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
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Neighbourhood guide: Kuching

The capital city of Sarawak boasts lively lanes, vintage corners and modern attractions that make for a satisfying visit



1 The Marian Boutique **Lodging House**

Perched atop a hill in the city centre, this 1885 colonial bungalow overlooks Kuching's oldest and liveliest streets. The former girls' boarding school now offers a range of rooms including family options and a two-bedroom apartment - within a church compound beside the heritage-listed Bishop's House. Bonus: the adjoining

Kantin at The Granary, a large dining hall in a restored warehouse. serves up delicious bites. 25 & 27 Wayang St; themarian.com.my

2 Borneo Cultures Museum

With a striking façade inspired by Sarawak's traditional crafts. Malaysia's largest museum - and the second largest in Southeast Asia - offers

a fitting prelude to the state's history and indigenous cultures. Expect interactive exhibits, dioramas and immersive installations - including a children's section where kids can learn about recycling, create a trash monster on an interactive screen or play a drum set made from reused materials. © Commons Café & Restaurant

Located in the Old Court House opposite the Kuching Waterfront, this chic eatery is perfect for a meal, coffee and a side of history. Commissioned by Charles Brooke in 1868 and completed in 1874, the Old Court House served as Sarawak's administrative heart for over a century. Jln Tun Abang Haji Openg; @commons_byfj

4 Main Bazaar

Looking for souvenirs? Head to Main Bazaar, Kuching's oldest street and your one-stop hub for charming trinkets, Sarawak keepsakes and treats like the famous kek lapis (layered cake). Once the heart of Kuching's trade scene, this riverside row of wooden shophouses is a must-visit for every traveller in town. Jln Main Bazaar

6 Carpenter Street

Originally called "Attap Street" due to the thatched



roofs of its buildings, Carpenter Street is famous for its 19th-century shophouses and named for the carpenters who built businesses in the area.

Visit the Hiang Thian Siang Ti Temple, then stroll past Chinese apothecaries, jewellery stores, quaint cafés and rustic bars. For tasty local Chinese fare, stop by Lau Ya Keng food court for kueh chap, kolok mee, dumplings, porridge and more. *Carpenter St*

6 Kuching Waterfront

No trip to downtown Kuching would be complete without a leisurely stroll by the Sarawak River, with scenic views of the Darul Hana Bridge, The Astana, Fort Margherita, The Square Tower and more.

Enjoy street shows, local crafts and tasty snacks along the lively promenade. Pop into the nearby Chinese Museum for a quick cultural break or relax while the kids play outside. Check out the cat statues along the Waterfront – and for stunning riverbank views, hop on a daytime or evening cruise, which also offer dining packages. 7

7 Fort Margherita

Built in 1879 by the second White Rajah, Sir Charles Brooke, Fort Margherita – named after his wife, Margaret – was modelled after an English castle. It now houses the Brooke Gallery, which traces Sarawak's history under the White Rajahs through personal artifacts, documents and more. Reach it via a walk across the Darul Hana Bridge or a quick tambang boat ride from the Waterfront. **Petra Jaya**

13 The Junk

Launched in the early 2000s, The Junk quickly became Kuching's go-to spot for date nights and celebrations, thanks to its rustic charm, antique décor and hearty portions. It has since evolved into a multi-space venue: cosy dining rooms, a karaoke lounge, the lively Junk Bar and Backstage, where DJs

and live acts keep the party going late into the night. 80 Wayang St; @thejunkkch

The Other Side

This speakeasy is perfect for a quiet night out.



"Kuih is a test of your patience,"

says Dinesh Rao, a professional cake and kuih maker whose trays of traditional treats regularly sell out within hours on Instagram. "Kuih lapis (layered cake) takes two hours to prepare and steam. It needs to rest at room temperature - no fridge, no fan, definitely no freezer. I wasn't very good at being patient in the beginning," he laughs.

There's a reason this beloved bite-sized dessert demands such precision and time. Made from rice flour, coconut milk, pandan water and sugar, kuih lapis typically features eight to nine layers, each one steamed on top of the last in the same tray. Every portion of batter is weighed to ensure consistency - a slight misstep and the whole cake loses its delicate uniformity.

Over generations, the recipe was adapted by various communities, including the Malays and Peranakans, resulting in different techniques and colour palettes - but always with a shared emphasis on texture, patience and presentation.

Today, kuih lapis is seen as both a festive treat and a nostalgic comfort food, often found at markets, celebrations and family gatherings.

Rao took up kuih-making during the Covid-19 lockdown and quickly found his rhythm. His creations painstakingly layered and visually striking - drew attention online. While the classic Peranakan-style version features bands of pink and white, topped with a red or orange cap, Rao began experimenting with colour.

