islands off the east coast. Favourite trip? Cycling from Kuala Lumpur to George Town, via Ipoh and Taiping, with a detour to ride to the top of Gunung Jerai to take in those incredible views across Kedah.

Looking north from the summit of Gunung Jerai – 1,200m above sea level – Kedah's paddy fields spread out like a patchwork quilt as far as the eye can see. To the left, the Andaman Sea shimmers. It is a view that's attracting a growing number of tourists to drive, cycle or even hike to the summit of this impressive mountain, which is home to the popular Jerai Hill Resort and attractions.

Further down the slopes, the Gunung Jerai Eco Park, Tupah Recreational Forest and Titi Hayun nature reserve are becoming increasingly popular for hiking, waterfalls and natural swimming pools, nestled among spectacular oldgrowth rainforest. You'll also find the Gunung Jerai Paragliding Park, which offers daredevils the highest launch site in peninsular Malaysia.

Other natural wonders that are drawing crowds to Kedah include the natural hot springs of Ulong Legong in Kampung Kedah Ulu Legong in Baling, and Gunung Keriang, a 250-million-year-old limestone mountain, rich in local folklore, located just outside the city of Alor Setar. Shaped like an elephant's head, the summit of this iconic hill is a short but steep climb away for adventure lovers.

Those looking for a less strenuous encounter with the outdoors may venture to the Seri Banian Malay Village in Pendang to experience dance, music and food customs in a traditional rural village setting.

Kedah Paddy Museum



Notable highlights include a stunning 360-degree mural, painted by 60 North Korean artists, stretching 103m long and standing eight metres tall. This masterpiece captures the serene beauty of Alor Setar's rural landscape, making the museum a fascinating blend of art, history and agriculture.

D' Puncak Beris Lake Resort is a peaceful spot that offers a perfect escape from the bustle of everyday life and welcomes visitors with its charming wooden chalets sitting gracefully along the water. While it's always been a darling of the diving community, Tioman Island is now becoming the island of choice for upscale travellers seeking understated luxury and a place to disconnect. Located two hours by boat from Mersing, on Malaysia's east coast, this distinctive island is known for its dramatic mountainous silhouette, densely forested interior and curving white sandy beaches. In its surrounding sea, corals teem with life and reef sharks meander close to the surface.

The latest low-key luxury resort to open is The Boathouse, a serene escape reached by the resort's private boat, with its own secluded beach. Unfussy and effortlessly chic, The Boathouse focuses on simple pleasures, a slower pace and reconnecting with nature.

An hour north of foodie haven Ipoh lies the bustling heritage town of Taiping. Though often overlooked in mainstream tourist itineraries, Taiping is a destination that holds its own when it comes to sites of historical significance. In fact, the town is proudly home to no less than 40 "firsts" in Malaysia that are attracting a growing number of landmarkloving tourists to explore its popular Heritage Trail.

Visit the Aun Tong Coffee Mill, the oldest in Malaysia; the Perak Museum, the first one in the country; and the Taiping Railway Station, home to Malaysia's first modern railway line. You can even visit Malaysia's oldest prison where there's a gallery selling arts and crafts made by inmates. The latest addition to Taiping's heritage trail is the town's 140-year-old market, the oldest in Malaysia, which was recently restored to its former glory and reopened at the end of 2024.

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Taiping is a destination that holds its own when it comes to sites of historical significance" In the highlands of Sabah, the mountain town of Kundasang in Ranau has grown a reputation as a welcoming host for hikers tackling Malaysia's highest peak, Mount Kinabalu, or visitors who simply want to view the landmark up close. But those who come for the mountain now stay for the area's thriving adventure sports scene.

Tackle the world's highest Via Ferrata on Kota Kinabalu's Panalaban Rock Face, ride an ATV through the Kundasang Highlands, go whitewater rafting on the Mokodou River, soar over rainforests and valleys with a paragliding operator or head to the nearby tourist resort of Poring for canopy walks and hot springs.

Ranau is also home to a growing cross-country and downhill mountain biking community, with numerous trail sites being developed for tourism and competition. At the centre of the movement is Kampung Kilimu and Kilimu Adventure Park, Ranau's first downhill mountain bike park. Featuring fast descents and technical inclines through spectacular mountain scenery at every turn, Kampung Kilimu is quickly making a name for itself as an up-and-coming destination for trail-seekers. The adventure park recently hosted the Sabah Enduro Mountain Bike Race which attracted riders from across Southeast Asia.



