

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

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Dear guests,

As we reach the halfway mark of another year, I'd like to take a moment to reflect on the incredible journey Malaysia Aviation Group (MAG) has charted thus far. The past few months have been marked by significant milestones and meaningful progress - each playing a vital role in shaping who we are today and where we aspire to be in the future.

As the Hajj season draws near – a time of profound reflection, faith and unity - MAG is honoured to support this sacred journey. This year, Amal by Malaysia Airlines, the Hajj and Umrah pilgrimage arm of Malaysia Airlines, is proud to support the 2025 Hajj season with a total of 110 flights across two phases, facilitating the journey of 15,620 pilgrims. Phase 1 will see 55 flights transporting pilgrims to Madinah and Jeddah in Saudi Arabia, while Phase 2, beginning 14 June and concluding by 10 July 2025, will bring them safely home.

I am also pleased to share that MAG recorded its second consecutive positive Net Profit After Interest and Tax (NIAT) of RM54 million and an operating profit of RM113 million - marking the third consecutive year of profitability. This was achieved despite the operational headwinds we faced, attributed to delayed deliveries of new aircraft and persistent supply chain bottlenecks. As we chart our path towards Destination 2030, we remain firmly focused on commercial sustainability and nation building - driving long-term strength, competitiveness and meaningful contributions to Malaysia's economic development.

As part of our connectivity strategy, we are increasing flight frequencies on several key routes to further enhance our network expansion and offer improved travel options for our passengers. Beginning this month, travellers can enjoy greater convenience as we will be increasing flights to Trivandrum (from four to five times weekly) effective 6 June 2025 and Surabaya (from 11 to 14 times weekly) starting 16 June 2025. We will also increase frequencies to cities like Sydney, Melbourne, Auckland and Phuket and are pleased to mark our return to Brisbane from 29 November 2025. This strengthens connectivity, supports rising travel demand and reinforces our presence in key markets.

This expansion underscores Malaysia Airlines' role in positioning Malaysia as the gateway to Asia and beyond - strengthening Kuala Lumpur's status as a key regional hub that connects passengers to major cities across Southeast Asia, the Indian subcontinent, and the wider global network.

Beyond connectivity, we are committed to enriching the onboard experience. After launching our Best of Asia menu in 2024, we continued this culinary journey in the first quarter of 2025, during which passengers in both Business and Economy Class savoured the bold and authentic flavours of Thailand and South Korea. In the second quarter, the culinary journey continues with the rich, comforting taste of China through a new feature dish: braised chicken with red dates in superior sauce. This dish draws inspiration from Cantonese cuisine, renowned for its refined braising techniques and emphasis on freshness, balance and the natural sweetness of ingredients.




Birder's paradise



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






Charting ASEAN's tomorrow

ASEAN Malaysia 2025 in Kuala Lumpur marks a moment to reflect, realign and shape the region's next chapter

A decade of progress

In 2015, Southeast Asia was on the cusp of change. The global economy was slowly recovering but challenges with development gaps, infrastructure and unresolved disputes still lingered. It was then that ASEAN leaders gathered in Kuala Lumpur to launch the ASEAN Community Vision 2025, signalling a unified commitment to regional progress.

Ten years on, that vision has translated into high-impact growth. ASEAN's combined GDP has grown from around USD\$2.6 trillion to over USD\$4.3 trillion. Trade within the

region has strengthened, digital links have expanded and a new generation is growing up with a stronger sense of ASEAN identity. It's a story of progressive integration and of strength found in togetherness.

A moment to realign

Now, in 2025, Malaysia once again takes the chair as ASEAN leaders return to Kuala Lumpur for ASEAN Malaysia 2025. Beyond just a ceremonial gathering, it's a timely opportunity to pause, reflect and realign.

With the world navigating climate shifts, digital acceleration and rising geopolitical complexity, ASEAN is sharpening its focus on long-term resilience. Conversations around sustainability, inclusion and innovation are front and centre. What began a decade ago as a shared roadmap



Clearing the plate

Trend alert: two creative restaurants - in Bangkok and in Phuket - deliver full flavour with zero waste BY PARISA PICHITMARN

Great chefs create tantalising menus

from humble ingredients. The truly exceptional ones turn waste scraps or nature's pests into fine dining delicacies, all in the name of reducing food waste. According to the World Wildlife Fund (WWF), food waste contributes to roughly 10% of global greenhouse gas emissions, which is nearly four times larger than the airline industry.

