



Firewood Penang is a real flamechanger

With Ker Yang Hao as chef, this steakhouse in George Town is the place for quality steaks and chargrilled goodness

The heart of Penang's culinary identity may lie in its traditional street food scene, but the city's new crop of restaurants offers another compelling reason to visit Malaysia's Pearl of the Orient. One such spot which has been earning praise is Firewood Penang, tucked away in Unesco-listed George Town and led by 31-year-old chef Ker Yang Hao.

Ker honed his craft in Singapore's prestigious kitchens, including at The St Regis and Gordon Ramsay's Bread Street Kitchen at Marina Bay Sands, before returning home to Malaysia. He owes his inspiration to Ramsay, "It's not about his culinary skill. It's about how he managed 70 restaurants all at once and managed to do it so successfully," Ker says.

Housed in a nearly decade-old building, Ker's 2025 Michelin Selected Restaurant elevates the art of cooking over open flames, creating meaningful connections between people through food and fire, and paying homage to Penang's heritage.

"Before we opened, there were a lot of different cafés and fine dining establishments so not many people were running casual dining restaurants with good food. Over at Firewood Penang, you'll see people bringing their kids but also suit-wearing corporates who just want to relax, savour quality food and bond over wine. It's a good environment," Ker says. "It's rare to find but casual dining is picking up and positioning is very important, so when you think of Firewood Penang, you think steaks."

Firewood Penang's menu is extensive, spotlighting steaks, heartwarming dishes and chef specialities. Even the appetisers embrace the flame, from the smoky Charcoal Burnt Caesar to delicately charred dishes like Miso Eggplant, Garlic Shrimp with Charred Cabbage, Firewood Truffle Mushroom Soup, Crabmeat Tagliatelle Pasta, a selection of Certified Australian Angus and not forgetting the Japan A5 Miyazaki Wagyu Ribeye.

While Ker prioritises quality and cooking methods, when asked about his all-time favourite ingredient to use in his cooking, Ker says he keeps it as simple as possible.

"I'm a steak-lover; I only use salt and pepper for steak as it brings out a really good flavour. We also use fresh ingredients for the other dishes on the menu."

Back to the future


We have six months to catch

Japan doing what it does best: imagining the future. From 13 April to 13 October, Expo 2025 will be on show at Yumeshima, a 390ha artificial island in Osaka Bay. Prepare to be awestruck by everything at the Expo's Future Society Showcase, a leapfrog into a dream future, neatly organised into exhibition categories. The Smart Mobility Expo, for instance, presents technology that will hopefully lead to a carbon-neutral society. Think passenger drones and driverless, electric buses with a power supply that recharges while in motion. The Future Life Village, on the other hand, provides visitors with a more immersive and evocative experience of urban life in the not-too-distant 2030.

Other attractions include the Osaka Healthcare Pavilion (shown in this rendering) where, if you

dare, vou can meet a version of yourself from the year 2050, created based on your personal health record.

This isn't Osaka's first rodeo: the city hosted the World Expo in 1970, which showcased the first-ever IMAX film, early mobile phones, magnetic levitation technology and a moon rock, a souvenir from the previous year's Apollo moon landing. This year's event is a global gathering of over 160 countries and international agencies showcasing innovations designed to help the world meet the UN's 2030 Sustainable Development Goals - a list of 17 goals that includes eradicating poverty worldwide, promoting peace and justice for all and addressing the climate emergency - first set 10 years ago. Master the maze

Explore Chandni Chowk, Delhi's oldest and largest marketplace BY PUNITA MALHOTRA

Here's a test for true shopping lovers: a day at Chandni Chowk, the delightfully chaotic and sprawling 17th-century market in the heart of Shahjahanabad or Old Delhi. Although the moonlit freshwater canal that inspired its name (Moonlight Square in English) is long gone - as are the Silk Road-era caravanserais, communal bathhouses and leisure gardens - the ghost of a grand past lingers. You'll see it in the crumbling Mughal-era havelis (mansions), where elegant mushairas (Urdu poetry gatherings) and lively pigeon-flying once defined everyday life. Here, you can feel history mingling with the hustle, perfect for a day of scouring for treasures.