"I didn't want to change the flavour or texture," he explains. "But I knew if it looked pretty, people would be curious." His first variation was a subtle ombré, followed by a whimsical pastel-hued "unicorn" kuih and eventually a bold rainbow version – each one a nod to his modern take on a traditional form.

Despite his visual reinvention, Rao stays faithful to traditional ways of eating kuih lapis. "Some people use a fork," he says, "but I still prefer peeling it layer by layer with my fingers. That's how I learned as a kid. That's still the fun part." @myasiankitchen

Why kuih lapis is so hard to get right

"The most challenging parts are the temperature and the timing," Rao says. "Oversteam it and the texture changes. Under-steam it and the layers won't peel cleanly." He recalls tossing out entire trays when batches were underdone by 30 seconds – something you only discover after cutting.

- 1 Mix rice flour and water into a paste, then let it rest for 40-60 minutes to bloom.
- 2 Boil pandan leaves in sugared water, strain, then combine with rice flour paste.
- 3 Stir in coconut milk, strain and divide into nine portions. Colour some red or pink, leaving others white.
- 4 Grease and preheat a metal tin. Steam each layer one at a time, starting with three minutes for the first, increasing slightly as layers build.
- **5** After the ninth layer, cover with cling film and cool at room temperature for several hours.
- **6** Slice with a plastic or oiled knife for clean edges.

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

East of paradise

When in Bali, escape to the laidback shores of Sanur BY CLAIRE KNOX

Developed in the late 1960s, the former

fishing village of Sanur, about half an hour's drive from the airport in Denpasar, was the first high-end resort town in Bali, frequented by rock stars and the global jet set. Mick Jagger married Jerry Hall here, while David Bowie, Yoko Ono and Marianne Faithfull were regulars. Over time, as other enclaves rose to prominence, Sanur receded from the spotlight.

Now a medley of sleek resorts and locally run boutique hotels, cafés and excellent eateries (plus a snazzy new



up shop, drawing people keen to escape the hubbub of the heaving lower west coast. Andaz Bali, by Hyatt is part of this new wave, offering a striking blend of contemporary design and traditional Balinese village charm, complete with landscaped courtyards, winding pathways flanked by lilies and towering Banyan trees, vast gardens (linked to its impressive sister resort, the Hyatt Regency) and breezy open-air pavilions inspired by local kampungs.

Designed by Tierra Design and Spin Studio, the resort's aesthetic is a masterclass in understated tropical modernism. Think locally sourced teak, plaited bamboo, lava stone, handwoven ikat fabrics and an earthy palette that lets the lush jungle landscaping do most of the talking. Rooms and suites - there are 149 of them - are spread across low-rise clusters, all generous in size and infused with cultural cues.

Among the resort's highlights is its dining precinct - a cluster of culinary pavilions arranged around a central square - a nod to Bali's communitystyle banjars (local councils). Village Square, the hotel's main dining hub, brings together Wok Wok (local Indonesian dishes), Fire Fox (a wood-fired grill), Deli & Bakery and Blue Oven (Mediterranean cuisine), each with its own open kitchen and unique design. Unwind at the mellow beachfront Fisherman's Club and devour wonderfully fresh grilled seafood, melt-in-the-mouth sashimi and moreish

cocktails served feet-in-sand and accompanied by dreamy sunset hues.

The property is a great base for families, thanks in part to the Kemu Mai Kids Club - a playful, woven-treehouse space that offers fun and fascinating cultural activities such as kite-making, Balinese dance classes and tie-dye workshops. Nature lovers will also love releasing turtle hatchlings back into the wild at the resort's impressive Turtle Conservation Centre.

Despite its tranquil setting, Andaz Bali hums with quiet energy and local spirit. There's a genuine emphasis on cultural immersion, from the complimentary sunrise yoga classes to workshops on traditional crafts such as lontar (palm-leaf manuscript) writing. And with Sanur emerging as a serene but stylish alternative to Bali's overtouristed hubs, Andaz is setting a new standard for a modern tropical escape. hyatt.com

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

Where to get your Asian food fix in **London** BY DELLE CHAN

It's a few days into your holiday in

the British capital and your palate is screaming for a taste of home. Here's where to go if you're craving...

Modern Malaysian

Granted, Lower Clapton in East London is rather out of the way for the average tourist. However, it's well worth the trek for Mambow, which serves up some of the best modern Malavsian food in town. The restaurant describes its vibe as "Malaysian heat and refreshing drinks" - accordingly, diners can pair dishes such as *otak-otak* prawn toast (red curry and kaffir lime leaf prawns on wild betel leaf), umai (Sarawak-style cured fish) and grilled skate stuffed with sambal and wrapped in banana leaf with a drink of their choice. The menu changes regularly but stays rooted in chef Abby Lee's Malaysian upbringing, with a

dash of European culinary influence.