In Thailand, this has sparked aboveand-beyond eco-conscious commitments in restaurants, whether by working directly with farmers or re-imagining waste. And a couple of standout innovators are leading the way. Situated in an old shophouse just a few minutes away from Bangkok's Chinatown, **Electric Sheep** serves Mediterranean tapas made with 100% Thai produce. The duo in charge - Michelin-starred chefs Yoan Martin and Amerigo Tito Sesti - take a rather radical approach to sustainability. To reduce their carbon footprint, for instance, none of the ingredients they use are imported. They also work exclusively with local distilleries that don't use foreign

ingredients. Inspired by the sci-fi film Blade Runner, the restaurant has a retrofuturistic, dystopian ambience - think bare cement walls splashed with pink neon lights and video projections. Adding to the grunge-chic eeriness is a fermentation lab displaying dozens of pickle jars, as well as multi-coloured dining tables made from repurposed plastic. The fun part is going through the menu, which must be viewed with a slide viewer. Images of steampunk animals give a rough idea of what to expect from the seasonal sharing plates.

creativity," explains Italian chef Sesti.
"When you lack the main ingredient,
you have to find something different
and it becomes exciting. Sometimes, we
forget to look around us to see there are
plenty of things that we can play with
or transform into something that didn't
exist before."

Despite operating without any gas lines and cooking only with wood fire and electricity from their solar panels, the squid roe and mushrooms are grilled to luscious softness. Bites like prawn skewers with sweet chilli brasucade and fried soft-shell crab aglio olio pack a flavourful punch. A guava sorbet with vanilla wraps up this inventive meal.

Over on the island of Phuket, Jaras, a beachfront restaurant in InterContinental Phuket Resort, serves seafood and southern dishes made from "nature's menaces" and invasive species. Set against a wall of dark pine logs, diners are invited to the rear of the restaurant to view a food map showcasing where the finest ingredients were sourced from all over the country. As the first restaurant in Thailand to be endorsed by WWF, Jaras champions zero-waste cooking and closes the waste loop by bringing their compost to the local farms they source from. Not that much is left for the trash cans. Even coffee grounds and oyster shells are sent to pottery studios, and aromatic menus are printed on leftover lemongrass bark.




Over a nine-course tasting menu, award-winning chef Chalermwut Srivorakul has injected authentic Thai flavours into plants and animals that disrupt local ecosystems, such as water mimosa, black chin tilapia and golden apple snails. The menu revolves around what produce is available during the season.

Their star main course, khanom chin, a rice noodle with curry, fashions noodles out of the flesh of black chin tilapia – a formidable African fish that has been competing with indigenous species for sustenance. Last year, the Thai government committed 450 million baht to combat this fish's environmental impact. "It may seem like you're just having dinner, but it's not just a meal," insists chef Srivorakul. "It helps with climate change and supports the local farmers and fishmongers, whether directly or indirectly. They may be selling humble vegetables, but when they see how their produce turns into fine dining dishes, they are immensely proud and want to elevate their crops. If you want to work in sustainability, do it well. It's not about being lazy and taking the easy way out."

Trash can clearly turn into treasure in the right hands. As Douglas McMaster of Silo, the world's first zero-waste restaurant in London, says: "Waste is a failure of the imagination." electricsheepbangkok.squarespace. com; phuket.intercontinental.com











The new muse


Hong Kong's design-forward destination mall is a paradise for art fans by STEPHEN O'CONNELL

Hong Kong has long been celebrated

as a shopper's haven, but one destination is redefining the very essence of retail. Located in the heart of the revitalised Victoria Dockside waterfront district in Tsim Sha Tsui, along Hong Kong's Avenue of the Stars and just steps away from the Bruce Lee statue, K11 Musea blends luxury retail with art, culture and sustainability.

It's an architectural marvel developed at a staggering US\$2.6 billion and built in collaboration with over 100 global artists, architects and designers, including firms such as Rotterdambased OMA, landscape designers James Corner's Field Operations (known for their work on New York City's High Line) and Hong Kong-based architecture practice LAAB Architects.

Clad in elegant Portuguese limestone, its exterior features 50,000ft2 of lush vertical greenery. Inside is a breathtaking centrepiece: the Theatre



Oculus, an expansive golden sphere chamber that serves as both a creative hub and a visually striking focal point within the mall's grand atrium. Designed with a dynamic organic vault structure and programmable lighting, it transforms into an immersive environment for exhibitions, pop-up events and performances.

