

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MALAYSIAN ICONS

A celebration of cultural pride, heritage and timeless Malaysian craftsmanship



Lustrous hits

Two Malaysian manufacturers are keeping the timeless art of pewter craftsmanship alive **BY RENYI LIM**



Prized for its beauty and versatility, pewter has been crafted and traded since the Bronze Age, with the earliest examples found in an Egyptian tomb dating to around 1450 BC. This metal alloy, made primarily of tin mixed with antimony, bismuth, copper or lead, has historically flourished in Malaysia.

The discovery of vast tin deposits in Perak and Selangor in the mid-19th century laid the foundations of the local pewter industry. By 1904, the country was producing over 50,000 tonnes of tin annually – more than half the world's supply – driven by booming demand for tinplate cans in Europe and America.

Among the many Chinese migrants who came to work in the mines were skilled tinsmiths. One of them, Yong Koon from Shantou, arrived in Kuala Lumpur in 1885 and later founded Royal Selangor, now Malaysia's most renowned pewter manufacturer. When tin prices fell in the 1930s, Yong Koon pivoted to crafting pewter ashtrays, vases, teapots and European-style cigarette boxes.

Though tin exports fell sharply in the late 1990s – accounting for less than 1% of the country's gross export earnings – pewter craftsmanship endures. Royal Selangor, headquartered in Kuala Lumpur, remains the world's largest manufacturer and retailer of pewter. Alongside it, smaller companies, such as Penang-based Pewter Art Malaysia, uphold their own proud pewter-making traditions, collectively preserving and advancing Malaysia's long-standing heritage in the craft.

WORTH ITS METAL

Although pewter was historically made with lead, modern formulations are lead-free and safe for contact with food, beverages and skin.

How is it made?

Every pewter creation begins with casting. Molten pewter, heated to around 250°C, is poured into a preheated iron or rubber mould. Once cooled, the piece is filed, polished to a silvery sheen, and – if made from multiple parts – soldered together with temperature control, timing and precision.

Beyond its distinctive lustre, pewter's true beauty lies in the artistry behind it. "We still believe in the human component involved in the design, creation and retailing of our products," says Dato' Yong Yoon Li, managing director of Royal Selangor and a fourth-generation member of the family business. "We take influences from the arts and cultures of this region and make them accessible for our customers to have in their homes [through our range of home products] – it's a reminder of what Malaysian culture is all about."

At Royal Selangor's Setapak factory, artisans assemble and solder each





piece by hand. Techniques such as hand-polishing, scotching (creating a smooth sheen), hammering (adding a dimpled texture) and hand engraving give every item its unique character.

Royal Selangor continues to push creative boundaries through collaborations with international designers and museums, including Taiwan's National Palace Museum. Its Autumn/Winter 2025 release features 10 new collections timed perfectly for the gifting season. A highlight is the Silk Road series, inspired by murals of the Flying Apsaras from the Mogao Grottoes in Dunhuang, China. The ethereal figures – symbols of divine beauty, music and blessings – are intricately sculpted across vases, tumblers and tea caddies.

Pewter's future in Malaysia

Safeguarding Malaysia's pewter heritage remains an ongoing challenge, particularly for manufacturers with small artisan teams. "Our workshop has only 15 highly skilled pewter craftsmen, with our most senior boasting over 35 years of experience," says Ng Shi Ling, creative director of Pewter Art Malaysia. "With fewer young people taking up the craft, every piece created today becomes even more meaningful, carrying the legacy of a rare and cherished tradition."

Even for a long-established company like Royal Selangor – which employs around 150 pewter craftsmen – attracting new talent is a continual effort. "Smithing isn't everyone's cup of tea; it involves cutting, filing, sanding and fitting – very tedious

work," says Dato' Yong. "But after the pandemic, many young people have realised they enjoy hands-on, creative work, so we've seen a steady stream of apprentices. They train for 10 weeks, then choose to specialise as solderers, casters, polishers or hammerers. After two or three years, they become quite skilled. Our pewter artisans typically stay with us for 30 to 40 years."

At the Royal Selangor Visitor Centre, visitors can experience pewter-making through interactive workshops such as the School of Hard Knocks and The Foundry, where they learn to craft pewter pieces by hand. Who knows? A few budding talents might even find their calling in pewter.

As the year folds into the next, Belum offers the rare luxury of stillness: an evening bonfire beneath a canopy of stars, the hush of the jungle before dawn and the quiet awareness that renewal does not always mean doing more. Sometimes, it simply means listening to the hush of nature.

Among ancient trees and timeless waters, a stay at Belum is more than a retreat – it is a gentle reset and a reminder that new beginnings often stem from the most enduring places of all.

Real deal

In the Maldives, where private pools and overwater villas are standard, **Soneva Fushi** in the Baa Atoll stands out for a quieter kind of luxury. The 71-villa resort, a 30-minute seaplane ride from the airport, has just won the SeiBellissimi Art of Hospitality Award at The World's 50 Best Hotels 2025, making it the first Asian property to receive the honour. →

The award recognises something that can't be measured: empathy, attentiveness and the kind of timing that makes a gesture feel both spontaneous and inevitable. "Luxury here isn't defined by gold-plated service," says general manager Antony Paton. "It's defined by care that feels deeply personal and naturally warm."

Since opening in 1995, Soneva Fushi has set the template for what's now called barefoot luxury. There's no formal butler protocol, no rehearsed greetings. The resort's Barefoot Guardians, as they're known, listen and observe – then act. That might mean leaving you your favourite fruit at breakfast or arranging a dinner under the stars that feels like your idea.

The service philosophy is simple: anticipate, don't intrude. Staff learn guests' preferences not from digital notes but through quiet observation. "We empower our hosts to take ownership of every interaction," Paton says. "It's about curiosity, not choreography."