Foodie-focused travel is nothing new in George Town – the city has been welcoming street food lovers to its hawker stalls and kopitiams for years. But the tides are shifting in this colourful coastal community as increasing numbers of business travellers bring an appetite for contemporary dining options.

The most recent addition, Peninsula House, is without doubt the most exciting restaurant to open in George Town in years. Located in India House, a once derelict historical building with an imposing façade, Peninsula House is an airy, openconcept dining room and kitchen with a contemporary global menu. On the same street, Beach St Bistrot is another relatively new addition to George Town's dining scene and offers modern European fare in a modern, minimalist setting.

While contemporary fine dining restaurants are a growing concept in George Town, they're not entirely new either. Restaurant au Jardin opened its doors in 2019 and attained a Michelin Star in 2022, proving that there's more to George Town's culinary credentials than char kway teow and hokkien mee.




In 2024, Sarawak's Niah National Park became Malaysia's newest designated Unesco World Heritage Site due to its rich archaeological significance which, until recently, had gone largely unrecognised. Now, the site of the oldest human remains in Southeast Asia is achieving global attention and the town of Miri is preparing to welcome visitors from all over the world.

The park has multiple impressive cave sites including Great Cave, Moon Cave, Painted Cave and Traders' Cave, each with its own unique story. Take Painted Cave once a burial site filled with boat-shaped wooden coffins, its walls are adorned with figures painted by prehistoric inhabitants. The paintings, graves and artefacts are on display for visitors to see.

The Qatari capital has been my adopted home twice over, and my second stint, now in its third year, is a very different experience to my first in the early 2000s. Over the last two decades, Doha has emerged as a powerhouse of art and design - art installations can be found across the city and even in the desert, and design and innovation is being actively fostered through events such as the Design Doha biennial, which was inaugurated in 2024. World-class museums, including the IM Pei-designed Museum of Islamic Art (MIA), and the National Museum of Qatar, designed in the shape of the gypsum formation called the desert rose, are on every visitor's must-see list. The M7 Design Hub and Mathaf: Arab Museum of Modern Art also curate superb exhibitions each season. And in 2025, the choices are diverse, thrilling, as well as chilling. Here are three of the best:



Ellsworth Kelly at 100, M7

The Middle East's first-ever retrospective of this American painter, sculptor and printmaker brings together 70 works of colour and abstract design celebrating what would have been the artist's centennial. Whether it's pencil-drawn sketches, blocks of bright colours, or a simple yellow shape set in its very own room, this is a truly celebratory exhibition. Until 25 February; **m7.org.qa**

Splendours of the Atlas: A Voyage through Morocco's Heritage, MIA

Part of the Qatar-Morocco 2024 Year of Culture, this exhibition brings together some 200 artifacts, manuscripts, photographs and musical instruments, some of which have never been displayed before. Some of the jewellery, including an Alawite headdress, are truly stunning. Until 8 March; *mia.org.qa*

Everything is red and grey: Forensic Architecture, Mathaf Presented by Forensic

Architecture, a research agency that exposes state violence, this poignant exhibition features two Palestinian villages that were systemically wiped by Israel in 1948. Incredible scientific investigations, and sadly still so relevant today. *mathaf.org.qa*

PARISA PICHITMARN Bangkok

Growing up in Bangkok long before the *Hangover* hype, my childhood wasn't set against a glitzy cityscape. But in the blink of three decades, my city of noodle shophouses transformed into a capital of glossy skyscrapers. I love the duality of Bangkok, there's plenty of traditional culture alongside all these towering marks of progress. Today, there's a dizzying number of gorgeous rooftop bars, but the latest one which opened in 2024, is the first to offer upscale Thai cuisine without a sky-high price tag. Helmed by Thitid Tassanakajohn of Michelin-starred Le Du, Le Du Kaan (*ledukaan.com*) sits on the 56th floor of the Empire Building and serves modern Thai share plates, uninterrupted 360-degree views and a gorgeous garden. Throw in a gold mosaic pool in the sky, and you've got something worth flying for.