Classic Filipino

True to its name, Kasa and Kin is all about hearty, homey fare best enjoyed with family and friends. A café and bakery by day, it transforms into a full-fledged restaurant in the evening, with both classic and contemporary Filipino dishes on the menu. The grilled lemongrass chicken *inasal* is prepared in the traditional Visayan style, while the confit duck adobo - duck leg and breast served with a rich sauce of vinegar, soy, garlic and bay leaf - is a modern take on Northern Luzon's adobong pato. Pair your chosen main with some bagoong (shrimp paste) fried rice for extra oomph. 52-53 Poland St; kasaandkin. co.uk

Street Thai

Helmed by British chef Luke Farrell, who spent nearly 18 years in Thailand, Speedboat Bar is a fun, flamboyant restaurant that pays homage to the latenight stalls of Bangkok's Chinatown. The vibe is certainly reminiscent of a Yaowarat Road diner, from the strip lights and stainless-steel tables right down to the laminated menus. Likewise, the food celebrates the big, bold flavours of Bangkok's street food scene, complete with Thai herbs and spices that Farrell dutifully grows in a nursery in Dorset. Menu highlights include the deep-fried chicken skins, dusted with a delightful umami seasoning, and the pad kra pow (minced beef with holy basil) - best enjoyed with a bowl of steaming white rice, of course. 30 Rupert St; speedboatbar.co.uk

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A Malaysian in... **Ho Chi Minh City**

Melvin Fernando shares his favourite finds in a place full of surprises, from capybara cafés to speakeasies BY ANANDHI GOPINATH



I grew up in the heart of

Kuala Lumpur, so I'm used to the traffic and bustle, and having vour favourite mamak never more than five minutes away. I went to secondary school at St John's Institution, a place that gave me solid grounding, lifelong friends and more than a few tales to tell. After studying in Sydney for a master's degree in marketing, I thought I'd return home after graduation. Instead, life had other plans. I was offered a teaching role at RMIT University in Vietnam's Ho Chi Minh City and 17 years later, I'm still here - now with my wife, Linh, and our two kids, Melody and Oliver.

What made me stay was the momentum of things. One opportunity led to another, and I found purpose in helping students bridge the gap between the classroom and the working world. Ho Chi Minh City (or Saigon, as many still affectionately call it) felt like it welcomed me in, and it still does. It's chaotic, vibrant and endlessly surprising, and I wouldn't have it any other way.

One of the best ways to experience the city? Hop on the back of a bike for a tour through alleyways, past homes, street stalls, and even tiny barbershops tucked into corners.

Foodie paradise

Ho Chi Minh City has a kind of energy that's hard to explain unless you're in it. Scooters fly past you in perfect choreography while food stalls tucked in narrow alleys serve some of the best meals you'll ever have. Vietnamese cuisine is packed with flavour and heart. Dining at Cuc Gach Quan (10 Dang Tat, Tan Dinh, District 1; cucgachquan. com), for example, feels like having a meal at someone's house. Must-try dishes include bun thit nuong (grilled meat on rice noodles and vegetables), ca kho to (claypot fish) and a good old bowl of pho ga (chicken soup).

For the best banh mi, nothing beats Banh Mi Huynh Hoa (26 Le Thi Rieng, District 1; banhmihuynhhoa.vn). If you're





in the mood for something upscale, try Anan Saigon (89 Ton That Dam, District 1; anansaigon.com), located in the historic Cho Cu market. Their Saigon Tasting Menu takes you on a culinary journey from North to South Vietnam with local ingredients and French techniques.

For visiting Malaysians who are feeling homesick, Banana Leaf Saigon (46/6 Pham Hong Thai, District 1; bananaleafsaigon.vn) is my fix. The nasi lemak reminds me of my Sundays in KL, and their roti canai hits the spot. I've even converted

some Vietnamese friends, who are now rendang fans.

Coffee is a ritual here. For meetings, I usually go to The Workshop (27 Ngo Duc Ke, District 1; @theworkshopcoffee). But for a proper Vietnamese experience, nothing beats ca phe sua da (iced milk coffee) which you can find anywhere. On a hot day, it's like drinking melted coffee ice cream. If you're feeling adventurous, try Little Hanoi Egg Coffee (multiple locations; littlehanoieggcoffee.vn).


Shop, stroll, repeat


Unlike the mall-heavy landscape back home, boutique and concept stores are big here. L'Usine (multiple locations; lusinespace.com) blends fashion and coffee culture and Metiseko (101 Dong Khoi, District 1; metiseko.com) offers beautifully made, sustainable fashion with a Vietnamese soul. For something cooler, The New Playground (26 Ly Tu Trong; District 1; @thenewplayground) is a treasure box of local streetwear and independent designers.