Soneva Fushi's whimsical details reinforce the same ethos. There's an open-door chocolate room, an ice cream parlour stocked with rotating flavours and a "no menu" dining concept where chefs improvise dishes based on mood rather than order.

The empire rises again

The world's most famous terracotta army has arrived in Perth **BY MAX BREARLEY**

Often teased as the world's most isolated major city, Perth has found creative ways to overcome what Australians call the “tyranny of distance”: its vast separation from other big cities and cultural centres. The result is a self-sustaining arts scene.

In the Perth Cultural Centre at Northbridge, the **WA Museum Boola Bardip** is one of Western Australia's key cultural landmarks. Boola Bardip means “many stories” in the language of the Whadjuk Noongar people, the traditional custodians of Boorloo (Noongar name for Perth).

True to its name, WA Museum Boola Bardip has housed bold exhibitions

exploring diverse, ancient cultures. In an Australian first, the museum presents “Terracotta Warriors: Legacy of the First Emperor”, an immersive experience tracing the reign of Emperor Qin Shi Huang, running until 22 February 2026.

The world has been enthralled by the terracotta army since its discovery by farmers near Xi'an, Shaanxi Province in 1974. Over 8,000 life-sized soldiers and horses, spread across over 51km², lay buried for 2,000 years – a demonstration of the emperor's power in life and protection in death.

The warriors are just one part of the 225 artefacts on display, some shown for the first time and nearly half never exhibited outside China. In collaboration with the Shaanxi Cultural Heritage Promotion Centre and Emperor Qin Shi Huang's Mausoleum Site Museum, the exhibition uses projections and interactive elements to bring history to life.

While exploring the museum's collections, look out for *Illuminate*, a permanent digital display projected onto the Old Gaol, a heritage-listed building within the complex. This multisensory kaleidoscope of light draws inspiration from the museum's exhibits and the state's natural beauty. visit.museum.wa.gov.au

Eat like a 'glocal'

An inventive restaurant is putting **Shenzhen** on the culinary map **BY SOPHIE STEINER**

Over the past

year, Fumée in Shenzhen's Nanshan District has become one of southern China's most talked-about restaurants, drawing diners eager to experience its inventive cuisine. A visit here brings a refreshing discovery: a world of flavours that feels both global and unmistakably Chinese.

Founded in 2022 by visionary restaurateur David Pan, Fumée champions traditional Chinese flavours through creative modern techniques led by chef Reina Chen. The latter's stint at Mugaritz in San Sebastian (one of the world's most experimental fine dining institutions) and her former career as a Kunqu Opera singer has shaped her belief that food should engage all five senses and tell a story.

Located in the city's tech and dining hub, Fumée welcomes guests into a warmly lit space where a rustic counter, adorned in greenery, frames an open



kitchen. Here, Chen infuses her dishes with a "glocal" perspective – blending global technique with local tradition to create a "province-less" Chinese cuisine that reflects the cultural exchange and migration shaping China's culinary heritage.

Her 11-course seasonal tasting menu is paired with four cocktails, each designed to heighten the sensory experience. Expect surprising yet moreish flavour compositions: a quenelle of Chaoshan sweet olive ice cream balanced by pickled nectarine and a plump French oyster; 10-day aged duck piped with prawn mousse below puckering skin to resemble a layer of glossy fat; and Dongbei glutinous rice layered with jamón ibérico, Jinhua ham and Dalian sea urchin. **@fumeerestaurant**




Eat your way down the Seine

Plénitude: art of sauces

At the five-star Cheval Blanc Paris hotel, Plénitude is helmed by

celebrated chef Arnaud Donckeire, renowned for his masterful command of sauces.

Like a perfumer, he begins each dish with the *jus* (dressing) before building the seasonal components around it.

Service unfolds like a choreographed performance – from a visit to the wine cellar to a private course at the chef's table and a stop at the cheese cave. *@plenitude.paris*

Hakuba: Japanese culinary sanctuary

Also within Cheval Blanc Paris, Hakuba, led by chef Takuya Watanabe, immerses diners in refined Japanese gastronomy.

Renowned for his artistry in sushi and kaiseki, Watanabe's signature 17-course omakase showcases

the finest fish, rice and seasonal produce. Expect sake-flambéed, glazed eel over glutinous claypot rice and a briny kaki oyster nigiri.

Designed by Peter Marino, the tranquil Japanese forest-inspired interiors set the stage for Watanabe's artful presentations and inventive collaborations. *@hakubaparis*

Restaurant Kei: French-Japanese connection

In Paris' first

arrondissement, Restaurant Kei fuses French artistry with Japanese discipline.

Born in Japan's Nagano prefecture, chef Kei Kobayashi trained under Alain Ducasse and alongside Gilles Goujon before opening his eponymous restaurant in 2011.

World-class suites, dining and entertainment make this **Manila** escape one to remember

For travellers who like variety – a mix of action, entertainment, food and culture – **Solaire Entertainment City** has it all. Explore hidden bars, catch a theatre show, join an art tour and dine at some of Manila's best restaurants, all in one long, indulgent weekend.

As the first luxury integrated resort to break ground in the reclaimed Manila Bay area of Parañaque in 2010, it has since paved the way for the district's rise as a premier leisure and gaming destination. Just a 10-minute drive from Ninoy Aquino Airport and 30 minutes from Bonifacio Global City or Makati, it remains an unbeatable location.