Art is at the core of the K11 Musea experience. The mall showcases a collection of works by internationally acclaimed talents such as Chinese contemporary master Tianzhuo Chen and Austrian artist Erwin Wurm. While some pieces are permanent, new installations and special collaborations keep the artistic landscape evolving. For a deeper appreciation of what's on display, consider signing up for one of K11 Musea's curated experiences. The K11 Koncierge on the ground floor offers guided tours across the property, a complete museum experience in a lively retail setting. Keep an eye out for K11 Ecoast in Shenzhen - set to be twice the size of its Hong Kong counterpart and only 45 minutes away. k11musea.com

K11 Musea isn't just about art and shopping - the mall will house CR7® Life, Asia's first museum dedicated to Cristiano Ronaldo's legendary career. On show from July 2025 until July 2026.

1pm

Grab lunch at Glasshouse Greenery; with its iconic terrace on the rooftop garden, it's a great spot for cocktails and all-day dining.

3pm

Fancy a coffee? Housed inside the Kube, a cube-shaped kiosk designed by acclaimed Dutch architecture firm OMA, % Arabica serves flat whites along with unobstructed views of Victoria Harbour. For a touch of elegance, head to 181 at Fortnum & Mason, where you can indulge in the restaurant's renowned English Afternoon Tea while enjoying one of the best harbour views.

4pm

Shop till you drop at exclusive retail concepts, such as the MoMA Design Store and Fortnum & Mason's largest flagship outside London.

7pm

End the day with panoramic views of the Symphony of Lights - the nightly lightshow on Hong Kong island - while enjoying a satisfying meal at one of the rooftop garden's dining outlets. For authentic Cantonese dishes, there's Yung's Bistro - don't miss their signature roasted goose.


Green living

You won't see plastic water bottles or plastic straws anywhere. Recycling bins are within easy reach. A lot of people take public transport or use the city's rental electric vehicles. Even during my time there, Paris was always clean as there were electric street sweepers that cleaned the streets early in the morning.

Market haven

The best part of Paris is the French markets found in every neighbourhood. You can buy literally everything fresh and organic - from fruits and vegetables to meat, fish, readycooked meals, cheese, desserts, flowers, home goods and more. The vendors are always super friendly and you're guaranteed to experience a typical French marché. My favourite local markets are Marché des Sablons in Neuilly and Mouton-Duvernet in the 14th arrondissement, but you'll need to check which days they're open.





Must-do Parisian experiences


Of course, I love the Eiffel Tower and the Louvre - these are mustvisits in Paris - but of all the museums, my favourite is the Musée d'Orsay, which houses impressionist paintings in a former train station. It's breathtaking, with masterpieces by Monet, Manet, Degas, Renoir, Van Gogh and Cézanne. I also enjoy visiting the Musée Picasso and Musée Rodin.

Other must-visit landmarks are the Notre-Dame, Arc de Triomphe,









Opéra de Paris, Sainte-Chapelle and La Conciergerie where Marie-Antoinette was imprisoned before her execution. More recently, I discovered the newly refurbished Hôtel de la Marine. This is really a gem, located at Place de la Concorde. Advance bookings are a must for all of these places.

If I had just one free day in Paris to show someone around, I would definitely book a trip to Versailles, just outside the city. It is spectacular, and you'll want to take your time exploring the interiors, gardens and fountains. If you have more free time, consider visiting Chantilly or Fontainebleau; their châteaux are also very beautiful.

When it comes to classic Parisian indulgences, breakfast is a must with café crème and a croissant or pain au chocolat at a café. You must visit the Jardin du Luxembourg, where Parisians like to sit and relax, walk around, sunbathe and admire the scenery.

Get outside Paris

My favourite places for a getaway are Normandy, and a little farther away, the Loire Valley. In Normandy, you can visit the iconic Mont Saint-Michel and eat the best omelette in the world at La Mère Poulard. There are also the D-Day beaches, Giverny (where Monet lived and painted his breathtaking lily pond masterpieces), the stunning cliffs of Étretat and Honfleur, a picturesque port town.

The Loire Valley is known for its many châteaux, and it's worth visiting these in particular: Chenonceau, Chambord, Blois, Amboise, Azay-le-Rideau and Villandry. You can even take a beautiful hot air balloon ride at sunset for incredible views.