Start early, before the cacophony of rickshaws and the aroma of sizzling street food takes over the streets. Fuel up with a full meal at one of the legendary breakfast spots that offer an irresistible spread of savoury snacks, biscuits and sweets. Think stuffed parathas (fried unleavened bread), samosas and kachori sabzi (crisp, savoury pastries served with tangy potato curry). The feast continues with *chole bhature* (spicy chickpea curry served with fluffy, deep-fried bread) and succulent kebabs. For dessert, indulge in





the decadence of the gulab jamun, golden jalebis or the layered delight of rabri falooda. For a soulful twist, visit the Gurdwara Sis Ganj Sahib and partake in the langar, the Sikh community kitchen that serves meals to all.

As with any shopping expedition, the key to overcoming choice paralysis is knowing what you want. Vibrant silks and shimmering sarees? Find them all at Katra Neel, an area of textile wholesalers next to a historical gate. For intricate silver jewellery, head to Dariba Kalan, a 17th-century alley once frequented by royalty scouting for precious stones. Kinari Bazaar dazzles with wedding finery - from lace and tassels to jewellery boxes and gift bags. If you've come for the spices, make a beeline for Khari Baoli, widely recognised as Asia's largest wholesale spice market. Here, mountains of spices and dried fruit create a kaleidoscope of colours and aromas.

As the day winds down, explore the Kathika Museum to trace Delhi's architectural and cultural evolution. End your journey at Haveli Dharampura, a Unesco-recognised 19th-century gem, and enjoy a decadent tasting course along with a live Kathak performance (an Indian classical dance form known for its intricate footwork, graceful movements and storytelling). It's the perfect way to savour the timeless allure of the walled city.

Stay tuned

In Colombo, check out Asia's oldest radio station as it turns 100 by khursheed dinshaw

Ever wondered how Elvis Presley

- and the rest of rock 'n' roll made it to living rooms and dance halls in Colombo and across India, halfway across the world? Then head over to Cinnamon Gardens, an affluent neighbourhood of embassies and government buildings in the Sri Lankan capital, and peek into the hallowed halls of the Sri Lanka Broadcasting Corporation (SLBC), previously called Radio Ceylon.


Entering Asia's oldest radio station, located within Colombo's Independence Square (formerly Torrington Square), is like walking into a time capsule. The spacious corridors are lined with mostly black and white photographs that take visitors through iconic moments in history and the country's socio-political milestones, many from when the station was called Radio Ceylon. Think of the Apollo 11 moon landing broadcast in 1969, and Queen Elizabeth II's address to the public from the radio station in 1954. There are photos of

Professor Maulvi H Salahudeen, who presented a radio programme on Islam for the first time in Sinhalese, and veteran broadcaster Vijava Corea, a household name in Sri Lanka, who introduced Elvis to this side of the world.

The SLBC building in Cinnamon Gardens

The photo gallery leads to another corridor displaying antiquated equipment like microphones, recording tools, consoles and a disc-cutting lathe. There's even a grandfather clock that harks back to 1925, when the station was established. Take in their five music libraries, including one with hundreds of gramophone records. The station is equipped with enough music for 55,000 hours (over six years) of nonstop airplay. But there's more to the tour than looking at relics from a bygone era. Visitors may also opt to sit inside the studio during broadcast sessions and linger for a chat with the veteran presenters (80-year-old Somasiri Chandrasena, who has worked at the station for 50 years, will have some fantastic stories to share).

SLBC, which turns 100 this year, continues to be a trusted source for news, discussions on current affairs, radio drama, entertainment, women-centric content and programmes that focus on intangible heritage. The guided tour of the station is free, but pre-booking is required. It's open from Monday to Friday, and office hours are from 8.30am to 4.15pm. *slbc.lk*

From Papuan-style papeda kuah kuning (sago starch with turmeric fish soup) and Makassarstyle *iga bakar konro* (grilled beef ribs prepared for four days) to West Sumatran-style beef rendang, West Javan-style chargrilled prawns with sweet and spicy sauce and Medan-style herbs and seafood fried noodles, it's a feast served in Menteng, in the heart of Jakarta. We caught up with the chef for some insider tips. Kepulauan Seribu











First of all, what should we eat?