From the moment you step in and stride past gleaming walkways lined with upscale restaurants and boutiques, it's hard not to marvel at the artworks and installations scattered across the 8.3-ha property. Clive Miners' *Foo Dogs* guard the entrance, Katarina Kudejova Fulinova's *Dramatic Leaf* chandelier dazzles in the main lobby and Norman

Dreo's *My Little Museum* spans an entire wall at the theatre foyer. Art enthusiasts should consider a guided tour to explore more of the resort's vast, eclectic collection.

Departing from the opulence of the gallery walkways, the Sky Tower lobby is a welcoming light-filled oasis filled with palm trees, fresh blooms and an indoor waterfall. The sleek 17-storey tower has held a Forbes Travel Guide Five-Star Rating for nine consecutive years, and after settling into the Sky Studio – a spacious 65m² suite with a living area and a generous bathroom featuring a bathtub, twin sinks and Acca Kappa toiletries – it's easy to see why. Other rooms include the Chairman's Suite, a lavish 395m² retreat on the top floor.

A food lover's haven, there are 19 restaurants and bars ranging from casual to fine dining on site. If there's no time to try them all, visit these: Italian restaurant Finestra for steak Florentine and homemade pastas; Red Lantern for braised short ribs or its lauded dim sum buffet; Oasis Garden Café for Filipino favourites like salmon sinigang; and Yakumi for premium sashimi and sushi flown in from Tokyo's Toyosu market.

Spend happy hour at Waterside Restobar with a cocktail or beer on tap while looking out over the pool. For a nightcap, head downstairs to the BRB Baccarat Room and Bar, where warm wood, plush seating, moody lighting and a crooning jazz singer recall a vintage speakeasy. It's a popular hangout for locals, even on weeknights.

If you can, try to time your visit with a show at Solaire. Designed with a state-

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A Malaysian in... Taipei

Between neon streets and mountain teahouses, versatile performer **Soo Wincci** found not just her voice, but the city that defined her artistic journey

I went to Taipei in 2011, just as my music began gaining traction in Taiwan. Between 2012 and 2015, it went viral across the region, and I ended up being based there for nearly five years. I recorded three albums during that period – an incredibly exciting time in my career, while juggling work and studies at the same time.

Life in Taipei

My first impression of the city was how peaceful and safe it felt – even late at night. I'd often head to 24-hour cafés after work to write my PhD thesis, something I couldn't imagine doing elsewhere. If you haven't been to

Eslite Bookstore Songyan (88 Yanchang Rd; eslitecorp.com), open all day and night, you must!

My days were structured: I'd wake up at 7am, hit the gym

and be at my recording label office by 10. From there, it was a whirlwind of meetings, rehearsals and appearances.

I lived near **Taipei 101** (7 Xinyi Rd; taipei-101.com.tw), which was incredibly convenient – shops, restaurants and the MRT were all within walking distance.

What I loved most were the people. Taiwanese are warm, polite and genuine – there was always kindness in every interaction. The cost of living was reasonable and everything worked so efficiently.

I've since moved back to Malaysia after my stint there, but these spots remain on my must-visit list whenever I return.

Incredible food scene

First-time visitors should visit **Shilin Night Market** (101 Jihe Rd; shilin-night-market.com). It may be touristy but it's worth it – giant crispy chicken cutlets, juicy grilled oysters, candied sweet potatoes, stinky tofu and milk teas in every flavour. It's the perfect introduction to Taiwan's vibrant street food culture.

Looking for a good breakfast spot? Go to **Good Cho's** (54 Songqin St; [@goodchos_tw](http://goodchos_tw)) for handmade bagels. The nasi lemak at Malaysian eatery **Mr Chee Kopitiam** (385 Section 2,





Fuxing S Rd; @mr.cheekopitiam) will surely hit the spot.

For lunch, the hearty beef noodles at **Chang's Halal Beef Noodle Shop** (21 Yanping S Rd) are simple and comforting. If you're looking for vegetarian options, **Loving Hut** (247 Songde Rd; lovinghut.com) offers affordable vegan fare while **Yang Shin Vegetarian Restaurant** (128 Songjiang Rd; ysvege.com) serves dim sum so realistic you'd never guess it was meat-free.

Foodies should also explore Taipei's Michelin dining scene. Book a table at **Tairroir** (299 Lequn 3rd Road; tairroir.com) which offers

elevated Taiwanese cuisine in a luxe setting. Make sure to book ahead.

For a soulful recharge, nothing beats **Maokong** in Wenshan District, near Taipei Zoo station. Ride the cable car into the misty hills to find teahouses overlooking lush valleys. Try tea-infused dishes like tea oil noodles or chicken, fried rice with tea leaves, tea-roasted eggs or tea-essence tofu – simple and delicious.

Tucked into quiet alleyways, Taipei's hidden cafés are perfect for unwinding or getting a bit of work done. Go to **Ogawa Coffee** (39 Wuxing St; [@ogawa.coffee](http://ogawa.coffee)) for its relaxed outdoor seating,

After5 (34 Linsen N Rd; [@after5_coffeetail](http://after5.coffeetail)) for industrial charm or **Mountain Kids Coffee Roasters** (126 Zhongxiao W Rd; [@mkcrtw](http://mkcrtw)) for some quiet work time.

For a quick pick-me-up in between shopping and sightseeing, Taiwan's fresh fruit culture means you're never far from a juicy guava or mango cup on the go.

Avenues of discovery

Ximending Night Market (127 Hanzhong St) is Taipei's fashion haven. It's trendy, fast-paced and perfect for scoring affordable, stylish outfits in a heartbeat.

Experience the thrill of finding pieces you love.

Beauty lovers will be captivated by Taiwanese skincare. Chains like Watsons and Cosmed stock an incredible range of sheet masks, creams and beauty gadgets.