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












Punjab's gem in Northwest India, called Ambarsar by locals, was established almost 500 years ago

by the fourth guru of Sikhs, Ram Das, who also laid the foundation of the Golden Temple here, considered to be the largest Sikh shrine in the world. "Amritsar has come a long way - from the reign of the Mughals followed by rule of the Sikh empire to the colonial times," says historian Surinder Kochar. "It's also called a holy city because of its many shrines, but the Golden Temple stands out."

Today it's a city of modern shopping malls, luxury hotels and creative coffee, but the city's heart remains in the old quarter, an ancient walled city where you'll find the best traditional eats with a side of history. There's no better way to start a weekend tour but right here, in Ambarsar's heart.




Morning. Start with breakfast of *kulcha*, clay oven-baked spicy flat bread stuffed with mashed potatoes and vegetables and served with chickpea curry, at Pehalwan Kulcha near Chatiwind Gate. At this small, old-fashioned place that's been serving kulcha meals since 1953. you can watch cooks prepare your meal in the open kitchen.

Then head to the Partition Museum in the colonial-era Town Hall, the world's first museum dedicated to the partition of Pakistan and India in August 1947. The museum, opened in 2017, documents the largest forced mass migration in modern history, during which at least 15 million Hindus, Sikhs and Muslims were displaced. There are video interviews with the survivors, artefacts including newspapers announcing the partition and personal items - from trunks and clothes to books

and utensils - that people brought along as they scrambled to meet the midnight deadline. The gallery that spotlights how the borderline was finalised is quite illuminating, if not confronting.

Afternoon. The Golden Temple, also known as the Harmandir Sahib, was completed in 1604. As the name suggests, its inner sanctum is decorated in gold and sits in the middle of a large pool, locally known as the sarovar. Visit the Central Sikh Museum and Digital Sikh Museum, both part of the Golden Temple complex, to learn about Sikh history through artworks, artefacts and documentaries. Its free community kitchen (called langar), which feeds thousands of visitors every hour, is a warm, soul-touching space. People from all corners of the world and from diverse faiths partake in these simple vegetarian meals. Feel free to volunteer peeling vegetables, preparing food and serving meals for a more enriching experience at the temple.

Evening. Stroll down the lively Heritage Street, lined with fine examples of Sikh, Mughal and colonial-era architecture. As a pre-dinner treat, sample street food such as aloo tikki, golgappa and kulfi. End the day with a sumptuous meal at Kesar Da Dhaba, located in Chowk Passian. The restaurant is over a century old, yet its lentil curry, slow-cooked for the entire day, is a classic staple.



Day 2 A glimpse of rural life

Morning. Enjoy breakfast at Giani Tea Stall, a traditional tearoom on Cooper Road, where locals like to gather for morning socials after a walk at the nearby Company Garden. Giani Tea Stall's *kachori* – a fried pie filled with lentil powder and spices - tastes best with their masala chai. The classic omelette with toasted bread and butter buns are also a big hit.

Walk it all off at the Company Garden, also known as Ram Bagh, spread over 84 acres. Built in 1831 by the Maharaja Ranjit Singh, the chief of the Sikh empire, the highlight here is



the grand museum: Maharaja Ranjit Singh Summer Palace. If you've always wondered how a maharaja lived, this museum - which houses mannequins, paintings and rare collections of the maharaja's arms, manuscripts and coins - paints a pretty vivid picture.

Afternoon. Visit Gobindgarh Fort on old Cantonment Road, a historic military fort with a theatre that showcases an animated 3D movie on the life and times of Maharaja Ranjit Singh; a Turban Museum which presents the history of turbans along with a wide variety of styles; and two resident camels, popular among visitors for rides.

Evening. Head to Haveli, a Punjabi restaurant in Jandiala Guru, just a 20-minute drive from the city centre. It's also a living museum inspired by rural life, the centre of attraction being the village street with replicas of homes, a post office, jeweller and schools. There are outdoor food stalls, but for dinner, take a table indoors to soak up the grandeur of the restaurant's soaring ceilings. The extensive menu takes you on a tour around India, from north to south. as well as side trips to China. Pizzas, burgers and fries are also available.

Day 3 **Bazaars and borders**

Morning. Catch the sunrise at Ram Tirath on Chogawan Road, about 15 minutes' drive from the city centre. According to Hindu mythology, this was once the



hermitage of Lord Valmiki, poet and author of the epic poem Ramayana. It's also said to be the birthplace of Luv and Kush, sons of the epic's protagonist and Hindu goddess Sita. In the last decade, the government turned it into a huge temple complex, renovating its sacred and historic pool and constructing a Valmiki shrine in the middle of it. Meditate by the tranquil waters bathed by the first rays of the sun.

