Coastal gems

Terengganu keeps its traditions alive through festivals that mix culture and community. Ahead of Visit Malaysia Year 2026, Tourism Terengganu director Hilman bin Hajijan tells us about the state's must-visit attractions and cultural experiences.

Join the locals in the age-old tradition of squid jigging at the Candat Sotong Carnival, held between April and August when squid spawn near the shore. After nightfall, fishermen lure them with bright lights before catching them on special hooks - a ritual now celebrated with live music. food stalls and cultural performances.

Equally anticipated is Karnival Pantai, which draws over 150,000 visitors annually. Browse stalls selling traditional kuih and handcrafted goods, and enjoy the festive vibe with cultural showcases and themedstall competitions. This event is a platform for local entrepreneurs to showcase their products.

Next Ramadan, experience the magic of Pelita Raya as it lights up the season with rows of glowing lamps arranged in intricate patterns - a nod to the traditional kerosene lamps used to decorate lawns during the holy month.

Add riverside charm to your trip at Dataran Batu Putih and the Marang Floating Market, where you can watch artisans make nisang coffee, dodol and nipah roofs - an authentic glimpse into local traditions.

And don't leave without seeing Kuala Terengganu's iconic drawbridge, the first in Southeast Asia and inspired by London's Tower Bridge. Adorned with Islamic motifs, it's at its most breathtaking during sunset. terengganutourism.com;

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
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



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Ananth Arumugam: Let there be light

It is common to see diyas lit during Deepavali, a tradition linked to the return of Lord Rama to Ayodhya, the rebirth of the goddess Lakshmi and Lord Krishna's victory over the demon king Narakasura.

"We see a surge in demand as families prepare their homes for the Festival of Lights," says Ananth Arumugam, a fourth-generation claypot maker and founder of KS Pottery in Kuala Selangor, which specialises in producing diyas and vilakkus (Tamil for lamp). "Many believe that only a clay diva carries true authenticity and sacredness."

Diyas are often lit at dawn and dusk, placed at entrances, altars or in front

of deities to invite blessings. Some use a single wick to symbolise unity, others multiple wicks for prosperity. Lamps are usually filled with sesame oil or ghee considered pure and auspicious - though mustard and coconut oil are also used in different regions.

"Lighting a diya or vilakku is a symbolic act of inviting wisdom, peace, prosperity and spiritual energy into one's home. It represents light, purity and the removal of darkness, negativity and ignorance," says Ananth.

Ruben Prakash: Kolams of art

Deepavali's most striking visual is the kolam – a traditional Indian art form where intricate geometric patterns decorate floors and entrances.

"I like to base my work on Indian culture, whether it is our traditional dances, architecture, food or epics. Our culture is so rich, and I love sharing that," says Ruben.



"A kolam welcomes visitors and brings prosperity to the house. It is also meant to feed birds and insects as an offering to nature," says Ruben Prakash, the Kuala Lumpur-based director of S4SKY Rangoli Kolam Malavsia, who is in high demand in the weeks leading up to the festival for his designs created using dved rice grains.

Traditional motifs feature peacocks, flowers and elephants, but Ruben's creativity shines through in his largescale commissions for malls and corporate clients. His largest kolam to date, created in 2017, stretched 240ft by 8ft across Gateway@KLIA2 and took his team four days to complete. (By comparison, a small, simple kolam can be finished within an hour.)

Ruben has also experimented with

Sri Shangari Subramaniam: **Garments of tradition**

Two to three months before Deepavali, orders pour in from customers eager to buy sarees - 6m garments of woven cloth draped around the waist and shoulder, paired with a blouse. Jansri Sarees, which has stores in KL and in Kuantan, the capital of Pahang, has become a favourite for its handloom-woven organic silks and cottons, sourced directly from India.

"During Deepavali, we celebrate everything that is good - and what better way than with new clothes?" asks founder Sri Shangari Subramaniam. "They symbolise prosperity and blessings: elders gift them to younger family members and newlyweds receive clothes from their parents for a happy married life."

The saree remains the most popular choice for Malaysian Indian women during Deepavali, while men often opt for new shirts and dhotis (ankle-length trousers) in bright, festive colours. "Younger people might choose salwar kameez Punjabi suits, lehenga skirts or even black or darker shades, which were once thought unlucky," says Sri Shangari. "Still, traditional clothes connect us to our roots and remind us of where we come from."



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

A global guide to uplifting updates for work, rest and play

The architecture is as striking as the exhibits. Designed by Austrian studio Jadric Architektur and Korean firm 1990uao Architects, Photo SeMA is a black cube with interesting linear flourishes that resemble the ends of film rolls. You can happily spend a whole afternoon here inside the four-storey building are exhibition galleries, a photo library, learning studios where workshops are held, a darkroom and a café.