"Bakmi Acung in Kedoya, West Jakarta. I grew up in this part of the city, enjoying various Chinese-Indonesian dishes. Since I was a kid, I developed a taste for Chinese food like Bangka noodles and pempek (fishcake served with vinegar sauce). And West Jakarta, wow, that place is a food heaven. There's also Tongseng in front of the Great Mosque of Sunda Kelapa, Central Jakarta. I've enjoyed their goat stew since I was in high school. The tongseng is still cooked using charcoal. It's top-notch. For beef soup, go to Soto Betawi Bu Nyai in Kemayoran, also in Central Jakarta. It comes in a coconut milk-based broth."



"I like to go island-hopping and diving around Kepulauan Seribu (Thousand Islands) Regency - part of the Jakarta province - and staying there for a night. Take a few boat rides from Muara Angke port to Pulau Bira, which is great for camping. The place is quiet, not crowded, great for snorkelling and diving."

Best souvenir?

"Angklung (a musical instrument consisting of bamboo tubes) keychains from street vendors in front of Café Batavia, part of Jakarta's Kota

Tua or Old Town. The instrument is originally from Java and is a big part of Indonesia's heritage."

"The 18 different variants of sambal (Indonesian-style chilli paste). We thought foreigners couldn't handle the same level of spiciness as Indonesians, but it turns out they all love sambal. And they finish it - even the ones that we Indonesians find spicy."

In recent years, the island's culinary landscape has evolved to include even more upscale dining establishments that focus on sustainability, fusion and innovation, not to mention a feast of a view of the Andaman Sea. Here's where to book a table.





A taste of Japan

Due to popular demand, Japanese restaurant **Zuma** has extended its seasonal residency at Anantara Layan Phuket Resort, tucked away in a serene bay by the Andaman Sea, until April 2026. Since its launch in 2016, Zuma has become a popular island habit, thanks to its izakaya-inspired dining, showcasing highquality, fresh ingredients coupled with exceptional service and the brand's hallmark lively atmosphere.

The restaurant offers an expansive spread of contemporary Japanese plates and creative cocktails, an experience made more fun by live music performances. This

season's list of exclusive tasting menus includes the signature Daikoku, which features dishes such as crispy fried squid with green chilli and a gasp of lime; thinly sliced sea bass finished with yuzu, truffle aioli and glistening salmon roe; a chef's selection of sushi and sashimi: and spicy beef tenderloin seared with a sweet soy, sesame and red chilli gastrique. On Sundays, the baikingu brunch presents a relaxed dining experience with a variety of Zuma favourites, like fried softshell crab, white shrimp tempura and Chilean sea bass. zumarestaurant.com

Star-studded and eco-friendly

Adjacent to the opulent Trisara resort, Pru's culinary philosophy is encapsulated by its eponymous "Plant, Raise, Understand" tagline. Since opening in 2016, Pru has garnered acclaim, earning its first Michelin star in 2018 (the only restaurant on the island that still has one as of press time), making it the gold standard for fine dining in Phuket. Most recently, chef Jimmy Ophorst was awarded

"Best Dutch Chef Abroad 2025" by Gault&Millau for his commitment to using exclusively Thai ingredients coupled with Western techniques.

Under the guidance of Ophorst, Pru showcases an array of locally sourced seafood, plants and artisanal preserves (which use rare ingredients - like katsuobushi-style coconut heart, dahlia flower, black peanut oil, fried red ants and mangrove-sourced crab - from the restaurant's own organic farm and local fishing communities), emphasising its commitment to community engagement. The entirely solar energy-powered kitchen utilises wood and homemade charcoal for grilling, a testament to its eco-friendly practices.

Diners are treated to an immersive experience, with the Japanese Kappo-style counter providing a view into the open kitchen, where intricate dishes are crafted with a focus on the terroir of the Andaman Sea. prurestaurant.com

Modern Euro

The modern European menu at Jampa restaurant, Phuket is hot on the radar for an abundance of fine dining experiences that bridge international techniques with local flavours"

led by chef Rick Dingen, revolves around the philosophies of zero waste and ecological responsibility (Jampa's motto is "Dine good, do good"). The restaurant sources fresh seafood and produce exclusively from artisanal vendors and local farms, and its commitment to sustainability is further highlighted by its latest feat: a Michelin Green Star for 2025, a recognition of its pioneering efforts in sustainable gastronomy. Jampa's farm-to-fork approach is complemented by live-fire cooking, where food is grilled over embers to create a smoky aroma in their open-air kitchen. Dining at Jampa is not just a meal, it's a conscious choice towards sustainable travel. jamparestaurant.com