Back in Amritsar, indulge in a popular local ritual of eating chole puri, an aromatic chickpea curry served with flat bread, at one of the Hindu temple canteens. One of the best places is the canteen of Shri Durgiana Mandir near Hathi Gate. This temple sits close to the walled city - home of many bazaars - so it's a perfect opportunity to shop for clothes and footwear at Chitta Katra, Dharam Singh Market and Katra

Jaimal Singh. On the lookout for some jewellery? Head over to Guru Bazaar. Fuel up with an Amritsari lassi, a yogurt drink available at nearly every turn.

Afternoon. Head to the India-Pakistan border (about a 40-minute drive from Amritsar) to catch a special parade at 5pm. During the parade, which has been held daily since 1959, the Indian Border Security Force and Pakistan Rangers open the border gates for a quick handshake and a flag lowering ceremony. The synchronised high-kicks and marching is riveting to watch. After the show, visitors can get close to the gates for pictures with soldiers.

Evening. Enjoy a final meal in the city at Crystal Restaurant, a storied establishment that opened before the partition in 1935. It began as an openair restaurant with a limited menu. Today, it's a premium fine dining spot that offers a multi-cuisine menu with a European vintage vibe. Go for the Indian specialities, such as Shahi paneer and malai kofta. End the night on a sweet note and wander over to A-One, just a few steps away from Crystal, for a satisfying serving of traditional ice cream called kulfa.





Firewood Penang's success starts before the first bite

At Firewood Penang, a Michelin Selected restaurant, fire isn't just a cooking method, it's the soul of the kitchen. And for its founder, 31-year-old chef Ker Yang Hao (pictured above), it represents everything he values in the restaurant business: honesty, patience and connection.

Chef Ker's career began in fine dining, but it was the humble, open-air eateries of Bali that sparked his true passion. "They were alive – busy, generous, full



of heart. That stayed with me," he says. This spirit of sincerity and simplicity now guides Firewood Penang's flameforward philosophy.

At Firewood Penang, each dish is kissed by open fire – from the MB6-7 Sirloin with house-made chimichurri to the smoky grilled prawns on a Nyonyainspired coconut risotto.

And while Firewood Penang is best known for its steaks, its menu is designed to suit all ages and dietary preferences. "I always ask myself what would my parents enjoy? What would kids eat?" says Ker.

This people-first mindset runs deep. Staff are hired not just for their skills, but also for their warmth and fondness for families.

"We're not a formal steakhouse. We're a place where people come to celebrate, to relax, to feel at home," says Ker. Young chefs are also encouraged to contribute to the menu and take creative ownership. "I'll guide them, but I want them to grow," he adds.

Transparency is another cornerstone of Firewood Penang. When it comes to



steaks, the team takes time to educate diners about the different cuts of meat available – even showing it to them before they are cooked. "Seeing newer restaurants adopt the same approach tells me the industry is moving in the right direction," says Ker.

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


On the trail of myth, mysticism and one magnificent mountain, **Cheryl Marella** falls in step with the natural rhythms of the land and its people

Yogyakarta

I felt it as soon as I landed in Yogyakarta: an energy both grounding and gentle.



It invites you in with the scent of cloves in the air, the rustle of banyan leaves and the warm nods of strangers who look you in the eye and smile, acknowledging your presence.

Located in Central Java, Yogyakarta - or Jogja, as it's affectionately called - is Indonesia's cultural capital. It's a city shaped by ancient kingdoms and active volcanoes, by royal palaces and surf-washed shores. It's also a gateway to the Unesco-inscribed sites of Borobudur Temple, one of the greatest Buddhist monuments in the world, and Prambanan, a cluster of ancient Hindu temples, the largest in Indonesia.

Home to 3.7 million people, it feels more like a giant village than a metropolis. To the north, Mount Merapi, one of Indonesia's most active volcanoes, rumbles with fiery energy. To the south, the Indian Ocean's waves break against the mystical shores of Parangtritis, long believed to be the domain of Nyi Roro Kidul, the legendary Queen of the Southern Sea from Javan mythology. She is said to command the tides, protect the southern coast and demand respect

from those who visit. Locals often avoid wearing green - her sacred colour - at the beach, out of fear they'll be swept away by her waves. Between these two forces of nature and myth, Jogja thrives in perfect balance.