Twin powerhouse opening shows hint at the high standard of programming we can expect from the museum. "The Radiance" highlights Jung Haechang, who staged Korea's first photo exhibition in 1929, alongside Park Youngsook's bold feminist works from the mid-1970s. "Storage Story" presents six contemporary artists, including Won Seoung Won, who

transformed construction-site materials into imaginative photographic works.

Beyond exhibitions, the museum offers classes through Photo SeMA Academy and preserves over 20,000 archival images from the 1920s to the 1990s. A fourth-floor library stocked with rare volumes completes the experience. sema.seoul.go.kr

Listen up, audiophiles


Five fab vinyl bars and cafés in **Chiang Mai BYLUCIE GRACE**



creative powerhouse – the mountainside city is home to art schools, music colleges and now, a flourishing vinyl scene. From hole-in-the-wall cafés to buzzing weekend dance floors, Chiang Mai's new clutch of listening bars and record-friendly eateries are giving music lovers plenty to spin about. Here are five spots to check out.

Deaf Shop

Chiang Mai's premier vinyl listening bar might pass for a record shop at first glance, but the racks belong to husband-and-wife duo Oomboi and Mum, who opened this hub for music lovers in 2022. Pick an album from the eclectic LP collection and they'll cue





it up; the soundtrack could veer from hip-hop and funk to indie and punk. On weekends, expect a packed dance floor. 36 Prapokklao Rd, Phra Sing; @deaf.shop

The Toys Club

A laid-back café by day and speakeasy by night, this collector's dream is packed full of retro toys, games and stacks of vinyl. Owner DJ Bird's record collection is a treasure trove of jazz, funk, hip-hop, house and electro, and the bar has a "sit back and relax" vibe – so pull up a stool and enjoy the DJs at work here every night of the week. 46/1 San Pa Koi Rd, Wat Kad; @thetoysclubth

Street Coffee Crew

Opened eight years ago by DJ and record collector Khun OG, this coffee-and-vinyl spot was ahead of the curve. The small café's walls are lined with street art and shelves of OG's hip-hop, soul and funk LPs, which he often spins in the mornings while baristas brew locally grown, house-roasted coffee. 144/55, Yu Yen Rd; @streetcoffeecrew

John Lemon

Fung Record Bar

A relaxed spot for Beatles-themed cocktails and low-key conversation, Fung usually leaves the playlist to its resident DJs. On quieter weekday evenings, they might dip into the inhouse record stash for requests.

Experience the meticulous craft of Chanel first-hand in a rare travelling exhibition in **Tokyo** by KISSA CASTAÑEDA





To reinvent something, first you must understand

the basics. This is exactly how Gabrielle "Coco" Chanel rose from being a seamstress with a big dream to a visionary who radically transformed fashion. From the beginning, she placed extreme importance on the power of craftsmanship – taking the sewing skills she learned at an orphanage and eventually weaving masculine codes into womenswear that offered a breath of fresh air in the 1920s.

Over a century later, this philosophy continues to influence the luxury maison. At the heart of Chanel is its close collaboration with numerous *métiers d'art* (specialist artisans), such as the world-renowned Lesage, an embroiderer celebrating its centenary this year. In 1985, Chanel started buying local partner workshops and manufacturers to ensure they could continue to thrive, creating an ecosystem unique to the fashion house.

In 2021, Chanel established le19M in Paris, a physical manifestation of its commitment to preserving and advancing traditional craftsmanship. Named after Chanel's favourite number – a reference to her birthday and the 19th arrondissement where the boutique is located – this purpose-built destination holds a workshop, a school and a gallery that "aims to showcase the savoir-faire of artisans and creators".

The gallery arm provides insider access that was previously reserved for top clientele and media guests. Today, the public can admire what goes on behind the scenes.

From 30 September to 20 October, la Galerie du 19M travels to Tokyo, marking the second international edition after Dakar, Senegal in 2023. For over three weeks, the 52nd floor of Mori Tower in Roponggi is more

Live demonstrations and hands-on workshops invite visitors into the artisans' world

than just a place to take in sweeping city views – it is a temple of craft and a creative incubator. Normally working quietly in the background, the artisans step into the spotlight with live demonstrations and handson workshops that invite visitors into their world.

The Tokyo residency unfolds as a three-part experience anchored by The Festival, an installation by acclaimed architect Tane Tsuyoshi and ATTA.

Another notable exhibition is "Beyond Our Horizons", which sees the participation of 30 French and Japanese artists and artisans. Specialists from maisons like Maison Michel (millinery) and Massaro (shoemaking) work alongside Japanese counterparts in textiles, ceramics and lacquer, together creating a cultural and talent exchange like no other. *le19m.com*



smoothie bowls and beach-bar burgers. Now it's less about what's photogenic and more about what's personal. Two of the island's trending dining spots are doing just that: serving up Eastmeets-West stories with serious style (and a very good sambal on the side).