A Malaysian in... **Chiang Mai**

I was born in Kuala Lumpur,

studied in Singapore and spent 14 years in London before settling in Bangkok in 2013. As an actor, I trained in drama school and worked in film and television. Most will know me from the Singaporean series Growing Up or The Teenage Textbook Movie. These days, I consider myself semi-retired, taking on the occasional project while focusing on another lifelong passion: coffee. Like many actors in London, I have worked in cafés between gigs. That's how I ended up at Monmouth Coffee, one of the city's most respected names in speciality coffee. I enjoyed it so much that I decided to work fulltime for a couple of years and get into coffee properly. When


I moved to Bangkok, the city's budding café culture drew me in, and eventually I co-founded Luka, a café that blends quality coffee with great hospitality. But now when I need a break from Bangkok's energy, I escape to Chiang Mai. It's so creative, the landscapes are stunning and the café scene is thriving. Here are some of my favourite spots.

Start my day right

There are a few key things that you must do when you go to Chiang Mai. One of them is explore the local coffee scene. The whole region around here grows excellent coffee. Among all the great cafés you can visit is local institution Ristr8to. They have several locations, but I love the Roast8ry Flagship on Nimmanhaemin Soi 17. The building is beautiful, too. instagram.com/roast8ry

Inspire me, please

Chiang Mai has quite a few galleries, including one of my favourites - the MAIIAM Contemporary Art Museum, just outside the city centre. But it's not just galleries. A lot of the ceramic tableware you find





in hotels and restaurants around Thailand is produced here. Near MAIIAM, you'll find all these factories making beautiful plates, cups and décor, some of them glazed in traditional jade-coloured celadon. I love this studio called Roro. Ceramics like theirs are great to bring home. maiiam.com; instagram.com/roro.ceramics

Give me something good to eat

Khao soi is a must. It's like chicken curry noodles but with a slightly thicker broth. Even the stall in the











Chiang Mai airport makes a good version. For something low-key but special, go to **Wanlamun Rim Nam** at the Sala Lanna Chiang Mai hotel. The Thai desserts are a must-try. It's also by the river, so it has a nice view. *instagram.com/wanlamun_chiangmai*

Beat the heat - or the rain

Tourists don't usually think about going to the cinema, because they have cinemas back home. But when my friends travel to Thailand, I tell them, "If you get the chance, do it."

If you go for the VIP experience, you start in a lounge where you can eat and drink before the film, and then you're ushered to a recliner or a sofa in the cinema. You lie down on these beds and the staff serve you popcorn and drinks. But even the standard movie seats are really comfortable. The price you pay for the experience is incredible.

Venture off the beaten path

Chiang Mai itself is a major-ish city, but nature is just a short trek away. There are so many coffee plantations you can visit, such as Pana Coffee's farms in Doi Saket and Chiang Dao. If you want to go further, it's easy to rent a motorbike or a car. One of the last times I was in Chiang Mai, I did a big, two-week tour of Lamphun, Lampang, Nan and Phayao. It's mountainous, so there are places where the temperatures drop quite low, and in others you can stay in glamping tents in the middle of the rice paddies. pana.coffee

Tell me a secret

Northern Thailand has loads of temples. But I absolutely love **Wat Analayothipyaram** (Luang Pu Phaibun) in Phayao, about two and a half hours from Chiang Mai. This traditional wooden temple, deep in the forest, is not as busy or popular as the main religious sites in Chiang Mai, so it's peaceful and very much integrated with nature.

Sleep in style

Thailand in general is so creative, and there are lots of interesting, independently owned businesses and properties everywhere. I love staying at Chiang Mai Summer **Resort** in the old city. It's like a homestay – affordable but special. For something artsy, stay at the Chandra Residence; every building was designed by the owners and is filled with beautiful teak furniture and native plants. For a true escape, there's Pine Village, set among the pine trees and fields in the Mae On district. about 50 minutes east of the city centre. For affordable luxury and lots of greenery, you can't go wrong with Chantra Khiri Chalet in Ban Pong. facebook. com/chiangmaisummer; chandraresidence.com; instagram.com/ pine_villagecnx;

A PERFECT WEEKEND IN

Yogyakarta

The cultural heart of Java enchants with its ancient traditions and modern creativity, making you want to come back for more

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Yogyakarta, or Jogja as the locals affectionately call it, is where ancient traditions and modern creativity intertwine. Sprawled between

the Indian Ocean and the towering Mount Merapi, this vibrant city in Central Java is often hailed as the cultural heart of Indonesia's most populous island - a place rich in history, art and irresistible cuisine.