That first evening, just behind my hotel in Prawirotaman - a trendy neighbourhood of stylish boutiques and hip cafés - I stumbled upon a selametan, a centuries-old Javanese communal feast and prayer gathering that draws neighbours seeking blessings, safety and spiritual balance. It's a ritual that marks important life events, from births and deaths to marriages and even a good harvest.

The group of families and neighbours sat cross-legged on woven mats, passing around plates of nasi kuning (turmeric rice) and opor ayam (chicken in coconut milk curry) under the soft buzz of streetlamps. I stood at the edge, unsure if I should approach, until an older woman patted the mat beside her. No words were exchanged. As I watched children serve elders, I began to understand that this was a quiet ritual of harmony, a way to honour the invisible threads that connect people, the land and something greater.

AFTER SUCH A TENDER WELCOME, I MADE

my way to Alun-Alun Kidul, and at night the square pulsed with that peculiar Jogja energy, part carnival, part sacred space. Teenagers posed for selfies with neon light toys, vendors sold sticky rice wrapped in banana leaves, tricycles rigged with booming speakers blasted music that sailed through the air. I spied twin banyan trees at the square's centre, where a small crowd had gathered to watch blindfolded walkers attempt the space between them.

On impulse, I joined the queue. The attendant tied a red cloth over my eyes, and suddenly the cheerful noise of the square faded. With outstretched arms, I took my first shuffling steps forward, bare feet on warm pavement. Someone in the crowd giggled as I veered sideways. The darkness amplified every sensation: the humid night air, the distant scent of fried tempeh and tofu, the palpable anticipation of onlookers.

Then my fingertips brushed rough bark. A collective "Ooooh" rose from the crowd as I corrected the course. Three more steps and - smack! - my shoulder hit the second tree. Laughter erupted as I pulled off the blindfold to see I'd missed the path completely. The attendant winked and handed me a small amulet anyway. "The trying matters more than the succeeding," he said.





It was profound how spirituality revealed itself here. No grand ceremonies or ornate temples, just an old woman whispering to a banyan tree before passing beneath its branches. Or laughter and prayer mingling effortlessly at a street-side selametan.

THE NEXT DAY I WENT TO SEE A SHAMAN AT

Parangtritis Beach. It's one of Java's most spiritually charged places. Located about 30km south of Yogyakarta, its charcoalblack sand meets the Indian Ocean, where locals believe the mythical Nyi Roro Kidul rules. More than legend, she's a living part of local belief, commanding tides and tempests from her unseen palace.

I wanted to understand why spirituality is such a big part of daily life in Jogja. I'd heard of beachside rituals that people quietly undertake when they feel unsettled, seeking balance, blessings or a sense of clarity. And so I went, not to chase the mystical, but to meet it where it lives.

Mbah Purwo guided our ritual. He's a kunchen, a royal shaman of the Keraton, the Sultan's palace, where centuries of Javanese tradition, mysticism and royal lineage still pulse with authority. Mbah Purwo was calm yet commanding, his demeanour carrying deep, unquestionable wisdom.


We began at Cepuri Parangkusumo, two massive black rocks believed to be Nyi Roro Kidul's throne. I was instructed to kneel and place offerings of flowers, rice, bananas and incense between them, whispering prayers for protection and guidance. The rocks radiated an eerie but powerful energy, as if charged with centuries of devotion.

Only after paying respects to the throne could we approach the shoreline. The wind howled as Mbah Purwo lit the incense, its smoke curling into the salt-heavy air. We sat in silence, meditating as he chanted in low, rhythmic Javanese, his voice merging with the surging waves. One by one, we waded into the shallows, releasing our offerings petals and banana-leaf boats - into the tide.

Then the ocean, unpredictable and fierce, suddenly stilled just long enough to draw our gifts into its depths.





"She accepts," Mbah Purwo murmured. As tradition dictated, we cupped the cold seawater in our hands and washed our faces in purification, sealing the ritual. I expected to feel relief, but instead, a quiet awe settled over me. The waves resumed their fury, as if nothing had happened. Yet something had shifted. This is how people in Jogja have always lived - where deep respect guides even the smallest actions.