Hong Kong


My life follows a familiar trajectory - from the initial plan of two years, I've now been living in Hong Kong for 10 years and counting. I love how compact and convenient it is. I can go for a swim at Repulse Bay in the morning, enjoy a great lunch at a trendy new restaurant, hike the Dragon's Back or The Twins in the afternoon, and end the day with an evening cocktail at a rooftop bar overlooking Victoria Harbour. Known internationally more as a finance, foodie and shopping metropolis, Hong Kong has recently invested massively in art and culture. With new world-class museums such as M+ and the Palace Museum, as well as numerous local galleries and studios, the art scene is thriving. Surprisingly, Hong Kong has never had a truly world-class stadium until now. The futuristic 50.000seat Kai Tak Sports Park at the old airport will open in the first quarter of 2025, with Coldplay as the inaugural international act performing in April.



All through my life, David Bowie's extraordinary creativity across multiple artforms has been a major inspiration, and I'm proud that this vastly influential, London-born legend once graced this metropolis that pulsates with artistic activity, especially envelope-pushing music. As a London resident for 14 years until 2007, I witnessed fantastic. left-field acts in intimate or larger venues often twice a week. Next April, I'll be watching two of my favourite artists within eight days. On 13 September, the V&A's (Victoria & Albert Museum, vam.ac.uk) new, free-entry V&A East Storehouse at the Queen Elizabeth Olympic Park in Stratford opens its David Bowie Centre, showcasing 90,000 priceless items from the transformative singer/songwriter's personal archives; I'm sure I'll be one of the exhibition's first patrons.

For 12 years and counting, my husband and I have cast off from Westhaven Marina in pursuit of adventures. Regardless of where we went, there was always the thrill of seeing dolphins, Bryde's whales and little blue penguins along the way. We've hiked up a volcano on Rangitoto Island, marvelled at near-extinct native birdlife on Tiritiri Matangi Island and snorkelled alongside manta rays around Great Barrier Island. When all we want is wine, cheese and a great view, we sail towards Waiheke Island. Race fans will flock to Auckland for the high-octane ITM New Zealand Sail Grand Prix on 18 and 19 January. But if you're yearning for more than a spectator sport, check out Viaduct Harbour Marina (viaductharbourmarina. *co.nz*) to hire a charter boat or book a cruise to the islands.

Chiang Mai 🛛

I've spent weeks or months in Chiang Mai each year since 2011, and I've seen it transform from a tourist hub into Thailand's true second city. The shift really accelerated after 2020, when Bangkok residents moved north to enjoy a slower pace of life. With international tourism at a standstill, locals reimagined their offerings for a more discerning domestic crowd. Some suburban immigrants stayed and started businesses, too.

Now Chiang Mai has a palpable new energy. The nightlife scene has flourished with bars like Bitter Truth, jazz club Noir, and Moai and Easter, a café by day, cocktail bar by night. Projects like Neighborhood, an artisanal food court-slash-social hub, have given Chiang Mai a cosmopolitan edge. The coffee scene, led by enterprises like Indigenousowned Akha Ama is world class. Factor in familiar selling points – great food, wild jungles, mountain villages – and it's clear that Chiang Mai stands out on the global stage.

Manila


The Philippines is in a golden age of celebrating its own rich and diverse heritage, and in the capital city, you'll find numerous fairs that spotlight Filipino traditions, craftsmanship and ingenuity. Don't miss exquisite crafts, fashion and gourmet finds at ArteFino (at Power Plant Mall); handcrafted gifts, slow fashion and vintage Filipino jewellery at MaArte Fair (at Peninsula Manila Hotel); and a curated mix of traditional handloom weaves and artisan offerings at Habi Market Fair (Glorietta Activity Centre).

A government initiative, the National Arts & Crafts Fair at SM Megamall brings together cooperatives and artisans from across the Philippines to showcase their heritage handicrafts, with a special focus on the country's master artisans called "national living treasures". The Katutubo Pop-Up Market (at the Bench Tower, in Bonifacio Global City or BGC) held every other month offers a rotation of proudly local décor, accessories and fashion – especially great for modern Filipiniana additions to your wardrobe. Manila FAME at the World Trade Centre showcases export-worthy furniture, fashion and handicrafts, while the indie PURVEYR Fair at the Metrotent Convention Centre highlights emerging artists and designers, making it incredibly popular with the young and cool crowd.