For Norhizam Kadir, a 50-year-old IT professional with a deep appreciation for the arts, Jogja was love at first sight. "My first visit was magical," he recalls. "I didn't know what to expect, but the city's charm and spirituality blew me away.' If you're planning a weekend escape to Jogja, we've copped Norhizam's threeday itinerary that combines the city's hidden gems and timeless wonders.

Day 1 A spiritual and cultural introduction

Morning. Kick off your trip with a visit to Prambanan Temple, a Unesco World Heritage Site and one of the largest Hindu temples in Southeast Asia. Built in the 9th century during the Mataram Kingdom, this stunning complex features towering spires and intricate carvings that depict stories from the Ramayana epic. Dedicated to the Trimurti - the three principal Hindu gods: Brahma, Vishnu and Shiva - the temple fell into ruin over time but was restored in the 20th century. Today it's a symbol of Indonesia's rich cultural heritage. The temple opens at 6am, making it a great spot to catch a breathtaking sunrise.


But the real magic unfolds in the evening, when the Ramayana ballet takes centre stage. Performed in an



open-air theatre with the temple as a dramatic backdrop, this traditional dance drama brings the epic tale of Prince Rama to life. The performance combines classical Javanese dance with modern storytelling elements, captivating locals and tourists alike. "Watching the ballet at Prambanan is unforgettable," says Norhizam. "It's a beautiful mix of culture and history."

Afternoon. Head north to **Sleman**, a region known for its lush landscapes and traditional crafts. Here, a small tempeh factory also teaches visitors how this fermented soybean cake, an Indonesian staple, is made. "It's a simple but very fascinating process," says Norhizam, and "it plays a big role in Javanese food."

From Sleman, drive 40 minutes to **Mie Ayam Ibu Tumini**, a humble eatery known for its tasty chicken noodles. This is a great spot to refuel before continuing your adventure.

Evening. As the sun sets, explore **Malioboro Street**, Jogja's bustling hub of street food, shopping and culture. This lively area is perfect for picking up souvenirs such as batik, a traditional Indonesian fabric. "I couldn't resist buying lots of it at **Beringharjo Market**, a historic market that's been around for centuries," says Norhizam.

End your day with a traditional Javanese dinner at **Sekar Kedhaton**, a restaurant that offers a refined take on local dishes. Try their *gudeg*, a sweet and savoury jackfruit stew, or *opor ayam*, a creamy chicken curry.

Day 2

Nature, art and culinary delights

Morning. Start your day with a visit to a pasar pagi (morning market) to experience Jogja's vibrant daily life. These bustling markets are a feast for the senses, filled with vendors selling fresh produce, aromatic spices and traditional snacks. Opening as early as 4am, they offer a glimpse into the city's morning rhythm before the streets fully awaken.

Afterwards, swap the urban energy for the tranquil ambience of **Pinus Pengger Pine Forest**, about an hour's drive from Jogja. This peaceful spot is perfect for a morning walk among the towering pine trees, offering a refreshing change of pace. "I particularly enjoyed the owl conservation centre," says Norhizam. "It was such a unique experience. Being surrounded by nature and learning about these birds – and the importance of conserving them – was truly refreshing."

Afternoon. Back in Jogja, immerse yourself in its vibrant art scene with a visit to the Affandi Museum, once home to Indonesia's most famous painter. Born Affandi Koesoema, his expressive works are a must-see for art lovers. As an avid art collector, Norhizam also recommends exploring local galleries and art villages, such as Kasongan, renowned for its ceramics. "Jogja is full of creativity," he says. "I love collecting pieces from young artists. I have some beautiful ceramics from Kasongan, and each piece tells a story of Jogja's artistic heritage. The village is a hub for pottery, and watching the artisans shape clay into intricate designs is mesmerising. Plus, it's only 30 minutes from the museum."