IF PARANGTRITIS HUMBLED ME WITH ITS


unseen forces, Merapi would shake me with its power. Towering at nearly 2,930m, Mount Merapi is Indonesia's most active volcano, its jagged peak often veiled in mist and smoke. The landscape shifts dramatically as you approach: lush rice fields give way to blackened lava rocks, skeletal trees and ghostly remnants of past eruptions.

Villagers speak in hushed tones of ancestral guardians and mythical creatures like the sacred macan putih, a white tiger said to roam the slopes. These animals are revered as spiritual custodians. To harm them would violate taboos older than the Keraton itself, a disrespect to the mountain's invisible caretakers.

This reverence manifests in the annual Labuhan Merapi ritual, where the Sultanate's offerings - a traditional rice dish (nasi tumpeng), heirlooms, flowers and handwritten prayers - are carried into the crater. It's a delicate pact between humans and spirits, maintained through gifts that acknowledge Merapi's dual role as destroyer and life-giver.

Beyond its spiritual significance, Merapi offers more visceral thrills. I experienced this firsthand on the Merapi Lava Tour, where local guides turn volcanic history and Javanese folklore into a heart-pounding offroad adventure. Our modified jeep bounced over hardened lava flows, each jolt a reminder of the mountain's raw power. The point of

the tour isn't just the thrill; it's to trace the scars of Merapi's past eruptions, to witness how life returns after devastation and to honour the guardians who've protected the mountain for generations.

The jeep lurched forward, tires spitting volcanic gravel as we charged into Merapi's shadow. "Hold tight!" yelled our driver Pak Yudi, grinning as we hit a dip that sent us bouncing against the roll bars. Swerving past massive lava boulders, he pointed to steaming vents where the earth still breathes. "See how alive she is?" he shouted over the engine's roar. Then, cutting the engine near an unmarked turnoff, his voice grew reverent: "Before we go deeper, you should understand who protected this mountain."

Twenty-four dusty minutes later, I stood at Museum Petilasan Mbah Maridjan, its wooden walls weathered by mountain winds. Just steps from where the legendary *juru kunci* (the gatekeeper) once kept vigil, a largerthan-life photo of Mbah Maridjan in his signature all-black attire greeted visitors.

Inside, the caretaker served thick Javanese coffee in the very spot where Mbah Maridjan would receive villagers. The humble collection spoke volumes: a cracked shortwave radio he used to monitor quakes, mud-caked boots, binoculars that had seen countless sunrises over the crater. During Merapi's devastating 2010 eruption, Mbah Maridjan chose to stay behind. He ignored evacuation orders, believing it was his duty to remain and carry out sacred responsibilities. Some say he died protecting the village. Others believe he was simply fulfilling his role. Either way, his presence still lingers. The caretaker glanced at the photo of Mbah Maridjan and said, "He wasn't just watching the mountain, he was listening to it."

My final hours in Jogja unfolded with quiet symmetry. At a jamu stall near Malioboro, the elderly vendor handed me a glass of



Malaysia Airlines flies between Kuala Lumpur and Yogyakarta 2x weekly. beras kencur. The ginger rice tonic burned pleasantly down my throat, its earthy sweetness a farewell gift. She pressed a tiny bottle into my palm – "Untuk di jalan" (for the journey) – her fingers yellowed from decades of grinding turmeric roots at dawn.

My last stop was a small art gallery near the Tugu monument in Malioboro, where a young artist unfurled a batik scroll. The design mesmerised me: indigo waves colliding with charcoal smoke, their dance framed by Javanese symbols. "Ini Rwa Bhineda," he explained – Bali's philosophy of opposites, reimagined by Javanese hands. As I rolled the fabric into my carry-on, I realised it was a map of the balance Jogja had imprinted on me – where fire and water, loss and renewal, exist not as opposites but as partners in an endless dance.

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

Maungawhau, otherwise known as Mount Eden, is a popular hiking spot (or "Tāmaki desired by many"), it was formally established as a modern city in 1840 and declared New Zealand's capital a year later. But for all its youth, it's a city with captivating stories. "There's an enormous amount of history in Auckland, especially when tracing back to pre-European times," says Terry Hobin, operations director and senior guide at Auckland Walks, a company that's been telling the city's tales through engaging heritage tours and themed walks for over 20 years.

Perhaps the most interesting story lies beneath it: Auckland's volcanic field – 600m² that's home to more than 50 dormant volcanoes. Over the last 100,000 years, geologists claim that outbursts from these volcanoes have dramatically shifted the terrain, creating the stunning and varied landscape it is today.