As an artiste, I love Taipei's creative pulse. The city's live houses buzz with music ranging from indie rock to jazz. **Riverside Live House** (177 Xining Rd; [@riversidelivehouse](http://riversidelivehouse)) and **Blue Note** (171 Roosevelt Rd; bluenotetaipei.com) are two of my go-to spots.

If you only have one day

Start with Taiwanese breakfast such as *youtiao* (fried dough) and soy milk at **Yong He Soya Milk** (102 Fuxing S Rd). Visit Taipei 101 for the city views, some light shopping and a quick lunch at its food court. Take the MRT to Maokong for a tea-infused meal with hillside views, then head to Shilin Night Market for snacks and souvenirs. End your night in Ximending, where Taipei's youth culture truly comes alive.

Malaysians at heart

Building bridges between our country and its people around the world



When TalentCorp launched MyHeart, the idea was not to create another platform – it was to build a living, breathing community of Malaysians around the world. “From the start, the inspiration came from the diaspora themselves,” says Nazrul Aziz, group chief strategy officer at TalentCorp. “Their voices, stories and hopes shaped what MyHeart is today.”

In a world where identity often transcends borders, MyHeart reflects a more modern definition of belonging. “Being Malaysian isn’t defined by where

you live. It’s about how you connect, contribute and care,” says Nazrul.

Through MyHeart, users can collaborate on research, cultural or community projects, or simply celebrate shared heritage. In this way, Malaysians abroad can give back without physically returning. “Home is where your heart – and impact – is,” he adds.

MyHeart’s community spirit is best seen through real-world connections. Nazrul recalls an initiative, Salam Dari Malaysia – London 2024, where Malaysian batik artist Shirlyn Low hosted a workshop that brought Malaysians together through art. “It reminded them of home and sparked new creative collaborations that continue beyond the event,” he says. “That’s the spirit of MyHeart – celebrating who we are, wherever we are.”

For TalentCorp, the most valuable insight from MyHeart’s journey has been about listening. “True engagement is built on trust, respect and shared purpose. It’s not about telling the diaspora what to do but about listening to how they want to contribute and create meaningful pathways for it to happen,” says Nazrul.

Ultimately, MyHeart is a digital embodiment of Malaysia’s greatest strength: its people. “Our borders don’t define us,” says Nazrul. “It’s our people, wherever they may be, who carry the Malaysian spirit forward. MyHeart is the manifestation of that.”

A PERFECT WEEKEND IN

Phnom Penh

Cambodia's capital teems with intriguing art and architecture, memorable dining and endless shopping. Here's how to make the most of it



Over the past several years, and throughout the pandemic, Phnom Penh has been rapidly transforming



from a low-slung sprawl of shophouse blocks into a cosmopolitan hub of towering buildings housing global retail and hospitality brands. Like all busy urban hubs, it can be overwhelming, but a thoughtful itinerary – a blend of classic attractions, well-established favourites and new must-visits – holds the key to a satisfying weekend in the city.

Friday

Morning. Shopping on the first day of the trip gives you time to scan the scene for what's available and mull over pricier items. At **Psar Thmey**, also known as the Central Market (St 142), housed beneath a photogenic Art Deco dome built in the 1930s, you'll find a tumble of affordable goods, including Cambodia's must-buy pantry essentials: black, red and white pepper from Kampot; coffee grown in the eastern highlands of Mondulkiri; and wild honey from Siem Reap and Kampong Thom.

Afternoon. Stroll down Street 240, lined with some of the city's finest independent boutiques for artisan-made crafts. Begin at **The Weaver's Tale** (29 Oknha Chhun

St 240; [@the_weavers_tale](#)) for legitimately fair-trade pieces from social enterprises such as **Fair Weave** ([fairweave.com](#)), makers of handloomed blankets, scarves and kimonos. Among the best items to take home or give as gifts are the colourful, handwoven bags and mats by **Maya Handicrafts** ([mayahandicraftscambodia](#)), jewellery made from bullet casings by **Ammo** ([ammojewellery.com](#)) and knitted toys by **Cambodia Knits** ([cambodiaknits.com](#)).

While in the Chakto Mukh neighbourhood, pop into the **National Museum** (Preah Ang Eng St 13; [cambodiamuseum.info](#)), a russet-hued, temple-inspired building housing one of the largest collections of Khmer artefacts. Beside it, the **Royal Palace**, King Norodom Sihamoni's official residence, offers limited access, with only the Silver Pagoda's Throne Hall – used for ceremonial events – open to visitors.

Evening. Few sunset viewing spots offer the same panoramic sweep as **Sora** (*Vattanac Capital Tower, Preah Monivong Blvd; [@sora_phnompenh](#)*), Rosewood Phnom Penh's 37th-floor sky bar. Through its glass walls, you

can watch the Tonle Sap and Bassac rivers merge with the mighty Mekong, Southeast Asia's longest river.

Prefer something more low-key?

Juniper Gin Bar (*The Point Hotel, St 130; @juniper_gin_bar*) is a classic alternative for sparkling sips, open-air dining and fiery sundowners.

For dinner, celebrate your first day with a multi-course meal at **Sombok** (*1 St 154; sombok.asia*), the riverside restaurant helmed by chef Kimsan Pol, one of the talents behind Siem Reap's much-lauded tasting restaurant Embassy. Expect attentive service, distinctly Cambodian flavours and a lively atmosphere along Sisowath Quay.

Saturday

Morning. Make arts and culture the theme of the day, starting with a leisurely breakfast at the new flagship outlet of **Brown Coffee** (*107 Mao Tse Toung Blvd; browncoffee.com.kh*), set in the former home of Vann Molyvann, Cambodia's most prominent architect and urban planner.