For lunch, stop by **Kedai Rukun**, a cosy eatery serving authentic Javanese flavours. Norhizam highly recommends their *soto*, a fragrant soup, and fermented fish. "The food here is simple but delicious," he says. "It's a great introduction to Jogja's flavours. The soto is particularly special – light and refreshing, with a clear broth that differs from the richer, coconut milk-

based versions found elsewhere. It's infused with spices such as turmeric and lemongrass, allowing the delicate flavours of the tender chicken and fresh herbs to shine through. It's comforting yet light, perfect for Jogja's warm weather."

Evening. For dinner, treat yourself to an unforgettable experience at Amanjiwo, a luxurious resort with stunning views of Borobudur Temple. The elegant setting and exquisite cuisine provide the perfect finale to your day.

Day 3 A journey through history and tradition

Morning. No trip to Jogja is complete without a visit to Borobudur Temple, the world's largest Buddhist monument. Built in the 9th century during the Sailendra Dynasty, this architectural marvel is adorned with intricate carvings and over 500 Buddha statues. Its design reflects Buddhist cosmology, with three levels symbolising the realms of desire, form and formlessness. Arrive early to witness the sunrise over the temple – an unforgettable, almost mystical experience.

After soaking in the beauty of Borobudur, head to Plataran for their famous becak breakfast. This unique meal is delivered straight to your table on a traditional tricycle, popularly known as becaks. "I highly recommend the becak breakfast, it's an absolute delight," Norhizam says. "Imagine sitting down for a meal, and suddenly, a colourful becak rolls up, carrying a

spread of delicious dishes. It's playful, unexpected and such a fun way to start the day."

Afternoon. After breakfast, visit Kraton Yogyakarta, the Sultan's Palace. This living museum offers a glimpse into Javanese royalty and traditions. Just a short distance away, explore Taman Sari Water Castle, a former royal garden with serene pools and hidden tunnels.

For lunch, indulge in gudeg at **Gudeg Yu Djum**, a local favourite known for its rich, slow-cooked jackfruit stew.

Norhizam also recommends *garang asem*, a tangy and refreshing dish made with chicken and tamarind.

Evening. End your weekend with a stroll through Alun-Alun Kidul, the city's southern square. Take part in the local tradition of walking blindfolded between two banyan trees – legend has it that those who succeed will be blessed with good luck. For your final meal, head to Warung Brongkos Handayani, a beloved institution serving traditional Javanese food since 1975. Their signature dish, nasi brongkos,

It's typically served with sides like *tahu telur* (tofu and egg) and *koyor* (slow-cooked cow skin). Pair your meal with *wedang uwuh*, a traditional herbal drink to round up the experience.

Jogja is a place that stays with you long after you leave. As Norhizam puts it, "There are so many magical corners to explore. Every visit feels like a new adventure." Whether you come for its temples, art or cuisine, Jogja will leave you enchanted.

Monsoon rains soak the dense forests where tigers and elephants roam.

Waterfalls roar and tea gardens blanket the rolling hills. Coconut palms line the creeks, canals and rivers that form the serpentine backwaters. These lush landscapes ultimately give way to the coast, and to wellness resorts on crescent-shaped beaches in Kovalam, a town in India's southwestern state of Kerala.

Located in the far south on the Malabar Coast, Kerala makes up about 3% of India's 1.4 billion population. Yet, it consistently ranks at the top of the country's human development index with the highest literacy rate and life expectancy, a topic of pride for most Keralites. It's also abuzz with activity during the high season from September to April - as tourists from all over the globe retreat to its beaches, homestays and wellness resorts, mostly in search of Ayurveda, India's own holistic wellness practice.

Ayurveda-which means "knowledge of life" in Sanskrit - is one of the world's oldest medicinal systems. More than 5,000 years ago, Ayurveda was first practised and shared through oral tradition in Northern India before it was documented some 2,000 years later. Ayurveda embodies the balance between mind, body, spirit and environment, and prioritises disease prevention and management. It is rooted in the principle that everything in the universe, dead and alive, is linked with one another. Every person is made of five elements - space, air, fire, water and earth - that form three doshas, which are forces that control the human body. The goal of Ayurveda is to harmonise these three energies.