Many of the fairs happen in August (heritage month), as well as October and December. No matter which fair you catch, every event feels like an island-hopping, shopping adventure across the Philippines.

This city is hands-down one of India's most electrifying culinary destinations. Over the years, my admiration for the Amritsar's rich tapestry of flavours has only deepened - from the sizzling Amritsari kulcha (stuffed leavened bread) and decadent chole bhature (a spicy chickpea curry) to the soul-stirring communal langar meal at the Golden Temple, where I was one among thousands of devotees. Lately, a bold gastronomic revolution has been reshaping the food scene as upscale and innovative establishments raise the stakes. Yes, there's delicious food everywhere, but if you want to take the experience up to luxurious heights, you can delight in authentic Indian cuisine at The Bagh (*thebaghasr.com*), a stunning gourmet dining destination, or at Elgin Café (elgincafe.in), for the vibrant and avant-garde creations of chef and cookbook author Suvir Saran, amid a decorator's fantasy (picture a Victorian-era glasshouse with a soaring ceiling, heavy drapery and loungers in striking patterns).

You can live all your life in Tokyo and still find something to discover. The world's largest city is home to over 37 million residents. who lend Japan's capital with an energy that's unmatched by anywhere else. I first moved to Tokyo in 2007 to study at Waseda University, and since leaving in 2011, I return at least once a year to my second home. Still the city with the greatest number of Michelin stars, foodies will be happy to know there's even more to look forward to in Tokyo. Boredom isn't an option here, with over 137,000 restaurants

found in subway basements to swanky rooftops including Asia's top restaurant, SÉZANNE, which was recently awarded three Michelin stars. In 2025, take some time to visit the newly expanded teamLab Planets (10 new exhibitions will be revealed this year) as well as the rebirth of the iconic Sony Building into the Ginza Sony Park, which finally opens to the public in January.



I've been an expat in this cosmopolitan city for a decade and one of the things that keeps the adventure exciting is the culinary scene, a captivating fusion of tradition and innovation. From Michelin-starred restaurants such as Ultraviolet to the vibrant energy of local eateries, the city offers a diverse range of dining experiences. Think iconic dishes like xiaolongbao (soup dumplings), shengjian bao (pan-fried buns) and congyoubing (scallion pancakes), best enjoyed at the bustling food stalls of Yuyuan Garden. For a contemporary take on Chinese cuisine, Lotus Eatery in Zhongshan Park offers a modern twist on Yunnanese flavours, while Sichuan cuisine powerhouse Haidilao Hot Pot is an experience you will remember for years to come.

KUSHBOO KANNA

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Before you go, pick up Fuchsia Dunlop's bestselling Invitation to a Banquet: The Story of Chinese Food (Penguin, 2024), a satisfying, erudite and very readable deep dive into the remarkably varied cuisine. Born in Sri Lanka, I moved to Colombo nearly a decade ago for school and the city has since become my home. I love the city for its pockets of greenery that wrap around canals, streams

and waterways, concealing fishing cats and vibrant birdlife. The sunsets on Marine Drive are straight out of a picture book, and the city is home to design-led, contemporary art spaces.

As the country returns to its past tourism glory, the last couple of years saw Colombo's gastronomy scene evolve, with the return of weekend organic markets serving island fare, local barista-run speciality coffee shops, international restaurants and speakeasy bars highlighting local spirits like arrack. Try progressive South Indian fine dining at Avartana housed inside the city's newest luxe hotel ITC Ratnadipa (itchotels. com) and don't miss the stunning MAYs Table (@mays.table.cmb) serving authentic Thai dishes.

My home for 38 years has an incredible art scene, with globally acclaimed artists, events such as ARTJakarta (3 to 5 October) and Jakarta Illustration + Creative Arts Fair (JICAF, 18 September to 5 October) and fabulous museums. The newly renovated National Museum reopened its doors and is always worth a visit, as is the Museum of Modern and Contemporary Art in Nusantara (MACAN) which showcases extraordinary collections by Indonesian and international artists. Visit by 6 April to catch Korakrit Arunanondchai's "Sing Dance Cry Breathe", exhibiting for the first time in Indonesia. Along with exciting art, the culinary scene is another Jakarta charm, with restaurants like August claiming the #46 spot on Asia's 50 Best Restaurants list. Lush greenery is rare in the densely populated Jakarta but Hutan Kota Plataran offers an urban forest dining experience in the heart of the CBD. For a fine-dining modern take on classic Jakarta favourites, ESA in SCBD has an 8- or 12-course tasting menu that blows you away.