First stop: the quiet hills of Ubud, where renowned designer Jonathan Rachman - known for his gorgeous interiors in San Francisco - has come home to open Di Sini Di Sana.

The name means "here" and "there" in Bahasa Indonesia, and that's exactly the idea. Part restaurant, part shop, part memory box, the space is filled with pieces from Rachman's own journey – a Javanese royal pavilion gilded in gold leaf, colonial-style chandeliers and colourful tiles that nod to his Peranakan roots.

The menu reads like a passport: nasi goreng and Singaporean laksa from his childhood, side by side with creamy carbonara and burrata salads from

his life in the West. Over at Di Sana - the boutique and café - you'll find homeware and fabrics from Rachman's own line, plus a peaceful spot for an espresso or light lunch after a massage.

Meanwhile, down in Canggu, Santanera is all fire and flair. Perched above the beach clubs, it's a three-storev restaurant by Colombian chefs Andres Becerra and German Rincon, who've brought Latin American flavours to the island and turned up the heat - literally.

Dishes like woodfired baby squid with black garlic mole and hamachi ceviche with plantain crackers are big on bold flavours and clever technique, but still casual enough for a night out with friends. The rooftop bar's a hit too, especially with cocktails made using local fruit like tamarillo.



A Malaysian in... Manila

Now based in Siargao with a Malaysian eatery of his own, actor and model Ben Amir maps out his go-to places in the surfing island and in the Philippine capital BY ANANDHI GOPINATH



I've recently moved to Siargao,

where I opened a Malaysian eatery, but Manila was my first base in the Philippines - the city that introduced me to the country and still draws me back for work, friends and food.

I often fly out from Manila to experience the Philippines' many destinations: Cebu's waterfalls, El Nido's beaches and, of course, Siargao, which has become home. What makes Siargao special is not just for the surf or the sand, but the island's slower rhythm of life.

In Manila, my life is highenergy. I start with an early gym session and coffee, then plan around the city's notorious traffic. Meetings fill the day, while evenings are for friends and food.

Some of my favourites include Thai-Filipino fusion at Basil (One Bonifacio High Street, Taguig;

basilphilippines.com) – a cosy, halal-certified gem serving comforting dishes like Pad Thai; and familiar Asian flavours at Pamanganan House of Malaysian Halal Food (G/F Saimah II Hotel. 310D Elizondo St, Quiapo; fb.com/pamanganan). I also like Spices (The Peninsula Manila, 1226 Makati Avenue, Makati; peninsula.com) for its upscale Southeast Asian flavours.

When I want to show visitors Manila's diversity, I take them to the "Muslim Town" near the Golden Mosque in downtown Manila (892 Globo de Oro St, Quiapo). Wandering through its streets, you'll find everything from smoky grilled meats to syrupy sweets – a food crawl that feels like a cultural deep dive.

To see and buy

For those drawn to history and art, I recommend the National Museum of Fine Arts (Rizal Park, Padre Burgos Ave, Ermita; @natmuseumph). The building is an elegant neoclassical landmark, housing treasures like Juan Luna's Spoliarium.

Shopping in Metro Manila has its own charms. Divisoria (Claro M Recto Ave, Tondo) is a maze of wholesale stalls. perfect for bargain hunters looking for everything from fabrics to accessories. For retro finds and local creativity, Cubao





Expo (General Romulo Ave, Cubao, Quezon City; @cubaoexpoph) is a haven of vintage shops, galleries and cafés with an indie vibe. If you're after pearls, gadgets or traditional Filipino handicrafts, go to Greenhills Shopping Centre (1502 Ortigas Ave, San Juan, Metro Manila; @greenhillsph).

For something more polished, head to BGC, with its modern, walkable layout. There, you can hop between malls - Uptown Mall, SM Aura Premier, Market! Market! and the open-air Bonifacio High Street - enjoying art walks, weekend markets and café stops along the way.









Small moments, big impact

When I need to unwind, I look for life's smaller moments. Cycling along coastal roads, pausing at sari-sari stalls (tiny convenience kiosks selling everything from snacks to shampoo) or playing basketball beneath swaying coconut trees helps clear my head. With friends, it's always music and laughter over home-cooked meals. For a date night, I don't need anything elaborate - just a tucked-away corner with warm lighting and good food. A refined option I often choose is Hossein's Persian Kebab (Serendra Mall, BGC, Taguig; @hosseins.ph), which brings Persian, Indian and Mediterranean cuisine into an elegant, halal-certified setting.