After your meal, explore the upper floors, originally built in 1966 and restored by HKA+Partners. Molyvann, who led the New Khmer Architecture movement of the 1950s and 1960s, was a defining figure of Cambodia's Golden Age under King Norodom Sihanouk. His restored home offers a glimpse into that era's thriving music, film and literary scene before the shadow of genocide.

Continue the theme with a guided tuk-tuk tour of Molyvann's works with **Khmer Architecture Tours** (*fb.com/KhmerArchitectureTours*). Led by a local architect, highlights include the Royal University of Phnom Penh, the 100 Houses social housing project and the



National Sports Complex (Olympic Stadium). En route, look out for the **Independence Monument** – a lotus-inspired stupa built in 1958 at the roundabout where Norodom and Sihanouk boulevards meet.

Afternoon. See Cambodia's history from a different lens at the **Sosoro Museum** (16 Preah Moha Ksatreiyani Kossamak Ave; sosoro.nbc.gov.kh), which traces 2,000 years of the country's monetary evolution, from the Funan period and the Khmer Empire to the French Protectorate and the present day.

Then head to **Factory** (1159 National Rd 2, Khan Mean Chey; [@factory_phnompenh](http://factory_phnompenh)), a mixed-use complex of tech offices, co-working spaces, art galleries and creative enterprises. It hosts regular weekend markets and one-off events, so check their social channels for what's on.

Evening. **Langka Lane** (St 51), an atmospheric alley with a don't-blink-or-you'll-miss-it entrance, offers a

fine mix of international fare. Try tasty, steaming pho at **Bún** ([@bun.phnompenh](http://bun.phnompenh)), seafood specials such as grilled lobster and baked scallops at **Clams** ([@clams seafood.club](http://clams seafood.club)) or modern French cuisine at **Le Langka** ([@le_langka](http://le_langka)).

Among Phnom Penh's many Japanese restaurants, **Oyakata** (54 St 57, BKK 1) shines for its excellent ramen and grilled mackerel.

Sunday

Morning. Have a traditional breakfast of *num banh chok* (fermented rice noodles in fish curry topped with flowers and vegetables) at **Psar Tuol Tompong** (off Monivong and Mao Tse Tung Blvds), nicknamed the Russian Market in the 1980s for its popularity among Russian expats. The market also serves as a landmark for the hip Tuol Tompong neighbourhood, a residential district peppered with trendy boutiques.

Head across town to one of this year's hottest openings, **Tsutaya** (1F, Aeon Mall 1; [@tsutayabookstorekh](http://tsutayabookstorekh)), the Japanese bookstore chain known for its curated mix of books and crafts. Its Phnom Penh outpost in Aeon Mall 1 is a full-fledged lifestyle destination, with a café (serving matcha, of course), a community event space and shelves of Cambodian books and international titles spanning literature, history, art and cookbooks.

The bookstore also puts the spotlight on some of Cambodia's finest crafts. Take home rattan baskets by **Manava** (manava-cambodia.com), a social enterprise employing over 70 women

Time for Techo

The new **Techo International Airport** (KTI) opened in September this year and it's a stunner: the US\$2 billion-dollar project, by global firm Foster + Partners, is designed to handle 13 million travellers annually. Among the highlights is a Brown Coffee outpost featuring large art installations inspired by seed pods, created by renowned Cambodian artist Sopheap Pich.

Where to stay

Shangri-la Phnom Penh
The hotel's gleaming glass towers opened at the end of 2024, marking the brand's debut in Cambodia. Some of its 303 rooms feature fantastic views of the Tonle Sap, Bassac and Mekong rivers. shangri-la.com

Hyatt Regency
It doesn't get more strategic than this – located just across the National Museum, along a street lined with art shops and galleries, the 247-key luxury property features a spa and a 24/7 fitness centre. hyatt.com

Hotel KVL Phnom Penh
This sleek and stylish 76-room hotel is conveniently located along Sisowath Quay. The rooms' understated elegance and soothing, muted colour palette is perfect for minimalist fans. hotekvlgroup.com

weavers from villages around Siem Reap practising long-held Khmer weaving techniques, or hand-crafted Cambodia-inspired perfumes by independent brand **Saarti** (saarti-cambodia.com).

Afternoon. No visit to the capital is complete without a meal at **Cuisine Wat Damnak** (St 228; cuisinewatdamnak.com), housed in a 1950s villa and serving Cambodian flavours prepared with French techniques. Unlike the original Siem Reap restaurant, once listed among Asia's 50 Best Restaurants, chef Joannès Rivière's Phnom Penh outpost offers an à la carte lunch, while dinner is served as tasting menus with vegan and vegetarian options.

Work off your midday indulgence with several rounds of pickleball at **Pickle Monster** (picklemonsterkh.com), which has outdoor courts at Hotel Cambodiana along Sisowath Quay. The best part? The gorgeous sunset backdrop.

Evening. For your final dinner in Cambodia, splash out on a private meal by Rotanak Ros, best known as **Chef Nak** (chefnak.com), one of the country's top chefs and advocates for Cambodian cuisine. Author of two award-winning books preserving nearly lost Khmer recipes, Chef Nak's private dining takes place in a traditional wooden house outside the city. Pre-booking is required, but the experience offers both exceptional food and a lesson in the resilience of the Cambodian people.



With Visit Malaysia 2026 ahead and hero dishes like the Stone Axe steak, Firewood KLCC marks the beginning of a confident new chapter.



Step beyond Auckland's marina to explore the Hauraki Gulf's most storied islands – the birdsong of Tiritiri Matangi, the gardens of Kawau's Mansion House and the creative calm of Waiheke – all ideal spots for a family adventure

Previously a working dockyard filled with fishing boats and warehouses, Auckland's Viaduct Harbour

was reinvigorated in the late 1990s to prepare for the 2000 America's Cup. Today, it's one of the city's most popular waterfront spots, with a lively mix of restaurants and yachts.