Although these ancient healing treatments are present throughout India, Kerala is now widely regarded as India's Ayurveda capital. Travelling across the state last year, I was struck by the ubiquity of


Ayurveda centres, retreats, hospitals and resorts dotting the cities, towns and villages. According to many practitioners, knowledge of Ayurveda is passed down from one generation to the next and has now become an integral part of Kerala life. Here, growing medicinal plants and herbs and knowing the health benefits of each one is as natural as breathing.


My introduction to Ayurveda was through a shirodhara treatment, where warm herbal oil was slowly poured onto my forehead. Unlike any other therapy I had experienced before, I instantly felt what the treatment promised; my body instantly relaxed and I could feel my stress melting away. Its calming effect is also said to treat insomnia. During a body massage, my therapist also used navara kizhi - a warm cloth bundle tightly packed with medicated rice – designed to ease body aches.

THE STATE CAPITAL TRIVANDRUM, OFFICIALLY CALLED Thiruvananthapuram, provides an ideal getaway to Kerala's Ayurveda and other wellness experiences,

particularly in the beach town of Kovalam, only 20km south of the city. For visitors, a popular way to experience wellness is a stay at a luxury retreat like the Niraamaya Surya Samudra, a short, 30-minute

drive from the airport.

Poised on a cliff edge by a tranquil, secluded beach and the Arabian Sea, the resort is a popular choice among those who prioritise holistic wellness and spirituality. Guests stay at the terracotta-roofed heritage houses shaded by swaying coconut palms, with banyan tree suites and traditional stone-built houses fitted with open-air baths, rain showers and rattanwoven seating nooks offering sea views. The resort's 10 Ayurveda rooms are the highlight, with treatments like panchakarma (five actions). At the resort, this is a multi-day holistic programme that includes a series of cleansing and detoxifying practices; joint care using intensive oil therapies and medicated baths; massages, yoga, meditation, pranayama (yogic breathwork) and diet. The Essence of Wellness programme - lasting from five to 21 nights - tops the list of healing experiences as it combines Ayurveda with both oriental and Western medicinal practices to revive mind and body.

According to Niraamaya Surya Samudra's general manager Ameya Mandke, many people realised the importance of strong immunity and overall well-being during the COVID-19 pandemic. "Ayurveda's holistic approach to health and disease prevention has gained global recognition now as it can promote long-term wellness," he says. At the resort, the experience begins with Ayurvedic consultations so guests can better understand their physical and mental well-being, followed by a customised treatment plan, including abhyanga snana (oil massage) to relax and detoxify.

The idyllic landscapes play a part in the healing atmosphere, too. Here visitors can practise yoga along the coastline at sunrise and sunset, take nature walks and meditate in the green spaces. Mandke explains that although the future of wellness tourism is evolving. he's quick to point out that most guests are increasingly

after the former king of Travancore, with its Italian mantellassi furniture and glass chandeliers - are also open to guests. Excursions at the resort include Hindu temple visits, treks to waterfalls and mangrove tours.

General manager Ayyappan Nallaperumal says that the hotel designed its Kerala Ayurvedic Centre surrounded by tropical gardens to sit atop a cliff that overlooks the sea, so guests can "feel the flow of nature" in Kerala. For visitors, pre-consultation sessions with highly qualified Ayurveda doctors are just the beginning; the resort also embraces a farm-to-table philosophy and grows organic vegetables in the five-acre garden Aaramam. Ingredients for treatments are sourced from the herb garden with over 400 varieties of microgreens.

Nallaperumal says that the state's stunning tropical nature, clean air and beaches provide the ideal setting for wellness tourism. "And we have organic food that doesn't compromise on taste but encourages sustainability and slow living," he says, adding that Kerala also excels in its hospitality.

Also on the luxury wellness spectrum is the Taj Green Cove Resort & Spa, part of India's prestigious Taj Hotels, with its hillside cottages and suites seamlessly merging with the surrounding garden and the ocean. According to the hotel's wellness manager Hergin Charles, the wisdom of Ayurveda is now "redefining luxury wellness" across the globe as it offers an "immersive

journey into natural health and self-discovery". At the resort, this includes addressing all five sense organs – eyes, ears, tongue, nose, skin – using herbal oils.