A perfect day in Siargao

Just a two-hour domestic flight from Manila, Siargao is a teardrop-shaped island off Mindanao's northeastern coast and the surfing capital of the Philippines. With no traffic lights or strict schedules, life here flows to the rhythms of community, nature and breathtaking sunsets. It's the kind of magic that explains the so-called "Siargao Curse": you come for a week but end up staying for a year.

Roam around Tourism Road

Start your morning with coconut coffee at Coco Frio (@cocofriosiargao) before pedalling through dappled village streets. Stop for lunch at Wild Restaurant (@wild.siargao), where fresh ingredients meet inventive Filipino flavours. Pause mid-afternoon for coffee at Don Macchiatos (@donmacchiatos.official), then island-hop or head to Sunset Bridge for golden skies. End with dinner at Roots

(Kaimana Resort; @roots. siargao) – toes in the sand, stories shared, hearts full.

More shops

I'm a big fan of Bravo Restaurant (Tourism Rd; @bravosiargao), right by the beach. The tacos and ceviche at CEV: Ceviche & Kinilaw Shack (@cevsiargao) are staples, while my own place, Rasa (General Luna Rd; @rasa. siargao), serves halal Malaysian comfort food like nasi lemak and sambal-grilled fish – rare finds on the island.

I'm soon opening Raket, the first badminton lifestyle space in Siargao. Located right next to Rasa, Raket will also be home to Rasa Kitchen and The Juice Shack — a self-serve juicery and juice bar. It's a space built around food, play and community, and we're hoping it brings people together the same way Siargao always has.

You can enjoy a game of badminton, sip on fresh juices and tuck into your Malaysian favourites all in one place. I'm really excited – and I hope you guys can visit us soon!

Stay on Tourism Road for a bit of shopping. I love visiting **The Concept Store** (@theconceptstore.ph), where you'll find locally made, curated tees, bags and island-inspired jewellery with an elevated design sensibility.

Nearby, Côte Femme (femmecote.com) carries elegant and sustainable linen. If you're on the hunt for holiday mementoes, there are charming souvenir stalls around General Luna. I also recommend Komunidad Siargao (@komunidadsiargao), a community workshop and store selling island-made crafts.

The Philippines is often thought of as just beaches and surf. But what truly stays with you are the people – their warmth, humour and resilience. Arrive with an open heart, and the country will open its heart to you.

"In 2020, when many Malaysians couldn't return home, over 300 of us gathered for National Day, sharing nasi lemak, char kway teow and teh tarik. As we sang "Negaraku", memories of home filled the air," recalls Isaac, who was named one of TNL's (The News Lens) "Future Icons" in 2023.

Today, MIT collaborates with Taiwanese companies to create jobs and host career workshops. Isaac says, "Together with MyHeart, we connect Malaysians abroad and build a global, empowered community."

Through MyHeart, associations like MBC and MIT don't just bring Malaysians abroad together, they become part of a larger movement. By collaborating on outreach initiatives. ioint events and cross-border programmes, they showcase Malaysian talent and amplify their impact, ensuring that Malaysians everywhere can contribute their knowledge, expertise and resources back to the nation.

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


A PERFECT WEEKEND IN-

From colonial-era landmarks and Unesco-listed architecture to bustling markets, sacred temples, hip cafés and fine dining – plus the favourite Gujarati snack of Asia's richest man – here's how to explore Maharashtra's capital





India's financial capital has evolved from a Koli fishing village into a restless megalopolis, shaped by centuries of colonisation.

Under the Portuguese, its seven islands were called "Bombay" – from Bom Bahia (Good Bay). In 1661, Bombay was passed to the British as part of Princess Catherine of Braganza's dowry to King Charles II. Renamed Mumbai in 1995 after Mumba Aai (mother), the patron goddess of fishermen, the city remains deeply rooted in its Marathi heritage.

Extensive 19th- and 20th-century reclamation transformed the fortified trading post into a textile hub and India's first city, home to the world's second-largest collection of Art Deco buildings after Miami. To understand its energy, weave through its bylanes, markets, shrines, monuments and thriving food scene.

Day 1 SoBo Icons

Morning. Start in SoBo (South Bombay) - comprising the genteel enclaves of Colaba, Malabar Hill and Cuffe Parade. Have breakfast at Kala Ghoda Café (10Rope Walk Ln; kgcafe.in) before taking a one-hour boat ride from Apollo Bandar to Elephanta Island to explore its rock-cut Shiva temple.

Back on shore, visit the Gateway of India - an arch monument built for King George V and Queen Mary in 1911, and (ironically) the exit point for British troops in 1948 – then step into the legendary Taj Mahal Palace (Apollo Bandar; tajhotels.com), built by JN Tata after being turned away from a "whitesonly" hotel.