When guests want souvenirs, I take them to Saigon Kitsch (43 Ton That Thiep, District I; @saigonkitsch_shop) or Mai Home (Thu Duc City, District 2; maihomedecor.com) for artisanal lacquerware and textiles.

Family time, anytime

With kids, we've discovered plenty of family-friendly spots in the city. Snow Town (125 Dong Van Cong, Thanh My Loi, District 2; snowtownsaigon. com) is a fun, faux winter wonderland and indoor playground. tiNiWorld (multiple locations; tinicorp.com) is another favourite. Kapi Café (36 Thao Dien; @kapicafe.vn) has got capybaras, so enough said. For green space and fresh air, we head to Crescent Lake Park (Phu My Hung, District 7) - it's perfect for picnics or just letting the kids run wild.

"We don't have to lose our identity just to fit in," she adds.

As president of the Malaysian Student Association, Chiau champions inclusivity across diverse cultures and campuses. "Leadership isn't just about giving direction - it's about empowering others, bridging differences and turning challenges into opportunities," she says.

For this MARA scholar. leadership begins with integrity. "A good leader lifts others up, not commands them," he says. Reflecting on his Cherita Kita episode, he shares how studying abroad broadened his perspective and revealed new ways of doing things he wouldn't have discovered within his comfort zone.

was transformative for this economics student, offering a fresh perspective on his experiences. "Sharing my struggles with the realities of 'adulting' - learning to budget and cook, feeling homesick during Raya made me realise how far I've come. ASEAN leadership in action

As Chair of the Association of Southeast Asian Nations in 2025, Malaysia proves that diplomacy and dialogue can be used to strengthen regional unity and defuse tensions

When tensions escalated along the Thai–Cambodian border recently, Malaysia, in its capacity as ASEAN Chair, convened emergency talks and brokered an immediate ceasefire – reaffirming how Southeast Asia's future must be shaped from within.

This was not an isolated moment. It reflected a deeper, deliberate strategy.

Turning principles into action

ASEAN's foundational documents – the Charter and the Treaty of Amity and Cooperation – speak clearly: regional peace, stability and non-interference are not slogans but structural commitments. Malaysia's leadership in 2025 has underscored this.

Prime Minister Dato' Seri Anwar Ibrahim's direct involvement in calming cross-border tensions shows how diplomacy can work swiftly when guided by trust and regional ownership.

At the same time, Foreign Minister Dato' Seri Utama Haji Mohamad bin Haji Hasan has remained steadfast in pushing for progress to end the conflict in Myanmar through ASEAN's Five-Point Consensus, reinforcing the organisation's focus on dialogue and reconciliation.

A model of regional ownership

At a time when global powers often project influence onto Southeast Asia, ASEAN's approach offers a different path – one defined by consensus, not coercion. This model does not claim to be quick or easy,

but it is sustainable. It relies on the strength of shared purpose rather than external pressure.


Malaysia's chairmanship has reinvigorated this idea. Rather than relying on outside arbitration, ASEAN is demonstrating that solutions can be regionally led, supported and collectively enforced.

A more credible ASEAN centrality

As ASEAN navigates an increasingly complex geopolitical landscape, its relevance will hinge on its ability to act – not just speak – on behalf of its members. Malaysia's 2025 term as Chair is demonstrating that ASEAN centrality is more than a diplomatic phrase. It is a working strategy for stability, built on trust, credibility and regional leadership.

Peace in Southeast Asia has always been a shared goal. Through Malaysia's stewardship, it is once again becoming a shared achievement.

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


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


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Whether you're exploring its vibrant riverside promenades, cycling along nature trails or hopping on a CityCat ferry for a night out at Howard Smith Wharves, going with the flow in Queensland's sunny capital will reward you with unforgettable thrills. But if your travel wish list includes communing with nature - and cuddling a koala or two we've got you covered too. Here's how to pack it all in over a weekend in Brissy and beyond.

Friday

Morning. Make an early start for South Bank Parklands where a "mini rainforest" simulates the biodiversity of an actual rainforest. The park opens at 5am, but visit between 6am and 7am to avoid the crowds and heat.

Grab a coffee to go from Lost Bean (Russell St; @lostbeanaust) - they start brewing at 6am and serve coffee made with sustainably sourced and

Melbourne-roasted St Ali beans. From there, follow the signs to Rainforest Green and enjoy a tranquil wander along the Rainforest Walk. It's an easy trail on a boardwalk built between lush native plants and trees.

For the rest of the morning, check out these two riverside galleries: Queensland Art Gallery (QAG) and Gallery of Modern Art (both at Stanley Place; gagoma.qld. gov.au). They offer excellent free exhibits. such as "Wonderstruck", featuring over 100 artworks by international and Australian artists that celebrate the wonder in the ordinary. Don't forget to snap a selfie at the iconic Brisbane sign.