But look past the marina and out towards the water, and you'll see Auckland's true beauty. The Viaduct opens into the Waitematā Harbour, a sheltered waterway that flows east into the Hauraki Gulf, a vast marine park with over 50 unique islands to explore.

My husband and I have spent years sailing around these waters and keep finding ourselves drawn back to three in particular: Tiritiri Matangi, Kawau and Waiheke. Maybe it's the clear turquoise waters, the enchanting forests or the chance to see rare wildlife. Whatever it is, these islands always pull us back, with loved ones in tow, and every visit is filled with exciting adventures and precious memories.

The best part? They're all just a short ferry ride from the mainland, yet each offers a different experience, perfect for a day trip where families of all ages can explore and connect.

Tiritiri Matangi: feathered paradise

It's hard to imagine that Tiritiri Matangi was once a barren farmland. Today, it's an island sanctuary where there are more birds than people. As the Tiritiri Matangi Island Ferry pulls up to the jetty after an 80-minute ride from the Viaduct Harbour, you can already hear the chatter of birds carried over the water, a hint of what waits ashore.


Strolling beneath a lush forest canopy with a constant bird concert echoing around us, Tiritiri feels like entering another world. It's the perfect place for families to unplug from screens and reconnect with nature – not only because Wi-Fi coverage is limited but because there's so much to see in real life. The walking trails are well marked with benches along the way for older family members to rest and take in the views. Toilet facilities are available at Hobbs Beach, the Visitor Centre and the wharf.

For the best experience, head up to the Visitor Centre beside the historic 1864 lighthouse and join a guided walk with the Supporters of Tiritiri Matangi. Mosey along gently winding forest trails and look out for the *pōhutukawa* trees (known as New Zealand's Christmas tree) which bloom with red flowers in summer, from December to February.

Grandparents will love learning how to identify bird calls and hearing stories of how this land was brought back to life. Once a Māori settlement blanketed in dense native forest, Tiritiri Matangi was cleared for farming by the Europeans in the mid-1800s – a move that drove away much of its wildlife. But in 1984, the Department of Conservation and hundreds of volunteers launched a reforestation project on the island, planting 250,000 trees and reintroducing endangered bird species such as the *tieke* (saddleback), *hihi* (stitchbird), little spotted kiwi and *korimako* (bellbird).

Parents will want to keep their cameras ready – this is one of the best places in New Zealand to photograph native birds up close, particularly the elusive *kōkako* (also known as the “ghost of the forest”) and the endangered *takahē*, a large, flightless, jewel-coloured bird. Kids will be beside themselves if they’re lucky to spot the reptilian *tuatara* sunning itself on a rock – a real-life “dinosaur” with a third eye that dates back 250 million years.

There's no café or food service on the island, so it's best to pack food in sealed bags or containers. The island has a strict Pack In, Pack Out rule – whatever you bring, you take back with you. The Visitor Centre offers complimentary tea and coffee and sells cold beverages and bird-themed souvenirs in the gift shop.



Kawau: island of Victorian curiosities

Just a short trip north of Auckland, this island once belonged to Sir George Grey, who served twice as governor of New Zealand. In the mid-1800s, Grey purchased Kawau as his private retreat, envisioning it as a living menagerie. He brought in exotic plants and trees and imported animals such as wallabies, peafowl, kookaburras and monkeys to bring his dream to life.

Today, that eccentric vision remains. Arriving here in the summer feels like you've wandered onto the set of a period film, with the Victorian-era Mansion House at its heart. Surrounded by camellias and hydrangeas in full bloom, and with peacocks strutting across the lawns, it's hard not to be charmed. For a small entry fee of NZ\$4, you can wander through the beautifully restored parlours and dining spaces furnished with Victorian décor, filled with curiosities that hint at Grey's fascination with nature and the exotic.

Comfortable shoes and a sunhat are a must when exploring the island. From the Mansion House gardens, follow the shoreline trail on a 20-minute walk through native bush to Lady's Bay, a secluded beach cove perfect for a family picnic or a refreshing swim. Tell the kids to keep an eye out for wallabies, the smaller hopping cousins of kangaroos, or the cheeky *weka* – curious, flightless birds that often loiter for scraps under picnic tables.

For parents and older kids seeking a bit more adventure, the Coppermine Track to the stone engine house ruins is a two-hour return walk rich in history, with native bird sightings of *tūī*, *pīwakawaka* (fantail), *kererū* (New Zealand wood pigeon) and sweeping ocean views.



Grandparents who prefer a gentler pace can wander through the Victorian gardens around the Mansion House, enjoy the flowers and watch for peacocks.

When it's time for a bite, the whole family can regroup at the Mansion House Café. Open during the summer months from 10am to 4pm, the café serves lunch along with coffee, salads, sandwiches and Maree's scones, a local favourite.

Getting to the island is easy and a scenic experience. From Auckland's city centre, drive about 50 minutes north to Sandspit Wharf, where you can park and board a ferry to Mansion House Bay. Kawau Cruises operates a quick 20-minute ferry with five departures throughout the day during summer. For a more scenic journey, the Royal Mail Run Cruise takes a longer 40- to 50-minute route and offers the chance to spot gannet birds diving for food and the occasional penguin or dolphin along the way. Check the website for timetables and book your tickets at least two hours ahead.