Afternoon. Grab a Continental lunch at Leopold Café (Colaba Causeway; @leopoldcafemumbai), a Mumbai institution immortalised in Shantaram, the 2003 best-selling novel by Gregory David Roberts. Next door is Irani-owned Café Mondegar (@cafemondegar) with Mario Miranda murals and a jukebox.

Post lunch, browse Indian antiquities at Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj Vastu Sangrahalaya (159–161 Mahatma Gandhi Rd; csmvs.in) or visit other nearby art spaces such as the National Gallery of Modern Art, Jehangir Nicholson Art Foundation and Jehangir Art Gallery.

Book lovers should stop at Kitab Khana (47 Mahatma Gandhi Rd; kitabkhana. online) before walking along Oval Maidan, flanked by Victorian Neo-Gothic buildings, as well as Marine

Drive's Art Deco promenade – a Unesco World Heritage site.

End at **Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj Terminus**, a Victorian Gothic railway marvel – some say it's the greatest train station ever built by the British – with its own heritage museum.

Evening. Feeling peckish? Bombay Sweet Shop & Café (Seksaria Chambers; bombaysweetshop.com) in Kala Ghoda serves elevated Indian sweets and snacks – think kulcha Margarita, mango-passion fruit pani puri, avocado papdi chaat, tiramisu rasgulla and gulab jamun churros.

Grab a drink at **Colaba Social** (B K Boman Behram Marg; socialoffline.in) or **The Table** (Kalapesi Trust Building; foodmatters.in), Gauri Devidayal and Jay Yousuf's spot for 'Frisco-style global fare.

The coast gives Mumbai the freshest seafood, best savoured at **Trishna** (Sai Baba Mandir Marg; @trishnamumbai), a Mangalorean restaurant that has served presidents and Bollywood stars.

Friendly stewards entice you with live crabs (sold by weight) to convince you to try their signature butter garlic pepper crab.


Day 2 Temple run

Morning. Fascinated by temples? Start at Shree Siddhivinayak Temple (SK Bole Rd; siddhivinayak.org), dedicated to the wish-fulfilling Lord Ganesha. Visit at dawn on weekdays to escape the rush. Next, make your way to Mahalakshmi Temple (Bhulabhai Desai Marg; mahalakshmi-temple.com), which honours the goddess of wealth and prosperity, along an alley lined with flower stalls. Finally, head to Babulnath Temple (16 Babulnath Rd; babulnath.com) known for its ornate carvings.

Near Chowpatty Beach, Mani Bhavan (19 Laburnum Rd; mkgandhi.org/museum/mumbai.php) was Gandhi's Mumbai base from 1917 to 1934, with historic photos and a letter to Hitler. Nearby, Swati Snacks (Karai Estate, 248 Tardeo Rd; swatisnacks.com) serves Gujarati favourites like panki (steamed pancake made of rice flour and yogurt in banana leaf), a Sunday favourite of business tycoon Mukesh Ambani, the richest person in Asia.

Afternoon. The often-overlooked Dr Bhau Daji Lad Museum (Rani Baug; bdlmuseum.org), once known as the Victoria and Albert Museum, chronicles Bombay's evolution through lithographs, documents and models.








Nearby, Nine Fish Art Gallery (TheNew Great Eastern Mills; ninefish. in) occupies a 177-year-old textile mill while The Bombay Canteen (Kamala Mills; thebombaycanteen. com) in Lower Parel serves inventive twists on regional dishes like sea bass sev puri and thepla tacos.

Evening. Go for a sunset stroll along Marine Drive, often referred to as the Queen's Necklace, the iconic crescentshaped promenade along the Arabian Sea or skip the crowds to explore 47-A Art Gallery (Khotachi Wadi, @47a. design) for design-led exhibitions blending art, craft and contemporary culture (it closes at 7pm).

Treat yourself at Masque (Shree Laxmi Woollen Mills; masquerestaurant. com) with its 10-course tasting menu showcasing locally foraged, seasonal produce. At 6,500 rupees (US\$74) per head, it's worth the splurge.

Day 3 Bandra and beyond

Morning. Get your caffeine fix and breakfast at Subko Cacao (subko. coffee) at Mary Lodge on Chapel Road in Bandra. Then, visit Sanjay Gandhi National Park (sgnp.maharashtra.gov.in), an hour's drive from Bandra to Borivali, and take an AC bus from the park gate to Kanheri Caves (closed on Mondays), a rock-cut Buddhist cave complex with 2,000-year-old sculptures.









Afternoon. Hit Bandra Kurla
Complex (BKC) – Mumbai's central
business district – for lunch. O Pedro
(opedromumbai.com) serves GoanPortuguese dishes like custard tarts,
choriz pulao (rice) and sourdough poee
(bread). Then, check out Art House at the

Nita Mukesh Ambani Cultural Centre. You can also sign up for a three-hour guided Bombay Express Street Food Tour (achefstour.com), which includes over 15 tastings and a local train ride from Churchgate at 3.30pm.