Ready for some grub? Walk over to The Jetty Southbank ($River\ Quay,\ Shop/4$ Sidon St; thejettysouthbank.com.au) for a brunch of smashed avocado, crushed feta and dukkah served on freshly baked sourdough bread. The menu changes constantly, highlighting the best of Australian produce. Order your second cuppa of the day or treat yourself to a cocktail at lunch.

Push yourself out of your comfort zone. If you prefer descending, sign up for abseiling lessons at Kangaroo Point Cliffs (29 River Terrace). Admire the Brisbane River and city skyline before rappelling down the cliffs. If climbing is your jam, opt for the Story Bridge Adventure Climb (5 Boundary St; storybridgeadventureclimb.com.au). Ascend the iconic Story Bridge - the same one you see on souvenir postcards and mugs - via stairs and catwalks until you reach a sturdy platform 80m above the river. Pat yourself on the back for your daring, then savour the panoramic city views from the top.

Evening. Brisbane was a penal colony from 1824 to 1839, so why not cap your thrilling day with dinner at Felons Brewing Co (5 Boundary St; felonsbrewingco.com.au). Nestled under the Story Bridge, this modern-day brewery in Howard Smith Wharves was inspired by the true story of four Sydney-bound felons shipwrecked on Moreton Island in 1823. Dig into their delicious wood-fired pizzas and fish and chips, matched with their flagship crisp lager, while enjoying sitting outdoors.

Saturday

Morning. Rent a car and drive north to Noosa Heads, an hour and a half from downtown Brisbane. This Unesco Biosphere Reserve is considered one of Australia's most beautiful beach towns, favoured by the rich and famous.





Alternatively, you can take the Sunshine Coast train from Brisbane for a longer but more leisurely journey.

Make your way to Noosa Main Beach for a swim, then to Noosa Heads Surf Life Saving Club (69 Hastings St;noosasurfclub.com.au) to get a feel of the land. Grab a table with balcony views and order lunch. Take your pick from calamari, oysters, fish and chips or an Asian salad - the portions are generous and the service is quick.

Afternoon. With its gentle waves and protected surf, Noosa Main Beach is the perfect spot for surf lessons. Merrick's Noosa Learn to Surf (@noosalearntosurf) guarantees you'll be standing on your board during your first session. Their two-hour group class includes rental of a surfboard, rash guard and wetsuit.

After riding the waves, slip into comfortable shoes for a hike along Noosa National Park's coastal trails. You just might spot koalas and kookaburras perched in trees, even marine life if you venture further. During migration season (June to November), dolphins and humpback whales have been spotted from Dolphin Point and Hell's Gates.

Evening. Food options abound on Hastings Street, Noosa's stylish strip by the beach. Love Asian fusion? Bang Bang Noosa's (U 9 Lot 6/32 Hastings St; bangbangnoosa.com) dishes are meant for sharing, and with good reason: you won't need a lot to appreciate the flavours. Order the Hiramasa kingfish with green apple, coconut, mango and



kaffir lime, and don't miss the woktossed sen yai noodles with braised beef shin, sweet soy sauce and crispy shallots served with chilli vinegar.


Sunday

Morning. Pop into Moonstruck Noosa (5 Hastings St; moonstrucknoosa.com) for a flat white and freshly baked ham and cheese croissant. This funky café serves 100% locally sourced food and coffee and transforms into a boutique cocktail

bar at night. The interiors evoke the old-school cafés of Europe, with warm lighting and mosaic-tiled floors. It's the perfect setting to enjoy an unhurried breakfast before your one-hour drive to **Australia Zoo** (australiazoo.com. au) in Beerwah, which opens at 9am. The hours go by quickly in this award-winning zoo and animal sanctuary, the brainchild of the late Steve Irwin (aka the Crocodile Hunter). His legacy continues thanks to his wife, Terri, and children, Bindi and Robert.

Purchase roo food (AUD\$3) from the gift shop, then hand-feed kangaroos and wallabies in Roo Heaven or Red Kangaroos anytime from 9am. To get up close and personal with a koala, book a Cuddly Koala Encounter (various time slots available). For lunch, head to Grasslands Café for a table with an amazing view of an African savannah replica, with real zebras, rhinos, giraffes, cheetahs and meerkats roaming around.

Afternoon. Arrive 15 minutes early at the Crocoseum to get good seats for the Wildlife Warriors Show, featuring giant snakes and majestic birds in flight, such as the wedge-tailed eagle (Australia's largest bird of prey), kookaburras and barking owls. The show's highlight is the crocodile feeding, starring the world's largest reptile: the saltwater crocodile.

Terri, Robert and Bindi often join in for some jaw-snapping entertainment. Leave Beerwah for your one-hour drive back to Brisbane.