For a captivating Māori performance

Catch the Māori Experience at Auckland Museum, where indigenous artists and orators bring Māori culture to life through music, storytelling and dance. Tickets are priced at NZ\$35 for adults and NZ\$17.50 for children aged 5–15. aucklandmuseum.com

For a full-day cultural immersion

Join a guided tour with local operators such as Cheeky Kiwi Travel for a day steeped in Māori heritage. Highlights include live cultural performances, a buffet lunch and a visit to Te Puia to experience its geothermal wonders. cheekykiwittravel.com

For a walk on the wild side

Explore New Zealand's wildlife and landscapes along the Te Wao Nui track at Auckland Zoo. Learn about unique native species such as the tuatara, a prehistoric reptile older than the dinosaurs. aucklandzoo.co.nz

Waiheke: art and behold

A place where laidback beach life meets artistic flair and a taste for the finer things, Waiheke Island is just a 35-minute ferry ride from downtown Auckland. Once a bohemian haven for struggling artists and dreamers in the 1970s, it now boasts a prominent art scene and some of New Zealand's best boutique wineries and restaurants.

Getting around the second-largest island in the Hauraki Gulf is simple, even for families with young children or older relatives. Most areas are stroller- and wheelchair-friendly, with paved paths and easy access to buses and taxis. Oneroa Village, the island's main township, is just a 15-minute stroll from Matiatia Wharf. The main street, Ocean View Road, is lined with cafés, art galleries and boutique shops selling everything from handmade jewellery to home décor by local artisans.

Start with a leisurely brunch at Wai Kitchen while admiring sailboats anchored on Oneroa Bay. Packed a picnic basket? Follow the sloping path from Ocean View Road down to Oneroa Beach, where kids can build sandcastles and paddle safely in shallow waters while parents unwind on a blanket under shady trees.

The Waiheke Community Art Gallery is a five-minute walk from Ocean View Road, where local talents exhibit their work. If you're there between 5 December 2025



and 1 February 2026, buy and collect a piece of original Waiheke art to take home from the "Jostle-Waiheke Small Things" exhibition. Summer is also the best time to go on the Oneroa Art Trail, an easy 3km walk past public art installations and local art galleries.

Waiheke's Mediterranean-like climate makes it ideal for vineyards and olive groves, and even those who don't drink will find plenty to appreciate. Foodies can head to Allpress Olive Groves on Gordon Road for a NZ\$10 tasting session that lets them sample a selection of extra virgin olive oils, learn about the milling process and even pick up a bottle or two to take home.

If you prefer something more thrilling, EcoZip Adventures offers an unforgettable way to see the island from above. After a quick pick-up from the Matiatia ferry terminal, the three-hour experience will have you soaring over treetops and vineyards.

Cap your island adventure at the iconic Mudbrick Restaurant on Church Bay Road, a three-minute taxi ride from Oneroa's main street. Order light bites – perhaps flatbreads, crispy calamari or shiitake mushrooms – sit back and admire views of the water and Auckland city in the distance.

To get here, board the Fullers360 ferry for a 40-minute trip to Matiatia Wharf from Auckland's Downtown Ferry Terminal at Pier 2 on Quay Street, within walking distance of the Viaduct Harbour. You can purchase tickets at the terminal on the day itself, but it's best to book ahead during summer.





In Hong Kong, art and design are no longer confined to the sidelines – they're woven into the very fabric of the city, reshaping its identity in ways that feel both deeply rooted and strikingly new

Long defined by its commercial prowess, Hong Kong might surprise you with just

how profoundly creativity is reshaping its urban soul. Across neighbourhoods, art and culture are reclaiming and reimagining forgotten spaces, turning them into canvases for new kinds of storytelling.

Tucked between the glass and steel skyscrapers of the central business district, Tai Kwun feels like a portal into another world. The moment you step through its gates, the city's frenetic buzz fades away. Slate-grey paths curve around shady courtyards; red-brick façades glow warmly in the afternoon light. Balconies with wrought-iron railings overlook open spaces alive with art-lovers, school groups and curious wanderers.

Once a symbol of law and order, the former police compound – Tai Kwun, meaning “big station” in Cantonese – has been transformed into a cultural landmark. Spread across 16 restored colonial-

era buildings, the site is a masterclass in preservation and reinvention. Today, it's a place of reflection and exchange, where visitors come for its exhibitions, performances and dining experiences.

What captivates most is the interplay between old and new. From one corner stands JC Contemporary, Tai Kwun's main art gallery designed by Swiss architects Herzog & de Meuron. Its cast-aluminium façade shimmers subtly with the changing light, and inside, a concrete staircase spirals elegantly through the building's three floors, anchoring the space with sculptural presence.

A SHORT CLIMB UP HOLLYWOOD ROAD brings you to PMQ – another reinvention of the past. Previously the Police Married Quarters, this clean-lined modernist complex now hums with the creative energy of Hong Kong's independent design scene. Twin white blocks are connected by breezy open-air corridors where sunlight filters through potted plants and the aroma of fresh coffee drifts from corner cafés. Behind glass-fronted storefronts, designers sketch and stitch, their studios doubling as boutiques and workshops.

Along the walkways, visitors peek into shops and pop-up galleries, where displays change with the seasons. At B'in Select, the shelves pay homage to Hong Kong's visual language – accessories shaped like mahjong tiles and table lamps inspired by the city's red-and-white taxis. Cheongsam brand For a Change reimagines the traditional dress in

bold, contemporary forms with asymmetrical cuts and unexpected fabrics. At Oscary Art studio, brushes swirl in paint jars as visitors join in art-jamming sessions.

ON HONG KONG ISLAND'S SOUTHSIDE, creativity takes on a grittier texture. Wong Chuk Hang, once an industrial zone of factories and warehouses, has evolved into a dynamic artistic enclave. The buildings still bear the marks of their utilitarian past – concrete columns, cargo lifts, metal shutters – but behind unmarked doors and up freight elevators lie some of the city's most compelling galleries.