Evening. Bandra Born (Rose Minar, 87 Chapel Road; @bandraborn), by chef Gresham Fernandes, serves small plates of nostalgia. Order the Kamina Karpaccio and the posh Hearsch puff, both nods to the iconic Hearsch Bakery. Take the Bandra–Worli Sea Link back to SoBo to end a whirlwind three-day tour.

If you're up for a late-night jaunt, take a Victoria. Not the vintage horse-drawn carriages (which were banned in 2015) but an e-Victoria sans the horse. **Khaki Tours** (*khakitours.com*) will take you around heritage spots by e-carriage, giving you a taste of both old and new Mumbai.





Where Beijing projects political weight and Shanghai hums with financial speed, Chengdu takes its time. Its defining reputation is for its liveability - a city that protects leisure as carefully as it builds infrastructure.

That priority comes into focus at Heming Teahouse, a century-old institution within the 11ha People's Park downtown. Beneath pagodas and towering trees, tables stretch endlessly, packed with families, retirees and mahjong players whose tiles clack in a steady rhythm.

"Here, quality of life is valued more. People prefer to prioritise rest over stressful long hours at work," says my taxi driver, a stocky Tibetan man in his mid-40s, before dropping me off. A lake glimmers, koi fish surfacing occasionally as if on cue. I order yellow bud tea on the recommendation of a waitress who has worked here for decades. It is indeed delicious.

Later, I come across a classic Chinese opera in another courtyard nearby, where masked figures perform on stage in a burst of colours. A young waitress, dressed in turquoise traditional attire, seats me outside and recommends the flower tea. The natural beauty and relaxed tea culture create a genuinely peaceful

Leaving the park behind, I head to Taikoo Li, an open-air shopping complex lined with outposts of European luxury brands. The polished glass façades and immaculate walkways could belong to any global city, but at its centre stands Daci Temple, more than 1,600 years old. Here, incense curls through the air, its presence threading an ancient rhythm into the sleek commercial heart of modern Chengdu.

Inside the grounds, sunlight falls through the trees, catching the smooth stone of a floral courtyard worn down by centuries of footsteps. Within the temple's walls, a small Sichuan restaurant operates almost unnoticed, its wooden beams weathered and its tables simple yet inviting. At the counter, a smiling elderly woman serves me a basket of baozi - steamed buns filled with fragrant vegetables. I sit beneath an umbrella while locals gather at nearby tables, sipping tea and laughing softly. The scene feels timeless, like stepping into a painting.

This habit of lingering extends to Chengdu's younger quarters as well. On Yulin Road, immortalised in Zhao Lei's 2016 song "Chengdu", taverns spill out onto the streets, murals brighten the walls and shops brim with curiosities. At Oasis, a gallery-like boutique, the owner, Blue, shrugs when I ask about prices. "Nothing has a tag," she explains. "Customers decide what to pay. Everyone is relaxed here." Her philosophy is echoed in the items on display – a Native American doll beside a Catholic icon, artefacts pulled from different worlds but set down easily side by side.

IF THE FIRST IMPRESSION OF CHENGDU IS LEISURE,

the second is reinvention – the city has a talent for reshaping what it inherits. The clearest example is

Eastern Suburb Memory, a former industrial site that has become one of Chengdu's most dynamic cultural hubs.

Warehouses once filled with heavy machinery now host live music venues, design studios and cafés. Murals creep across brick walls, while young artists unpack canvases under converted skylights. The atmosphere is laid-back by day, electric by night – proof of Chengdu's ability to turn industry into art.

By midday, I arrive at Tianfu Art Park, an immense new cultural complex with three museums, including the hibiscus-shaped Chengdu Art Museum, which recently hosted an exhibition of works by the artist Su Xinping—including his iconic *Walking Man* sculptures which still stand outside the building.

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


Within Tianfu Art Park are two more museums, and exhibitions range from cutting-edge installations to works celebrating Sichuan's artistic lineage. Families wander across broad lawns, students sketch by the water, elderly couples stroll quietly. It is ambitious yet intimate - a park that makes culture part of daily life rather than a distant pursuit.

By evening, I find myself by the Jin River at Anshun Bridge. Marco Polo once stated that it was "one of the most impressive bridges in China." As I stand before it now, I can understand the explorer's heavy praise.

Anshun Bridge is hardly colossal, yet its grandeur is revealed through the richness of its details. Intricate carvings of plum, orchid and bamboo adorn the railings, while emerald-green tiles and vermilion-red walls combine to create a scene that radiates the spirit of China. As darkness falls, the bridge glows with warm amber lights - yet another example of Chengdu's unique ability to turn historic sites into modern spectacles.