Evening. Enjoy a final dinner in Fortitude Valley. For a novel experience, Agnes (22 Agnes St; @agnesrestaurant) ticks all the boxes. The award-winning restaurant is housed in a dimly lit heritage warehouse, where meals are cooked in an open wood-fire kitchen. Try the Skull Island tiger prawns with fermented chilli butter – one of chef Ben Williamson's creations, and a favourite of Nigella Lawson.

Where to stay

This sustainable five-star hotel, located under the iconic Story Bridge, offers luxe accommodations and rooftop pool views, and is close to Howard Smith Wharves' dining scene. crystalbrookcollection.com

The Constance

Evolving beyond its beloved hawker roots, Penang's fine dining scene is gaining global appeal thanks to world-class chefs and Michelin stars

Whenever I'm here, I feel like I've just stepped into a living tapestry –







from centuries-old temples, colonial-era mansions to buzzing street food stalls and the weathered walkways of the clan jetties. All of it forms part of the George Town Unesco World Heritage Site, where vivid expressions of culture, history and daily life are woven into every corner. But this time, I've come with a more curious palate, searching for something unexpected. Amid the kopitiams, curry houses and hawker stalls that define Penang's celebrated food scene, a new wave of overseas-trained chefs is quietly reshaping the island's gastronomic identity.

As I set out to explore the island's ever-evolving food scene, what excites me the most is the chance to discover something new – a boundary-pushing dish, a reimagined classic or a chef's personal interpretation of heritage and haute cuisine.

My first stop is Restaurant Au Jardin, one of Malaysia's most celebrated fine dining establishments. Tucked within George Town's artistic hub, Hin Bus Depot – a creative space known for indie art galleries and weekend markets – Au Jardin lives up to its name ("in the garden") by offering a quiet, refined escape in a repurposed warehouse. Inside, I'm greeted by raw concrete walls and floorto-ceiling windows, accentuated by lush

greenery and natural light. Elegant yet understated, the space mirrors Penang itself – a harmonious blend of old and new, heritage and reinvention.

"Penang's culinary canvas is incredibly colourful," says Su Kim Hock, Au Jardin's chef-proprietor. "You can enjoy everything here, from street food and cafés to fine dining, if you want to spoil yourself. It's the complete experience you won't find anywhere else."

Au Jardin's thoughtful fusion of French technique, Peranakan sensibility and Malaysian produce has earned Su and his team numerous accolades, including a coveted Michelin star. It's also deeply personal, rooted in Su's French culinary training, Asian heritage and time spent honing his craft in the UK, Taiwan and beyond.

"Penang has one of the widest flavour spectrums in the world," adds Su. "Beyond the three main ethnic groups – Malay, Chinese, Indian – our food is shaped by Hokkien, Cantonese, Teochew, Peranakan, Thai and expat influences."

A prime example of that spectrum is Au Jardin's signature cognac- and hay-aged duck. Perfected through continuous refinement and cooking techniques honed over the years, it's a sensorial treat every time I experience this masterfully crafted dish. It begins





In its current iteration, the duck is served with fermented guava and guava purée, Szechuan pepper and blanc jus. It's a dish that lingers on the palate long after the last bite.

PENANG'S FOOD CULTURE HAS ATTRACTED

talent from across Malaysia, including Ker Yang Hao, co-founder of Firewood, a grillfocused restaurant dedicated to showcasing quality meats and ingredients.

A Taiping native, Ker studied culinary arts in Penang before moving to Singapore to cut his teeth at St Regis and Gordon Ramsay's Bread Street Kitchen. When the Covid-19 pandemic struck, the entrepreneurial chef returned home and opened Firewood in the heart of George Town. Today, it's a Michelin Selected restaurant and proudly ranked 68th in the World's 101 Best Steak Restaurants.

Firewood is located on Jalan Masjid Kapitan Keling, one of Penang's oldest and most storied streets and famously dubbed the "Street of Harmony" for its historic religious landmarks that reflect the island's diverse communities. Shedding the

timeworn charm of its heritage shophouse origins, the restaurant now features a sleek, modern interior – black steel, timber floors, high ceilings – drawing your eyes towards the action at the open grill.

For the full experience, I sit at the counter. The rich aromas of smouldering charcoal and the sizzle of meat on the grill create a captivating sensory display. Starters like charred white sweet corn and hay-smoked seasonal mushrooms highlight how heat and technique can coax deep, layered flavours from humble ingredients.

But the undisputed star is the premium dry-aged beef – sourced from Australia, Japan and Korea – grilled to perfection and served with roasted garlic and Ker's house66

blended Malaysian umami spice. Is there anything else that satisfies the palate quite like a perfectly cooked steak? I doubt it.

"We've seen so many talented people in F&B return to Penang from abroad, especially Penangites," says Ker. "There's a growing demand for elevated dining experiences from both locals and tourists across the region."