For this reason, Auckland has a lot to offer visitors who choose to explore it on foot. Where else can you climb to the summit of a dormant volcano less than 15 minutes from the central business district? Or drive less than an hour from the city centre to walk on coastal cliff sides shaped by volcanic activity? Whichever trail you choose, you'll be rewarded with wild, spectacular views you'd only dream of seeing in the movies.

Maungawhau (Mount Eden)

Standing at 196m tall, Maungawhau is Auckland's highest volcanic cone. About 28,000 years ago, it erupted for the

first time, leaving a large mound with a 50m-deep crater in its wake. The mount was a Maori $p\bar{a}$ (fortified village) before the Europeans arrived. Today, it's one of Auckland's most-visited mountains, drawing a million visitors to its summit each year. On a clear day, you'll see its well-preserved bowl-shaped crater as well as the impressive Auckland city skyline, the Waitakere Ranges and Rangitoto Island. You might also recognise the mountain as a location for Netflix's Sweet Tooth series.

To honour the sacred nature of the summit and ensure pedestrian safety, vehicle access to the top is limited. There are several ways to walk to the crater and some trails can be stony and steep, so stay on designated paths. The primary route commences at the entrance on Puhi Huia Road, which takes you on a scenic 2km trek along the old summit road, and connects you to the crater rim track.

Want to get to the summit in less time? From Puhi Huia Road, climb the 300m ascent to the crater. This route can be rather steep, so make sure you can handle the incline.

Piha Beach

Recognised as the birthplace of modern surfing in New Zealand, Piha Beach is one of the country's foremost surf spots and a hiker's dream. Standing guard on its black sand shores is the iconic



Lion Rock, a majestic landmark that's actually the eroded neck of a volcanic eruption 16 million years ago. This iconic beach set the scene for Amazon's The Lord of the Rings: The Rings of Power. And just off Piha Road lies Karekare Beach, the stunning location for Jane Campion's 1993 Oscar-winning film The Piano.

Here, the Karekare Falls trail is an easy, 600m trail that leads you to the 30m-tall Karekare Falls in the Waitākere Ranges Regional Park. It takes about eight minutes to do the walk and is perfect for groups with very young kids or elderly family members with mobility issues. Make sure to pack a swimsuit and take a dip in the falls.

For a more challenging hike, the Mercer Bay Loop Track is a 2.1km trail set high above Piha's cliffs, providing an excellent vantage point for dramatic coastal views. The path provides good traction, with gentle descents and inclines through native forests. Take your time and enjoy panoramic views of the Tasman Sea.


Muriwai Regional Park

Less than an hour's drive from Auckland's city centre, this West Coast beach has "wild" written all over it - from the consistent swells sought out by surfers and black volcanic sand to the rugged pillow-shaped cliffs hewn from hot lava that erupted underwater and then rapidly cooled. Muriwai Beach is home to the gannet, a large seabird known to swoop into the water at up to 100kmph, and the kororā (little blue penguins). It's a natural stunner and also served as a filming location for The Rings of Power.

The area offers plenty of hiking options. For beginners, the Muriwai Gannet Colony Walk is a 1km round-trip hike along gravel paths and wooden steps. This leisurely route features subtle inclines that take you to a spot overlooking the windswept beach and Muriwai's well-known gannet colony.









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Rangitoto Island

Considered one of New Zealand's youngest volcanic islands, Rangitoto's most recent eruption occurred just 600 years ago. This pest-free island has a flourishing ecosystem, where native flora and feathered creatures like the tūī, saddleback, bellbird and fantail thrive. To get there, board a 25-minute ferry ride from either the Downtown Auckland Ferry Terminal or Devonport Ferry Terminal.

The Rangitoto Summit Track starts at the Rangitoto Wharf and is a 7km hike on gravel paths and volcanic scoria, which are sharp jagged rocks that can be slippery, so proceed with caution. Depending on your pace, it will take one to two hours. Tramp through lava fields, native scrub and forests of Pōhutukawa trees (aka the New Zealand Christmas tree whose red flowers bloom in December). It's an otherworldly scene that provided the backdrop for *Under the Mountain*, a New Zealand film starring Sam Neill of *Jurassic Park* fame.

As you move closer to the top, you'll climb wooden stairs that lead to a viewing deck, giving you sweeping panoramic views of Auckland's impressive harbour. If you're up for a challenge, take a 15-minute detour about two-thirds of the way to check out the lava caves. Make sure to pack a flashlight.