Blindspot Gallery was among the first to champion photography and video art and now stages boundary-pushing exhibitions that explore identity and memory. A few steps away, SC Gallery celebrates Hong Kong artists through an unfiltered, local lens, set amid whitewashed walls, exposed beams and concrete floors. Across the road, Axel Vervoordt Gallery brings a contrasting calm with its minimalist aesthetic, hosting exhibitions that feel like serene, visual meditations.

What sets Wong Chuk Hang apart is its sense of openness. Even when visits are by appointment, the atmosphere remains welcoming rather than exclusive. Visitors are free to explore, observe and engage in a neighbourhood that feels more like a living creative ecosystem than a curated district.

ACROSS VICTORIA HARBOUR, THE WEST

Kowloon Cultural District rises as Hong Kong's boldest artistic statement yet. At its centre is M+, a museum of visual culture that has become a beacon for the city's creative identity.

"M+ helps tell stories of Asian contemporary arts that are not fully reflected in any existing museums in the West," says Suhanya Raffel, the museum's director. It marks the first time "we have in Asia an institution comparable to the Centre Pompidou in Paris or the MoMA in New York, both in scale, ambition and purpose," she adds. "It's like Hong Kong itself."

The museum's design – sleek and horizontal – echoes the city's skyline while subverting its vertical obsession. Inside, exhibitions span graphic design, sculpture, architecture and everything in between. And just outside, the Art Park stretches along the waterfront, dotted with joggers and amateur photographers chasing golden hour.

Design-driven stays for art lovers



Nearby, the Hong Kong Palace Museum offers a different kind of cultural immersion. Its vast galleries open like cinematic frames, displaying imperial robes, bronze artefacts and ancient scrolls. The space feels expansive, with wide sightlines and thoughtful lighting that bring centuries-old treasures into sharp contemporary focus.

A few steps away, the Xiqu Centre honours Chinese opera as a living, breathing tradition. Performances of Cantonese opera and other regional genres unfold in its grand, state-of-the-art theatre while workshops and behind-the-scenes tours reveal the craft and discipline behind the spectacle. Outside, the building's flowing, silk-like façade reinterprets the traditional Chinese moon gate motif – fluid, inviting and symbolic of passage.

For visitors, these places reveal a different Hong Kong – one where art is not just decoration but a driving force for change. For those who come with open eyes, it offers a powerful new way to experience the city: not just as it is, but as it's becoming.







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CABIN LUGGAGE HANDLING

Passenger and crew safety on board our flights are our highest priority. In compliance with the airline's policy and in observing Occupational Safety and Health Regulation requirements, cabin crew are no longer required to stow passengers' hand luggage in the overhead stowage compartments. This is to minimise occupational hazards and ergonomic risks faced by cabin crew in the aircraft. Cabin crew on duty will, however, assist passengers travelling with infants, young passengers travelling alone, the elderly and passengers with reduced mobility. Passengers who are fit and in good health must carry, stow and secure their hand luggage on board. Hand luggage exceeding the 7kg weight limit must be checked in before boarding.



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For safety reasons, in line with the Civil Aviation Authority of Malaysia guidelines, mobile phones and small PEDs can be used throughout your journey in "Flight Mode". Large devices with screen size above 12 inches are not allowed to be used during takeoff and landing. Whilst cruising, all devices can be used in "Flight Mode". Devices transmitting cellular signals to satellites must remain switched off throughout the flight, until disembarkation. The Captain may prohibit the use of devices if there is any interference with the aircraft's system.



LITHIUM BATTERIES

Lithium metal or lithium ion cells or batteries for portable electronic devices (PEDs), including medical devices, must not exceed 2g for lithium metal batteries and 100Wh for lithium ion batteries. All spare batteries, including lithium metal or lithium ion cells or batteries for PEDs, must be carried in passengers' carry-on baggage only. These batteries must be individually protected to prevent short circuits. PEDs containing non-spillable batteries must be 12V or less or 100Wh or less. Passengers are allowed to carry a maximum of two spare batteries onboard. These batteries must be individually protected to prevent short circuits.



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IN-FLIGHT ENTERTAINMENT

Movies, TV and Music On-Demand are available on selected flights either on seatback inflight

entertainment systems or streaming via personal electronic devices. Unlimited complimentary Wi-Fi internet service is available on selected aircraft regardless of cabin class or loyalty tier.



ONBOARD CHARGING

Laptop power points are fitted on Business Suite, Business, Premium Economy and selected Economy Class seats. USB charging is available on selected aircraft.



FOOD & BEVERAGE

All food served onboard is halal. Special dietary meals can be prepared with 24-hour notice through "Manage My Booking" on malaysiaairlines.com. Business Suite, Business and Economy Class passengers may use the Chef-on-Call service to pre-book their meals 24 hours prior to departure on selected flights. Alcoholic drinks are available on flights above three hours for passengers above the age of 21. Our cabin crew reserves the right to decline serving and selling alcohol to any passenger who appears intoxicated. Consumption of personal alcoholic drinks is prohibited.



FRESH & FROZEN SEAFOOD

Fresh and frozen seafood is strictly not permitted in check-in baggage. It may be accepted in cabin baggage, subject to the destination's

quarantine regulations. It must be properly packed and should meet the cabin baggage weight and size requirements. If dry ice is used, a maximum of 2.5kg per passenger is allowed. We reserve the right to refuse carriage if the items are not properly packed.



PEANUT & NUT ALLERGIES

Meals containing nuts may be served throughout the aircraft. We cannot accommodate requests for peanut/nut-free zones in the aircraft and strongly encourage those with allergies to take the necessary medical precautions before flying, including travelling with medications in their hand luggage.



WHEELCHAIR ASSISTANCE