Anshun literally translates to "peace and smoothness", a feeling that is unmistakable as I watch the now-lit-up river boats sail underneath. Along the picturesque riverbank, bars and restaurants line the water. I take a stroll in search of the ideal spot to relax and observe Anshun in all its glory.

There is a slightly livelier vibe around the bridge, though not to the point of being overwhelming. A gentle hum of chatter drifts from nearby groups, accompanied by the occasional clinking of glasses. I spot various couples and families relaxing by the river – some enjoying a drink, others lining up to take one of the frequent boat tours.

Eventually, I find the perfect seat. Situated right next to the river, I have a stunning view of Anshun Bridge in all its splendour.

Taking a sip of a smooth whisky sour, I can't help but appreciate how Chengdu manages to maintain such a rich history with modern flavour. The following morning, in the CPI district, minimalist lakeside cafés offer one last perspective. When a light rain begins to patter against a glass roof, the entire district feels suspended in time. Leisure here is not an indulgence but the very rhythm of Chengdu's daily life.



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
London's



This month, as the British capital unveils the grand opening of the David Bowie Centre, we trace the city's musical heritage that shaped the rock star and countless other icons








"Everyone's in Brixton, there's a street party," came the call.

On a cold January day, David Bowie had just passed. Without hesitation, I jumped on a bus to the south London town where my hero, Ziggy Stardust, Aladdin Sane, The Thin White Duke, aka David Bowie, was born and raised. I was met by thousands of other fans having sing-alongs, bonding in an outpouring of communal love, grief, joy and loss in the square outside the local cinema, which had changed its sign to read: "David Bowie, Our Brixton Boy. RIP." He didn't have a funeral, but we held our own. It felt cathartic to celebrate the otherworldly genius who had released his 26th studio album just months earlier, on his 69th birthday.

Now, nine years later, the illustrious Victoria and Albert Museum, an institute that's the epitome of multifaceted creativity, is opening up David Bowie's

personal archives, a colossal collection donated to the V&A and housed at their new East Storehouse in Stratford.

Madeleine Haddon, curator at V&A East explains, "Bowie embodied a truly multidisciplinary practice musician, actor, writer, performer and cultural icon - reflecting the way many young creatives today move fluidly across disciplines and reject singular definitions of identity or artistry. For Bowie fans and those discovering him for the first time, we hope the centre can inspire the next generation of creatives."

I can't help but wonder - could such an artist have come from any other city? Through the ages, London has been centrifugal to musical talent, with worldfamous events, streets and venues pumping out scene after scene of cutting-edge genres.

I covered this legacy and how it lives on today in my new book, An Opinionated Guide to Music London (published in September by Hoxton Mini Press), selecting over 50 sites of importance in the capital. Whittling them down to a manageable few was a challenge, but if you have a few days for a musical pilgrimage across the city, we've got you covered.

We must start with the David Bowie Centre, which opened on 13 September at V&A East Storehouse. The exciting public-access archive is a must for all culture vultures - a collection of over 90,000 artefacts spanning the diversity of Bowie's interests and influences, his output and inspirations.

Legendary musician and Bowie collaborator Nile Rodgers has selected treasures for the inaugural exhibition, including the suit worn by Bowie during the Serious Moonlight tour for the Let's Dance album; photographs by Chuck Pulin of Bowie, Rodgers and guitarist Stevie Ray Vaughan working on the recording of Let's Dance in New York; and personal letters between Bowie and Rodgers from 1993.

To visit the David Bowie Centre, book a ticket in advance. Mega fans can also book one-to-one sessions with archivists to request viewing up to five objects

from the vast collection, which includes costumes, instruments, awards, notebooks, diaries, letters and much more.

From Stratford, take the Tube to north London to visit Abbey Road, home to the internationally renowned recording studios and one very famous zebra crossing – this one's for The Beatles fans.

Originally from Liverpool, the band put this address in the history books when they named their 11th studio album after the street, with a photo of the "Fab Four" walking over said crossing on the cover.

Some visitors recreate the scene (while being careful of traffic), but it's the studios that hold the real history, as the site where, over the course of seven years, more than 200 songs forming 12 albums were produced.

You don't have to be Beatle-mad to enjoy this place though; acts like Adele, Amy Winehouse and Oasis have also recorded here. It's a fun place to visit; you can leave your mark on the studio's graffiti wall and peruse the gift store for merchandise.

Next, head down to Mayfair to visit the elegant Handel Hendrix House that's dedicated to the lives and works of two very different geniuses: baroque composer George Frideric Handel and rock icon Jimi Hendrix, who lived at 25 and 23 Brook Street respectively, over two centuries apart.