These wellness offerings are complimented by the resort's other unique experiences. Lagoon boat rides wind up at the shore for a chef's grilled seafood dinner; fine dining venue Curries serves local dishes cooked with coconut milk; and cruises drift over the canals and streams of Poovar backwaters, an estuary surrounded by the palm-fringed golden sand beaches at the southern tip of Trivandrum. As Charles explains, "a commitment to well-being, mindful ways of living and deeper connection with nature" remains the ultimate goal.

And you'll see that wherever you go in Kerala; in its marshy lakes teeming with migratory birds, narrow waterways weaving through rice paddies and mistenveloped mountains concealing icy-cold pools within their deep forests. All that coupled with Ayurveda, yoga and organic eating, what you experience in Kerala is more than a temporary sense of wellness – it's a fresh perspective on the healing powers of ancient wisdom.



Stepping onto the shore, the soft powdery white sand yields slightly underfoot. The only sounds are the gentle lap of the waves and the occasional rustle of palm leaves stirred by a salt-laced breeze. The air is thick and warm, but the sand remains cool beneath my toes - another marvel of these pristine beaches. It's paradise, far from being an overdeveloped tourist trap. No towering resorts, no crowded boardwalks.

For years, Terengganu has been a quiet contender in Southeast Asia's beach scene, overshadowed by the likes of Phuket and Bali. But those who have been here know better. They've watched, from an empty stretch of sand, as the sunrise painted the horizon gold; snorkelled in waters so clear that every coral and fish seemed to glow; and stood in the shallows as tiny fish lapped lazily around their ankles. This is what Terengganu offers: an experience that feels rare in today's world of crowded coastlines and overtourism.


TERENGGANU'S BREATHTAKING COASTLINE IS THE RESULT OF A

delicate combination of geography, conservation and a low-impact tourism model that has kept its waters pristine. Unlike Malaysia's west coast, which faces the busy Straits of Malacca, Terengganu's beaches - and the islands scattered off the coast, all accessible by well-organised ferries from the mainland - benefit from their location along the South China Sea, where ocean currents constantly refresh the waters, keeping them astonishingly clear.

Professor James Tan, a conservation educator from Universiti Malaysia Terengganu (UMT), explains how science plays a key role in maintaining this clarity. "Terengganu is home to some of Malaysia's most beautiful coral reefs, particularly around Pulau Redang, The Perhentians, Kapas and Tenggol. To ensure that tourism remains sustainable, we've established coral restoration projects that accelerate reef recovery, creating healthier habitats for marine life," he says.

These efforts, combined with Marine Protected Areas (MPAs) and Total No-Take Zones, allow coral ecosystems to regenerate naturally, ensuring a thriving underwater world.

The sand here is another marvel. Unlike the darker, volcanic sands found in other beach destinations, Terengganu's beaches are composed of finely broken-down coral and shell deposits, giving them their distinctive powdery texture. "The light composition of our sand enhances the turquoise effect of the water while keeping it cool underfoot, even on the hottest days," adds Tan. But this delicate ecosystem relies on every grain - removing shells or corals as souvenirs may seem harmless, but over time, it disrupts the natural cycle that keeps these beaches so pristine.









of the hospitality industry to preserve what makes it special. One of the most striking beachfront resorts on the mainland is Tanjong Jara Resort, a sanctuary where heritage, luxury and environmental responsibility intertwine seamlessly. "By protecting nesting sites, running hatch-and-release programmes and educating guests about marine biodiversity, we play an active role in ensuring that future generations can experience the magic of these beaches just as we do today."

The resort also practises responsible waste management, water conservation and sustainable dining, sourcing ingredients from local fishermen and farmers to support the surrounding community. With the rise of experiential travel, guests aren't just looking for a place to stay – they want to be part of a story.

operators will ensure that tourism growth does not come at the expense of the environment," says Tan. He believes that stricter marine conservation laws, combined with educational programmes and corporate sponsorships of reef restoration initiatives, will be key to ensuring long-term sustainability.

Here, I've woken up to the sound of the sea, with nothing but the ocean ahead of me and the day stretching wide open. I've stood at the water's edge, toes sinking into the sand, watching the sky turn from gold to indigo as the waves rolled in. I've waded in the shallows, mesmerised as coral fish darted between my feet. And I've held my breath as a sea turtle glided past in water so clear it was almost invisible.