Though street food remains the island's biggest draw, Penang's evolving restaurant scene is now receiving just as much attention. "Our F&B sector needs to step up its marketing game to let more people know that there's so much more to discover beyond our amazing street food," he adds.

MY LAST STOP IS THIRD CULTURE DINING,

housed in a restored mid-century bungalow in Pulau Tikus, once home to a local architect. The setting feels stylishly homey and inviting, featuring vintage botanical prints, polished marble and Art Deco furnishings, all curated to reflect minimalist elegance. The all-women front-of-house team greets me with gracious warmth, creating the kind of dining atmosphere that feels like a reunion with old friends.

After graduating from Lyon's prestigious Institut Paul Bocuse (now Institut Lyfe) and

spending years honing her skills in some of the world's most esteemed kitchens - La Maison Troisgros, L'Astrance and Septime - followed by refining her farm-to-table approach in Napa Valley and Hawaii, chef-owner Khor Sue Ching brings a fresh, contemporary voice to Penang's culinary landscape. Though not a native Penangite, she honours its food heritage through the lens of modern gastronomy and local produce.

One dish that perfectly captures Khor's culinary identity is her take on lam mee, a beloved Penang classic featuring thick vellow noodles served in a rich, thick broth. Originally conceived as a French-style bouillabaisse showcasing local seafood, it evolved into an Asian-fusion reinterpretation featuring angel hair pasta, grilled king prawns, steamed flower crab and a housemade lacto-fermented sambal and dill.

"To me, this dish truly reflects the spirit of Third Culture, honouring where I come from while embracing where I am. It's a conversation between East and West in one bowl," says Khor.

She also notes how Penang diners are changing. "A restaurant's aesthetics and ambience didn't used to matter as much. But now, thanks to social media, they've become key factors in how people choose where to eat."

As my time in George Town draws to a close, I leave deeply satisfied and genuinely inspired, knowing that Penang's vibrant F&B scene continues to flourish. Guided by passionate chefs and rooted in a rich cultural heritage, its offerings - ranging from humble hawker fare to boundary-pushing cuisine - always make for a memorable time.

Acclaimed cocktail bar **Backdoor Bodega** continues to be at the forefront of Penang's burgeoning drinks scene. Founded by selftaught mixologist Koh Yung Shen, it has earned global acclaim; ranked 64th on Asia's 50 Best Bars extended list and winner of this year's Siete Misterios Best Cocktail Menu Award.

"Five years ago, if you were an ambitious bartender in Penang, you wouldn't stay here because there wasn't a clear career path," reflects Koh. "Today, we have people moving to Penang to work in bars, thanks to international recognition. That shows they have confidence in our growing bar scene."

Penang's rich food scene can overwhelm first-timers, but the Backdoor Bodega team acts as cultural guides, curating authentic local experiences. Their award-winning cocktail menu, titled The Backdoor Bodega Guide to Penang, is an encyclopaedia of the island's culture, history and flavours, cleverly woven into each cocktail.

"Our drinks showcase Penang's unique flavours – our RBS (Ramly Burger Special) is a good example," Koh explains. "People often order it without knowing what a Ramly burger is. That gives us the perfect opportunity to share its story as an iconic Malaysian street food. Sometimes, we even order one for them so they can do a side-by-side comparison." @backdoorbodega





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



Feel the the rush

Once known mainly as a golf haven, the coastal city of Da Nang in Central Vietnam is fast emerging as a hub for other leisure sports. If you love adrenaline-pumping holidays, you've come to the right place

It's 5.35am and My Khe, Da Nang's central beach, is already buzzing. There's a sea of scooters and motorbikes





parked along Vo Nguyen Giap Street, a four-lane beachfront boulevard named after the late general who was instrumental to Vietnam's reunification in 1975. It's a morning made for moving. breaking a sweat and getting the heart rate up, and I survey Da Nang residents of all ages on the broad sand practising tai chi, jogging, tossing a Frisbee.

Less than two decades ago, this approximately 9km beach was a sparsely populated coastal stretch in Da Nang. Today, it's a hive of constant activity and some of the biggest international hospitality groups have a stake on the strip, operating hotels and resorts across a range of price points.

Before developments such as Ba Na Hills - a hill station mountain resort with a leisure park and a Luke Donald-designed 18-hole golf course - and the Golden Hand Bridge took social media by storm, Da Nang had already made a name for itself as a golfer's favourite, thanks largely to Central Vietnam's long dry season that stretches from January to August. Now, more and more travellers are catching on to Da Nang's rare and enviable setup - a wide,



Da Nang's remarkably well-kept beaches – perfect for all manner of water sports – draw travellers from far and wide. At Danabeach, on the south end of My Khe, adrenaline-fuelled water sports such as parasailing and wakeboarding are available on demand, with wait lists forming well before 8am. (It's reassuring to know that since 2012, Vietnamese authorities have tightened safety measures for water-related activities. Life vests are a prerequisite and all lifeguards must possess a valid licence.)