A ticket gives you access to both houses, which couldn't be more different in décor, yet both give you a sense of the musicians who once lived there and the colossal impact they made on their respective music scenes. Visit Hendrix's house on a Friday lunchtime to experience live guitar performances adding another dimension







London's best record shops

Reckless Records, Soho

Established in 1984, Reckless has survived the highs and lows of vinyl's popularity for over 40 years and is a trusted treasure trove for collectors, selling rare LPs of every genre imaginable. 30 Berwick St; reckless.co.uk

Owned by the Soul Jazz Records label, this eclectic store has been specialising in rare grooves and multinational music since the 1990s and is still thriving today. 7 Broadwick St; soundsoftheuniverse.com to the ambience, or Handel's house on Saturdays for classical pianists doing the same.

Spend the following day in London's West End, starting your endeavours at Denmark Street, just off Charing Cross Road.

Known in the 1960s for its swathe of music industry offices, the likes of David Bowie, The Rolling Stones and mod godfathers The Kinks would hang out in the cafés of this iconic address.

Nowadays, it's lined with instrument shops selling just about any musical equipment you can imagine. Hank's Guitar Shop, Rose-Morris and Wunjo Guitars, to name just a few, are staffed by technicians who can help you browse new and vintage equipment.

The heritage is brought alive by gig venues like The Lower Third and record stores such as Rough Trade, which recently opened on this prestigious street that's truly back in fashion.

A short walk up to Oxford Street leads you to the 100 Club, whose walls have certainly seen some action since it opened in October 1942.

From jazz icons like Louis Armstrong playing here in the 1950s to its rebirth as a key venue in the punk scene of the 1970s, the 100 Club has seen it all.

Photos of past performances line the walls, with bands like The Who and The Clash captured in full swing. Over 80 years into its story, the 100 Club remains relevant in the 21st century, hosting early Libertines gigs and secret shows from the likes of Green Day.

If you're a savvy planner, book yourself a show at the Southbank Centre; this complex, perched on the Thames, is an unmissable destination.

The sprawling site includes the Royal Festival Hall - its largest space - as well as sister venues the Queen Elizabeth Hall and the Purcell Room.

A City Written in Tea and Spice, Chengdu



Time moves a little differently in Chengdu. There's a phrase that the locals love "bā shì dé hěn", which loosely translates as "life is very comfortable". And despite having grown into a metropolis of over 21 million inhabitants, Chengdu has somehow refused to rush.

Perhaps this is why teahouses remain the heartbeat of the city, where an afternoon can slip by without anyone noticing. At Heming Teahouse, a century-old institution in People's Park, the choices are simple but satisfying. Tea harvested from nearby Mount Emei are paired with refreshing desserts, where you are welcome to slide into a bamboo armchair and take your time. In the background, mahjong tiles clack in a steady rhythm, as if keeping time for a city that is in no rush to move forward.

For over 2,000 years, the city has remained in the same location and held the same name, a feat only a few places in the world can claim. Once the heart of the ancient Shu Kingdom, Chengdu was also a vital departure point along the Southern

Silk Road. Today, history continues to live in the kitchens and streets, shaping how Chengdu eats, drinks and celebrates daily life.

In Chengdu, food is never far. The air carries the prickle of Sichuan peppercorns, drifting from kitchens and alleyways, greeting you with the city's most irresistible calling card: a delightful scent. Whether it's a nest of cold Dan Dan noodles placed on a hot and numbing chilli-oil base topped with minced meat and scallions or a simmering hotpot with paper-thin beef, fiery remains the flavour of choice.

While these flavours can be found almost everywhere, **Kuanzhai Alley** is where they all come together. One of the largest surviving streets from the Qing dynasty, it is now buzzing with teahouses, noodle stalls and dumpling shops. Nearby, **Jinli Ancient Street** adds its own chorus of snacks, from dried sweet persimmons to san da pao – sweet, sticky rice tossed and rolled before being coated in soybean flour and finished with molasses syrup.





Beyond its flavours, Chengdu is also equally defined by its icons. Just half an hour away from the city centre lies the **Chengdu Research Base of Giant Panda Breeding**, offering you a chance to watch China's most beloved animals in their natural habitat.

Back in the city, catch the legendary bian lian performance in **Jinjiang Theatre**. In a swift motion, masks change colour and expression before your eyes, a dazzling illusion that reflects Chengdu's flair for surprise and drama.



In less time than a leisurely lunch, the high-speed rail can transport you from the heart of Chengdu to the feet of the **Leshan Giant Buddha**. Carved into the cliff face of red sandstone during the Tang dynasty, this 71-metre-tall UNESCO World Heritage site sits at the meeting of three rivers. Seeing it up close, you can feel the craftsmanship that continues to define this region, and a reminder that time here is not measured in speed, but in depth.