Check out Gen Z queen Charlie XCX at St Jerome's Laneway festival in February; the same month sees The Prodigy and Kylie Minogue perform stadium shows. In March, there's Green Day, Roxette and the fabulous Port Fairy Folk Festival (in a coastal town a three-hour drive from Melbourne along the picturesque Great Ocean Road); in April the Libertines; in October it's all about Oasis; and in November Metallica will play. Plan your music travel well ahead – the bigname touring acts tend to sell out in a flash, so it's wise to also get on pre-sale lists and sign up with major ticketing outlets.

Like most of my generation in Melbourne, the soundtrack to my formative years included a vast and diverse list of excellent live music, soaked up at small and intimate pub band rooms and theatres; storied concert halls; mammoth stadiums; and sunny outdoor spaces such as the Sidney Myer Music Bowl and Botanic Gardens. In the summer, we'd pack up our tents and drive a few hours out of Melbourne for days-long festivals that had taken over wineries, farms and bushland.

The annual Big Day Out, held at the Melbourne Showgrounds from the early 90s through to 2014, was a rite of passage in our youth, allowing us antipodeans the chance to see transformative artists from Björk and Beastie Boys to Rage Against the Machine and Pearl Jam. Any night of the week you can catch a gig, big or small, in Melbourne; the city's musical DNA was even officially recognised in 2019, when it was crowned the live music capital of the world for having more live music venues per capita than any other city in the world – even more than London, New York and Los Angeles.

After a crippling, pandemic-induced slowdown, 2024 saw a major revival of the scene. In October, the state government injected \$3.9 million into a "Victorian Gig Fund" that will benefit the city's music industry and provide a lifeline to musicians, venues and festivals. Funding was also earmarked for emerging regional musicians, culturally and linguistically diverse artists, event producers and young performers. And the federal government allocated \$8.6 million in its 2024–25 budget to a "Revive Live" programme. The result is that 2025 is shaping up to be Melbourne's live music scene's great big renaissance. Scores of smaller and intimate venues are thriving again. And we can look forward to major headlining shows, smaller gigs and festivals.

I've lived in Mumbai all my life and recently I developed a newfound affinity toward this sprawl by the sea that is a leveller on many fronts. Its dense streets welcome migrants from across cultures and communities; its last few surviving Art Deco cinemas draw audiences that slither and slide between languages; a street-facing table at an Irani café awaits a patron who will seek delight in dunking *bun-maska* in sweet, milky tea. And if you have nowhere to go, you will always find refuge by the Arabian Sea. Long after its seven islands coalesced to form the metropolis, Mumbai – a port, a fishing dock, even housing a mausoleum in the middle of the sea – is best discovered on water. From sundowner sails and a boat ride with a maritime historian, to trying your hand at sailing and perhaps getting lucky with spotting dolphins, The Bombay Gypsea offers experiences that will make you look at the otherwise frenzied city in a whole new light.

Over the past several years, one of the region's fastest-growing cities has witnessed a building boom and creative renaissance - from food and fashion to art and design – fuelled by young and entrepreneurial talent. I especially love how many homegrown brands have taken centuries-old craft traditions such as ceramicmaking, weaving and basketry and given them a stylish and contemporary spin. After five years of living in the country, I have my favourites: soft blankets and sturdy rugs by

Fair Weave and rattan homeware and accessories by Manava, handwoven by villagers in Siem Reap. You can find all these and many more in stylish Phnom Penh boutiques such as The Weaver's Tale along Street 240 and For Someone I Like on Street 464. Talk about a win-win situation: these brands support local artisans with a living wage and keep craft traditions alive, and we get all these gorgeous pieces of functional art.






As a photographer based in Vietnam, I've witnessed Danang make a name for itself for an impressive array of architectural marvels.