For an average package rate of VND950,000 (USD\$36), you and a travel buddy can be hoisted 120m into the air, thanks to a parachute and a speedboat. No prior training required, just the courage to be airborne for three to five minutes – an eternity if your legs are dangling in the air. For an additional fee, a drone







will record this moment of daring against a stunning backdrop of the bay and the picturesque Son Tra Mountain.

In a more private setting in the west end of the mountains, you can enjoy similar activities at Vietgangz Beach Club Da Nang, a group of beach-and-camping clubs across the country. If flying high over the water isn't on your list, perhaps a slow relaxing stand-up paddle on lightweight inflatable boards around a scenic bay is just what you need.

If you're up for something more grounded, then Son Tra, also known as Monkey Mountain, is home to a 4,400ha nature reserve of the same name. Animal lovers will find several species of adorable primates, most notably the endangered red-shanked douc langur nicknamed the "Queen of Primates". The luxurious, Bill Bensley-designed InterContinental Danang Sun Peninsula Resort is located within the reserve, and part of its offerings are guided three-hour hikes through the jungle to behold an 800-yearold Banyan tree or along the mountain ridge to the breathtaking Son Tra Mountain summit.

BACK IN MY KHE, NET SPORTS TAKE OVER THE AFTERNOON. FROM

3.30pm every day, the Danang Summer Spikers, a Telegram-based volleyball players group, set up a private pitch for highly competitive and electric tournaments. Most of the players are expats, but the community oozes an easygoing vibe and anyone is welcome to join. Several open game pitches with no player limit can be found on the same stretch, and finding groups to play with is as easy as searching for groups on Facebook with the keywords "Danang", "Expats" and "Volleyball". Perfect opportunity to flex volleyball and social skills.

When evening descends, the city comes alive with a new countrywide obsession: pickleball, a cousin to both tennis and ping pong, but a sibling to neither. Invented in the US in the 1960s, the sport is experiencing a boom across the globe. 
popularity to the nature of the sport itself – compared to tennis, the play area is smaller, the paddle is lighter, the rules are simpler and the games tend to be shorter.

Just a short walk from My Khe beach, at 6 Point Pickleball, the action begins at 5am and continues throughout the day and well into the night. Owner Le Hai Anh, a Hanoi native, set up the business as an excuse to move to the comparably laidback Da Nang. She tells me, "My son spent three years learning tennis. Now he has no one to play with. Everyone is into pickleball."

The beachside facility – which features a café and lounge area, six professional courts and retractable canopies so you can play rain or shine – is one of a growing number of pickleball clubs mushrooming around the city. There's a social element to it as fans encourage others to pick up the sport; if you're up for a bit of serve and volley, lace up your trainers, rent a paddle and show up in court.

FOR ADVENTURE BUFFS LOOKING FOR A MORE SUSTAINED HIGH.

there's a fun option: motorbike rides. More than 70 percent of the elongated, S-shaped country rely on two-wheelers for their daily commute, and decades of riding motos has established a motorbike-and-scooter culture like no other. Experience it yourself with a ride to the Unesco-inscribed Hoi An Ancient Town, a 15th-century trading port known for its mustard-coloured buildings, that became





But motorheads make the journey for an additional reason – Central Vietnam's lush rice paddy fields. It's one of the highlights on tours by Onyabike Adventures, a tour outfitter founded in 2017 by Hawkmoon Boxer, originally from England, and Australian Jeff Burke. Today, it is one of the few fully legal motorbike tour providers based in Da Nang and an official tours partner of Royal Enfield, stocked with a fleet of 25 Himalayan 410cc motorbikes.

"Demand [for motorbike touring] has increased significantly over the last few years," says Boxer. Da Nang is particularly popular. "People love the region's coastal routes." Onyabike's tours vary in size, from two to 10 riders in a pack. The seven-day Highlights of Central Vietnam tour is a truly epic adventure.

In the 1,300km loop that begins and ends in Hoi An, participants will visit the ancient Vietnamese capital of Hue, and the Khe Sanh District in Quang Tri Province, known for speciality coffee and various Austroasiatic-speaking hill tribes.

Continuing onwards through the Ho Chi Minh Trail, riders will reach Phong Nha-Ke Bang, a national park and Unesco World Heritage Site in Quang Binh Province, home to the otherworldly Son Doong, believed to be the largest cave on earth.

If time is short, the Hai Van Pass and Monkey Mountain tour will take you beyond the Son Tra Mountain and over the stunning Hai Van Pass, a 21km coastal route offering panoramic views of the Lang Co peninsula.

It's an exhilarating ride, one that, like the rest of action-packed Da Nang, will inspire you to keep coming back.
